## PROCEEDINGS OF THE BOARD OF RAPID TRANSIT RAILROAD COMMISSIONERS.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD HELD IN NO. 320 BROADWAY ON THURSDAY, 24TH MARCH, 1904.

There were present:

Alexander E. Orr, President, presiding; John H. Starin, Vice-President; Comptroller Edward M. Grout, and Commissioners Woodbury Langdon, Morris K. Jesup and John Claflin.

George L. Rives and Albert B. Boardman, Counsel; William Barclay Parsons, Chief Engineer, and George S. Rice, Deputy Chief Engineer, also were present.

The minutes of the preceding meeting, that of the 18th March, 1904, were read, and it was moved that they be approved.

Ayes—The President, Vice-President, Comptroller and Commissioners Langdon, Jesup and Claflin.

Nays—None.

Carried.

Letter of August Belmont as to station at Forty-second street and Broadway was read as follows:

INTERBOROUGH RAPID TRANSIT COMPANY,  
No. 23 NASSAU STREET,  
NEW YORK, March 21, 1904.

Hon. ALEXANDER E. ORR, President, Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, No. 320 Broadway, New York City:

DEAR SIR—The Interborough Rapid Transit Company desires very much to characterize, so far as it can, its important distributing stations by name, where other converging transportation lines make such a station a centre, or, if for any reason it is in the neighborhood of some conspicuous institution, like Columbia College.

No station on our route is liable to be more active or important than at Forty-second street and Broadway. We are planning, in connection with the Times Building, to enlarge the station, and, through the Times Building, to have access to it from Seventh avenue. Owing to the conspicuous position which the "Times" holds, it being one of the leading New York journals, it would seem fitting that the square on which its building stands should be known as "Times Square," and the station named "Times Station." "Long Acre," the present name of the square, means nothing, and it is not generally known throughout the city. I, therefore, on behalf of the company, apply to the Commission to use its best efforts with the City authorities to change the name of "Long Acre Square" to "Times Square," and apply to your Board for permission to name the station "Times Station" in conformity therewith.

Resolved, That the Secretary inform Mr. Belmont that the Board does not think it desirable to take any action upon his letter until the Mayor and the Board of Aldermen change the name of the square.

Letter of Mr. Belmont, as follows, as to tunnel under Pier 17, North river, was read and referred to Counsel and Chief Engineer for report:

MARCH 18, 1904.

Hon. ALEXANDER E. ORR, President, Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, No. 320 Broadway, New York City:

DEAR SIR—Our sub-contractor and engineers upon the East River Tunnel section report that the line of the tunnel, according to the present plans of grade and alignment, passes under Pier 17, East river, in the Borough of Brooklyn, north of the foot of Joralemon street, in a manner which will necessitate cutting off the bottom of all the wharf piles which come in the path of the shield, and that in the event of subsequent repairs to the pier the driving of new piles would endanger the tunnel structure, and that provision should be made to avoid this injury and to protect the tunnels from future interference by the reconstruction of the pier.

This seems to present a case arising under that section of the contract which provides that where extraordinary conditions exist or unforeseen contingencies arise, etc., "The Board may issue such supplementary plans, duly countersigned by the engineer, and accompanied by specifications, explanatory thereof or describing the method of construction, changing the sections or the dimensions of the parts or the materials of the structure and such supplemental plans and specifications when so issued shall be binding on the contractor."

In this connection, I am also advised that the New York Dock Company, which is the owner of Pier 17, objects to interference with that pier, and I therefore beg to invoke that further provision of the contract whereby the City undertakes to secure to the contractor the right to construct the railroad free of all interference on the part of any owner or any other person, etc. It may be necessary in this connection for the City to acquire by condemnation the ownership of a portion of the pier referred to, as provision should be made for the protection of the tunnels from future injury by the driving of new piles in repairing the pier.

I am informed that some suggestion has been made between the engineers that this difficulty might be avoided by a change in the alignment of the tunnel; but the proposed change is objectionable to us as making a break in the alignment on the New York side, and not wholly avoiding the difficulty on the Brooklyn side, and I have therefore to request that you give the matter your early consideration, and oblige,

24TH MARCH, 1904.

To the Board:

Your Committee on Contracts begs leave to report that it has had a further conference with the New York Connecting Railroad Company, whose application for a franchise to construct a railroad was received on 11th June, 1903. Your Committee has proposed certain terms and conditions on which it would be willing to recommend to the Board the granting of the franchise desired, with a view to protecting the City in the compensation to be received for the rights granted and of establishing safe precedents for future grants of a similar nature.

