

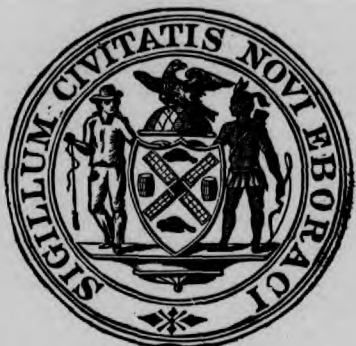

DEAR SIR—I inclose herewith draft of a resolution and ordinance to pave with macadam, on Telford foundation, Kingsbridge road, from One Hundred and Ninetieth street to the Harlem river.

This improvement is necessary, and I respectfully ask you to have the resolution introduced in the Board of Aldermen, and to use your influence to secure its passage.

Resolved, That the roadway of Kingsbridge road, from One Hundred and Ninetieth street to the Harlem river, be paved with macadam pavement with Telford foundation, except that the gutters be paved four feet wide with trap-block pavement, and that the space included between the lines of the gutters nearest the centre of the roadway and the crosswalks at the intersecting streets or avenues, be also paved with trap-block pavement, and that crosswalks be laid on the east and west sides thereof at the intersecting streets and avenues, where not already laid, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

As provided by section 189 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, I submit herewith, in writing, the Departmental Estimate of the amount of expenditure required for conducting the public business in the Finance Department of the City of New York for the year 1895, stating in detail the objects and purposes of such expenditure, and including a statement of the salaries of each of the officers, clerks and subordinates employed in the Department, and the compensation of temporary clerks engaged during a portion of each year.

The amounts presented herewith for the above purposes are stated as they existed at the beginning of my incumbency of the Comptroller's office. The largely increased volume of work which has of late been imposed upon the Finance Department has necessitated a readjustment of the duties of some subordinates and a consequent resettlement of salaries. This process of readjustment is not yet complete, and when finished may call for a slightly increased appropriation, of the details of which I will further advise the Board of Estimate and Apportionment before the completion of the Final Estimate.

Statements in detail are presented of stocks and bonds of different kinds and classes which become due and payable in the year 1895, and the redemption of which is provided for as stated, under their several heads and classification, and also of installments payable in 1895, to be raised by tax for the redemption of water bonds at maturity, as follows:

#### PAYABLE FROM THE SINKING FUND.

1. Statement of stock payable in the year 1895 from the Sinking Fund, as provided by Ordinances of the Common Council, amounting to \$1,766,600.
2. Statement of stock payable in the year 1895 from the Sinking Fund, as provided by section 192 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, as amended by chapter 178, Laws of 1889, amounting to \$910,000.
3. Statement of stock payable in the year 1895 from taxation and from the Sinking Fund, as provided by sections 176 and 177 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, \$151,000.
4. Statement of bonds and stocks of the City of New York, payable from taxation, issued after June 3, 1878, and prior to September 1, 1894, and to be issued as estimated during the remainder of 1894, by authority of existing statutes, and the sums required to be set apart out of the surplus income, revenues and accumulations of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt for the year 1895, and subsequent years, which, with the accumulation of interest thereon, shall be sufficient to redeem said bonds and stocks by the time the same shall be payable, as provided by section 192 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, as amended by chapter 178 of the Laws of 1889, amounting to \$2,054,731.65.

#### PAYABLE FROM ASSESSMENTS.

5. Statement of bonds payable in the year 1895 from assessments, amounting to \$4,875,756.45.

#### PAYABLE FROM TAXATION.

6. Statements of bonds issued by the Towns of Morrisania and West Farms prior to their annexation to the City in 1874, becoming due and payable in 1895, amounting to \$16,000. Interest becoming due in 1895 on bonds of the Towns of Morrisania and West Farms, amounting to \$18,930, is included in the statement of interest on stocks and bonds outstanding, exclusive of the funded debt held by the Sinking Fund.

