Message from His Honor the Mayor in Relation to an Application for Special Revenue Bonds to Provide Additional Cots and Blankets and an Added Force for the Municipal Lodging House.

No. 1217.

City of New York, Office of the Mayor, January 12, 1915.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen-An application will be made by the Department of Charities for a Special Revenue Bond to provide additional cots and blankets for those who may apply to the City for sleeping accommodations at the Municipal Lodging House. I have gone over this matter with the Commissioner of Charities, and hope that

you will be able to consider his request at the earliest possible moment. For the last few years the Department has been furnishing sleeping accommodations each night during the summer for 300 to 400 people, and during the winter for 800 to 1,500. The only paid staff that the City has to take charge of this situation is one Superintendent at \$2,400, one Inspector at \$750 per annum, and a few helpers recruited from the ranks of the lodgers, who are paid a nominal sum and given food and lodging. Last winter the greatest number of cots available was about 900. Some nights, for a short period of time, as many as 2,000 applications were made for night

lodging, and many were required to sleep on the floor in the boats, or in the waiting rooms under the jurisdiction of the Department of Charities. In the present financial depression an unusual number of applications are being constantly made for night lodging, such applications on one night running up to almost 2,700. The purpose of this Special Revenue Bond issue is also to provide for a larger paid staff to take care of this greatly increased number of applicants at the Municipal Lodging House. A Superintendent and Inspector are entirely too small a force to operate with, and the old practice of having the applicants for aid do the

cleaning and take care of the cots and bedding is but, at best, a make-shift.

I hope that you will be able to take up this application forthwith.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the Commissioner of Parks, Manhattan and Richmond:

Commissioner of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond-Request for Authority to Modify the Contract for the General Construction of Additions "J" and "K," Metropolitan Museum of Art, Central Park.

City of New York, Department of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond,

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen, City of New York:

Gentlemen-Under the terms of the contract for the General Construction of Additions "J" and "K," Metropolitan Museum of Art, Central Park, it is impossible for me to allow extras to the Contractor for the work, since the usual five (5%) per cent. clause in the contract has been changed to read:

"Modification of contract. Charter, Sections 413, 426. This contract and the specifications herein contained, and the plans herein referred to, may be modified and changed as may be agreed to in writing between the parties thereto, in a manner not materially affecting the substance thereof, nor materially increasing nor diminishing the price to be paid in order to carry out and complete more fully and perfectly the work herein agreed to be done and performed."

This clause is interpreted by the Corporation Counsel to mean that practically no extras can be granted on this contract. However, the following conditions have arisen on the work, which will compel me to expend approximately \$8,000 over and

above the contract price:

The excavation for the new extensions has disclosed the fact that the old 4-foot brick sewer carrying off the waste water from the Central Park reservoir, and the 30-inch tile sewer, both of which run diagonally through the sub-basement of the new extensions, differ considerably both in plan and elevation from the lay-out shown on the plans of McKim, Mead & White, architects for the building. This is probably due to the fact that the old records referred to by them when the building plans were being formulated, were incorrect. At any rate, this Department has, through its Architect and Engineer, looked into the matter of overcoming the difficulties arising from these conditions, in the most practical and economical way, and has come to the following conclusions:

The 4-foot brick sewer, as found when uncovered, is cracked and settled, and in such poor condition structurally, that it would be very expensive to protect it and the building in a proper manner. This fact alone would justify its removal outside of the building. But in addition to this, the elevation of the sewer is much higher than shown on the plans, and to such a great extent that it practically cuts the sub-basement in half, there being insufficient headroom between the top of the sewer construction and the floor beams above to make it possible to use the sub-basement in its entirety. Furthermore, the lines of both sewers found in excavation vary from the lines shown on the plans to such an extent that it would be necessary to build additional concrete walls, and straddle the 4-foot sewer with steel beams to make it possible to support the walls and columns above. It would also necessitate the changing of the line of the 30-inch tile sewer where it runs under the foundation walls for a considerable distance.

The 4-foot sewer also passes under the heaviest corner pier of the building, and it would be dangerous to attempt to build same over the sewer.

It is, therefore, recommended that the present 4-foot sewer be discontinued and a new reinforced concrete sewer constructed west of the west wall of the new Additions. As a result of these conditions the following unforseen work must be done that is not covered in the contract:

Additional expenditure No. 1—For all labor and materials necessary to change the course of the 30-inch tile sewer where it runs through the westerly wall, together

with all the necessary excavation, backfill and new pipe.

