

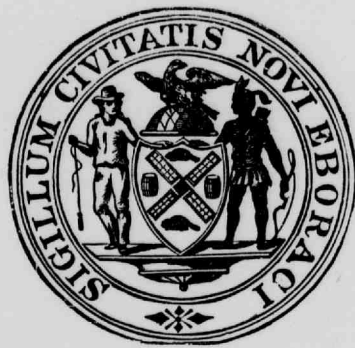

### DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

Wednesday, November 3, 1880.

Regular meeting 9.30 A. M.

Present—Commissioner Wenman, President, Conover, Lane, and Green.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

The following communications were received:

From the Deputy Commissioner of Public Works, desiring permission to establish bench marks on the Park wall on Eighth avenue.

Laid over.

From P. T. Bruner, John N. Stearns, Jr., Fred Jenkins and others, bicyclists desiring permission to ride on the sidewalk on Fifth avenue side of Central Park, and on Riverside Drive.

Denied.

From the Engineer of Construction, reporting upon several matters referred to him, which were considered separately as follows:

1. In regard to large boulders at corner of Third avenue and One Hundred and Fifty-third street.

Commissioner Wenman moved that the Superintendent of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards be directed to have the same removed.

On motion of Commissioner Green, laid over.

2. Recommending that the sewer in College avenue be cleaned.

The Superintendent of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards was directed to clean the same.

3. Recommending that permission be given Mrs. Fox to cut down the trees in front of her premises on One Hundred and Seventy-fifth street, which was approved of.

4. Recommending the cleaning of receiving basin on Riverside Drive, and the construction of sewer at Tieman's hill.

Laid over.

From the Topographical Engineer, in relation to unhealthy lands in Twenty-third Ward complained of by the Board of Health, and submitting map for the use of the Counsel to the Corporation for taking land for building drains.

Laid over.

From the Superintendent of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, reporting upon subjects referred to him, and which have received his attention.

Ordered filed.

From Patrick Flanagan, foreman, asking to be allowed pay for two days' absence on account of sickness.

Commissioner Wenman moved that the two days' time be allowed.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to said motion, and it was determined in the affirmative, a majority of all the members of the Board voting in favor thereof, as follows:

Ayes—Commissioners Wenman, Conover, Lane, and Green—4.

From Peter J. Masterson, desiring to be restored to duty as Assistant Foreman.

On motion of Commissioner Conover, said application was denied.

From the Commissioner of Public Works, relative to the use of a Steam Road Roller.

Ordered filed.

From the Director of the Menagerie, relative to the purchase of animals.

Ordered filed.

From the Topographical Engineer, relative to the complaint of the Board of Health upon the condition of Mill Brook.

Ordered filed.

From the Topographical Engineer, reporting upon the complaint of B. Richardson, relative to the sewerage of One Hundred and Forty-fourth street.

Laid over.

From Charles R. Leaycraft, presenting Macaws.

Ordered filed.

From the Engineer of Construction, recommending the transfer of a safe from the office on Riverside Drive to the office at One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street and Third avenue.

Commissioner Wenman moved that the Treasurer be authorized to have the transfer made.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to said motion, and it was determined in the affirmative, a majority of all the members of the Board voting in favor thereof, as follows, viz.:

Ayes—Commissioners Wenman, Conover, Lane, and Green—4.

Resolution of the Board of Aldermen, authorizing John Halpin to place two hitching posts in front of his premises at McComb's street and Broadway.

Referred to the Treasurer, with power.

From John B. Devlin, proposing to lay sewer-pipe in One Hundred and Forty-second street.

Referred to the Treasurer with instructions to procure estimates for doing said work.

From Joseph B. Dunkley, offering to remove dead tree from the lot designated as a public place in the rear of Public School, No. 62.

Referred to the Superintendent of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, to report upon.

From the Counsel to the Corporation, relative to forms of contract for paving Mott avenue, and regulating and grading One Hundred and Fifty-eighth street.

Referred to the President to reply to.

From George Francis Train, relative to Park Ordinances.

Ordered filed.

From John McGauran and others, complaining in relation to the condition of Ogden avenue, Devoe and Wolf streets.

Referred to the Superintendent of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, to report upon.

From the Topographical Engineer, reporting relative to the drainage necessary for Sedgwick avenue.

Referred to the Engineer of Construction for a report at the next meeting, and submitting an estimate of the cost.

From the Superintendent of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, recommending that the Engineers employed on Steam Road Rollers, be allowed to work and be paid for ten hours per day.