7. Statement of the estimated amount of installments to be raised by tax in 1895, for the redemption at maturity of stocks issued and to be issued for the supply of water, pursuant to the provisions of article 8, section 11, of the State Constitution, from a special Sinking Fund formed for the purpose, amounting to \$1,397,754.35.

8. Statement of bonds payable in the year 1895 from taxation, to be provided for by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, amounting to \$170,325.84.

Statements in detail are also presented, showing the amounts of interest becoming due and payable on stocks and bonds in 1895, as follows:

1. Statement of stocks and bonds outstanding September 1, 1894, exclusive of the funded debt held by the Sinking Fund as investments, showing interest becoming due thereon in 1895, amounting to \$4,550,018.94.

2. Statement of the estimated amount required to be raised by tax for interest payable in 1895, on stocks and bonds to be issued in 1894, after August 31, and in 1895, amounting to \$233,456.38.

3. Estimated amount of interest to be paid on Revenue Bonds to be issued in 1895, in anticipation of the collection of taxes, to meet the current expenses of the City Government, amounting to \$250,000.

The statement of State taxes payable in 1894, as the quota of the County of New York for the State fiscal year, commencing October 1, 1894, amounts to \$4,173,713.86, to which must be added the amount required for the salary and expenses of the Shore Inspector, \$12,406.10, making a total of \$4,186,119.96 to be included in the estimate for 1895.

Statements are also presented with the Departmental Estimate of the Finance Department of the amount of rents payable in the year 1895 on leases to the city of premises for the use of various departments and public offices, the Civil and Police courts, armories and drill rooms for the National Guard, together with estimates of miscellaneous expenses chargeable upon the City Treasury, and on account of judgments against the Corporation, and a number of items of necessary expenditure which are not included in any Departmental Estimates.

DEAR SIR—Since the contracts for this year's repavements under chapter 35, Laws of 1892, and the authority of your Board, have been wholly or partly completed, it is found that there is an available balance of \$34,000 in the appropriation provided by that act.

I, therefore, respectfully recommend that your Board authorize the following additional repavements with asphalt on the present stone-block pavements:

Sixty-first street, from Madison to Fifth avenue—This street was on the list recommended for repavement this year, but action was deferred pending the construction and completion of buildings which are now completed. The present pavement is old Belgian blocks, much worn and past repair; area, 1,450 square yards; estimated cost, \$5,600 00

Thirty-eighth street, from Sixth avenue to Broadway—The present pavement is old Belgian blocks, very much worn. This would complete a continuous asphalt pavement from Lexington avenue to Broadway; area, 1,400 square yards; estimated cost, 5,600 00

Thirty-ninth street, from Sixth avenue to Broadway—The present pavement is specification trap blocks, very rough and uneven. This would make a continuous asphalt pavement from Park avenue to Broadway; area, 1,300 square yards; estimated cost, 5,200 00

Sixty-fifth street, from Third to Lexington avenue—The present pavement is old Belgian blocks very much worn; area, 1,450 square yards; estimated cost, 5,800 00

Centre street, from Leonard street to White street—This part of Centre street fronts on the New Criminal Court Building. The other three streets which surround the building—Elm, Franklin and White—are already paved with asphalt, and it is desirable to complete this noiseless pavement around the whole building to facilitate the business of the courts; area, 2,650 square yards; estimated cost, 10,600 00

DEAR SIR—I am in receipt of the letter of 8th instant from the Clerk of your Board, transmitting an extract from the minutes of the meeting of 3d instant, relative to the requisition of this Department for the issue of \$50,000 bonds for additional fire-hydrants, authorized by chapter 510, Laws of 1894. Your Board requests that the Chief Engineer of this Department furnish a statement, showing the necessity for additional hydrants, the number that will be required during the present year, their location, pattern and cost.

All the information now asked for was transmitted to your Board with my letter of July 20, 1894, except as to the pattern selected for the additional hydrants. With that letter I transmitted a letter from the Chief of the Fire Department, a list of the locations at which the additional fire-hydrants are to be placed, and an estimate by the Chief Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct of the cost of furnishing and placing them. I closed that letter by stating that early action by your Board was necessary, if much of the required work was to be accomplished this year.

