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# DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH.

REPORT FOR WEEK ENDING JULY 18, 1914.

DONATES ICE TO SAVE THE BABIES.

Each year, with the coming of hot weather, there is an appalling increase in the number of infant lives sacrificed; this is particularly the case when there is a continued hot wave, such as we are now experiencing. That all corporations are not soulless is shown by the fact that the Knickerbocker Ice Company has generously sent to the be continued. Department of Health over 5,000 booklets, each good for a month's supply of ice, for free distribution among the deserving poor.

This is the sixth year in which this very practical aid has been donated to the work of saving infant lives in this city. The number of books of free ice coupons

During the year 1913 the distribution was made through the Babies' Welfare Association, so that all agencies affiliated with that association benefited by the donation of free ice to the needy families under their supervision.

MICROSCOPICAL DIAGNOSIS OF CANCER.

Physicians desiring to have specimens of tissue examined by the State Institute for the Study of Malignant Disease, should observe the following directions for preserving the specimen:

Directions for Preserving Specimen.

Specimen should be put at once into 10 per cent Formalin in a wide-mouthed bottle. A piece the size of a chestnut is sufficient. This should be cut from the suspicious-looking area, viz.: where there seems to be a solid mass of tissue whitish or grayish in color. Avoid the broken down areas. A section from the edge of the tumor is the best. In flat tumors, as those from the skin, stomach, intestine, etc., the specimen should be cut at right angles to the surface, that the relation of the normal tissue may be preserved. Where metastases are present a portion of these should be included, marked properly or put in a separate bottle. When two pieces from different parts of a growth are placed in one bottle cut them of different shape and properly describe them, stating from where taken.

Specimens should be securely packed to prevent breakage. The following information should be supplied:

Name..... Age..... Sex..... Single...... Physician's name and address..... Clinical diagnosis..... Origin of tumor..... Description of tumor as to duration, size, shape, rapidity of growth, etc..... ......

WHAT IT COSTS TO PRODUCE SMALLPOX VACCINE. The smallpox vaccine sold by the Department of Health is prepared at the Department of Health Laboratory at Otisville, N. Y. After collection, the original product is sent to the Vaccine Laboratory, foot of E. 16th street, where it is prepared for use. One gram of the vaccine pulp is ground, diluted with 4cc. of glycerine and tested. The virus is then drawn into capillary tubes, or vials of different sizes, dated, numbered and kept on ice until used. It is estimated that one cc. of the finished product costs 80 cents and that one cc. of bulk vaccine will fill 80 capillary tubes, each containing sufficient virus for one vaccination.

The outfit for one vaccination, including a capillary tube filled with virus, a sterilized needle encased in a paper cylinder, rubber bulb, wooden cylinder box, cardboard carton costs to produce 6 cents, an outfit for five vaccinations with the vaccine in individual capillary tubes costs 16 cents, and one for ten vaccinations 27 cents. An inspector's outfit for ten vaccinations, including one vial of virus, needles,

70,729 capillary tubes for single vaccinations were distributed in 1913. Cash receipts, \$7,269.68, the money being turned into the city treasury.

DAILY LIST OF INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

Beginning July 13th, 1914, the daily printed list of Contagious Diseases which the Department furnishes to schools, libraries, Branch Offices, medical inspectors, nurses and institutions, and which formerly was printed in four sections, was radically revised and combined into a single list.

This change is a distinct economy in several ways; it reduces the number of files kept in the various offices, effects a substantial saving in postage and gives at a glance a comparative picture of the incidence of Contagious Diseases in the various boroughs.

NURSES' SERVICES BY THE HOUR.

The Central Registry, maintained by the New York County Registered Nurses' Association announces the establishment of an "Hourly Nursing Service" for those who require the skilled attention of a trained nurse to administer certain necessary parts of the treatment, but who do not need to go to a hospital or to have the constant care of a trained attendant. Inasmuch as the charge is only seventy-five cents per hour, it is certain that this service will meet with a hearty welcome both from physicians and patients. We recommend the new policy to nurses generally.

NOTICE TO PATENT MEDICINE FAKIRS.