The counsel of the Board and of the railroad company are to confer with a view to working out contract provisions covering this general ground, after which a further report will be submitted by your Committee.

Counsel reported on the hearing they had attended by the direction of the Board before the Joint Committee of the Senate and Assembly in Albany on the 23d instant.

The following resolution was moved:

Resolved, That the action of counsel be and the same hereby is approved in consenting to the amendment of the bill sent to Albany by this Board to amend section 37 of the Rapid Transit Act, by adding to the last sentence in that section, before the word "prescribed" the words "consented thereto and," so that the sentence shall read as follows:

"The amount of bonds authorized to be issued and sold by this section shall not exceed the limit of amount which shall be prescribed by the board of estimate and apportionment or such other local authority having power to make appropriations of moneys to be raised by taxation; and no contract for the construction of such road or roads shall be made unless and until such board of estimate and apportionment or such other local authority shall have consented thereto and prescribed a limit to the amount of bonds available for the purposes of this section, which shall be sufficient to meet the requirements of this contract in addition to all obligations theretofore incurred and to be satisfied from such bonds.

The Chief Engineer presented two maps or plans showing proposed extension of the Brooklyn-Manhattan road, and the following resolution was moved:

Whereas, The Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York has determined that a rapid transit railway, for the conveyance and transportation of persons and property in addition to those already existing, is necessary for the interests of the public and of The City of New York, and should be established in the Borough of Brooklyn therein, as hereinafter provided; and

Whereas, This Board has duly made the inquest and investigation necessary or proper in the premises and all such inquests and investigations as are necessary or proper for such determination;

Now, Therefore, This Board does hereby adopt the following route for an additional rapid transit railway in The City of New York and does hereby determine and establish the said additional route as follows, and does hereby adopt a general plan of construction of the said railway, the route of which is herein provided, and does in such general plan hereby adopted show as follows the general mode of operation and such details as to manner of construction as may be necessary to show the extent to which any street, avenue or other public place is to be encroached upon.

A route, the centre line of which shall commence at a point at or near the intersection of Flatbush and Atlantic avenues, at the terminus of the Rapid Transit Road, described in the route and general plans of January 24, 1901, approved by the Board of Aldermen on the 21st day of May, 1901, and contracted for under Contract No. 2 on the 21st day of July, 1902; and such centre line shall run in a subway from thence under Flatbush avenue to Park Plaza, passing under Park Plaza and then again under Flatbush avenue to Ocean avenue, occupying, if necessary for the purpose of the curve, from Flatbush avenue to Ocean avenue, a portion of Prospect Park; and thence under Ocean avenue to the southerly side of Parkside avenue. The route shall also include a loop around and under the Park Plaza. A suitable connection shall be provided for between the terminus of the subway described above at Parkside avenue, with the railroad known as the Brighton Beach route, which extends southerly from the south side of Parkside avenue to Brighton Beach.



The general plan of construction hereby adopted is as follows:

For the route under Flatbush avenue from Atlantic avenue to a suitable point under Park Plaza, four parallel tracks; for the route from such point under Park Plaza, two parallel tracks; for the route under Flatbush avenue from Park Plaza to Ocean avenue, two parallel tracks; for the route under Ocean avenue, eight parallel tracks, except that if necessary for additional terminal purposes four additional parallel tracks may be laid under the easterly side of Prospect Park and contiguous to the westerly side of Ocean avenue; for the route of the loop around Park Plaza, two parallel tracks.

All of the above-mentioned tracks shall be placed in subway on substantially the same level, except that wherever required by special necessities of surface or sub-surface structures, or other special or local necessities and for the purpose of avoiding grade crossings at the junction with the southerly tracks of the subway at Flatbush and Atlantic avenues or with the Brighton Beach road at Parkside avenue or elsewhere, any one or more of the tracks may be depressed below the level of the other tracks to a depth of not more than twenty feet, and the route under Park Plaza may be so arranged as to pass either under or over the tracks extending across the Park Plaza on the line of Flatbush avenue.

The four tracks above provided for along Flatbush avenue from Atlantic avenue to and across a part of Park Plaza need all not be built at the same time as the remaining tracks, but two of such tracks may be constructed at such time hereafter as may be found necessary or convenient.

The tracks shall be of standard gauge, that is to say, of a width of four feet and eight and a half inches between the rails. There shall be a width of twelve and a half feet for each track in addition to the thickness of the supporting walls, except that at stations, switches, turnouts, curves and crossovers the width may be increased to the extent permitted by the width of the tunnel.