To complete the information called for, I transmit herewith detailed plans showing, in full, the pattern selected for the additional hydrants. The design was specially made in the Bureau of Chief Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct, and embodies all the best features and appliances brought out by twenty years' experience, and no part of the appliance is patented.

After your Board makes an appropriation, much preliminary work becomes necessary before any actual work can be done. Contracts and specifications will have to be prepared, advertised and let for furnishing the hydrants, the connecting pipes, branches and special castings, and for lead, yarn and other material to be used in the work. Each location designated by the Fire Department for an additional hydrant must be separately and critically examined in advance of the actual work. The entire sum of \$50,000 called for can be economically expended in the pre-

liminary work, and the purchase by contract of the hydrants and materials. For the actual work most of this year is lost, and if no appropriation is obtained until next year, most of that year will be lost before the work of placing the hydrants can be proceeded with.

DEAR SIR—I beg to acknowledge the receipt of a letter from your Board informing me that the matter of the bid for the repaving of Third avenue, north of One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street, to the line between the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, was laid over on motion of the Comptroller, and that the Secretary was directed to inform me,

"That no statement of the amount that will be required, in accordance with the bid received, has been submitted to this Board, and that no action can be taken by this Board until the Commissioner of Street Improvements presents to this Board a statement showing the amount of bonds that will be required to be issued for the purpose."

A reference to the minutes of your Board will show that on May 3, last, I presented a communication which embodied an estimate for the completion of this particular work.

A further reference to the minutes of your Board will show that at a subsequent meeting the Comptroller presented a report made by Engineer McLean upon the subject matter of the estimate that I presented with my letter, which was acted upon at your meeting of May 3, last.

On June 4th last I addressed a letter to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in reference to the report of the Engineer of the Finance Department. On June 12, 1894, by request of the Comptroller, a communication from the Chief Engineer of this Department was addressed to the Engineer of the Finance Department, setting forth the reasons why the amount suggested for engineering and inspector's fees, etc., was inadequate, and asking that a sum not less than \$2,000 be provided to cover the expenses of engineering and inspector's fees in addition to the sum bid for by the contractor to do the work.

The total amount of Mr. Kelly's bid was also on record in the Comptroller's office. COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF  
THE CITY OF NEW YORK.*Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a Meeting held at the Mayor's Office  
at 1 o'clock P. M. on Wednesday, October 3, 1894.*

Present—Thomas F. Gilroy, Mayor; Frederick Smyth, Recorder; Ashbel P. Fitch, Comptroller; Joseph J. O'Donohue, Chamberlain, and Nicholas T. Brown, Chairman Committee on Finance, Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the meeting held September 18, 1894, were read and approved.

The Comptroller presented the following communication from the Commissioner of Street Improvements, Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, together with the design and plans of the proposed new public building for the said Department:

CITY OF NEW YORK—COMMISSIONER OF STREET IMPROVEMENTS,  
TWENTY-THIRD AND TWENTY-FOURTH WARDS,  
No. 2422 THIRD AVENUE, CORNER 141ST STREET,  
COMMISSIONER'S OFFICE, September 27, 1894.

Hon. ASHBEL P. FITCH, Comptroller:

DEAR SIR—The design and plans of the proposed new public building for the use of this Department being in your hands, I respectfully urge you to present the matter to the Sinking Fund Commission at the earliest possible moment.

The need of additional room for the proper accommodation of the business of this Department is being manifested more and more daily, and I feel I cannot suggest too strongly that the construction of the building be proceeded with at the earliest moment practicable.

In reply to inquiries by the Mayor, Mr. George B. Post, architect of the work, said:

The demands of the Department for space were very large, much larger than the appropriation seemed to justify. I propose to construct the building of brick and terra cotta, what is known as mill construction or slow burning construction, which is better than wooden construction, and probably sufficiently good for the purpose. I have every reason to suppose it can be built in that way, and that it can be constructed for one hundred thousand dollars, the amount appropriated for the purpose. The architectural specifications are completed, and were sent with the drawing. I presume they have to be submitted to the Counsel to the Corporation to put them in legal form.

