MINUTES BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT, CITY OF NEW YORK, COUNCIL CHAMBER, CITY HALL, FRIDAY, JUNE 12, 1903.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

Before considering public improvement matters the Board took up the matter of the application of the Ocean Electric Railway Company for a franchise to operate a double-track surface road in the Borough of Queens.

Mr. William J. Kelly appeared on behalf of the railroad company and requested that the matter be postponed for one week.

The matter was laid over until the meeting of June 19, 1903.

The Board then proceeded to the consideration of the matters appertaining to public improvements, and at 1 o'clock took a recess until 2.30 p. m.

The Secretary presented the following communication from the Appraiser of Real Estate, Department of Finance, relative to the acquisition of property in the Borough of Brooklyn for an anchorage site for the Manhattan Bridge:

CITY OF NEW YORK—DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE,

COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE,

June 11, 1903.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—The Department of Bridges of The City of New York requires the premises bounded by Front, Water, Pearl and Adams streets, in the Borough of Brooklyn, as part of a site to be used as an anchorage pier for the Manhattan Bridge in said borough.

The property is owned by the Davol's, and is approximately 206 feet by 200 feet, and fronts on the four streets. It is used by the Brooklyn Brass and Copper Company and other tenants for manufacturing purposes.

The building is in the form of a hollow square, and was built at various times. The front on Water street—206 feet front and 100 feet deep—was built about 1890. (See diagram hereto annexed marked "A.")

The Pearl street section is a five-story brick building, 30 feet by 100 feet 1 inch, containing therein a chimney 5 feet by 7 feet.

The Water street front is a building 138 feet front by 50 feet deep, four-story brick.

The Adams street front is a building 38 feet 6 inches front by 100 feet deep, four-story brick.

The Front street, Pearl street and Adams street property was built about thirty years ago, and contains three separate structures (see diagram marked "B"). They are all built of brick four stories high.

The inner court is covered over one story high with an iron-trussed roof. There is a large chimney in this inner court 11 feet square. Two other chimneys are in the Front and Adams street buildings, one 8 feet 3 inches square, the other 4 feet by 6 feet.

In a conference held between the owners of the property, Mr. Harris, of the Corporation Counsel's office, and this office, the owners agreed to sell to The City of New York the entire plant intact (with the understanding that they could remove, before September 15, 1903, such machinery as they could use elsewhere), for the sum

of six hundred and eighty thousand dollars (\$680,000), possession to be given to The City of New York on the 15th day of September next ensuing, in order that the Department of Bridges might remove the building from the premises.

The price at which this property is offered to the City, under the conditions, is reasonable and just, and I recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopt a resolution authorizing the purchase of the entire plant herein named as part of an anchorage site for the Manhattan Bridge in the Borough of Brooklyn, at a price not exceeding six hundred and eighty thousand dollars (\$680,000).

The title to the lands taken in this proceeding became vested in The City of New York May 1, 1897, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 641 of the Laws of 1897.

Hon. ALEXANDER E. ORR, President, Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners of The City of New York, New York City:

DEAR SIR—The Hudson and Manhattan Railroad Company has been duly organized under the laws of the State of New York for the purpose of constructing and operating a tunnel railroad from a point at or near the intersection of Broadway with Cortlandt street, in The City of New York, and thence by a feasible route, beneath the surface in The City of New York, and under the bed of the Hudson river to a point under the waters of the Hudson river in the boundary line between the States of New York and New Jersey (opposite a point lying between Liberty and Fulton streets, in the Borough of Manhattan), where the said railroad is to connect with the railroad of a corporation organized or to be organized under the laws of New Jersey, extending westwardly to a point or points in the city of Jersey City, and State of New Jersey, and thereby forming a continuous line for the carriage of passengers and property between a point or points within and a point or points without The City of New York.

