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PUBLIC NOTICE.

OFFICE OF THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN, No. 8 CITY HALL,
NEW YORK, June 24, 1890.

At a meeting of the Common Council of the City of New York, held June 10, 1890, a preamble and resolution, of which the following is a copy, was presented and adopted. The preamble and resolution was received from his Honor the Mayor, June 24, 1890, without his approval or objections; therefore, as provided in section 75 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, the same became adopted:

Whereas, By authority of law, all the public offices of the city close at 12 o'clock M. every Saturday, and as the 4th of July, which occurs this year on Friday, is a legal holiday, it is believed that closing the public offices on the next day, Saturday, the 5th of July, thereby affording the employees of the city three consecutive holidays, viz.: Friday, Saturday and Sunday, July 4, 5 and 6, will be no detriment to the public service or cause the public any inconvenience; be it therefore

Resolved, That all the public offices of the City of New York, not by law required to be kept open, shall be closed on Saturday, the 5th day of July, 1890.

SIR—695 deaths were registered in this office during the week ending at noon of Saturday, June 14, 1890, representing an annual death-rate of 22.43 per 1,000 on an estimated population of 1,616,201.

CHAPTER 549.

AN ACT to amend section seven hundred and seven of chapter four hundred and ten of the Laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-two, entitled "An act to consolidate into one act and to declare the special and local laws affecting public interests in the City of New York," relative to the Street Cleaning Department.

Approved by the Governor June 7, 1890. Passed; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows: Section 1. Section seven hundred and seven of chapter four hundred and ten of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-two, is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

§ 707. In the work of street sweeping and cleaning and in the collection and removal of said sweepings, ashes and garbage, the men so employed may be provided with a metal badge to be designated by said commissioner, which shall be worn in a manner by which they shall be easily recognized as employees of the department. The board of police, upon the requisition of the commissioner of street cleaning, shall detail, to the service of the department of street cleaning, for the purpose of executing and enforcing the orders and regulations of said commissioner, and the ordinances of the common council in relation to the cleansing and keeping clean of the streets of the city of New York, not exceeding sixty suitable officers and men of experience of at least five years service in the police force, provided that the department of street cleaning shall pay monthly to the board of police a sum equal to the monthly pay of all officers and men so detailed. Such officers and men shall belong to the street cleaning company of police and shall report to the commissioner of street cleaning. The commissioner of street cleaning may report back to the board of police, for punishment, any member of said company guilty of any breach of orders or discipline,* or of neglecting his duty, and thereupon the board of police may detail another officer or man in his place, and the discipline of the said members of the street cleaning company shall be in the jurisdiction of the board of police, but any time the commissioner of street cleaning may object to the efficiency of any members of said street cleaning company, and thereupon another officer or man be detailed in his place. The board of police, in addition to such other powers as they may now possess, shall have the power, and it shall be their duty to make additional appointments to the police force of the city, not exceeding the number of said officers and men so detailed upon the requisition of the commissioner of street cleaning. The board of estimate and apportionment shall annually appropriate a sum sufficient to pay the salaries of said officers and men. The comptroller shall raise such sums by the issue of revenue bonds as may be required to pay such salaries so as to enable the board of police and the department of street cleaning to carry out the provisions of this act during the current year, and an amount sufficient to cover said salaries and to pay such bonds shall be included in the final estimate of said city for the year eighteen hundred and ninety-one.

§ 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

Resolved, That, subject to the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the sum of twenty-seven thousand dollars (\$27,000) be and is hereby appropriated from the proceeds of further additional bonds to be issued under and in pursuance of the provisions of the act, chapter 252 of the Laws of 1889, for the purchase, as a site for school purposes, of all that certain piece or parcel of land situate, lying and being on the northerly side of Eighty-second street, between the Boulevard and West End (formerly Eleventh) avenue, in the Twenty-second Ward of the City of New York, adjoining the site of Grammar School number Nine, on the easterly side thereof, bounded and described as follows: Beginning at a point on the northerly side of Eighty-second street distant one hundred feet easterly from the corner formed by the intersection of the easterly side of West End avenue with the northerly side of Eighty-second street, and running thence easterly, along the northerly side of Eighty-second street, fifty feet, thence northerly,

parallel with West End avenue, one hundred and two feet and two inches, to the centre line of the block between Eighty-second and Eighty-third streets, thence westerly along said centre line, fifty feet, to land of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, and thence southerly parallel with West End avenue and along land of the said Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty, one hundred and two feet and two inches, to the point or place of beginning; that the Comptroller of the City of New York be and he is hereby requested to issue such further additional bonds, for the purpose of providing the funds to meet the expenditure necessary for the purchase of said site; and that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby requested to approve of the same and of the purpose for which such expenditure is to be made, and to designate and appropriate the amount necessary to be expended for such purpose, and that when so designated and appropriated the same be paid by said Comptroller out of the proceeds of said bonds when issued, requisition therefor being hereby made, for the said piece or parcel of land above mentioned, upon the presentation to him of the deed or deeds for the same, together with the certificate of the Counsel to the Corporation that the title thereto is satisfactory and free from all incumbrances and is vested in the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York.

The consideration of the subject must be deferred, therefore, until an application is made to include an appropriation for the purpose in the estimates for 1891.

There is no existing appropriation for the purchase of sites for apparatus houses, and as it has been decided by the courts that a transfer cannot be made for a new appropriation, the funds cannot be provided by a transfer for the purpose, even if there was an appropriation from which a transfer could be made.

TO THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

It becomes my duty as Commissioner of Public Works and custodian of the many and immense interests involved in the City's water supply, to briefly present to the people of the City the present condition of the supply, and the extreme necessity for care and economy in the use of the water.

For a number of years past and up to the present time, the old Aqueduct and the Bronx river conduit have delivered in the City all the water which they are capable of carrying, the supply thus remaining stationary when the City has been constantly growing in population, buildings, manufactures and commerce, creating new and additional demands upon the water service. The consequence is that at certain seasons of the year, notably in extreme cold weather, when the habit of wasting water from faucets to prevent freezing in the pipes prevails, and in warm and dry weather, when various methods of waste are in vogue, the daily consumption exceeds the supply which can by any possibility be received through the old Aqueduct and the Bronx river conduit, the excess of consumption being drawn from the city reservoirs, diminishing the depth of water and the pressure in the distributing mains. There is no possibility of increasing the water supply received in the City until the new Aqueduct is brought into operation, and in the meantime the only reliance for a fair and equal distribution of water throughout the city is care and economy in its use on the part of the people. Already the depth of water in the reservoirs is being diminished at the rate of one inch per day, and if this should continue for any length of time, the pressure in the distributing mains would be so reduced that it would be impossible to deliver water in thousands of houses located on high ground, and in some other locations even in the basements or cellars.

I, therefore, most earnestly appeal to all citizens, residents and people carrying on business in this city to be careful and economical in the use of water, in justice to themselves, to the people at large, and especially to those who are so located as to be already suffering inconvenience from insufficient supply of water.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT
act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty, containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot, that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.

PUBLIC NOTICE AS TO WATER RATES.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT
in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559, Laws of 1887, amending sections 350 and 921 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed June 9, 1887, the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rents:

1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretofore been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meters are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter.

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

5th. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1887, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.