On motion, the plans were approved, and the design, plans and specifications were referred to the Comptroller and the Counsel to the Corporation to have prepared forms of contracts, specifications and advertisements for the work to be submitted for the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

The Comptroller presented the following report and a preamble and resolutions on stocks due November 1, 1894:

FINANCE DEPARTMENT—COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE,  
October 3, 1894.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—Certain stocks of the City and County of New York, originally payable by law from taxation, become due and payable on November 1, 1894, amounting to two million five hundred and sixty-seven thousand (2,567,000) dollars, a portion of which, amounting to six hundred and twelve thousand (612,000) dollars, is held by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the balance, one million nine hundred and fifty-five thousand (1,955,000) dollars, being held by private owners and corporations.

On December 4, 1893, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopted a resolution pursuant to the provisions of section 191 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, certifying to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the estimated revenues and accumulations of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt for the year 1894, would be sufficient to redeem said stocks without in any way impairing the preferred claims upon the said fund, thereby rendering it unnecessary to raise the amount by taxation, from which, by law, said stocks were made payable.

Sections 176 and 177 of the said Consolidation Act, authorize the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to pay from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt, any portion of the bonded debt of the City, provided such payment shall not in any way impair the preferred claims thereon, as specified in section 175 of said act.

Resolutions are submitted, therefore, to authorize the Comptroller to pay that portion of the stocks originally payable by law from taxation, which become due and payable on November 1, 1894, not held by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, out of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt, amounting to one million nine hundred and fifty-five thousand (1,955,000) dollars, and to cancel that portion held by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, amounting to six hundred and twelve thousand (612,000) dollars.

Whereas, Certain stocks of the City of New York, originally payable from taxation, as provided by the laws authorizing their issue, amounting to the sum of two million five hundred and sixty-seven thousand (2,567,000) dollars, become due and payable November 1, 1894, a portion of which, amounting to six hundred and twelve thousand (612,000) dollars, is held by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the remaining portion, amounting to one million nine hundred and fifty-five thousand (1,955,000) dollars, being outstanding and held by the public; and

Whereas, On December 4, 1893, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopted a resolution, pursuant to the provisions of section 191 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, certifying to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the estimated revenues and accumulations of "The Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt" for the year 1894 would be sufficient to redeem said stocks at maturity, without in any way impairing the preferred claims upon said fund, rendering it unnecessary to raise the amount due by taxation, as provided by the laws authorizing the issue of said stocks; and

Whereas, Sections 176 and 177 of said Consolidation Act authorize the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to pay from "The Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt" any portion of the bonded debt of the City, provided such payment shall not in any way impair the preferred claims thereon, as specified in section 175 of said Consolidation Act; therefore,

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund do hereby authorize and direct the Comptroller of the City of New York to pay and redeem from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt the stocks of the City and County of New York, outstanding and held by the public, becoming due and payable on the first day of November, 1894, and amounting to the sum of one million nine hundred and fifty-five thousand (1,955,000) dollars, as follows:

*Honorable Commissioners of the Sinking Fund :*

GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to state that during the grading, etc., of Webster avenue it will be necessary for Engine No. 48 of this Department to vacate its quarters located thereon, and to provide temporary quarters for the company elsewhere. After considerable search, quarters have been found at No. 585 Kingsbridge road, the owners whereof (Messrs. W. L. Cole & Co.) offer to let the Department have half of the first and the entire second floor of that building for the purpose, for \$800 per annum, for one year from the 1st proximo. It is believed that the work will consume the greater part of a year. I therefore request that your Honorable Board authorize the leasing of the premises referred to on the terms proposed.

*To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund :*

GENTLEMEN—I present herewith a request of the Fire Department for authority to lease a portion of the premises No. 585 Kingsbridge road for eight hundred (800) dollars per annum, for one year from October 1, to provide temporary quarters for Engine Company No. 48 during the grading of Webster avenue.