The capital stock of the company is \$3,000,000. The officers and directors are as follows:

The route of the road, as adopted, is from the State line in the middle of the Hudson river, at a point nearly opposite the foot of Cortlandt street, thence by single track, under the Hudson river and Cortlandt street, to Church street, thence under Church street to Fulton street, thence under Fulton street westwardly to a point in the State line in the middle of the Hudson river, nearly opposite the foot of Fulton street, at which points connection will be made with the railroad of a company organized, or to be organized, under the laws of New Jersey, so as to form a through line for the conveyance of persons and property between New York and Jersey City and points in New Jersey.

Under Church street, between Cortlandt and Fulton streets, a station will be constructed at such depth as not to interfere with the proposed subway along and under Church street. It is intended to construct a foot passageway under Dey street, from Church street to Broadway, to connect the Church street station of this company with the station of the Rapid Transit Subway at Dey street and Broadway, and to have independent stairways leading from such underground foot passageway to the surface of Dey and John streets. Property for station and terminal purposes along the west side of Church street, between Cortlandt and Fulton streets, has already been secured, so that the station under Church street will have ingress and egress on private property.

The plan herewith submitted, marked Exhibit "A," shows the route and profile of the proposed road, the location of the proposed station, the property upon which the terminal building is to be erected, and the proposed foot passageway under Dey street, to connect the station under Church street with the station of the Rapid Transit Subway at Broadway and Dey streets.

This company respectfully applies for the grant of a right-of-way or franchise for the construction and operation of the aforesaid railroad.

The Chief Engineer made the following report on the application for increase of compensation for Inspectors of Masonry:

Hon. A. E. ORR, President, Rapid Transit Board:

MY DEAR SIR—In accordance with the instructions of the Board I have considered the application of the Inspectors of Masonry for increase of pay.

The rate of pay of \$4 per day was fixed when the work began, because Inspectors in the Department of Water Supply and Sewers were doing similar work in the streets, and the Inspectors of the Rapid Transit were paid the same price. I have made application to the Chief Engineers of the Department of Water Supply and of Sewers, and find that the Departments still continue to pay the same rate, namely, \$4. It is therefore a matter for the Board to decide as to whether it desires to depart from the established schedule.

It is true that these Inspectors are paid a nominally lower rate than the men receive whose work they are inspecting. On the other hand, it should be remembered that the bricklayers and others whose work they are inspecting are paid by the day, with no guarantee that their work will continue, and are paid only when they work. The Inspectors, on the other hand, are protected by the Civil Service rules, can be discharged only in an established manner, and, as a general thing, make full time, whether the work is in progress or not. For instance, during the recent

strike, the bricklayers were receiving nothing; all our Inspectors were receiving full time. In addition to this they are paid for all time over eight hours, and whenever they have been injured on the line of the work their pay has been permitted to continue.

Hon. ALEXANDER E. ORR, President of Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, No. 320 Broadway, New York City:

SIR—I have your letter without date, received May 13th inst., inquiring about the appointment of Commissioner in condemnation proceedings in Brooklyn.

The original order appointing Commissioners was entered January 16, 1903. Some time afterwards Mr. William C. DeWitt declined to accept an appointment, and the order was modified by Mr. Justice Gaynor by substituting the name of Thomas J. Kenna. The order was further changed by providing that the first meeting of the Commission should be held on April 24, 1903, instead of February 5, 1903. Mr. Kenna qualified as Commissioner.

A careful examination of the statute impelled the belief on my part that it would be wise to advertise again for the appointment of the third Commissioner instead of relying upon the substitution made as above prescribed. Advertisement has accordingly been published of an application on June 1 for the appointment of the third Commissioner. This is merely to save any question of technical objection, as I have no reason to doubt that Mr. Kenna will be appointed, and as soon as practicable thereafter the first meeting of the Commissioners will be regularly held and the work proceeded with.