This work becomes necessary for the reason that the architects' plans show the 30-inch tile sewer running through the concrete wall on the west side of "J" at an angle of 45 degrees, which would make it possible to arch over with I beams. The actual conditions, however, are that the 30-inch tile pipe runs under the wall for a distance of about 50-feet, thereby making it necessary to move this pipe to one side of the wall and running it through at an angle of 45 degrees, connecting it to the existing manhole at this point.

Additional expenditure No. 2-For the removal of the present 48-inch brick waste at the northwest corner of the building, and making a temporary connection to the

30-inch tile sewer.

This includes all the necessary work connected with the removal of the 48-inch brick waste, the existing condition of which is contrary to that shown on the architects' plans, and which comes in the way of the construction of the concrete foundation walls at that point. The connection to the 30-inch tile sewer referred to is the arrangement decided upon by all the authorities to run the water now in the 48-inch brick overflow into the 30-inch sewer, temporarily, to enable the Contractor to proceed with the excavation and complete the construction of all his concrete foundation walls; also to facilitate the work of erecting the new concrete sewer.

Additional expenditure No. 3—For removing the entire 48-inch brick overflow from line BB to the south wall of Addition "K," and including a credit for the concrete risers over the overflow that would have been necessary, if conditions were

found to be as shown on the Architects' drawings. This estimate includes the removal of the 48-inch overflow sewer the full length of Addition "K," and practically the full length of Addition "J," where it comes under the concrete wall forming the pipe tunnel. It also includes additional excavation that would have been unnecessary had the conditions been found as shown on the architects' drawings. The credit referred to is for the concrete risers forming the steps over the 48-inch overflow which would have been dispensed with had the architects' drawings agreed with the existing conditions.

Additional expenditure No. 4-For the construction of a concrete wall between

the water mains east of Addition K.

This is made necessary because the five Croton water mains running under and iust east of the buildings are about 2-feet further apart than shown on the architects' drawings. This would necessitate the lengthening of all the plate girders which form the roof and support over the mains, and would represent a considerably larger extra on the contract than the building of the above-mentioned wall, since this wall will permit the substitution of steel beams for plate girders, thereby reducing the cost of steel very considerably.

It is absolutely necessary to do all this work at once to enable the Contractor to proceed with his contract. The work is now at a standstill, and valuable time is being lost.

The desirability of removing the 48-inch overflow sewer and relocating it west of the building is concurred in by the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, the Chief Engineer of the Finance Department, the Architects, McKim, Mead and White; the Museum authorities, and the Chief Engineer and the Architect of this Department.

With all these conditions in mind, I respectfully request that your Honorable Board adopt a resolution authorizing me to issue extras on the contract, or if that is impossible, open market orders, to the amount of approximately \$8,000, for doing this work without competitive bidding. The only passenger automobile in the possession of this department is a second-hand National four-cylinder car, bought in 1911, and which is now completely worn out after having been thoroughly repaired at various times. This car is not in commission and it cannot be operated, and, because of its age and hard service, could be placed in repair only at a prohibitive cost.

The number of and the distance between the institutions and divisions of this department make the possession of a passenger car for the use of the Commissioner and other departmental officials a matter of imperative need. The lack of an administration automobile imposes a distinct handicap upon the department.

Special authorization is also requested from the Board of Alderman for permission to purchase the automobile herein requisitioned without formal advertisement or contract, on account of the special character of the intended purchase and in order that purchases may be expedited.

The above is in lieu of the request which I made in my Departmental Estimate for Personal Service and Hospital Helpers, Municipal Lodging House, for the year 1915. Notwithstanding my strong protest, these positions were cut out of the request for the Municipal Lodging House. The only salaried positions which were left in the Budget beyond an allowance of \$4,380 for Hospital Helpers, were the following:

It is manifestly absurd to expect the Department to conduct so important an institution, registering in the course of a year over 200,000 lodgers and caring for from 2,000 to 2,700 lodgers a night, and to do this work with any degree of efficiency or credit to the City, with a Superintendent, an Inspector, and a few Hospital Helpers who must be recruited from the ranks of the applicants at the lodging house itself. In ordinary times the lodging house cares for from 300 to 400 men and women each night during the summer months and from 800 to 1,500 during the winter. Even in ordinary times it is absurd to expect the Department of Public Charities to operate the lodging house efficiently and to render even a reasonably satisfactory and adequate service with the institution so woefully undermanned. All of which I pointed out to the Budget Committee during the hearings last fall.