From an examination which I have made, it appears that the grade of Webster avenue, on which the building of Engine Company No. 48 is located, is to be raised about nine feet, and the contractor is about to commence his work. This will immediately cut off all access to the building, which must ultimately be raised to the new grade.

The premises No. 585 Kingsbridge road consist of a three-story frame building, and the part to be leased is 20 by 73 feet on the first floor and 35 by 73 feet on the second floor.

The rent proposed, although full, is not unreasonable under the circumstances, and it would, perhaps, prove impossible to find another place which would be at all suitable for the requirements of Engine Company No. 48.

Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation be and hereby is requested to prepare a lease to the City from W. L. Cole & Company of half of the first floor and the entire second floor of the premises No. 585 Kingsbridge road, as requested by the Fire Department, to be used as temporary quarters for Engine Company No. 48, of the Fire Department, for the term of one year from October 1, 1894, at a yearly rental of eight hundred (800) dollars, the owners to pay all taxes and assessments and Croton water rents, and the lease to contain the usual covenants and conditions ; and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, deeming the rent fair and reasonable, and that it would be for the interest of the city that such lease should be made, the Comptroller is hereby authorized and directed to execute such lease when prepared and approved by the Counsel to the Corporation, as provided by sections 123 and 181 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented the following preamble and resolution to exempt \$1,397,519.75 City Bonds from taxation :

Whereas, By a resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, adopted January 19, 1894, the Comptroller was authorized to issue Dock Bonds to the amount of one million five hundred thousand dollars (\$1,500,000), of which four hundred thousand dollars (\$400,000) have been purchased by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000) have been disposed of at public sale held June 26, 1894, leaving a balance thereof not issued amounting to six hundred thousand dollars (\$600,000); and

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, by resolutions adopted July 9, 1894, July 13, 1894, July 31, 1894, and October 3, 1894, authorized the Comptroller to issue School-house Bonds to the amount of seven hundred and fifty-four thousand five hundred and sixty dollars and seventy-five cents (\$754,560.75), none of which has as yet been issued ; and

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, by resolutions adopted May 15, 1894, July 9, 1894, and July 31, 1894, authorized the Comptroller to issue Sanitary Improvement School-house Bonds to the amount of forty-two thousand nine hundred and fifty-nine dollars (\$42,959), none of which has as yet been issued ; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the aforesaid stocks and bonds, amounting in the aggregate to one million three hundred and ninety-seven thousand five hundred and nineteen dollars and seventy-five cents (\$1,397,519.75), so authorized to be issued by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund and by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, be and hereby are exempted from taxation by the City and County of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 137 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, and an ordinance of the Common Council, approved by the Mayor October 2, 1880.

Which was unanimously adopted.

The following resolution was received from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for an addition to the Gouverneur Hospital, with statistics, etc. :

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT,  
CITY OF NEW YORK.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of the City of New York be and hereby are requested and required, as provided by chapter 703 of the Laws of 1894, to designate and set apart so much of Gouverneur Slip, in the City of New York, as will be requisite for the construction thereon of a building as an addition and extension to the present building, situated thereon and known as Gouverneur Hospital, and to construct upon the site so designated and set apart such a building, the entire cost, expense and equipment of which shall not exceed two hundred thousand dollars, for the purpose of providing suitable accommodations for a Reception Hospital for patients injured or taken suddenly ill in the lower east side of the City of New York.

STATISTICS OF GOUVERNEUR HOSPITAL, GOUVERNEUR SLIP, NEW YORK.

Hospital District—Gouverneur Hospital furnishes hospital facilities to the Seventh, Tenth, Thirteenth and part of the Eleventh Wards, or that part of the city bounded by Catherine street, Bowery, Houston street and East river.

Population—This district contains about 200,000 persons.

