Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, by the unanimous vote of all of the members thereof, makes this the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and four, being, first, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of said City for the said year, including State Taxes; and secondly, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the charges and expenses of the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond for the said year; amounting in the aggregate to the sum of one hundred and six million, six hundred and seventy-four thousand, nine hundred and fifty-five dollars and nine cents (\$106,674,955.09).

The City shall not become liable for any payment to a charitable institution in excess of the appropriation which may have been made to such institution, notwithstanding any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for the inmates thereof.

6. All institutions receiving money from the City are required to state specifically the amount so received, as from the City Treasury, in their printed annual reports.

7. "That no money be paid to any private charitable institution which pays any salary to or gives any consideration, financial or of any kind, for services to, or that has any business dealing with, or secures goods or merchandise, directly or indirectly, from any officer or trustee or member of its Board of Managers."

8. The rates of payments to private charitable institutions, unless otherwise specially provided for, are fixed for the various classes of inmates as follows:

That charitable institutions for children now carried in the Budget and not sending their inmates to the Public Schools, and not sharing in the Corporate School Fund, and not receiving Teachers and school supplies from the Board of Education, but giving in their own buildings secular education to the children resident in the institutions, shall be paid a per capita of 35 cents per week for each child receiving such instruction of four years of age and over during ten months in the year. I have asked the Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Chief Engineer of the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners to report to me upon the subject. Both of these gentlemen concur in saying that, in their opinion, the interests of the City would be in no way jeopardized if this permission were granted. They think, on the contrary, that the road would furnish welcome transit facilities in a section of the City not otherwise likely to be provided for in the near future. The application, therefore, appears to be a proper one to be granted.

I call the attention of your Honorable Board, however, to the fact that the proposed road will cross, either above or below grade, sixty-eight streets already open or dedicated, thus using 5,026 linear feet of property belonging to the City. At the rates charged to the Pennsylvania Railroad, this would necessitate a charge of 50 cents per foot of single track for the first ten years, and of \$1 per foot for the next fifteen years, with the right to readjust terms every twenty-five years thereafter. In this case, also, streets not now opened will later become the property of the City, and the conditions attaching to the consent should provide properly for this contingency.

Favorable action would be highly appreciated, not only by our neighbors to the north, but also by our own people of the Borough of The Bronx, who have made known to me, through their local authorities and through the voluntary action of public-spirited bodies without a dissenting voice, their very great interest in this project.

Dear Sir—As a representative of the public of Rye and Port Chester, of Westchester County, we appeal to you, as a representative of good government and as a public man interested in and ready to do what may be required to further the interests of the public and as a member of the Board of Aldermen, to secure the favorable action of the Board of Aldermen, by the passage of the New York and Port Chester Railroad Ordinance now in the hands of the Railroad Committee, at the meeting of the Board of Aldermen on October 27.

Hon. SETH LOW, Chairman, Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Dear Sir—The Department of Parks, Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, has suffered a very great disaster in the terrific rainstorm and flood of the last twenty-four hours.

The lake in Prospect Park has overflowed its banks and destroyed the main drive and the walks on the westerly and southerly sides of the park. The bridle path on the westerly side has been utterly ruined and must be reconstructed.

The banks of Sunset Park have been seriously washed, great masses of earth have been dislocated and carried into the streets.

Institute Park has suffered very greatly in the same manner, and also the Shore road. In many places the bank on the water side is so badly washed that parts of the road have collapsed, and it is in an exceedingly dangerous condition. I have barricaded portions, which makes it almost too narrow for a single vehicle to pass.

The bulkhead which was constructed at Coney Island a year ago has again saved the Concourse, the Ocean parkway and the Park, but it has been seriously injured and needs immediate repair. The stone wall separating the Concourse from the beach has been undermined and a portion of it fallen, the sea having beaten over the wall and bulkhead with terrific force that was irresistible.

The top soil has been washed from large areas of Prospect Park, necessitating immediate resurfacing.

For these reasons I come before your Honorable Board for an emergency appropriation of \$50,000, and below give specifications.

I sincerely hope there is some fund from which this amount can be taken without the delay which would be necessary if it should have to await the approval of the Board of Aldermen; and if it is possible to do so, I would like the authority to make the repairs without waiting for the formality of public letting.

