BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

EXTRACT FROM
MINUTES, BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT, CITY OF NEW YORK,
NOVEMBER 6, 1908.

The following matters, not on the calendar for this day, were considered by unanimous consent:

New York and Queens County Railway Company.

In the matter of the petition of the New York and Queens County Railway Company for a franchise to construct, maintain and operate two extensions or branches to its existing street surface railway, one from the former Village of Flushing to the Village of Whitestone, and one from Ingleside to Bayside, Borough of Queens.

At the meeting of October 16, 1908, by resolution duly adopted, November 27, 1908, was fixed as the date for the final public hearing, and the form of contract was entered on the minutes of this Board, and ordered advertised in two daily newspapers and in the City Record previous to such date.

The Comptroller offered the following:

Resolved, That the resolutions adopted by this Board October 16, 1908, fixing November 27, 1908, as the date for final public hearing on the application of the New York and Queens County Railway Company for a franchise to construct, maintain and operate two extensions in the Borough of Queens, be amended by striking therefrom the date "November 27, 1908," in each and every instance where said date appears in said resolutions, and inserting in lieu thereof in each and every instance the date "December 11, 1908."

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—16.

Third Avenue Railroad Company.

In the matter of the petition of the Third Avenue Railroad Company for a franchise to construct, maintain and operate a branch or extension to its existing line, upon and along Fort George and St. Nicholas avenues to West One Hundred and Ninetieth street, Borough of Manhattan.

At the meeting of June 26, 1908, a report was received from the Engineer in charge of the Division of Franchises to the Chief Engineer, together with a form of contract proposing terms and conditions to govern the grant, and at the conclusion of the public hearing, which was held on said day, the matter was referred to a Select Committee, consisting of the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx.

The Comptroller, as Chairman of the Select Committee, stated he had been visited by a representative of an institution holding property fronting on one of the streets proposed to be used by the railroad company, who strongly objected to such use, and he moved that the application be referred back to the Chief Engineer for further consultation with the applicant to obtain an acceptable line and agree upon terms and conditions to govern the grant.

Which motion was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—16.

Union Railway Company of New York City.

In the matter of the application of the Union Railway Company of New York City for franchises to construct, maintain and operate street surface railways as extensions to its existing system, as follows:

(a) From the intersection of its existing system at Third and Pelham avenues, upon and along Pelham avenue to the Southern boulevard, Borough of The Bronx.

(b) From the intersection of Sedgwick avenue and Fordham road, Borough of The Bronx, to and across the University Heights Bridge and its approaches, to Broadway, Borough of Manhattan.

At the meeting of October 30, 1908, a public hearing was had upon the aforesaid petition, and a report was received from the Engineer in charge of the Division of Franchises to the Chief Engineer, together with separate contracts proposing terms and conditions to govern the franchises for both extensions, when the matter was referred to a Select Committee.

GENTLEMEN—Your committee, to which was referred, on October 30, 1908, the application of the Union Railway Company of New York City for franchises to construct, maintain and operate street surface railways as extensions to its existing system upon, one, Pelham avenue, from Third avenue to Bronx Park, in the Borough of The Bronx, and, second, from Sedgwick avenue and Fordham road, in the Borough of The Bronx, to and across the University Heights Bridge to Broadway, in the Borough of Manhattan, would report as follows:

That on Monday, November 2, 1908, the committee held a meeting, and after consideration of the report of the Division of Franchises, attached to which was a proposed form of contract, the terms of which had been accepted by the Receiver for the railway company, have decided that such terms and conditions are in the interests of the City and should be approved.

MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York, Held at the Commission's Offices, No. 299 Broadway, on Wednesday, September 23, 1908, at 10 a.m.

Present—President Frank L. Polk and Commissioners R. Ross Appleton and Arthur J. O'Keeffe.

The President, Mr. Frank L. Polk, presided.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the Civil Service Classification by including in the exempt class, under the heading "Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity," the following:

"Supervising Electrical Engineer."

Mr. I. M. de Varona, Chief Engineer of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, appeared in behalf of the proposed amendment. Mr. John M. Cudliffe, representing Local No. 319, of New York City, International Union of Steam Engineers, opposed the exemption of the position. There being no other appearances, the Chair declared the hearing closed.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service Classification by striking from the non-competitive class, also from Part I. of the labor class, the position of Stoker, and including in Part I. of the labor class the following:

"Licensed Fireman."

"Coal Passer."

Mr. John M. Cudliffe, representing Local No. 319, of New York City, International Union of Steam Engineers, appeared in favor of the proposed amendment. There was no opposition and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

After the Commission had gone into regular session, the minutes of the meeting held September 16 were approved.