The tracks shall be placed in general under the central part of Flatbush avenue and Ocean avenue, so far as may be practicable and convenient, but wherever required by special or local necessities or for curves, the tracks may be diverted as far as necessary to one side or the other of the street. But no wall of the tunnel or part thereof, except at stations, station approaches, curves and places of access to sub-surface structures, as hereinafter provided, and except adjacent to Prospect Park, shall be within a distance of five feet of the exterior line or side of the street.

The roof of the tunnel shall be as near the surface of the street as street conditions and grades will permit. The tunnel shall not be less than thirteen feet in height in the clear. The maximum widths of the tunnel in the clear shall be as follows:

For the route along Flatbush avenue from Atlantic avenue to and across the Park Plaza, fifty feet; for the route under Flatbush avenue to Ocean avenue, twenty-five feet; for the route under Ocean avenue, one hundred feet; for the loop under the Park Plaza, twenty-five feet; for terminal tracks (if constructed) under Prospect Park, fifty feet.

Whenever necessary for the proper support of the street surface the roof of the tunnel shall be of iron or steel with brick or concrete supported by iron or steel columns and masonry walls, or the roof shall be a masonry arch.

Adjacent tracks shall be connected by necessary and suitable switches and connections, and an additional track for siding accommodations may be constructed not to exceed in length one-quarter of a mile for each mile of roadway, but provided always that the side of the tunnel shall not, by the enlargement of the tunnel for that purpose, be brought within five feet of the exterior line or side of the street.

Pipes, wires, sewers and other sub-surface structures shall, at any part of the said routes, be removed or disturbed when necessary for the construction and operation of the railway, and, if removed or disturbed, shall be placed under the streets in such manner and in such location that the use and service thereof shall not be impaired. Such pipes, wires, sewers and other sub-surface structures shall be left or shall be so arranged as to give free access for their repair or alteration, or for the placing with them of new pipes, wires, sewers and other like structures, and for making connections between the same and buildings at any time.

Stations and station approaches shall in general be at the intersections of streets and shall be built under the streets and immediately adjoining private abutting property, or through private property to be acquired for the purpose, or their approaches may be from the centre of the street. The streets under which stations or station approaches shall be built may include cross streets, but no part of any cross street shall be used for a station approach at a distance greater than seventy-five feet from the exterior line or side of the street of the route.

The word "street" wherever used herein shall include an avenue or public place.

The general mode of operation shall be by electricity or some other power not requiring combustion within the tunnel, and the motors shall be capable of moving trains at a speed of not less than forty miles per hour for long distances, exclusive of stops.

The manner of construction shall be by tunneling or open excavation.

It is further

Resolved, That this Board hereby adopts the drawings now produced and numbered 87 and 88 as showing the route and general plan hereby adopted.

Ayes—The President, Vice-President, Comptroller and Commissioners Langdon, Jesup and Claflin.

Carried.

Counsel referred to resolution adopted January 15, 1903, authorizing execution of contract for construction of third track, from the north portal north to terminus of west side line at Kingsbridge, and explained the necessity for a special contract covering this work.

The following resolution was moved:

Resolved, That the officers of this Board be and they hereby are authorized to execute a contract in form substantially as follows, to wit:

JOHN B. McDONALD, Contractor, AND INTERBOROUGH RAPID TRANSIT COMPANY.

#### AGREEMENT

Modifying Contract for Construction and Operation of Rapid Transit Railroad.

THIRD TRACK NORTH OF FORT GEORGE.

Agreement made this twenty-fourth day of March, in the year nineteen hundred and four, between The City of New York (hereinafter called the "City") acting by the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York (hereinafter called "the Board"), party of the first part, and John B. McDonald, of The City of New York (hereinafter called "the Contractor"), party of the second part, and Interborough Rapid Transit Company (a corporation organized and existing under the laws of the State of New York—hereinafter called "Interborough Company"), party of the third part, witnesseth:

Whereas, Heretofore and on or about the 21st day of February, 1900, the City, acting by the Board, entered into a contract with the Contractor for the construction and operation of a Rapid Transit Railroad in The City of New York and otherwise, as therein mentioned, the said contract being hereinafter styled the Contract for Construction and Operation, which contract was on said day modified in certain respects by a further agreement between the said parties bearing the same date; and which contract has been further modified by certain other agreements between the said parties; and