Trusting that action may be taken on this most important matter on Monday, I remain

joining on the west N. 30 degrees 56 minutes 20 seconds E. 4 feet; thence again southwesterly N. 17 degrees 51 minutes 10 seconds E. 59.06 feet; thence again southwesterly N. 16 degrees 40 minutes 40 seconds E. 168.90 feet to the junction of another stone wall; thence again southeasterly through the centre of the said stone wall, partly on the premises hereby intended to be conveyed and partly on the premises adjoining on the southwest N. 30 degrees 7 minutes 16 seconds W. 93.49 feet; thence again southeasterly N. 23 degrees 58 minutes 37 seconds W. 132.47 feet to a wire fence; thence in a southeasterly direction on a curved line with a radius equal to 2,714.93 feet 270.56 feet; thence again northeasterly along said curved line S. 34 degrees 23 minutes 15 seconds W. 186.36 feet to the point or place of beginning, containing 7.922 acres, as shown by said survey,

—and the Comptroller of The City of New York is hereby authorized to enter into an agreement for the purchase of the property above described at a price not exceeding \$4,000 per acre, which agreement or contract is to be submitted to the Corporation Counsel for his approval.

Headquarters Fire Department, City of New York, Nos. 157 and 159 East Sixty-seventh Street,

Borough of Manhattan, November 6, 1903.

Hon. CHARLES V. FORNES, President, Board of Aldermen, City Hall, Borough of Manhattan, New York City:

Sir—I enclose herewith draft of preamble and resolution to permit this Department to have done, otherwise than by contract at public letting, certain additional work required in connection with the existing contract for general repairs to the fireboat "Seth Low."

When the specifications for the work were prepared and present contract made the boat was in service, and the necessity for further requirements could not be determined until it was placed in the dry dock, which was but recently done. When the boat was stripped it was found that exposed portions of the hull were in very bad condition, making necessary the expenditure of a much larger sum than was originally estimated, and as the United States Inspectors may require still further additional repairs, it becomes difficult to formulate a specification or to approximate the cost, although the estimated cost of the work ordered by the United States Inspectors is three thousand dollars in addition to existing contract.

The boat is still in the dry dock, at an expense of twenty dollars a day, as it cannot be launched until the repairs ordered to the hull are completed.

A copy of report from the Chief of Battalion in charge of the Repair Shops, boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, to the Hon. Richard H. Laimbeer, Jr., Deputy Commissioner, and copy of report of the Assistant Inspector, United States Steamboat Inspection Service, are forwarded herewith. This emergency requires immediate action.

Messrs. DUMONT AND BARRETT:

In accordance with your instructions I examined the steamer "Seth Low" on dry dock at Gokey's, Erie Basin. Her bottom planking and butts are in good condition. I also examined her internally, and found her in very poor condition forward. There are ten floor frames and cants that are in very poor condition and should be taken out. What can be seen of her dead wood is in good condition, but main keelson, as far aft from stem as can be seen, is very poor. At her annual inspection I considered this vessel in poor condition and bored her. Borings proved to be good. Two main-deck beams forward and one carline are gone on the ends under the covering boards and must come out. The bosom knees are also rotten and must be replaced. Tank bulkhead will have to be removed and replaced with new. The knees of after towing bitts are poor and should be replaced with new ones. Several rail stanchions beside the ones already taken out should be renewed. The men's quarters forward should be entirely removed, including the water closet. In view of the generally poor condition of her forward part, I recommend that her garboards and two or three strakes of plank full length on both sides be taken off to allow a more thorough and extended examination of frames, especially under boiler and engine space.

Sir—Referring to Fireboat "Seth Low" Engine 123, now on dry dock for repairs, would say that it was discovered after same was docked that the repairs as per specification and contract do not cover all the work that is necessary to have done.

The Government Inspectors have examined a portion of the hull and have found that parts already uncovered are in very bad condition, and they have given directions that other parts will have to be uncovered so that they can make a further survey, and all such found defective will have to be replaced by new. To do this work, including opening of hull, will cost about \$3,000, making a total cost, including original contract, of about \$5,000.

I do not think it possible to have this work done by contract and for that reason I would ask for authority to direct the contractor to proceed to do the same by day's work.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, No. 280 Broadway, New York City:

Gentlemen—In accordance with your resolution of July 15, and with the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, I beg to transmit herewith the Departmental Estimate of the Tenement House Department for the year 1904.