Character of District, Inhabitants, etc.—In addition to the large population, there are located in this part of the city a large number of docks, factories and street railroads which are constantly sending cases of accident to the hospital. Moreover, by far the larger majority of New York's poorest and most dependent inhabitants reside in this section of the city. Since the hospital was opened in 1885 the character of this section has changed completely. A majority of the well-to-do people have moved up town and their small private residences have given way to immense tenement houses ; during the past six years more than six hundred of these tenements have been built.

Hospital building—Was an old police station 75 by 28 feet, three stories high.

Number of beds—In 1885 this old building was remodeled into Gouverneur Hospital and contains thirty-eight beds for patients.

Statistics, Annual Reports, etc.—In 1886 the first annual report of work done in the hospital was published.

Total number of cases treated in Hospital.....	546
Total number of cases treated in Dispensary.....	6,381

To care for these patients required the services of two visiting physicians, three resident physicians, eight paid employees and six unpaid help from Blackwell's Island.

The last annual report, published November 20, 1893, gives the following statistics :

Total number of cases treated in Hospital.....	2,269
Total number of cases treated in Dispensary.....	23,052
Total number of ambulance calls.....	3,204

To care for this enormous increase of hospital and dispensary patients required a corresponding increase in the number of attendants who now number five visiting physicians, five resident physicians, eighteen paid employees and thirteen unpaid help.

Present Condition—(a) Building—The time has come at last when the little three-story building, 75 by 28 feet, cannot be rearranged or made to hold any more patients or employees. The building and sanitary conveniences that were thought sufficient for the few patients and attendants when the hospital was opened are now totally inadequate for the large number of patients in the hospital and dispensary and the greater increased number of employees.

(b) Hospital—The large number of patients brought to the hospital in the ambulance, especially from fires, and the small number of beds, necessitates the frequent transfer to Bellevue Hospital of many patients who should, if there were beds, be retained on account of their weak condition.

(c) Dispensary—The rooms used for the dispensary are so small that the physicians do not have sufficient room to properly treat the cases, and the crowd is so great that the main hall and sidewalk in front of the hospital is blocked with patients.

Commissioners' Report—The Honorable Board of Commissioners of Public Charities and Correction, in their annual report (1890) to his Honor the Mayor, used the following words : "The hospital demands of that part of the city surrounding Gouverneur far exceeds the accommodations of the present building, and the matter must soon receive the attention of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment."

Whereas, owing to the destruction by fire of the dumping board at the foot of East Seventieth street, the Board has, with the consent of the lessee, temporarily assigned for the use of the Department of Street Cleaning the dumping board at the foot of East Seventy-third street, commencing June 15, 1894 ;

Resolved, That during the occupancy by the Department of Street Cleaning of the Dumping Board at the foot of East Seventy-third street, John A. Bouker, lessee, be and hereby is released from the payment of the rental thereof, commencing August 1, 1894.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be and hereby are requested to refund to said John A. Bouker the rental of said dumping board, from June 15, to July 31, 1894, amounting to the sum of one hundred (100) dollars, and which was deposited to the credit of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund by this Department June 13, 1894.

GENTLEMEN—On June 15, 1894, the Department of Street Cleaning took possession of the dump at the foot of East Seventy-third street, East river, under an arrangement by which Mr. John A. Bouker, who had rented the bulkhead from your Department, surrendered it and turned it over to this Department. Mr. Bouker did that upon the understanding that he should be relieved from the payment of rent for the bulkhead from the time of its surrender to this Department. That understanding was reached informally in a conversation at your office between the President of your Board, Mr. Bouker and myself, and I understood that it was ratified by a resolution of your Board. If that was not done, I have to request that it may be done now, as Mr. Bouker has sent me a bill for rent of the bulkhead with the statement that the Dock Department has continued to charge him for rent.

It is, of course, impossible for me to pay rent to Mr. Bouker, as I have no authority of law for doing so and no appropriation out of which to make the payment.