The sale of "fake" patent medicines is forbidden in this City under a section of the Sanitary Code, which declares it to be a misdemeanor to make any false or deceptive representation as to the quality, purpose or effect of any drug, medicine, decoction, drink or other article intended to be taken as medicine. Vigorous efforts to enforce this section of the Code have not heretofore been made by the Department of Health, but it is felt that the interests of the public demand that attention be given to this matter, and it is believed that public opinion is now sufficiently enlight-ened to insure the success of a determined attack upon those who, by fraudulent and misleading statements, not only cheat the unwary, but injure the health of so many persons as to impair the vitality of the community as a whole.

If it should be found that the Code, as it now stands, or the ordinance against fraudulent advertising recently enacted by the Board of Aldermen, is not sufficiently clear and definite to enable the Department, with the aid of the Courts, to put a stop to the extravagant claims of patent medicine fakirs, the Department will consider the advisability of adopting an amendment similar to the recently enacted law of the Philippine Islands, where the sale of patent medicines and secret formulæ is absolutely forbidden, upon grounds of public health. Perhaps there is no better avenue of approach to the cure of this evil than the avenue of publicity. If the manufacturer of a patent medicine is compelled to name the ingredients of his mixture, and if such ingredients prove to be either inert substances, as they often are, or harmful drugs or stimulants, as they are known often to be, it will be difficult to claim for preparations concocted of such ingredients, the miraculous powers that continue to be ascribed by daring and unscrupulous advertisers to many of the secret formulæ now on the market.

In dealing with the patent medicine evil, the Department asks for and expects to receive the cordial support of conscientious druggists.

FIELD WORK BY ATTENDING PHYSICIANS.

One of the difficult problems confronting the Bureau of Infectious Diseases is

efficient organization of the field work.

The opinion of the leading authorities on health and on social welfare is so markedly in favor of intensive work in small districts and so opposed to division and consequent reduplication of effort, that any attempt to carry on the field work on the old basis, namely, by a separate force for the Division of Contagious Diseases and for the Division of Communicable Diseases, seems unwise.

Each nurse, therefore, has been required to familiarize herself with all the activities and routine procedures of the entire Bureau, and now receives daily

assignments relative to all infectious diseases in her sub-district.

Early in the year it became apparent that visits to tuberculosis patients were falling in arrears, under press of the more urgent cases of contagious diseases. While this was doubtless due somewhat to the unfamiliarity, on the part of the nurse, with some part of her work, it is chiefly caused by lack of sufficient nursing force to accomplish the work assigned it, since the situation has not improved with increasing experience and better organization. It is also evident that the diminution of contagious diseases during the summer months will avail little, for vacations must be taken and the usual fall increase in typhoid fever cases adds to the number of inspections necessary. The nursing staff must be increased, if all this work is to

In order to use as effectively as possible the present available force, instructions have been issued to all Physicians-in-Charge of Tuberculosis Clinics, to use their medical staff for field work, whenever the ordinary work of the clinic happens

to be light.

PROGRESS AGAINST VENEREAL DISEASES.

The Department work against venereal diseases is increasing by leaps and bounds. Since the venereal diagnostic clinics were established on May first, 1912, the average daily attendance has increased from two or three patients a day to an average of more than 38. At the present time there are being made about 120 Wassermann tests a day and 30 complement fixation tests for gonococcus infection. Seventy-five per cent. of the specimens examined are sent in by private physicians and institutions. During the month of May, 1914, 127 patients were seen by the Medical Adviser

and of these 15 had been previously treated by quack physicians. This is a very important phase of the anti-venereal work. It is being reinforced by advertising in one of the afternoon papers and by placards placed in toilets of saloons and various other places in the City. The advertisements and placards call attention to the fact that confidential advice regarding gonorrhea, syphilis and sex diseases can be obtained free at Room 10, Department of Health, No. 149 Centre Street, certain days of the week from two to four p. m.

A very difficult problem in connection with the work of the Medical Adviser is the reference of patients seeking treatment and having no family physician. Patients obviously entitled to clinic treatment are referred to one of the various genitourinary clinics maintaining the standard set by the Associated Out-Door Clinics. Patients able to pay a private physician are given a list of the attending physicians of the various genito-urinary and dermatological clinics maintaining the required standard as already mentioned.

Popular education, of course, is indispensable. Cards of instruction to those having gonorrhea or syphilis have been printed and there is now in press a circular on the dangers of these diseases and on the methods of the advertising quack.
HOW TO WRITE A PROPER DEATH CERTIFICATE.