On motion, the matter of exempting the position of Supervising Electrical Engineer in the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity was laid over.

Thomas F. J. Coughlan, candidate for Patrolman, having failed to appear before the Commission, as directed, on motion, it was

Resolved, That the name of Thomas F. J. Coughlan be removed from the eligible list of Patrolman, pursuant to the provisions of paragraph 14 of Rule VII.

The Secretary was directed to communicate with Andrew J. Tally, of No. 231 East Thirty-fourth street, Manhattan, and Thomas J. Gibney, of No. 63 East Ninety-third street, Manhattan, candidates for Patrolman, and notify them that unless satisfactory proof that they had attained the minimum age of 21 were furnished by the time of the next meeting of the Commission, their names would be removed from the eligible list.

The Secretary stated that William A. McClaury, of No. 501 Ninth avenue, Manhattan, candidate for Patrolman, had procured a certificate from Public School 26, to the effect that he was born on March 5, 1886. The matter was referred to the Examining Department for a report.

BELLEVUE AND ALLIED HOSPITALS.

A special meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held on Monday, September 21, 1908, at 12:30 o'clock.

Present—Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair; Messrs. Barry, Sachs, Stern, O'Keefe, Robbins and Paulding, Trustees, and Mr. Heberd, the Commissioner of Public Charities.

The minutes of the meeting of September 17 were read and approved.

Reports of Committees.

Dr. Brannan called attention to an improved type of cribs, and, on motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, To approve of the purchase of 48 cribs for Pavilions A and B of the new Bellevue Hospital.

Dr. Brannan recommended changes in the bathtubs on the fifth floor of Pavilions A and B of the new Bellevue Hospital, and, on motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, To procure four raised tubs of a newer type.

Communications.

A communication dated September 1 was received from Messrs. McKim, Mead & White regarding the delay in the work of painting Pavilions A and B.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, To send a communication to Messrs. Hahn & O'Reilly, contractors, informing them that the Board of Trustees will exact of them in accordance with section 5 of their contract the sum of ten dollars for each and every day required by them to finish the work after October 8, the date set for the completion of their contract.

A communication dated September 17 was received from Messrs. Parish & Schroeder, with the report of Inspector William E. Barton on the training school building for the week ending September 12, 1908. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication and report was placed on file.

The bills of Messrs. Siebrecht & Son (\$939.24 for Fordham Hospital and \$658.07 for Harlem Hospital) were brought to the attention of the Board of Trustees, and, on motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, To send a communication to the contractors informing them that the dead trees must be removed from the grounds of both Fordham and Harlem Hospitals and others substituted for them before the Board of Trustees will approve of the payment of the bills.

A communication dated September 15 was received from the Art Commission approving of the designs and location of a fence to surround the property of the new Bellevue Hospital. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was placed on file.

Unfinished Business.

Resolved, To authorize the President to make application under the rules of the Civil Service Commission to appoint temporarily an expert in hospital construction at a compensation not to exceed \$750, such temporary expert to be appointed as soon as possible and to serve for such time as the law may permit, pending the creation of a permanent grade, the officer holding the position to be known as "Expert in Hospital Construction."

The matter of placing the alcoholic ward under the care of the Resident Alienist was referred to the President for further investigation and report.

Second—The said right to construct, maintain and operate a double-track street surface railroad as herein described, shall be held and enjoyed by the Company, its successors or assigns, for the term of twenty-five (25) years from the date when this contract is signed by the Mayor, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for the further period of twenty-five (25) years, upon a fair revaluation of such right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two years and not later than one year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the sum required to be paid during the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one year before expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding twenty-five (25) years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound upon request of the other, to enter into a written agreement with each other fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate and at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three months after they are chosen. During the first five years after the commencement of operation of the extension herein provided for, annually on November 1, three (3) per cent. of its gross receipts for and during the year ending September 30 next preceding, and after the expiration of such five years make a like annual payment into the treasury of the City of five (5) per cent. of its gross receipts. The Company shall pay such percentages only upon such portion of its gross receipts as shall bear the same proportion to its whole gross receipts as the length of such extension shall bear to the entire length of its line.

For the extension last described herein:

The sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) in cash within thirty (30) days after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

During the first five years after the commencement of operation of the extension herein provided for, annually on November 1, three (3) per cent. of its gross receipts for and during the year ending September 30 next preceding, and after the expiration of such five years make a like annual payment into the treasury of the City of five (5) per cent. of its gross receipts. The Company shall pay such percentages only upon such portion of its gross receipts as shall bear the same proportion to its whole gross receipts as the length of such extension shall bear to the entire length of its line.