DEAR SIR—We beg to call the attention of your Honorable Board to the need of a connection at One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, between the Westchester avenue line of the Rapid Transit road and the elevated road of the Manhattan Railway Company, now operated by Interborough Rapid Transit Company. The connection would be by elevated structure along Westchester avenue, from Brook avenue to Third avenue, and the advantages of it have been pointed out by Mr. Parsons in his report of February 19, 1903, on a comprehensive plan of rapid transit in the boroughs of Manhattan, Bronx and Queens. Through trains could be operated from points south of Bronx Park by direct line to all points south of the Harlem river, connecting South Ferry and City Hall. Passengers from the northeastern portion of The Bronx, instead of being carried westwardly across the City and back by the subway, as now planned, would go down the east side by a direct line one mile and three-quarters shorter. Passengers in the Harlem district would have better service because the Lenox avenue line would be relieved of the traffic from the northeastern portion of The Bronx. The Bronx elevated portion of the Rapid Transit Railroad could be opened at an earlier date, and upon the completion of the Harlem river tunnel either route could be used as the demands of travel might require.

We therefore ask your Honorable Board to take steps to procure the requisite authority for the construction of this connection by elevated structure along Westchester avenue, as part of the Manhattan-Bronx Rapid Transit line.

Counsel reported that the Court of Appeals had unanimously affirmed the decision of the Appellate Division on the opinion of Mr. Justice Hatch that the ducts in the rapid transit railroad are a part of construction and not of equipment.

Ingraham, J.:

This appeal is from an order of the Special Term denying a motion for an injunction restraining the defendants from further excavating, blasting or constructing the rapid transit tunnel for the underground railroad under Park avenue adjacent to the plaintiff's premises, or from continuing the work of tunnel construction in such a manner that the easterly side of the tunnel or of the excavation therefor, shall be nearer to the building or house line than the tunnel described and shown in the routes and general plan adopted and approved by the defendants, the Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners. The plaintiff is the owner of a dwelling house on the east side of Park avenue, at the corner of Thirty-eighth street. In pursuance of legislative authority and the consent of The City of New York, the Rapid Transit Commissioners prepared a general plan for the construction of an underground railroad in The City of New York. That general plan was approved by the municipal authorities, but the property owners having refused to consent to the construction of the road, application was made to this court for authority to construct and operate the said road, notwithstanding such refusal. The plans as prepared by the Rapid Transit Commissioners, and which were submitted to this Court for approval, contemplated three separate tunnels under Park avenue, in front of the plaintiff's premises, the easterly side of the easterly tunnel being thirty-seven feet and six inches from the building line of the property on the east side of Park avenue. The centre tunnel was twenty-four feet in width, and constructed in the middle of the avenue, and was separated from the east tunnel by a masonry wall. The centre tunnel was to contain two tracks, while the easterly tunnel was to contain one track, and it was this method of construction that was approved by this Court. After such approval, the Commissioners of Rapid Transit made the detailed plans necessary for a contract to construct the road. Upon a further consideration, the original plans were modified by substituting for the three tunnels originally proposed, two tunnels, one upon the east and the other upon the west side of Park avenue, the east side tunnel being thirty-five feet from the building line of the abutting property on the easterly side of Park avenue. The contract was made between the Commissioners of Rapid Transit and the defendant McDonald, for the construction of the road according to these modified plans. Subsequent to the execution of this contract, a further modification of these plans was considered necessary by the Chief Engineer in charge of the work, and such modification was directed by him without any formal action of the Rapid Transit Board, and without the consent of either the property owners or of this Court. By this modification, the easterly tunnel was located on the east side of Park avenue, about seven feet from the building line of the property. The construction of this easterly tunnel was prosecuted under the authority of the Chief Engineer of the Board of Rapid Transit Commissioners, with the approval of the engineer of the contractors, but without other authority. After the excavation was substantially completed, at a cost to The City of New York of upwards of \$400,000, this action was commenced to enjoin the further construction of this tunnel under Park avenue, and to compel the defendants to fill up the excavation already made and to proceed with the plans as originally proposed.

