#### Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending December 31, 1881:

December 31, 1881:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,272, as follows, viz.: I public building, 491 tenement-houses, 73 private dwellings, 76 other dwellings, 7 manufactories and workshops, 12 stores and warehouses, 17 sunken and vacant lots, 41 slaughter-houses, 2 lodging-houses, 2 public sewers, I oil works, 2 stock yards, 18 sunken and vacant lots, 45 yard; courts, and areas, 52 cellars and basements, 151 waste-pipes and drains, 180 privies and water-closets, 10 street gutters and sidewalks, 5 dangerous stairways, 4 smoky chimneys, 5 cesspools, 5 other nuisances.

The number of reports thereon received from the Sanitary Inspectors was 268.

During the past week 136 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were granted to the consignees of 38 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

Health Officer of the Port.

71 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.
The Disinfecting Corps have visited 171 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 115 houses, 115 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.
32 cases of contagious disease were removed to the hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

#### Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 544 births, 45 still-births, 189 marriages, and 741 deaths, reported to have aken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, December 31, 1881; this shows an increase of 29 births, and a decrease of 1 still-birth and 21 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1880, there was an increase of 21 births, 50 marriages, and 68 deaths, and a decrease of 10 still-births. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased 2; scarlatina, 1; diphtheria, 13; croup, 4; whooping cough, 5; erysipelas, 3; typhoid fever, 5; malarial fevers, 9; puerperal diseases, 1; diarrhoeal diseases, 1; inantition, 3; alcoholism, 2; rheumatism and gout, 1; bronchitis, 1; heart diseases, 2; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 3; meningitis and encephalitis, 8; apoplexy, 8; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 3; Bright's disease and nephritis, 8; cyanosis and atelectasis, 1; drowning, 2; while the deaths from measles increased 8; cerebro-spinal fever, 3; cancer, 6; phthisis pulmonalis, 3; pneumonia, 15; aneurism, 2; marasmus, tabes-mesenterica and scrofula, 2; convulsions, 3; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 1; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 1; premature and preternatural births, 5; suicide, 2.

SIR—There were 741 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, December 31, 1881, which is a decrease of 21, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 68 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1881. The actual mortality for the week ending December 24, 1881, was 750, which is 238.4 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 30.94 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,260,380.

Resolved, That, under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following additional ordinance of the Sanitary Code for the security of Infe and health, be and the same is hereby adopted, and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

§ 266. That no privy vault or cess-pool shall be allowed within thirty feet of any tenement or lodging house, hotel or manufactory in the City of New York, of a greater depth than two feet; nor unless it be connected at the upper end with the Croton-water and at the lower end with the street sewer, and provided with an outlet at the lowest point and on the bottom, so as to admit of the complete discharge of the contents whenever the outlet is opened and the vault or sink is flushed with water. The sides and bottom of every privy vault, cess-pool, or school sink in the City of New York must be impermeable and secured against any saturation of the walls or the ground about the same.

All existing provisions of law which impose a charge and require the collection of interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum upon arrears of taxes on real and personal estate within the City of New York, upon arrears of assessments for local improvements and street openings in said city, and upon arrears of Croton water rents in said city, are hereby repealed; and in lieu of such charge of interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum, there shall be charged and collected by the officer authorized to collect and receive any such arrears of taxes and assessments and Croton water rents, interest upon the amount thereof at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated for the same period as interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum is now required by law to be calculated thereon. This provision shall apply to taxes, assessments, or Croton water rents remaining unpaid and due, for the non-payment of which the lands and tenements liable therefor shall be hereafter sold at public auction as now provided by law; provided however, that nothing in this act shall be construed to affect the rights of purchasers at sales for taxes, assessments, or Croton water rents, heretofore made, or to authorize the redemption of lands and tenements from sales heretofore made for any lesser sums than the sums collectible for such redemption under the provisions of existing laws.