Fourth—Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the tracks and equipment of the Company constructed pursuant to this contract within the streets and highways of the City shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any Company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this grant as above the City (by the Board) shall so order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice in writing from the Board, remove any and all of its tracks and other equipment constructed pursuant to this contract within the streets and highways of the City shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any Company or individual.

Fifth—The annual charges or payment shall continue throughout the whole term of the contract herein granted, whether original or renewal, notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other railroad company providing for payments for railroad rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges herein granted, whether original or renewed, or of any part thereof, or of any of the routes mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effective for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract; and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute, or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform such and all of the conditions of this contract.

Sixth—The rights and privileges herein granted shall not be alienated, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title thereto, or right, interest or property therein pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company, its successors or assigns, or by operation

of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations, or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, or its successors in authority, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Seventh.—The railway to be constructed under this contract may be operated by overhead electric power substantially similar to the overhead electric traction now in use by street surface railways in the Borough of Queens, or by any other motive power, except locomotive steam power or horse power, which may be approved by the Board, and consented to by owners of property, in accordance with the provisions of law, and by the Public Service Commission of the First District of the State of New York.

Eighth.—The Company shall begin construction of the extensions herein authorized within the time prescribed by the Railroad Law of the State of New York, and such extensions shall be completed and shall be in operation on or before December 31, 1909; otherwise this grant shall cease and determine.

Ninth.—The said railway shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided in the Charter of the City; and the Company agrees to make application to the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity for permission to string and maintain its electrical conductors in the streets covered by this grant.

Tenth.—The said railway shall be constructed and operated in the latest improved manner of street railway construction and operation, and the railway and property of the Company shall be maintained in good condition throughout the term of this contract.

Eleventh.—Cars on the said railway shall run at intervals of not more than thirty minutes both day and night, and as much oftener as reasonable convenience of the public may require, or as may be directed by the Board.

Provided, however, that the Company during the first five years of its franchise shall not be required to operate its cars between the hours of 12 o'clock midnight and 5 o'clock a. m., each day, unless the Board shall determine after a hearing had thereon that public convenience requires the operation of cars during said hours.

Twelfth.—The Company shall attach to each car run over the said railway proper fenders and wheel guards in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the terms of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities.

Thirteenth.—All cars which are operated on said railway shall be heated during the cold weather in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities.

Fourteenth.—The Company, so long as it shall continue to use any of the tracks upon the streets and avenues in which the railway shall be constructed under this contract, shall cause to be watered the entire roadway of such streets and avenues at least three times in every twenty-four hours, when the temperature is above thirty-five degrees Fahrenheit, and shall provide for such purpose at least one tank-car, to be propelled by electric power, the capacity of which shall be sufficient to water such streets and avenues in a satisfactory manner.

Fifteenth.—All cars operated on said railway shall be well lighted by electricity, or by some lighting system equally efficient, or as may be required by the Board.

Sixteenth.—The Company, so long as it shall continue to use any of its tracks in any street or highway covered by this grant, shall have and keep in permanent repair that portion of such street or highway between its tracks and the rails of its tracks and two feet in width outside of its tracks, under the supervision of the proper local authorities, and whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe. In case of neglect by the Company to make payments or repairs after the expiration of thirty days' notice to do so, the local authorities may make the same at the expense of such corporation, and such authorities may make such reasonable regulations and ordinances as to the rate of speed, mode of use of tracks and removal of ice and snow as the interest or convenience of the public may require.

Seventeenth.—Any alteration which may be required to the sewerage or drainage system, or to any subsurface structures, pipes, conduits, etc., laid in the streets, on account of the construction or operation of the railway, shall be made at the sole cost of the Company, and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Eighteenth.—Should the grades or lines of the streets in which franchises herein granted be changed at any time during the term of this contract, the Company shall, at its own expense, change its tracks to conform with such new grades and lines, and during the construction of any public improvement upon said street, the Company shall take care of and protect the tracks at its own expense, all to be done subject to the direction of the President of the Borough of Queens.

Nineteenth.—The Company shall, at all times, keep accurate books of account of the gross earnings from the privileges granted under this contract. The Company shall, on or before November 1 of each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of New York of the business done by the Company for the year ending September 30 next preceding, as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain a statement of the gross receipts from operation of the railway, together with such other information and in such detail as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report, and may examine its officers under oath.

Twentieth.—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the railroad authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever in either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to pay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or default of the Company, giving the Company notice and the right to intervene in any action or proceeding wherein such damage may be sought.