The Tenement House Department respectfully requests that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment appropriate the sum of \$796,650 for the expenses of the Tenement House Department for the year 1904, made up as follows:

Rents	\$35,000 00
Supplies and Contingencies.....	25,000 00
Salaries	736,650 00

This is a considerable increase over the appropriation for the present year. It is also largely in excess of the annual appropriation which will be needed by the Department after the tenement houses of New York have been once made to conform to law. That excess is partly the inherited cost of many years of continual violation of the old law and partly the cost of bringing the tenements to the higher sanitary standard of the new law. Once paid, the current expenses in the Department can be reduced to a normal standard.

It is now for the first time possible to base such an estimate on full knowledge of existing violations of law and actual experience in the task of remedying them, and of transacting at the same time the every-day work of the Department.

About a year has now passed since the organization of the Department was first made possible by the qualification of its employees. During that time all the tenement houses in New York have been examined and their conditions ascertained. During that time, also, the volume of the current work of the Department has become manifest. The situation which confronts the Department with its present force should be clearly stated so that its bearings upon the Departmental Estimate for the coming year may be fully understood.

Tenement conditions in many instances have been found to be so bad that the most sensational newspapers of the City would hesitate to publish photographs of them. Vile privies and privy sinks; four cellars full of rubbish, in many cases of garbage and decomposing fecal matter; dilapidated and dangerous stairs; plumbing pipes containing large holes emitting sewer gas through the houses; rooms so dark that one cannot see the people in them; cellars occupied as sleeping places; dangerous bakeries, without proper protection in case of fire; pigs, goats, horses and other animals kept in cellars; dangerous old fire-traps without fire escapes; disease-breeding rags and junk stored in tenement houses; halls kept dark at night, endangering the lives and safety of the occupants; buildings without adequate water supply—the list might be added to almost indefinitely.

To illustrate the nature of the conditions that exist, I have appended to this statement a number of photographs taken by the official Photographer of the Department, showing some of these conditions. The photographs, however, do not do justice to the real facts, for it is not possible to thus produce nauseous and unhealthy odors.

The Department has done and is doing everything in its power to remedy these conditions. The Inspectors work in the field from 9 to 4 steadily, at the most fatiguing and exhausting kind of labor, and then are obliged to work two or three hours at home at night, writing up their reports. Many of the Clerks, Stenographers and office force of the Department will be found at their desks nearly every evening until 5.30 and even 6. The volume of work is so tremendous and the present force so inadequate that in several divisions if a single Clerk is absent for one day the work of the entire Department is seriously clogged and interfered with.

A realization of the volume of the work may be obtained when it is known that the normal number of current pending violations is 12,000 in Manhattan alone, and that in one Bureau of the Department 11,707 violations were filed in one month, each

violation representing on an average ten matters that required remedying in a particular house, thus making a total of 117,070 matters to be remedied, reported on in thirty days. From June 1, 1902, till June 1, 1903, the Department has made 269,691 inspections, and made 299,204 reports, and filed 138,270 violations.

Everything that could be done to minimize labor and systematize work has been done; typewriters are used wherever possible in place of clerks, printed forms have been prepared so as to simplify work and economize time, and yet the Department with its present force is able to do little more than keep up with current work brought to it on the new building side by new construction and on the old building side by citizens' complaints of unsanitary conditions, and cannot even make inspections as frequently as made mandatory by the City Charter.

The Tenement House Law includes a comprehensive and important plan for the structural improvement of the old tenement houses, letting light into dark rooms and halls, doing away with unsanitary privies and privy sinks, and generally improving the condition of these buildings.

One of the early tasks of the Department has been therefore to ascertain where the tenement houses were that needed such structural improvements, and the nature of such improvements in each case. This has been a colossal task. The Department has inspected 43,580 houses to ascertain these facts, and now has on its files the detailed information in regard to each house. It has, however, only to a limited extent been able thus far to issue the necessary orders to owners to make the improvements required by law, because of insufficient force.

It is of paramount importance that this work should be started and progressed as rapidly as possible. Even with a large force of employees it will probably be one or two years before the greater part of it can be accomplished.

The conditions disclosed by these inspections are appalling. It was known to the framers of the law that there were a great many dark rooms and many unsanitary conditions in the old houses, but no one had any conception of the real extent of these evils.

There are in Greater New York over 350,000 dark rooms, without any windows opening to the outer air or even to another room, which itself has windows opening to the outer air. Moreover, these rooms are located in over 40,000 different tenement houses scattered throughout the different boroughs. Under the law a large window 3 feet by 5 feet must be cut into each such room.

