The Board met pursuant to the following call :

In pursuance of the authority contained in the 112th section of chapter 335, being an act entitled "An act to reorganize the local government of the City of New York," passed April 30, 1873; and section 1 of chapter 779, being an act entitled "An act in relation to raising money by taxation in the County of New York, for county purposes," passed June 14, 1873; and chapter 304, being an act entitled "An act to consolidate the government of the City and County of New York, and further to regulate the same," passed April 30, 1874; and chapter 303, being an act entitled "An act in relation to the estimates and apportionment for the support of the government of the County of New York," passed April 30, 1874; and chapter 308, being an act entitled "An act in relation to the estimates and apportionment for the support of the government of the City of New York," passed May 1, 1874—a meeting is hereby called of the Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, constituting a Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to be held at the office of the Mayor, on Saturday, June 12, 1875, at 11 o'clock A. M., for the purposes specified in requisition of the Comptroller of June 10, 1875.

Mayor of the City of New York and Chairman of Board of Estimate and Apportionment :

SIR—By the provisions of chapter 593, Laws of 1872, and chapter 165, Laws of 1873, authority was given for the issue of additional "Croton Water Main Stock," for the laying of pipes to extend the distribut on of water through the city, and to furnish a sufficient supply to the institutions in charge of the Department of Charities and Correction, located on Blackwell's, Ward's, and Randall's Islands, and in laying mains to deliver water at higher elevations. The amount heretofore called for having been nearly exhausted in payment for work done and materials furnished, I deem it necessary and recommend that your Board authorize and direct the Comptroller to make a further issue of bonds for this work to the amount of three hundred thousand dollars.

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized to issue, from time to time, as may be required, and at such rates of interest as he may determine, not exceeding seven per cent. per annum, "Croton Water Main Stock," authorized by chapter 865, Laws of 1873, as per requisition of the Department of Public Works, dated September 5, 1874, one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000). The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote :

Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman), the Comptroller of the City of New York, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

GENTLEMEN—The undersigned, on behalf of the Prison Association of New York, respectfully

SIR—At a meeting of the Board held on the 2d inst., the following resolution was adopted :

"Resolved, That the Comptroller of the City of New York be and he is hereby requested to issue a public fund or stock to be denominated the 'Consolidated Stock of the City of New York,' to the amount of two hundred thousand dollars, as directed by section 2, chapter 351, Laws of 1875, said sum being necessary for the equipment of the building of the Museum of Natural History."

Resolved, That the appropriation of \$20,000 "For procuring and presenting of evidence in all matters, suits, or proceedings in relation to frauds committed, prior to January, 1872, on the City or County," under the head of "Miscellaneous Purposes," adopted December 24, 1874, be paid out, from time to time, on the certificate of the Comptroller, that the charges are reasonable and proper.

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the negative by the following vote :

Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman), and the Comptroller of the City of New York—2.

Negative—The President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—2.

The Comptroller offered for adoption the following resolution :

Resolved, That the following transfers of appropriations are hereby made, the unexpended amount thereof being in excess of the amounts required for the purposes and objects thereof, to certain other appropriations, the amounts thereof being insufficient, to wit :

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote :

Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman), the Comptroller of the City of New York, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

The Comptroller called up and offered for adoption the following preamble and resolution, laid over at meeting of May 21, 1875 :

Whereas, Chapter 759 of the Laws of 1873, authorizes the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to fix the compensation of the Commissioners for the erection of building for court purposes, appointed pursuant to chapter 335, Laws of 1873.

Resolved, That the compensation of the Commissioners of the New County Court-house be and the same are hereby fixed at the sum of \$2,000 each per annum, to take effect from the date of their qualifying to perform the duties of their offices.

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the negative by the following vote :

Affirmative—The Comptroller of the City of New York—1.

Negative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman), the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—3.

The President of the Board of Aldermen offered for adoption the following resolution :

Resolved, That the sum of \$2,500 is hereby transferred from the appropriation for "Fire Department Fund," 1874, the same being in excess of the amount required for the purposes and objects thereof, to the following appropriation for 1875, for which it is required, "For defraying the expense of the preparation of the New York Municipal Code," the expenditure thereof to be under the direction and subject to the approval of the Mayor.

Which was laid over.

The Comptroller offered for adoption the following resolution :

Whereas, The salaries now paid to the Supervisor of the City Record and his assistants are greatly in excess of the value of the services performed or required, and impose an unnecessary expense upon the taxpayers of the city, which should be reduced as much as possible :

Resolved, That the Mayor, Corporation Counsel, and Commissioner of Public Works, who are empowered by section 111 of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, to appoint and fix the compensation of said Supervisor and his assistants, be and they are hereby respectfully requested, if in their judgment they deem it proper, to revise the rates of compensation now paid to them, and by a reduction of salaries and the number of assistants required, so curtail said expense that it shall not exceed in all the sum of five thousand dollars per annum.

The President of the Board of Aldermen presented the following communication :

DEAR SIR—According to your request of this morning, please accept this statement of the situation of the armors of the several regiments, troops and batteries attached to the First Division of the National Guard. We have received no pay for our services rendered thus far for the year 1875, and I presume many of the armors' families are in destitute circumstances like my own. Your assistance in procuring an appropriation for the purpose of paying us our salaries is earnestly requested for the relief of our destitute families.

AN ORDINANCE to amend sections 51 and 64 of chapter 6 of the Revised Ordinances of 1866.

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, in Common Council convened, do ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 51 of chapter 6 of the Revised Ordinances of 1866, is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

§ 51. The Department of Public Works exclusively shall have power and authority to grant licenses for the sprinkling streets, avenues, or places with water, and to such person or persons as it, in its judgment, from time to time, may deem proper, and who will comply with the conditions of this ordinance, it being hereby expressly provided that, for the protection and health of the citizens, Croton water only shall be used for the purpose of sprinkling said streets, avenues, or places, taken from such of the public hydrants as shall be designated in writing by said Department.

No person or persons other than those authorized by license as above shall be allowed to sprinkle the streets, avenues, or places of the city, under the penalty of ten dollars for each and every such offense.

SEC. 2. Section 64 of chapter 6 is hereby amended by inserting the number fifty-one between the word "sections" and the number "fifty-eight."