The evidence is that it would cost The City of New York to comply with this demand in the neighborhood of \$500,000, in addition to the money already spent, and would delay the completion of the work for about eighteen months; and the question that was presented to the Court below was, whether in view of these facts, in the exercise of its judicial discretion, this work should now be stopped, entailing upon the public and the City this delay in the prosecution of the work, with the large additional cost indicated. It is undoubtedly true that this modification of the plans, materially changing the relation of the proposed road to the abutting property without the consent of the property owners, or in lieu thereof the approval of this Court, was entirely unauthorized. The constitutional provision, recognized and enforced by the statutes under which this road is being constructed, by which this railroad could not be built without the consent of the property owners, or in lieu thereof the approval of this Court, provided safeguards for the protection of property abutting upon a street through or under which it was proposed to construct a railroad. Before such a road should be constructed, the abutting owners were to be consulted; but in order to prevent the opposition of the property owners from preventing a necessary public improvement, provision was made by which an approval by this Court for the construction of such a railroad could take the place of the consent of the property owners; but that was only to be done where notice to the property owners was given so that they could be heard in opposition to the construction of the road; and the application to this Court for its approval was necessarily based upon the plans for the construction and location of the proposed road, so that the property owners could have an opportunity of presenting their objections to the road as it was proposed to be constructed and located. Before a tunnel within seven feet of the property was authorized, the abutting owners had the right to be heard and present their objection to a tunnel so located.

We will assume, therefore, in the disposition of this application, that the change of location was unauthorized, and if before any work had been done or substantial progress had been made in the excavation an application had been made for an injunction, that the Court would have been justified in restraining the further prosecution of the work until the necessary consents had been obtained. An entirely different question is presented where the application for an injunction is made after the excavation of the tunnel has been substantially completed and where all that remains is to construct the necessary masonry walls and supports. That it would be a much more

serious injury to the plaintiff's property to leave the excavation in the condition in which it was when this action was commenced than to allow it to be proceeded with and the necessary walls and supports constructed, is apparent. The only result of now granting a preliminary injunction would be to stop the work, leaving this hole in the ground unsupported; while if the contractors are allowed to proceed with the construction of the tunnel, the adjoining property would be secure against further settling or injury. The injunction asked for, therefore, would seem to be without any advantage to the plaintiff, but would subject him and the other property owners to the danger of having the adjacent rock settle into this excavation and so injure rather than protect his property.

The learned counsel for the plaintiff insists that the operation of the road in this tunnel will be a serious injury to his property, and for that reason the further construction of the tunnel, as at present located, should be enjoined. But we think the question of the operation of the road should be left until it can be determined, by its actual operation, whether or not such operation will entail upon the adjoining property any injury or disadvantage. The importance of this public improvement, the fact that it has involved the expenditure of such a large amount of public money, and the necessity for additional means of transportation of passengers in New York, are facts which should be considered in determining whether the Court should interfere by an injunction which would prohibit the completion of the public improvement, or adopt other methods to protect or compensate the abutting property owners. The question is whether there should be a preliminary injunction pending the trial of the action; and we think in view of the situation, the enormous public interests involved, and in view of the facts that such an injunction, while affecting most seriously the defendants, would be of no advantage to the plaintiff or the abutting owners, that the Court, in the exercise of the judicial discretion which it is bound to exercise in considering an application of this kind, was quite justified in refusing to grant the preliminary injunction asked for, leaving the question of the relief to which the plaintiff would be entitled to be determined upon the trial. Without attempting at all to indicate an opinion as to what the Court should do when the question as to the final judgment is presented, we affirm the order appealed from as a proper exercise of discretion in refusing to grant an injunction before judgment.

It follows that the order appealed from should be affirmed, with \$10 costs and disbursements.

The following report by the Chief Engineer on the condition of the streets and progress of the work was read:

NEW YORK, May 28, 1903.

Hon. A. E. ORR, President, Rapid Transit Board; Hon. SETH LOW, Mayor of The City of New York:

DEAR SIRS—As reported at the last meeting of the Board the strike of laborers on the Subway, which began on March 1, had very seriously interfered with the progress of the work, and especially that part of it which affects the general public in the way of closing openings. The strike is now nearly at an end on the whole of the work, but especially so on the portion south of Eightieth street. It is expected that the work will now continue without further interruption.