Leading physicians and experts who testified before the New York State Tenement House Commission in 1900 stated that the dark interior rooms in the tenement houses of New York were largely responsible for the very great prevalence of pulmonary tuberculosis in this City, that sunlight and fresh air were the two most important factors in its cure, and that a measure by which light and air could be let into the dark rooms of the tenement houses would do more to reduce the mortality from this disease than any other single measure. They also stated that there were 8,000 deaths annually in New York City from pulmonary tuberculosis, and 20,000 new cases of sickness.

In view of these facts, the importance of proceeding with these improvements cannot be overstated.

Because of inadequate force the Department has been compelled to neglect many other important phases of the work. There are many rear tenement houses in the City which, because of their age and structural condition, are in a very unsanitary condition. A careful and systematic canvass of such houses should be made, so as to discriminate carefully between those that are sanitary and those that are not, and to have permanently vacated those that are actually unfit for habitation. This requires the services of a number of men of special skill and of a high order of intelligence. The work is of great importance and has been practically neglected since 1897.

A special and systematic examination of cellar living-rooms in tenement houses should be made, so that those which do not conform to the law may be vacated. The Department has already on its files a list of 2,500 such houses, but as yet has no force with which to secure the necessary detailed information required to enable it to act.

A similar examination should be made of the bakeries located in tenement houses. There are several thousand of these in the City, many of which are a menace to the life of the occupants of the houses through lack of proper fire protection.

A special night force is needed to see that the law requiring a light to be kept burning in the public hall is observed. At present this provision of law is very frequently violated.

The law forbidding the incumbrance of fire escapes has practically never been enforced in this City. The Board of Fire Underwriters has upon several occasions urged the Department to take up this work. To do it properly necessitates a special squad.

There are several thousand tenements still unprovided with adequate fire escapes, in spite of the progress already made by the Department in enforcing compliance with these provisions of law, as a result of which several thousand have been installed.

Moreover, the work of the Department on the new building side is increasing rapidly. In 1902 the Department supervised the erection of 643 new tenement houses and of 1,468 alterations to old houses. In 1903, up to July 1, it has had to supervise the erection of 699 new houses and the alteration of 1,266 old houses—that is, it has in 1903 practically double the amount of work. The same force is unable to handle this year twice the amount of work it handled last year, and must be enlarged, for next year the work will be still greater.

In addition, under the provisions of chapter 439 of the Laws of 1903, which took effect on July 1, twenty-three different sections of the Tenement House Act, which had in the past been enforced by the Bureau of Buildings, were required to be enforced by the Tenement House Department. This was a desirable change in the interest of builders, because it concentrated the enforcement of the whole Tenement House Law in a single Department, but it necessitates an increase in the force of this Bureau.

In this connection it is not inappropriate to point out that in the Borough of Manhattan the Tenement House Department now has available but eight Inspectors to supervise new buildings and alterations to old buildings, whereas the Bureau of Buildings had sixty-seven men for similar work. In The Bronx the Tenement House Department has available but two men for this purpose, while the Bureau of Buildings has twenty men. It is obvious that the present force in the Tenement House Department for this work is inadequate and should be materially increased.

The Department has always planned the establishment of a branch office in The Bronx, and an office was rented for that purpose last October. Owing to the insufficiency of the departmental appropriation and the great volume of work, it has not been possible to open this office to the public. It is important that this should be done, as it is a hardship to the citizens of The Bronx to require them to spend an hour and a half's time in traveling from their borough to the Manhattan office of the Department to transact business.

The present offices of the Department are entirely inadequate for the transaction of the tremendous volume of work required by the Department, and it is necessary that additional space be secured.

There are other needs of the Department which should be met, and other work that the Department should do, but I have limited myself in this statement to those needs which are imperative and which must be satisfied if the health and welfare of the great masses of the people are to be properly safeguarded.

It should be borne in mind, as was stated at the outset, that a large part of the money asked for is to enable the Department to do what may be termed initial or abnormal work, which is temporary in its nature, and which, once done, will not have to be done again; and that the present volume of such initial work is due, not only to the higher sanitary standard of the present Tenement House Law, but to the fact that many important provisions of former laws had been for many years neglected by the different municipal departments charged with their enforcement. The increase over last year's appropriations would therefore be a temporary and not a permanent addition to the City's expenses for public health and public safety.

As an illustration of this initial work due to neglect of former laws, I mention the entire absence of adequate fire escapes on many thousand tenements, a condition which is rapidly being remedied.

As an illustration of such initial work due to the new Tenement House Law, I mention the cutting of windows into dark rooms. Such matters once attended to will require but little attention from the Department hereafter.