We are, however, facing an extraordinary condition this winter. Last winter, at this time, the lodging house maintained less than 900 beds, although it registered at times approximately 2,000 applicants. All applicants in excess of the number of beds were sent to sleep on the bare floors of boats moored at the dock at the foot of East 26th Street, on the floors of waiting rooms and even on the floors of the prison pen and the morgue. This character of service was maintained with great difficulty with the small staff which has been heretofore, and still is, maintained at the Municipal Lodging House. This administration has attempted to correct this condition and has succeeded to some degree. Although we have registered as many as 2,660 lodgers in The new George Bruce branch on Manhattan Street, near its junction with a single night, we have provided beds for all of them. We have not yet been obliged

As Overseer of the Poor, it is my duty under the State law to provide for the destitute; therefore, as the winter approached and as it seemed evident to everybody that it was going to be a very hard one and that there would be thousands of people out of work and out of funds, with no place to sleep and nothing to eat, after consulting with His Honor, the Mayor, I speedily made arrangements to provide 1,000 beds in addition to those which had been added to the lodging house during the past winter and summer. I also secured several hundred cots which could be pressed into service in case of emergency. These additional beds were provided at an expense of \$3,750. On November 2nd, 1914, we requested Special Revenue Bonds to pay the bills incurred, which request has been granted by your honorable body, and is now pending before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. There has been included in the above request the sum of \$7,000 for the purchase of cots and furnishings, as we have already been obliged to press into service almost all the beds which we have thus far added, and we have not yet encountered the most severe winter weather.

I am sure it will be clear to your Honorable Body that this Department cannot be expected to operate a lodging house, accommodating 2,700 people, with any degree of efficiency, using the same force which for years past has been provided and apparently required to operate an institution acommodating less than a thousand. But for the fact that the Department has been able to provide help through securing voluntary contributions, it would have been quite impossible to operate the lodging house at allthe institution would have completely broken down. The Superintendent has been obliged frequently to be on duty almost twenty-four hours out of the twenty-four.

Moreover, we are endeavoring to carry out a plan whereby lodgers applying more than three nights in succession will be required to work for any additional meals or lodging which has been provided for them. This plan has depended thus far on voluntary service, in order to prevent the influx of thousands of the unemployed from neighboring cities and states. The work policy should be regularly and rigidly enforced in this institution. It is quite out of the question to do this without adequately manning the institution. I am therefore requesting revenue bonds to the amount of \$9,460 for Personal Service and Hospital Helpers, which is slightly less than the amount which was cut out by the Budget Committee, viz.: \$9,580. This request has been put in a slightly different form to meet the situation as it now appears and also to conform with the rulings of the Civil Service Commission.

In order that we may be able to give intelligent and discriminating attention to the needs of applicants for help at the lodging house, in order that we may give particular consideration to those who apply for assistance more often than three nights in a month, and in order that we may be able to properly differentiate between the employable and the unemployable and adequately meet the needs of both, I sincerely hope that your Honorable Body will appreciate the importance of granting this request. To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:
Gentlemen—On December 5, 1914, you referred to the Corporate Stock Budget Committee a communication from the Commissioner of Public Charities dated November 27, 1914, in response to a resolution adopted by the Board on October 30, 1914, directing departments to submit to the Board comprehensive estimates of their corporate stock requirements to October 15, 1915.

In this communication is included a request for \$25,000 for steam conduit to connect the power house with buildings of children's hospitals and schools and for additional mechanical equipment, Randall's Island.

The new power house on Randall's Island is nearing completion, at present the buildings on the Island are divided into two groups, each group heated from separate plants. It is intended to connect the steam distributing mains of each group to a steam main from the new plant. The work contemplated must be done before the new boiler plan can be put in operation. Upon completion of the work the two existing power plants can be shut down and a possible saving of \$5,000 a year made by operating from one point.

After discussing with the officials of the Department of Public Charities the best method of connecting the new power plant with existing mains it has been decided to build a steam tunnel in place of the conduit originally contemplated. The tunnel construction, while more expensive than conduit, affords facilities for repairs to the steam mains, and for extensions of the service which is not possible with conduit construction. In order to keep the cost of the work within the amount requested it is proposed to construct the tunnel with prison labor, the Commissioner of Correction having agreed to supply the labor, providing the Department of Public Charities agrees to pay for the employment of one keeper for every group of fifteen prisoners employed on the work at the rate of \$66.66 per month, the established wage for this service. To this provision the Department of Public Charities has agreed,

Gentlemen-On December 18, 1914, the Municipal Civil Service Commission requested the establishment for its office, pursuant to section 56 of the Charter, of the grade of position of Finger Print Clerk, at \$1.320, for one incumbent. The Bureau of Standards reports thereon as follows:

"The Commission now maintains finger print records of all applicants for the positions of Fireman and Patrolman. This work is performed by David A. Scott, a Stenographer and Typewriter, at \$1,200. It is the intention of the Commission to extend its finger print records to cover the labor class, which numbers 18,000 applicants per year and which will necessitate the permanent assignment of a Finger Print Clerk exclusively to this work.