Whereas, By agreement between the City and the contractor, dated June 21, 1900, the routes and general plan for the construction and operation of the said Rapid Transit Railroad were duly modified by striking from the same the portion thereof beginning at a point under Eleventh avenue on the centre line thereof produced, and eleven hundred and five (1105) feet north of the centre line of One Hundred and Ninetieth street, and running thence as described in said routes and general plan to a point at or near the intersection of Broadway with Amsterdam avenue and south of Riverdale avenue; and by inserting in the said routes instead of the portion thereof thus struck out the route as hereinafter in this agreement described; and by adopting a general plan of construction for the portion of the route thereby substituted as in said agreement, dated June 21, 1900, to which reference is hereby had, is more fully set forth and provided, which agreement, and the routes and plans therein contained, was thereafter approved and consented to as therein provided; and

Whereas, The contractor has deposited with the Comptroller of the City certain security for the performance of the said contract for construction and operation on his part, and has given certain bonds as further security for such performance, and upon such bonds there are now sureties as follows: Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, The United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company, The City Trust, Safe Deposit and Surety Company of Philadelphia, American Surety Company of New York, National Surety Company and Fidelity and Deposit Company of Maryland; and

Whereas, By written instruments bearing date the tenth day of July, 1902, the contractor, with the written consent of the Board, concurred in by six members thereof, duly assigned the right and obligation to maintain and operate the said Rapid Transit Railroad for the term of years specified in the said contract, and all rights included in the leasing provisions of the said contract, together with the obligation to provide equipment for the said railroad unto Interborough Company, which company also guaranteed the performance by the contractor of the provisions of so much of his said contract as was not so assigned to it; and

Whereas, It is in said contract for construction and operation provided that the said Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners shall have the right for any section of the railroad to require additional work to be done or additional materials to be furnished or both, with the general purview of a rapid transit railroad as therein described, the reasonable value of which shall be additionally paid to the contractor; and

Whereas, The contractor desires, and the Board approves, a modification of the said contract for construction and operation in order to provide for the additional construction of certain side tracks for terminal purposes and otherwise; and

Whereas, It is in said contract for the construction and operation of the Rapid Transit Railroad provided that the contractor shall locate and furnish terminal grounds subject to the approval of said Board, having a mileage of not less than five miles and capable of storing the equipment to be furnished under said contract for which he is to be paid, as specified therein, amounts not exceeding in all the sum of one million seven hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$1,750,000), and the contractor has already located and furnished or made provision to furnish terminals at a cost to him in excess of said sum,

Now, therefore, in consideration of the premises, and subject to the consents hereinafter provided, it is agreed that the said contract of February 21, 1900, be and the same is hereby modified as follows:

In addition to the tracks to be laid as prescribed in the Specifications in said contract contained under the head "1. General Description," the contractor shall, at the time of constructing the same, also lay and construct an additional side track upon the portion of the route under or over private property, Eleventh avenue, Naegle avenue, Amsterdam avenue, Broadway or Kingsbridge road, Riverdale avenue and Two Hundred and Thirtieth street from a point at or near the north portal of the tunnel of the said Rapid Transit Railroad now being constructed on private property near the intersection of Eleventh and Naegle avenues to a point at or near the intersection of Two Hundred and Thirtieth street and Bailey avenue; the same to be laid and constructed in accordance with certain plans and drawings prepared and issued by the Chief Engineer of the Board, which are hereunto annexed as a part of this agreement, marked "Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, Office of the Chief Engineer, Drawing No. ...., Dated ..... day of ....., 1903," and which additional side track shall be included as a part of the railroad described in the leasing provisions of the contract aforesaid duly assigned to Interborough Company as above set forth.

And it is further agreed that the cost of constructing that portion of the said additional side track from the point at or near the north portal of the tunnel near the intersection of Eleventh and Naegle avenues to the point at or near the intersection of Amsterdam avenue with Kingsbridge road or Broadway and south of Riverdale avenue, a distance of 4,638 feet or thereabouts shall be deemed a part of the cost of constructing said Rapid Transit Railroad, and shall be paid to the contractor in the manner provided in the contract for construction and operation of said Rapid Transit Railroad, in addition to the amounts in said contract agreed to be paid unto said contractor; and such cost shall be included in the total cost of the construction of the said railroad in determining the amount of rental to be paid under said contract, in like manner as if so much of said side track had been originally authorized therein;

And it is further agreed that the contractor be and he is hereby authorized to construct at his own expense and as a part of the terminals of said railway that portion of the said additional track of the said railroad which lies between a point at or near the intersection of Amsterdam avenue with Kingsbridge road or Broadway and south of Riverdale avenue and a point at or near the intersection of Two Hundred and Thirtieth street with Bailey avenue.