#### PURCHASES OF DOCK RIGHTS.

The Comptroller presented the following report of Engineer McLean, of the Finance Department on agreements for the purchase of certain wharfage rights on West street, between Perry and West Eleventh streets

Hon. ASHBEL P. FITCH, Comptroller:

SIR—The Department of Docks has entered into agreements for the purchase of certain bulkhead and water rights on the westerly side of West street, as follows:

1st. With George H. Budke. Date of agreement, February 21, 1894. For 89 feet 6 inches, more or less, of bulkhead on the westerly line of West street, beginning at the northerly line of Perry street, for the sum of \$500 per running foot on West street.

2d. With Charles N. Lane. Date of agreement, March 8, 1894. For 23 feet of bulkhead on the westerly side of West street, beginning at a point 73 feet northerly of the northerly line of Perry street and running northerly, for the sum of \$450 per running foot on West street.

3d. With Henry Chastain. Date of agreement, February 28, 1894. For 43 feet 3 inches of bulkhead on the westerly side of West street, beginning at a point 158 feet northerly of the northerly line of Perry street, for the sum of \$450 per running foot on West street.

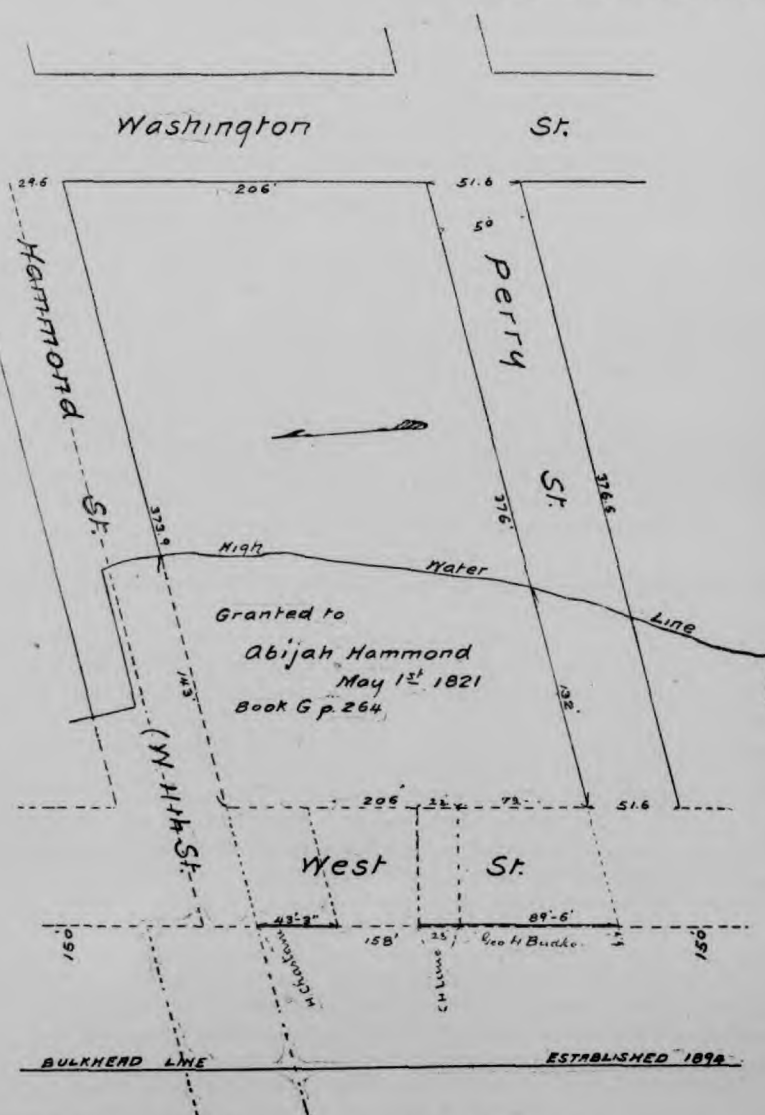
The water rights and privileges pertaining to the bulkhead proposed as above to be purchased, were granted by the City to Abijah Hammond, as shown on the diagram herewith submitted, May 1, 1821.