Commissioner Wenman moved that the recommendation be adopted.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to said motion, and it was determined in the affirmative, a majority of all the members of the Board voting in favor thereof, as follows:

From Sarah A. Martin—Relative to building on Third avenue, near One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street, standing outside of the house-line.

From M. K. Jessup, Chairman American Museum of Natural History—Relative to the cancellation of an order for a safe, and the alteration of two cases.

Commissioner Conover offered the following:

Resolved, That the request contained in the communication from the American Museum of Natural History be complied with, and that the Treasurer be authorized to issue an order for the work necessary in altering the cases as desired.

On motion, the President was authorized to furnish the maps desired.

From B. Hufnagel, relative to his bill for photographing on Riverside Drive.

Referred to the Treasurer to examine into and report upon.

From the Counsel to the Corporation, transmitting for filing in the Department certain applications for sub-lamp districts in Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards.

Ordered filed.

From the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, notifying the Department of the time fixed for the hearing of the Departmental estimate.

Ordered filed.

From L. P. di Cesnola, desiring permission to enclose a portion of the veranda in the Art Museum for an office.

Commissioner Wenman moved to refer the subject to the Executive Committee, to report upon.

Commissioner Conover moved as a substitute that the permission asked for be refused.

Resolved, That the action of the Board relative to the Harlem Bridge, Morrisania and Fordham Railway Company, had August 14, 1880, and September 22, 1880, be rescinded, and that said company be directed to repair the bridge forthwith, in accordance with the resolution of the Board adopted April 16, 1879.

NEW YORK, Wednesday, November 3, 1880, 9.30 A. M.

Commissioner Conover, Chairman of the Executive Committee, presented a report enclosing a communication signed by D. Huntington, President of the National Academy of Design, H. G. Marquand, Acting President of the Metropolitan Museum of Art, and E. T. Littell, President of New York Chapter of American Institute of Architects, stating that the design for the base of the statue of Admiral Farragut, by Mr. St. Gaudens, so far as it is completed, one-half only being at present modeled, is interesting and picturesque, and they think, so far as an opinion can be formed before it is finished, that it is worthy of acceptance as a work of art, and recommend the adoption of the following:

Resolved, That the statue of Admiral Farragut and the base therefor be accepted, and the same erected in Madison Square on the plot facing Fifth avenue, below the entrance at Twenty-sixth street. That the whole subject of the erection and unveiling of said statue be referred to the Executive Committee, with power.

On motion of Commissioner Green, a division of the question was ordered, and that part of said resolution accepting the statue of Farragut and the base therefor, and ordering the erection of the same in Madison Square, was adopted.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to that part of said resolution referring the subject with power to the Executive Committee, and it was determined in the negative, a majority of all the members of the Board not voting in favor thereof, as follows:

Ayes—Commissioners Wenman and Lane—2.

Noes—Commissioners Conover and Green—2.

Commissioner Green moved that the subject of the erection of the statue of Admiral Farragut be referred to the President, with power.



The President put the question whether the Board would agree to said motion, and it was determined in the affirmative, a majority of all the members of the Board voting in favor thereof, as follows :

Ayes—Commissioners Wenman, Lane and Green—3.

No—Commissioner Conover—1.

Commissioner Lane stated that Dr. J. O. Green desired to present a bear to the Central Park Menagerie.

Which was accepted, with the thanks of the Department.

A communication was received from the Superintendent of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, recommending the employment of eight double teams and eight laborers for work on Sedgwick avenue and Southern Boulevard.

Commissioner Conover offered the following :

Resolved, That the employment of eight double teams and eight laborers be authorized for work on Sedgwick avenue and Southern Boulevard.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to said resolution, and it was determined in the affirmative, a majority of all the members of the Board voting in favor thereof, as follows :

Ayes—Commissioners Wenman, Conover, Lane, and Green—4.

The President laid before the Board a Quarterly Report of the Department for the quarter ending September 30, 1880, which was laid over.

From Foreman Thomas Hodges, recommending the restoration of Dennis McSweeney, laborer.

Commissioner Green offered the following :

Whereas, By the terms of acts of the Legislature, this Department was authorized nine years ago to construct a bridge across the Harlem river, not more than half a mile north of High Bridge ; and Whereas, This Act was passed in recognition of a long existing public necessity for the means of crossing the Harlem river ; and

Whereas, The land for the approaches to the bridge on both sides of the river has long been paid for by the city, and the amount thereof has been assessed on the property-owners ; and

Whereas, Several resolutions calling for plans and estimates of such bridge have been passed, but such plans and estimates have not yet been received ; therefore

Resolved, That the Engineer of Construction be directed to report forthwith to this Board the plans and estimates for the said bridge.