(Article No. 5.) Many of the practicing physicians of this city are not fully advised as to their

legal responsibility in furnishing or refusing certificates where death has occurred in their practice. The deaths occurring in this city may be divided into two classes: those which come under the jurisdiction of the Coroners of the City, who furnish the certificates of death to the Department of Health, and those in which death results from natural causes, the physician in attendance being responsible under the law to this Department for the filing of the death certificate.

Taking up the so-called "Coroners' cases," the following State laws which apply are quoted:

"When in the City of New York any person shall die from criminal violence, or by a casualty, or suddenly when in apparent health, or when unattended by a physician, or in prison, or in any suspicious or unusual manner, the coroner shall subpoena one of the coroner's physicians, who shall view the body of such deceased person, externally, or make an autopsy thereon as may be required."

"It shall be the duty of any citizen who shall become aware of the death of a person who shall have died in the manner stated in the previous section, to report the death forthwith to one of the coroners or to the clerk in attendance at the coroner's office, or to any police officer, and such officer shall without delay notify the coroner or clerk in attendance at the coroner's office, of such death;

The physician is sometimes in doubt as to whether certain cases that come to his etc., costs to produce 22 cents. A similar outfit for fifty vaccinations costs 90 cents. attention should be reported to the Coroner, or whether in such cases he shall write a certificate of death for filing at the Department of Health. We may consider these points in the order following the section quoted above:

Deaths from Criminal Violence.

The duty of the physician is very plain in these cases; in fact, if possible, he must notify the Coroner's Office before the death of the patient in order that an antemortem statement may be obtained.

Deaths Resulting from Casualty.

Deaths resulting from casualties need not be referred to the Coroner's Office in certain cases: for instance, if a death results from septicaemia following the scratch of a pin, or some such minor abrasion; the Department of Health will accept the certificate of death issued by the physician. Although technically such cases may be regarded as under the Coroner's jurisdiction, practically it is inadvisable to construe the law so strictly as to include cases where the originating cause is of such innocent origin. Again, if an extremely old person fractures the neck of the femur while turning in bed, the case is not to be referred to the Coroner, but the certificate of death presented for filing at the Department of Health should contain full information concerning the case. On the other hand, deaths resulting from major accidents, should always be reported to the Coroner's Office. In case of doubt, it is always advisable to telephone to the office of the Registrar of Records at the Department of Health and be guided by its advice.

Sudden Deaths While in Apparent Health.

It is evident from the language stated that all these cases come under the jurisdiction of the Coroner and should at once be reported at the Coroner's Office.

Deaths Occurring When Unattended by a Physician.

Occasion arises in medical practice in this city where the physician, by reason of the hopelessness of the case, and his disinclination to exact fees from extremely poor patients, makes an arrangement with the relatives or friends to keep in touch with the case, to be apprised of the condition of the patient, and to suggest and prescribe remedies without actually visiting and seeing the patient. Certificates of death written by the physician in these cases will be accepted by the Department of Health, provided the disease is one of long standing, and the physician supplies in addition to the certificate of death, a note stating that the case was a hopeless one and that no accident occurred since the last time he saw the patient alive.

Deaths in Prison.

Deaths in prison, as a matter of routine procedure, are always referred to the Coroner's Office for investigation.

Deaths in Any Suspicious or Unusual Manner.

If there exist in the mind of the physician a suspicion that there has been foul play, or that the death of the patient has been hastened by the negligence or the actions of any individual, immediate notice should be sent to the Coroner. Deaths in an unusual manner may or may not be Coroners' cases, and it is suggested that in these cases the physician telephone to the office of the Registrar of Records in the Department of Health and act on the advice there given.

The question is often asked as to what period of medical attendance is required before death, in order that the physician may file a certificate of death. Under the law no specified time is required; each individual case must be governed by the circumstances or condition which may affect the acceptance or refusal of a certificate from the physician. The Department of Health holds that if a physician has attended a person within an hour of death, even though he has never attended the person before, a certificate of death will be accepted if the physician is able to make a positive diagnosis.

York City: Gentlemen—On August 13, 1907, we entered Gentlemen—On August 13, 1907, we entered into a contract under a franchise granted by your Honorable Board for laying certain pipes and supplying refrigeration to the Wallabout Market District. This franchise was for a period of 15 years with certain privileges of renewal for ten years on the following basis:

\$500 cash payment. An annual payment for the first five years 5% of gross earnings with a minimum of \$750.

An annual payment for the second five years, 6% of gross earnings with a minimum of \$1,000.