And it is further agreed for the purposes of this agreement that one hundred and four thousand dollars (\$104,000) shall be deemed to be the reasonable value of constructing so much of said additional side track as shall be paid for by the City unto the contractor as hereinbefore provided, and that the same be paid to the contractor upon vouchers duly certified and approved as in said contract dated February 21, 1900, is stipulated.

Provided, however, and it is expressly agreed, that this agreement shall take effect if and when and only when the following consents shall have been duly had, to wit:

The consents as subjoined of Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, The United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company, The City Trust, Safe Deposit and Surety Company of Philadelphia, American Surety Company of New York, National Surety Company and Fidelity and Deposit Company of Maryland.

In Witness Whereof, this contract has been executed for The City of New York, by its Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, under and by a resolution duly adopted by said Board, concurred in by six of its members, and the seal of the said Board has been hereto affixed and these presents signed by the President and Secretary of the said Board, and the contractor has hereto set his hand and seal, and Interborough Company has caused these presents to be duly executed by its proper officers under its corporate seal, the day and year first above written.

Letter of the Chief Engineer was read as follows:

NEW YORK, March 23, 1904.

Hon. A. E. ORR, President, Rapid Transit Board:

MY DEAR SIR—The last tunnel heading met on March 17 near the intersection of One Hundred and Ninety-second street and Broadway. The meeting of the lines was successful, but has not yet been accurately measured. The difference in level was, however, found to be about one-half inch. We have been unable to obtain the difference in alignment or the difference in the measuring, as there is some very bad ground where the bench is being taken out at the Fort George heading, which has necessitated a large amount of upright timbers and where the ground is dangerous to work in at the present time.

The excavation of this tunnel is now complete with the exception of the trimming, building of the station, and about 350 feet of bench.

Letter of the Chief Engineer as to "Fox Street Station" was read as follows:

NEW YORK, March 24, 1904.

Hon. A. E. ORR, President, Rapid Transit Board:

MY DEAR SIR—The Rapid Transit Board, by resolution, has located a station at Fox street, in the Borough of The Bronx. At the time this station was contemplated the name of the street at this point was Fox street, but was subsequently changed by the Board of Aldermen to Simpson street. I would suggest, therefore, that the name



of the station be changed from Fox street to Simpson street, in order to conform to the local facts.

The following report of the Chief Engineer as to old sewer on west side of Lenox avenue at One Hundred and Forty-fifth street was read, and a copy ordered transmitted to the President of the Borough of Manhattan:

BOARD OF RAPID TRANSIT RAILROAD COMMISSIONERS,  
CHIEF ENGINEER'S OFFICE,  
NEW YORK, March 24, 1904.

Hon. A. E. ORR, President, Rapid Transit Board:

MY DEAR SIR—I beg leave to hand you herewith an extract of letter received from the contractors:

"We would again earnestly call your attention to the sewer on the west side of Lenox avenue, between One Hundred and Forty-second and One Hundred and Forty-fifth streets, that has been let for some time by the City for reconstruction. We have already stated to you that the old sewer in places was entirely collapsed, and when we commenced the work the sewage was running through the bed of Lenox avenue, as well as the sidewalk. The filling of the sidewalk is more fine material than it was on the Lenox avenue bed; therefore we do not see how the sewage that we are now carrying across to the east side of Lenox avenue can be turned back into the sidewalk before the sewer is built without back-flooding all the buildings south and the lots around.

"This sewer has been let for some time back, and we understand is in the hands of the President of the Borough of Manhattan, who no doubt could arrange all necessary details and order the contractor on to build, and we understand would likely do so if a request was made from Mr. McDonald, the Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company or the Rapid Transit Commission Engineers, stating that the delay in rebuilding this sewer may interfere with the opening of this section. In fact, with the exceptions of turning the water back into the old sewer from where it originally was, and removing the cross sewer, cars could be run through the Lenox avenue extension in a very short time, with the exception of the matter of moving the gas pipe at One Hundred and Forty-fifth street, which, if some adjustment is made of the passage under the tracks, as we have already written you, the pipe can be changed in two or three days. At the very best, after this sewer is commenced, the contractor has 100 working days to do the work, unless he should choose to make some special effort, and also working night and day, and finish it in a month or six weeks.

