At a meeting of the Common Council of the City of New York, held June 10, 1890, a preamble and resolution, of which the following is a copy, was presented and adopted. The preamble and resolution was received from his Honor the Mayor, June 24, 1890, without his approval or objections ; therefore, as provided in section 75 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, the same became adopted :

Whereas, By authority of law, all the public offices of the city close at 12 o'clock M. every Saturday, and as the 4th of July, which occurs this year on Friday, is a legal holiday, it is believed that closing the public offices on the next day, Saturday, the 5th of July, thereby affording the employees of the city three consecutive holidays, viz. : Friday, Saturday and Sunday, July 4, 5 and 6, will be no detriment to the public service or cause the public any inconvenience ; be it therefore Resolved, That all the public offices of the City of New York, not by law required to be kept open, shall be closed on Saturday, the 5th day of July, 1890. CHAPTER 549.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows : Section I. Section seven hundred and seven of chapter four hundred and ten of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-two, is hereby amended so as to read as follows : § 70. In the work of street sweeping and cleaning and in the collection and removal of said sweepings, ashes and garbage, the men so employed may be provided with a metal badge to be designated by said commissioner, which shall be worn in a manner by which they shall be easily recognized as employes of the department. The board of police, upon the requisition of the com-missioner of street cleaning, shall detail, to the service of the department of street cleaning, for the ordnances of the common council in relation to the cleansing and keeping clean of the streets of the city of New York, not exceeding sixty suitable officers and men of experience of at least five years ser-vice in the police force, provided that the department of street cleaning shall pay monthly to the board of police a sum equal to the monthly pay of all officers and men so detailed. Such officers and men shall belong to the street cleaning company of police and shall report to the commissioner of street cleaning. The commissioner of street cleaning may report back to the board of police, for punsh-ment, any member of said company guily of any breach of orders or discipline,⁶ or of neglecting his duty, and thereupon the board of police may detail another officer or man in his place, and the discipline of the said members of the street cleaning may nobject to the efficiency of any members of said street cleaning company, and thereupon another officer or man be detailed in his place. The board of police, in addition to such other powers as they may now possess, shall have the power, and it shall be their duty to make additional appointments to the police force of the city, not exceeding the number of said officers and men. 