An annual payment for the third five years, 7% of gross earnings with a minimum of \$1,300. 25 cts. per running foot of conduit laid. \$2 for each manhole.

At the time this contract was made our Company had no way of ascertaining as to whether this contract would be favorable one or not other than the fact that it was the best that could be obtained from your Honorable Board on the recommendations of the Bureau of Fran-

The Bureau of Franchises undoubtedly at that time were not fully conversant with the value to the grantee of such a franchise and especially

as applied to a scattered district.

Our Company installed machinery and equipment at the expense of about \$100,000 and have given to the district in the territory covered by our franchise good service to all that have asked for it.

This operation has resulted in a loss to the

Company in direct operation during the six years of over \$110,000, as shown by an audit made by Certified Public Accountants employed at the direction of a committee, independent of the officers, which was appointed by the stockholders to investigate the causes of the Com-pany's depressed financial condition. There is over and above this amount a considerable additional loss on depreciation of machinery and

equipment.
Early this spring the stockholders and directors of the Company found themselves in

financial difficulties, their quick liabilities being

financial difficulties, their quick liabilities being several times more than their quick assets, and the fixed assets being fully covered by mortgage and their first mortgage bonds being sold as low as 50 cts, on the dollar.

The Company at that time was indebted to the City in Taxes on its real estate, and on this franchise to the extent of about \$13,000. While it was argued by a great many that the Company should be liquidated, it was finally decided by men who were active in the welfare of Brooklyn and Wallabout Market to get together and pay off the indebtedness of the Company and endeavor to put the business on a paying business; such a Committee has been actively at work for the last three months, and on June 11, 1914, the committee turned over to the Honorable W. H. Prendergast, Controller, the last payment of the taxes on this franchise amounting to about \$3,600, covering 25 cts. per running foot for four years, from 1910 to 1914.

In consideration of the foregoing and in view

In consideration of the foregoing and in view of the terms under which other franchises are now being granted in more densely built up sections of New York City, we hereby request that your Honorable Board grant us a franchise for a term of fifteen (15) years, with the privilege of renewal on re-valuation of ten years,

lege of renewal on re-valuation of ten years, based on the following principal points:

Annual payment 1st 5 years: 2% of gross earnings with a minimum of \$500.

Annual payment 2nd 5 years: 3% of gross earnings with a minimum of \$600.

Annual payment 3rd 5 years: 3% of gross earnings with a minimum of \$700.

Payment for conduit per linear foot: 10c.

Payment for each manhole: \$2.

Maximum rates to be charged for refrigera-

Maximum rates to be charged for refrigeration to be furnished under properly insulated conditions: 32 degrees Fahrenheit, freezing: 500 cu. ft. or less, 4c. per month. 500 to 1,500 cu. ft. 2c. per month. 1,500 to 2,500 cu. ft., 1½c. per month. 2,500 cu. ft. and over, 1c. per month.

The basis of percentage on gross earnings noted above is in line with the franchises that are at present being given by the City in the densely populated section of lower Manhattan,

and the minimum payments specified are greater than are provided for in those franchises. The rate of 10c. per linear foot is asked for as equitable on account of the long distances of pipe which are required in this district as compared with the densely built up section of lower

Manhattan; for instance, on one section of our line 1,300 feet long, there are only four customers, and on another section 700 feet long, there is only one customer. Many of these boxes are very small and the franchise tax per running foot of piping is entirely out of proportion to the returns.

It will be necessary in the near future to re-

It will be necessary in the near future to replace the present pipe line system with a new brine pipe line of larger diameter, to overcome the friction consequent upon the long distances the pipe is carried; and a large amount will have to be expended for new machinery.

It is generally admitted that the pipe line refrigeration which we have supplied to Wallabout Market is a public necessity, and it has been the most important single factor in the success of this Market, and if the service can be continued, it will still further aid in the growth of a very important public institution.

As before stated the men connected with this reorganization are paying to the City the full amount agreed upon, and are making an endeavor to keep the Company a going concern in the belief that your Honorable Board will give relief from the burden of the onerous terms of the franchise which has resulted in such

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies materials work or services for which the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the him therein, and, if no other person be so inter-ested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the con-tract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or con-sideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or Na tional banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or cor-porate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the pro-posals or instructions to bidders and shall not

be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate,
For particulars as to the quantity and quality

of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifica-tions, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department. No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who

is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids

or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures. Bidders are requested to make their bids or

estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Cor-poration Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there