Resolved, That the Engineer of Construction be authorized to employ William H. Grant, at a per diem allowance not exceeding ten dollars per day, to aid in the preparation of such plans and estimates.

A division of the question being ordered.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to said preamble and first resolution, and it was determined in the affirmative.

The second resolution was laid over.

On motion of Commissioner Green, at 12 o'clock and 35 minutes, the Board adjourned to meet on Saturday next, the 6th inst., at 9 o'clock A. M.

## COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND.

## Abstract of the Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at the meeting held October 30, 1880.

Present—Hon. Edward Cooper, Mayor (Chairman); Hon. Frederick Smyth, Recorder; Hon. John Kelly, Comptroller; J. Nelson Tappan, Esq., Chamberlain; and Patrick Keenan, Esq., Chairman Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The reading of the minutes of the meetings held October 25 and 26, was dispensed with.

The report of the Comptroller, relative to bonds and stocks payable in the year 1881, submitted at the meeting held October 25, 1880, and ordered printed in the minutes, was taken up for action; whereupon the Comptroller submitted the following preamble and resolution as a substitute for those submitted with the report, viz.:

Whereas, The Comptroller has reported to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund that the revenues of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt in the year 1881 are estimated at \$4,350,000.00, and that no bonds or stocks of the City of New York for which said Fund was primarily pledged fall due during said year; and

Whereas, The total amount of bonds and stocks falling due in 1881, originally payable from taxation, and of bonds and stocks payable from said Sinking Fund under the provisions of section 8 of chapter 383 of the Laws of 1878 is \$1,390,212.50, as follows:

—And, Whereas, The amount of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt is in excess to the amount of bonds and stocks for which that fund is primarily pledged, therefore

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund do hereby certify to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the revenues of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt in the year 1881, are estimated at \$4,350,000, and that no bonds or stocks of the City of New York for which said fund was primarily pledged fall due during said year, and that the total amount of bonds and stocks originally payable from taxation falling due during said year is \$1,346,649.48, and that the amount of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt is in excess of the amount of bonds and stocks for which said fund was pledged before the passage of chapter 383 of the Laws of 1878, the securities held by said Sinking Fund being more than thirty-four millions of dollars, while the amount of bonds and stocks for which said fund is primarily pledged amounts to less than nineteen millions of dollars.

On motion, the preamble and resolution were unanimously adopted, all the Commissioners being present and voting in the affirmative.

The Comptroller submitted the following report in relation to the Surplus Revenues of the Sinking Fund for payment of interest on the City Debt for the year 1880, viz.:

## To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—Section 2, of chapter 383, Laws of 1878, provides that the surplus revenues of the "Sinking Fund for the payment of interest on the City Debt" shall be transferred after the year 1878 to the "Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt," as follows, to wit:

"Section 2. The fund known as the 'Sinking Fund of the City of New York, for the payment of the interest accruing and to accrue upon the Stocks of said City, until the same be fully and finally redeemed,' shall be continued, and after providing for the payment of the interest on the Bonds and Stocks of said City, now payable therefrom as provided by law, shall form a fund which shall be transferred after the year eighteen hundred and seventy-eight to the 'Sinking Fund for the redemption of the City Debt,' and which transferred fund is hereby, in addition to the revenues and monies aforesaid, pledged and appropriated to said last mentioned Sinking Fund, until all the bond and stocks of said City, as aforesaid, are fully redeemed and paid."



The following statement shows the amount in the "Sinking Fund for the payment of the interest on the City Debt" on October 29, 1880.

—And that there are no other payments coming due during the calendar year 1880, for which said Fund is pledged.

I recommend that a warrant be drawn to transfer the sum of one million dollars (\$1,000,000) of the surplus revenues of the Sinking Fund for the payment of interest on the City Debt to the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt, as authorized by the above statute, and respectfully submit herewith a resolution for that purpose.

The report was approved, and, on motion, the preamble and resolution submitted with the report were unanimously adopted, viz.:

Whereas, Section 2 of chapter 383 of Laws of 1878 provides that the surplus revenues of the Sinking Fund for the payment of interest on the city debt shall be transferred after 1878 to the Sinking Fund for Redemption of the City Debt; and

Whereas, The surplus revenues in said fund on October 29, 1880, amount to \$1,286,193.74, and no payments, for which said fund is pledged and which will reduce the amount of the said surplus, will become due this calendar year, 1880, as stated in a communication from the Comptroller; therefore

Resolved, That a warrant be drawn in favor of the Chamberlain on account of the "Sinking Fund for Payment of Interest on the City Debt," for the sum of one million dollars (\$1,000,000), transferring the same to the "Sinking Fund for Redemption of the City Debt," under the provisions of section 2 of chapter 383, Laws of 1878.