Since the last report the Mall in City Hall Park has been restored, the stairway openings for the City Hall station having been planked over level with the sidewalk. The sidewalk on the east side of City Hall Park leading south from the Mall is now ready for concreting, and the trench on the east side of Park row in front of the newspaper offices has been almost entirely filled and repaved.

On Elm street the work is in progress and traffic is being maintained as well as the condition of the work will permit. The intricate work of reconstructing the pipe system at Canal street is progressing to a point that will soon permit this street to be backfilled.

North of Howard street the only construction is at Spring street in connection with the pipes. As previously reported to the Board, the Highway Department has been given possession of Elm street, from Howard to Prince.

I beg leave to call the attention of the City authorities to the cross streets at Pearl and Leonard streets. The first is impassable, the second shortly will be so owing to the change in street grades. This is not due to Rapid Transit work, but due to the fact that the grades in Elm street were changed when the new street was laid out. Unless this has already been done, an effort should be made by the City authorities to regrade the side streets to the new grades.

At Astor place there are certain obstructions at the north end of Lafayette place which are being rapidly removed through the construction of the station at Astor place.

On Fourth avenue the Department of Public Works has accepted the pavement from Tenth to Thirteenth, and Nineteenth to Twenty-second, and Twenty-fourth to Thirty-second. The only construction work left on that thoroughfare is at Fourteenth, Eighteenth and Twenty-third streets. Backfilling at all these points is in progress and street traffic is being maintained.

The piles of pipe on Fourth avenue, east of Union square, have been reduced more than one-half since the last report, as this pipe is being used in the relaying of the mains on Fourth avenue. The connection with Thirty-third street and Fourth avenue has been restored and repaved.

On Forty-second street the sidewalk has been restored for one-half block between Fifth and Madison avenues. On the other half backfilling is in progress, and the balance of it will be restored shortly. We are still having considerable trouble from sweepings from the shops along Forty-second street.

In Long Acre square the bulk of the construction material has been removed. What remains has been repiled. At Forty-sixth street an excavation has been open for some months owing to a change in gas main which could not be done until May. That work is now done, and the street is being closed.

From Sixtieth to Seventy-first street both driveways have been reasphalted except at Sixty-fourth and Sixty-sixth streets. At the former the foundations of the elevated railroad still delay matters, and at the latter a change in the large gas main. Work on the change of this gas main is now in progress and will be completed next week.

Between Seventy-third and Seventy-fourth streets backfilling has been completed. This is one of the points which has caused annoyance. From Seventy-ninth to Eightieth street the street is ready for repaving. The strike unfortunately interfered with the asphalt pavement, which has not yet been adjusted. This is also true of repaving much of the work between Eighty-ninth and Ninety-eighth streets. As soon as the paving men return to work this paving will be done. In the meantime there is much annoyance to the property owners from dust, which is unavoidable, but which is being reduced as much as possible by sprinkling. There is also some construction material along this part of the work which is now unnecessary, but which we have had difficulty in moving on account of the scarcity of laborers.

On Lenox avenue and in The Bronx the work is still very seriously affected by the strike. These sections are, therefore, going exceedingly slow. The contractors are doing their best to get their men to work. In The Bronx the route traverses an Italian neighborhood, where most of the laborers come from; the difficulty in getting men to work is very great.

Section 11, on Broadway, from One Hundred and Fourth to One Hundred and Tenth street, the work, I regret to report, is not in as good a condition as I should like to see it. The contractor, however, has been and still is short of laborers.

On Broadway, north of One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, the contractor has succeeded in getting men at work, and hopes to be able to have the west half of the roadway completely restored within a few weeks.

The Secretary was directed to forward to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment information concerning that portion of the Chief Engineer's report in which he speaks of difference in old and proposed new grades of streets at intersection of Pearl, Leonard and Elm streets.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable. Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate, that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done.