"We understand that the next meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment meets next Friday to consider such matters, and if this measure were put before the President of the Borough of Manhattan in the meantime, we think he would push it through and order the contractor to work. As we understand, it is held back on account of passing the appropriation for sewer repairs, which there does not seem to be any question about, excepting that the proper authorities do not seem to get it before them.

"If the Board of Estimate and Apportionment should not put this through this coming Friday, as that seems to be their regular meeting day every week, it then would not come up again for two weeks, as the following Friday being 'Good Friday,' there would not likely be any meeting held. Therefore it is very important to get Mr. McDonald to bring it to the attention of the Borough President before the coming Friday."

On the west side of Lenox avenue an old sewer had been built which is now in a very bad condition and which the Sewer Department now intends to rebuild. During the construction of the subway the sewage has been diverted from the old sewer. We have now reached the point where it is necessary to turn the flow back, and this cannot be done unless we remove our temporary sewer; to remove the temporary sewer means the diversion of the flow back into the old sewer, which is not in a proper condition to retain it.

I wish the City authorities would be asked to take this matter up immediately and the work of rebuilding the old sewer pushed.

Mr. Parsons then offered to place the exhibit that he had prepared for St. Louis at the disposition of the Commission, the Commission to pay the expense that Mr. Parsons had already incurred or that was still due on the exhibit; but on the condition that, when the exhibition was finished, the model and the other parts of the exhibit were to be presented to Columbia University, to be placed in the Engineering Museum. Mr. Parsons also offered to loan to the Commission the minerals, coins and other articles of private property that are in the show-case constructed to contain them; this private property so loaned to be returned to Mr. Parsons at the conclusion of the exhibition.

The following resolution was moved:

Resolved, That the offer of Mr. Parsons, with its conditions, be accepted.

The Rhinelander medal for valor to Patrolman Michael J. Coyne, of the Thirtieth Precinct, for an act of exceptional valor, described in the report of the said Committee as follows:

"While Coyne was patrolling his post in Corlears Hook Park on the night of February 27, 1903, at about 10.30 o'clock, he heard a cry of 'help!' from the direction of the river. He immediately ran down to the Pier at the foot of Corlears street, and, hearing the cry again, saw a dark object struggling in the water. He divested himself of his helmet, belt and coat and jumped into the river; he caught hold of the man (whose name proved to be John Harkness) and tried to bring him ashore, but the tide running very strong at the time carried them out into the middle of the river. Officers Corker and McQueeney, who were on post in the vicinity at the time, hearing the cries, immediately ran to the life-saving station, procured a rowboat, rowed out into the middle of the river and found Officer Coyne and the man struggling in the water and pulled them into the boat."

The Committee considers that in rescuing John Harkness under the circumstances Patrolman Coyne performed an act of exceptional valor, and at the peril of his own life.

The Isaac Bell medal for bravery to Patrolman Christopher C. O'Brien, of the Thirty-second Precinct, for an act of exceptional bravery, described in the report of said Committee as follows:

"Patrolman O'Brien was on post at One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street and Third avenue at 9 P. M., July 4, 1903, and went to the rescue of Charles Anderson, an employee of the Metropolitan Railroad Company, whose clothing had caught fire from an electric current while he was at work underneath the car at that point. Anderson was dragged from under the car by Officer O'Brien, who succeeded with the greatest difficulty, pain and at the risk of his own life, in extinguishing the flames which had by this time enveloped the man's whole body."

The Committee considers this an act of exceptional bravery on the part of Officer O'Brien, and believes that by his prompt and determined efforts he saved the life of Charles Anderson, and in so doing he was himself horribly burned.

The Peter F. Meyer medal to Patrolman Joseph M. McNierney, of the Twenty-fifth Precinct, for an act of exceptional bravery, described in the report of said Committee as follows:

"At 5 o'clock P. M., May 22, 1903, Patrolman McNierney jumped into the East river at the foot of Sixty-fifth street, and rescued from drowning a boy named Max Albert, seven years of age. The boy had fallen overboard and was carried by the tide 30 feet from shore. He had gone down for the third time. Without waiting to divest himself of any clothing, Officer McNierney dove for the boy, brought him to the surface and then swam with him to the shore, then carrying him in his arms ran to the Flower Hospital without delaying for the arrival of an ambulance surgeon. Such a delay, in the opinion of the surgeons of the hospital, would have proved serious. Under proper treatment the boy was resuscitated. The Committee finds that Patrolman McNierney rescued this boy at the risk of his own life, and that the rescue was an act of exceptional bravery, as well as showing a high order of intelligence on the part of the officer in immediately conveying the boy to the hospital for proper treatment."