A communication was received from the Commissioners of Docks, in relation to a proposed "alteration and change in the width and location of the proposed new Piers, 53, 54, 55, 56 and 57, North river, from the lines therefor, as laid down upon the plans adopted by the Department, April 13, 1871," which on motion, was referred to the Comptroller.

The Comptroller moved, that when this Board adjourns, it adjourns to Wednesday next (November 3), at 2 o'clock P. M., which was carried.

## ASSESSMENT COMMISSION.

MAYOR'S OFFICE—CITY HALL,  
THURSDAY, November 4, 1880—2 o'clock P. M.

The Commission created by chapter 550 of the Laws of 1880, to revise, vacate, or modify assessments for local improvements in the City of New York, met pursuant to adjournment.

Present—Commissioners Edward Cooper, John Kelly, Allan Campbell, George H. Andrews, and Daniel Lord, Jr.

The Clerk read the minutes of the previous meeting of October 1, 1880, which were approved. The "Daily Register" and CITY RECORD were produced, and the notice of the present meeting found advertised in those papers on the 3d and 4th of November, 1880.

Commissioner Kelly submitted the following statement: That a number of applications for relief had been filed with the Comptroller on or before November 1, 1880, as required by the act, chapter 550, Laws of 1880. That a statement was being prepared for the Commission showing:

- 1st. Date of filing application.
- 2d. The particular assessments complained of, and date of confirmation of same.
- 3d. The name of property-owner, his attorney or representative, filing the application.
- 4th. The amount of the assessment complained of.
- 5th. Whether the assessment or any portion thereof has been paid.

Commissioner Lord, on behalf of the Committee on Rules, submitted the following report: The Committee on Rules respectfully report the following:

### ASSESSMENT COMMISSION RULES.

#### CHAIRMAN.

The Chairman shall preside at all meetings of the Commission, and shall have control of the calendar of cases prepared by the Clerk, and shall, in respect to business before the Commission, have the same powers and duties as a presiding justice of a General Term of the Supreme Court. In the event of his absence at any meeting the Commission may select a Chairman pro tempore, who shall have the same duties and powers as the permanent Chairman.

The Chairman shall also have power to issue subpoenas and other process.

#### CLERK.

The Clerk shall prepare a list of all the notices filed with the Comptroller and Corporation Counsel under the provisions of the act, which list shall state the name of the petitioner, the particular assessment in relation to which relief is sought, the date of its confirmation, and the name of the attorneys representing the petitioner. Such list shall at all times be open for inspection. The Clerk shall, from such list, prepare for the use of the Commission a calendar of the cases, on which such number of cases as the Chairman shall designate shall be placed according to the dates upon which the notices have been filed.

The Clerk shall keep the minutes of the Commission and attend to the printing of the same. He shall be present at all meetings and shall give the necessary publication to both notices of meeting and to the minutes, and shall perform such other duties as shall be required of him by the Commission in relation to the business thereof.

#### STENOGRAPHER.

The Stenographer shall attend at all meetings of the Commission, and shall report the proceedings thereof and all testimony taken, and shall furnish to the Clerk a transcript of his notes, for use in preparing the minutes. He shall also furnish to either the Corporation Counsel or the attorney for any petitioner a transcript of such minutes upon the same terms as the same are to be furnished by the Stenographers of the Superior Court.

#### NOTICE OF HEARING.

A notice of at least eight days shall be given in writing to the Counsel to the Corporation, in the form usually known as a notice of trial, specifying a day on which it is proposed to take testimony or to make argument in relation to any particular assessment, and no objection to any assessment will be considered by the Commission, or any evidence taken in reference to any assessment or any argument heard, until proof of service of such notice shall have been filed with the Clerk, and proof of service of such notice shall be so filed with the Clerk at least two days before the proposed hearing.

#### HEARING.

The Commission will make such disposition of the cases before it as will facilitate the dispatch of business, and will place on a special calendar all cases involving the same assessments or similar principles, or in which the evidence will be identical or nearly so. Any case so placed on such special calendar and set down for hearing must be completed within such time as the Commission shall designate, and will not be postponed without legal excuse satisfactory to the Commission.