"The Commission states that great difficulty is encountered in the proper identification of candidates for appointment in the Labor Class, for the reason that the handwriting of most applicants is faulty. Many candidates are entirely unable to write and their mark in such cases is accepted in lieu of their signature. The finger print system appears to be the only sure method of employing only such persons as have passed the tests of the Commission.

"Mr. Scott is first on the eligible list for Finger Print Clerk and a reappointment from this list will give him the title which conforms to his duties. The proposed salary of \$1,320 is the minimum provided in the tentative specifications for this work." In view of the foregoing statement we recommend the adoption of the attached

Report of the Committee on Finance in Favor of Placing on File Request of Board of Education for \$10,000 Special Revenue Bonds for Repairs to Building Occupied by Manhattan Trade School for Girls.

The Committee on Finance, to which was referred on January 4, 1915 (Minutes, page 14) the annexed request of the Board of Education for \$10,000 Special Revenue Bonds for repairs to building occupied by Manhattan Trade School for Girls, respectfully

REPORTS:

That a precisely similar request for \$10,000 was made by the Board of Education on June 30, 1914, and was placed on file by the Board of Aldermen on July 7, 1914,

in pursuance of the following report:

"That Commissioner Wilsey stated to the Committee that if such imminent danger existed the Fire Department would order the premises vacated. That the school is now going on. He does not think the girls at this school in any danger, as they are all of larger growth and there are but 525 in this large building. Whatever the Fire Department insisted on before has been complied with. They have been in this building four years. Under these circumstances the Committee recommends that this request be ordered on file.'

Commissioner Wilsey again appeared before the Committee in support of this newer request, and virtually reiterated his previous statements. He further set forth that this building is equipped in the rear with fire escapes and is so constructed that it has practically what might be called an interior court in which is located a very wide and commodious staircase. The fact is that this building is only under lease until next September with the privilege of a year's renewal, when it is expected that a new school for this especial purpose will be ready for occupancy.

The Board of Education is provided in the 1915 Budget with funds which it can use for this purpose without waiting for any bond issue, requisition for which can be made at a later date in case of the existence of a deficit.

Dear Sir-On October 16, 1914, a report was made to you on an application of the President of the Borough of Manhattan, dated October 7, 1914, for special revenue bonds in the amount of \$4,000, the proceeds whereof to be used to defray certain necessary expenditures relative to the maintenance of the building located at 49 Lafayette Street. The details of these expenses were given in the report referred to.

A resolution requesting the issuance of special revenue bonds referred to was adopted by your Board November 10, 1914, in which it was provided that the proceeds of the said bonds were to be used for the "care and operation" of 49 Lafayette Street, and that all obligations contracted for as a result of such action were to be incurred

on or before December 31, 1914.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, on December 18, 1914, approved of and concurred in the action of the Board of Aldermen in this matter to the extent of \$2.714.12. The reason why the full amount requested was not approved was due to the fact that it was originally intended that certain personal service of cleaners and elevatormen employed by the President of the Borough of Manhattan would be paid for from the funds thus authorized. Owing to the delay in approving the request it was

found necessary to pay these employees from another source.

It is now found that the wording of the resolution adopted by your Board on November 10, 1914, which reads "care and operation of," is not sufficiently broad to justify the payment of vouchers for all of the objects outlined in the report submitted by this Bureau dated October 16, 1914. It is therefore respectfully suggested that the wording of the resolution referred to be amended to cover "repairs and alterations" as well as "care and operation" of the said premises. Inasmuch as the funds authorized by the resolution cannot be expended this year, owing to the necessity for this amendment, it is also suggested the resolution be further amended so that obligations contracted for thereunder may be incurred on or before June 30, 1915.

On October 20, 1914, the President of the Borough of Manhattan communicated with your Board relative to the issuance of \$3,500 special revenue bonds, the proceeds of which were intended to be used to defray the cost of certain other repairs and alterations to 49 Lafayette Street, the details of which were outlined in a report to

you dated October 31, 1914.

Your Board complied with this request by a resolution adopted November 17, 1914, which was approved of and concurred in by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on December 18, 1914. Under the authority so given no obligations could be contracted for after December 31, 1914.

Inasmuch as the \$3,500 as well as the \$2,714.12 previously referred to were to be used on the same building and inasmuch as the \$2,714.12 cannot be used this year for the reasons stated herein, the Superintendent of the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, who will have direct charge of the proposed work, has requested that the resolution adopted by your Board November 17, 1914, relative to the \$3,500 be amended so that the funds thus authorized be available until June 30, 1915.