Twenty-first.—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall file with the Comptroller of the City of New York the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), either in money or in securities to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all of the terms and conditions of this contract, the payment of the annual percentages for the privilege hereby granted, the rendering of efficient public service at reasonable rates, the maintenance of the property in good condition throughout the full term of the grant,

the repairs of the street pavement, the removal of snow and ice and the quality of construction of the railroad; and in case of default the performance by the Company of such terms and conditions, and such duties and obligations as may hereafter be imposed by the local authorities under this grant, or under the powers delegated by the Railroad Law, the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings; or after default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund after ten days' notice in writing to the Company; or in case of failure to keep the said terms and conditions of this contract relating to the headway, heating and lighting of cars, fenders, or wheel-guards and watering of street pavements, or in case of failure to render efficient public service at reasonable rates, or to maintain the property in good condition, the Company shall pay a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each day of violation, and the further sum of ten dollars (\$10) per day for each car that shall not be properly heated, lighted or supplied with fenders or wheel-guards, in case of the violation of the provisions relating to those matters. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund, the Company shall, within thirty (30) days after written notice from the Comptroller, so to do, pay to the Comptroller of the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000).

Twenty-second.—No action or proceeding or right under the provision of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City. The grant of this privilege is subject to whatever right, title or interest the owners of abutting property or others may have in and to the streets, avenues and highways in which the Company is authorized to operate.

Twenty-third.—The words "notice" or "direction" wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided, shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

The Company agrees that notice printed in the City Record shall constitute sufficient notice within the meaning of this contract.

Twenty-fourth.—If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned or intended to be mentioned, shall be transferred by law to any other Board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such case such other Board, authority, officer or officers shall have all the powers, right and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officer or officers.

Twenty-fifth.—This contract is also upon the further and express conditions that the provisions of Article IV, of the Railroad Law applicable thereto, and all laws or ordinances now in force, or which may be adopted affecting the streets and highways and the surface railroads operating in the City, not inconsistent with the terms and conditions hereinbefore fixed, shall be strictly complied with by the Company.

Beginning at a point on the main line of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company at or near Lebanon street thence running southerly crossing DeVoe avenue and One Hundred and Seventy-ninth street at or near their intersection; thence crossing Bronx street at or near its intersection with Walker avenue; thence crossing Walker avenue, between Bronx street and Boston road; thence crossing West Farms road, between Boston road and Rodman place; thence to a connection with the Interborough Rapid Transit Railroad on Boston road, between Bryant and Tremont avenues.

Connection With the Projected Southern Boulevard and Westchester Avenue Subway Route.

Beginning at a point on the main line of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company, between Westchester avenue and One Hundred and Seventy-fourth street, and running southerly and crossing One Hundred and Seventy-second street and Edgewater road; thence to a connection with the proposed Broadway-Lexington avenue subway at or near the intersection of Westchester avenue and Home street, all as shown on a map entitled:

"Survey Map and Profile of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company, for New York County, New York, Section 1, Section 2 and Section 3."

—adopted by the Board of Directors of said company on the 17th day of June, 1908, and signed by Allen Wardell, president; Mace Moulton, chief engineer, and Ralph Polk Buell, secretary, under the seal of the corporation, which map and profile were filed in the office of the County Clerk of the County of New York on the said 17th day of June, 1908, or any lawful amendment thereof which may be consented to by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority.

4. Section 2, clause fifteenth, of the said ordinance is hereby amended by striking out therefrom the words, "Except the overhead trolley system."

5. Section 2, clause sixteenth, of the said ordinance shall be stricken out and the following substituted therefor:

Second.—The Westchester Company hereby agrees to assume all liability to any person or company by reason of the execution of this contract by the City, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever, either to persons or companies, on account of the same, and the Westchester Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City may be compelled to pay by reason of this contract.

Sec. 3. The Westchester Company covenants and agrees to abandon and relinquish to the City all of its rights and franchises to construct, maintain and operate a railroad in, upon or across the streets on the portions of the route described in the said ordinance approved by the Mayor August 2, 1904, as amended by the ordinance approved by the Mayor July 21, 1905, and which are not covered by the description of the new and amended route as herein described, and which are not shown on the map of the amended route dated June 17, 1908, entitled "Survey map and profile of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company for New York County, New York, Section 1, Section 2 and Section 3," which map was filed in the office of the County Clerk of New York County on June 17, 1908.

Sec. 4. The Westchester Company promises, covenants and agrees, on its part and behalf, to conform to and abide by all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

In witness whereof, the party of the first part, by its Mayor, thereunto duly authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City, has caused the corporate seal of said City to be hereunto affixed, and the party of the second part, by its officers, thereunto duly authorized, has caused its corporate name to be hereunto signed and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed the day and year first above written.