#### EVIDENCE.

The Commission will, with the consent of the Counsel to the Corporation and the opposing counsel, receive as evidence any testimony heretofore taken in relation to any assessment as to which a proceeding is or has been pending in any court, provided, however, that either party may recall any such witness for further examination in relation to new evidence or for further cross-examination as to evidence so taken.

#### NOTICE OF MEETING.

Notice in writing of each meeting held on any days other than a regular meeting day shall be sent by the Clerk to each Commissioner, and such meetings shall be called by the Chairman on the written request of any two Commissioners.

#### MEETINGS.

The Commission will hold meetings on \_\_\_\_\_ and \_\_\_\_\_ of each week at \_\_\_\_\_ o'clock, \_\_\_\_\_ M., and oftener in case the business before it shall require it.

Notices of such meetings shall be given in the CITY RECORD and "Daily Register," as required by the act.

#### SUSPENSION OF RULES.

These rules may be suspended, modified, or altered at any meeting at which all the Commissioners are present by a majority vote, and may be suspended, modified, or altered at any meeting, provided written notice of the intention to move such suspension, modification, or alteration shall be given to each Commissioner at least two days prior to the meeting at which it is intended to make such motion.

## CHAPTER 195.

**AN ACT** in relation to the payment of assessments for local improvements in the City of New York.

Passed May 7, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time before the first day of September, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person liable therefor may pay, to the officer authorized to receive the same, the amount of any assessment for any local improvement in the City of New York, heretofore confirmed and now unpaid, with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum from the date of confirmation to the date of payment and at any time on or after said first day of September, and before the first day of December, eighteen hundred and eighty, any such assessment may be paid as aforesaid, with interest at the rate of nine per centum per annum from the date of confirmation to the date of payment.

Sec. 2. Where any installment or installments of any assessments have been paid under the provisions of chapter one hundred and three of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-six, or of chapter one hundred and fifty-nine of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, or of chapter two hundred and fifty-five of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, the amount of such assessment or assessments remaining unpaid may be paid within the same periods prescribed in the first section of this act and upon the same terms and conditions therein prescribed.

Sec. 3. Upon such payment in full, as hereinbefore provided, such assessment or assessments shall cease to be a lien upon the property, and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged; and there shall be no further interest or penalty by reason of such assessment or assessments not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute heretofore requiring the payment of any penalty or interest over the rate hereinbefore provided for upon any unpaid assessment.

Sec. 4. No provision of this act hereinbefore contained shall be construed as applicable to or affecting any assessment for the collection of which assessment the property has been sold.

Sec. 5. This act shall take effect immediately.

## ARREARS OF TAXES.

## NOTICE TO TAXPAYERS.

**THE COMPTROLLER OF THE CITY OF NEW** York hereby gives notice to owners of Real Estate in said city, that, as provided by chapter 123 of the Laws of 1880, they may now pay any arrears of taxes and Croton water rents levied prior to the year 1877, with interest thereon at the rate of seven per cent. per annum. If, however, such taxes and Croton water rents are not paid before the first day of October next, the property on which they are due will be sold for taxes immediately thereafter, with the addition of accrued interest thereon at the rate of 12 per cent. per annum from the respective dates on which they were levied.

Lists for such tax sale are now being prepared by the Clerk of Arrears.

## CHAPTER 123.

**AN ACT** in relation to arrears of taxes in the City of New York, and to provide for the reissuing of revenue bonds in anticipation of such taxes.

Passed April 15, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time after the passage of this act, and before the first day of October, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person may pay to the Comptroller of the City of New York the amount of any tax upon real property belonging to such person, heretofore laid or imposed and now remaining unpaid, together with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the time that such tax was imposed to the time of such payment, provided, also, that the time when such payment may be made on the amount of any such tax laid or imposed in the years eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, and eighteen hundred and seventy-nine shall extend to the first day of April, eighteen hundred and eighty-one. The comptroller shall make and deliver to the person making any such payment a receipt therefor, and shall forthwith cancel the record of any such tax on the books of the finance department; and upon such payment being made such tax shall cease to be a lien upon the property and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged, and there shall be no right to any further interest or penalty by reason of such tax not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute passed requiring the payment heretofore of any penalty or interest over even per centum per annum upon any unpaid tax.

Sec. 2. Any revenue bond heretofore issued in anticipation of the taxes in the first section specified which may fall due and become payable before said taxes are collected, may be renewed by the comptroller of said city, in whole or in part, for such period as he may determine, not exceeding one year.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.