The changes recently made by the Legislature in the Tenement House Laws also added largely to the initial work of the Department, because it will be necessary to reinspect most of the old tenements on points included in these changes to supplement the examinations already made before orders can be properly issued. In each house it is estimated that it will be necessary to verify an average of five different items because of these changes of the law.

The Tenement House Department is practically the Health Department for all tenement houses. It enforces in them not only the Tenement House Law, but many sanitary laws as well. Every consideration of public health and safety demands that these laws and regulations should be carried into effect, and the extent to which death and disease have already been diminished in the tenements by the work already done by this Department, in co-operation with that of other City departments, indicates how much more satisfactory results can be obtained by complete enforcement of these sanitary laws.

I respectfully ask that the full estimate be appropriated. Comparison is made with August instead of July, because the comparison with July would be misleading, in view of the temporary employees then on the Department payroll.

No amount of this year's appropriation will remain unexpended.

We have carefully investigated the question and it is believed that the rates of pay paid by this Department for the classes of services above described are below those paid for similar services by some other employers.

In order that this Department may pay the several classes of employees the wages they ask for an additional appropriation will be required.

I beg to request that your Honorable Board will add to the amount asked for Labor, Maintenance and Supplies, Department of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, for the year 1904 (\$496,000) the sum of \$16,000, required as follows:

AN ORDINANCE in relation to the erection of storm-doors.

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. No person, firm or corporation shall hereafter erect, place, keep or maintain any storm-door unless a license therefor shall have been granted by the Bureau of Licenses and the further provisions herein provided for shall have been complied with.

Sec. 2. Storm-doors, not exceeding ten feet in height, nor more than two feet wider than the doorway or entrance of any building, may be temporarily erected within the stoop-lines, but in no case to extend more than six feet outside the house-line. No structure under the name of "storm-door" shall be lawful which shall practically be an extension of the building front or house front within the stoop-line, or an enlargement of the ground floor of any premises.

Sec. 3. No storm-door shall be erected except as prescribed in section 2, and for each storm-door so erected an annual license fee of one dollar (\$1) shall be paid.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Any person violating, or assisting in the violation of, either of the provisions of the foregoing section shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not exceeding fifty dollars, or imprisonment not exceeding three months, or both; and any individual, company or corporation operating the railroad upon which

such violation shall take place shall be liable to a penalty of one hundred dollars for each and every such violation.

Sec. 3. It shall not be lawful for any individual, company or corporation operating a street surface railroad to run or operate any cars upon any portion of its route in the streets or highways of the Borough of Queens, without providing for the operation and management of every such car a conductor, as well as a driver or motorman; nor shall it be lawful for any such individual, company or corporation to use a steam, electric or other power whistle for the purpose of giving warning of their approach or otherwise, in the operation of its cars, upon any of such streets or highways.

Sec. 4. For each and every trip or part of a trip made in the operation of such car in violation of either of the provisions of the last section, the individual, company or corporation operating the same shall be subject to a penalty of fifty dollars.

Sec. 5. Every car for the carriage of passengers run or operated upon any street surface railroad, in the streets or highways of the Borough of Queens, shall be stopped at the intersection of every street or highway along its route for the purpose of receiving or discharging passengers, upon any passenger, or intending passenger, giving a signal of his desire to embark upon or alight from such car at such intersection.

Sec. 6. And any individual, company or corporation operating any such car in violation of the last section shall be liable to a penalty of twenty-five dollars for each and every such violation.

Sec. 7. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

MUNICIPAL EXPLOSIVES COMMISSION.

Proceedings of the Municipal Explosives Commission at meeting held Tuesday, October 13, 1903.

Present—Fire Commissioner and Chairman Thomas Sturgis and Commissioners Charlton, Eaton and McKenna.

Minutes of meetings held October 7 and 8 were read and approved.

Commissioner Charlton, as a sub-committee of one to inquire into the operation of certain sections of the fireworks regulations, submitted a report, which was read, approved and ordered on file.

The matter of the filing of bonds as provided in the regulations governing the sale, storage, use, etc., of fireworks was discussed, the Inspector of Combustibles being present. The advisability of requiring pyrotechnists to file only a single bond for numbers of small displays at certain seasons of the year was particularly considered, and a communication on the subject was prepared for transmission to the Inspector of Combustibles.

Further consideration was given to the proposed regulations governing the use, sale, storage, etc., of inflammable and volatile oils.



GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested in him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereto, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
