The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows : Section I. Subdivision II of section 107 of article VIII. of chapter 8 of the above-entitled ordinances is hereby amended by striking therefrom the word "North" before the word "West," so that said subdivision, when so amended, shall read as follows : "Stand No. 11—West and south sides of Madison Square." Sec. 2. Subdivision 14 of section 107 of article VIII. of chapter 8 of the above-entitled ordi-nances is hereby amended by striking therefrom the word "Sixth" before the word "avenue" and inserting in lieu thereof the word "Seventh," so that said subdivision 14, when so amended, shall read as follows : "Stand No. 14—At the junction of Broadway, Seventh avenue, or the squares Forty-third to Forty-seventh street."

Stant 16: 14-At the junction of Broadway, Seventh avenue, of the squares Porty-third to
 Forty-seventh street."
 Sec. 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.
 Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Alderman Van Rensselaer called up G.