Message from His Honor the Mayor with an Ordinance to Suspend for a Time the Requirements of the Existing Ordinance in Relation to Stands Within Stoop

City of New York, Office of the Mayor, December 22, 1914. To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—The ordinance now in force prescribes that stands for various purposes within the stoop lines on public streets shall not be larger than 10 feet long by 4 feet wide. Under previous ordinances larger stands were permitted, and there are yet a few of these old stands that have not been cut down to the present legal dimen-

I had before me last week a delegation of standkeepers who had these old stands, and they explained that they are making so little money, because of present general conditions, that an enforcement of the 10 feet by 4 feet ordinance would take away their means of earning a livelihood, as they have no money at present to cut the stands down. Their struggle to support themselves and their families appealed to me most

Several members of your honorable Board have already spoken to me about this matter and suggested that I ask the Commissioner of Licenses to suspend the enforcement of the present ordinance. This, of course, he has not power to do. Would it not be better to face this difficulty squarely and pass an ordinance suspending the operation of the 10 feet by 4 feet requirements until October 1, 1915? Herewith you will find a proposed draft of an ordinance that covers the old stands that were constructed prior to the present ordinance and have been maintained for a number of years. It would be well for you to consult with the Borough Presidents, who have done such excellent work in clearing incumbrances from the streets, and consider their JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, Mayor. ninendations. Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermon of The City of New York as follows: Section 1. Section 163 of Article V of Chapter 5 of Part I of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 163. Whenever any sewer, culvert, water mains or pipes are to be constructed, altered or repaired in any street in The City of New York in which the [gas] pipes, mains or conduits of [gaslight] public service companies are laid, or whenever any such street shall be regulated or graded, it shall be the duty of the contractor or contractors thereof to give notice, in writing, of the same to the said companies, or to the one whose pipes, mains or conduits are laid in the street about being disturbed by the construction, alteration or repairing of such sewer, culvert, water mains or pipes, or by the regulating or grading thereof, at least twenty-four hours before breaking ground therefor.

Section 2. Section 164 of Article V of Chapter 5 of Part I of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 164. It shall be the duty of the said [gas] public service companies, or the one whose pipes, mains and conduits are about to be disturbed by the construction, alteration or repairing of any sewer, culvert, water main or pipe, or the regulating or grading of any street, on the receipt of the notice provided for in the preceding section, to remove or otherwise protect and replace the [main and service] pipes, mains and conduits [lamp-posts and lamps], and all fixtures and appliances connected therewith or attached thereto where necessary, under the direction of the Borough President. The company notified in accordance with the preceding section shall comply with such notice by causing the pipes [lamp-posts and lamps], mains and conduits to be protected and replaced, where necessary, during the progress of the

Section 3. Section 165 of Article V of Chapter 5 of Part I of the Code of

Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby amended to read as follows: Section 165. The preceding provision shall be made part of every contract hereafter made for constructing, altering or repairing any sewer or culvert, water mains or pipes in any street of this city which the pipes, mains and conduits of [gaslight] public service companies shall be laid at the time of making such contract, or for the regulating or grading of any such street.

Section 4. Section 166 of Article V of Chapter 5 of Part I of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 166. It shall be the duty of the person or persons by whom or for whose benefit any excavation is to be made for constructing, altering or repairing a vault, waste pipe or drain in any street of this city, to give notice, in writing, thereof to the public service company whose pipes, mains and conduits are laid in the street and conduits from injury, and replace and pack the earth whenever the same shall or public place more than twelve hours, without a permit from the President of the

No cattle, calves, sheep or swine shall be driven in any street without a permit from the police commissioner and in strict accordance with the routes, hours and other conditions prescribed thereby; provided that, in the borough of Manhattan, cattle, calves, sheep or swine landed at the foot of the street leading to the slaughterhouse to which they shall be destined may be driven along such street if the same shall be effectively barred or closed so as to prevent the escape of any of said animals during their transfer from the dock to the slaughter house.

2. Leading cattle. No person shall lead, or attempt to lead or cause to be led. any cattle, otherwise than singly, one person with each on any street nor upon any

sidewalk. 3. Landing in Manhattan. No cattle, calves, sheep or swine shall be landed in the borough of Manhattan except in accordance with the provisions of this section.

Every person, when cleaning any street, shall clean, and every contractor shall cause to be cleaned, the gutters and parts of the street along which the water will run, before using any water to wash the same; and no substance that could be before scraped away shall be washed or allowed to be carried or be put into the sewer, or into any receptacle therewith connected. 