The following is the covenant: "And the said parties of the first part, for themselves and their successors, do covenant and agree to and with the said party of the second part, their heirs and assigns, that he, the said party of the second part, his heirs and assigns, paying the said yearly rents hereinbefore mentioned, and also observing, performing, fulfilling and keeping all and singular the articles, covenants and agreements herein mentioned and contained, according to the true intent and meaning of these presents, shall, and lawfully may, from time to time, and at all times forever hereafter, fully have, enjoy, take and hold to his and their only proper use all manner of wharfage, craning, advantages and emoluments growing or accruing by or from that part of the said wharf or street called West street, fronting on the North river, which is opposite to the said premises hereby granted; but it is understood and hereby mutually agreed that the said parties of the first part, their successors and assigns, shall forever have and enjoy, take and receive, to their own use and benefit, all the wharfage, craning, advantages and emoluments growing or accruing by or from that part of the said wharf or street which is opposite to the above-mentioned Hammond (West Eleventh street now) and Perry streets."

The grantees have complied with all the covenants of the grant, and the rights above specified are theirs.

These are the first purchases connected with the recent change of the bulkhead-line. They are necessary in carrying out the authorized plan, but I cannot see why there should be a difference in price of \$50 per foot in the parcels, which are very near each other. I consider \$450 a foot front a full price in this locality.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of an agreement made on the 28th day of February, 1894, between Henry Chastain and the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, acting by the Department of Docks, for the purchase of all the wharfage rights, terms, easements and privileges, etc., appertaining to the forty-three feet and three inches of bulkhead on the westerly side of West street, beginning at a point one hundred and fifty-eight feet northerly of the northerly line of Perry street, and more particularly described in said agreement, for the sum of four hundred and fifty dollars (\$450) per running foot front on West street.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of an agreement made on the 21st day of February, 1894, between George H. Budke and the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, acting by the Department of Docks, for the purchase of all the wharfage rights, terms, easements and privileges, etc., appertaining to the eighty-nine feet and six inches, more or less, of bulkhead on the westerly side of West street, beginning at the northerly line of Perry street, and more particularly described in said agreement, provided the consideration therein mentioned, five hundred dollars (\$500) per running foot front on West street, be reduced to the sum of four hundred and fifty dollars (\$450) per running foot front on West street.

Which were unanimously adopted.

An offer of Messrs. Brendlinger & Nearing, Engineers and Contractors, Yonkers, N. Y., for the purchase of 500 cubic yards of stone now in the dump at Shaft 19, New Croton Aqueduct, was received.

Which was referred to the Comptroller with power.



The Comptroller called up the communication from the District Attorney, received at the last meeting, requesting additional rooms for his use in the New Criminal Court Building.

Honorable John R. Fellows, District Attorney, was heard in support of the application.

Discussion followed, in which the questions of the care of the building, the duties of the janitor and the putting of the elevator men in uniform were considered.

Whereupon the Comptroller moved that the Commissioner of Public Works be authorized to make such rules and regulations for the government of the New Criminal Court Building as may seem to him proper.

The District Attorney asked that electric bells be placed in the various offices.

The Mayor said that in the matter of telephone service it might be well to request the Telephone Company to put a public telephone office in the building.

The Mayor then offered the following:

Resolved, That it is the sense of this Board that it would be for the benefit of the public if the Telephone Company would establish a public central office in the New Criminal Court Building. Which was unanimously adopted.

**TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS**

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature [chapter 449, Laws of 1889], which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed

Second avenue (East Houston street to Twenty-third street), Third avenue (Bowery to Harlem river, Harlem river to One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street), Fourth avenue (Sixth street to Forty-second street), Fifth avenue (Washington place to Fifty-ninth street), Sixth avenue (all), Seventh avenue (Forty-second street to Fifty-ninth street), Eighth avenue (Hudson street to Fifty-ninth street), Lexington avenue (all), Madison avenue (all), Fourteenth street (First avenue to Eighth avenue), Twenty-third street (all), Thirty-fourth street (East river to Tenth avenue), Forty-second street (Second avenue to Ninth avenue), Fifty-ninth street
