Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending December 31, 1881:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,272, as follows, viz.: 1 public building, 491 tenement-houses, 73 private dwellings, 76 other dwellings, 7 manufactories and workshops, 12 stores and warehouses, 17 sunken and vacant lots, 41 slaughter-houses, 2 lodging-houses, 2 public sewers, 1 oil works, 2 stock yards, 18 sunken and vacant lots, 45 yards, courts, and areas, 52 cellars and basements, 151 waste-pipes and drains, 180 privies and water-closets, 10 street gutters and sidewalks, 5 dangerous stairways, 4 smoky chimneys, 5 cesspools, 5 other nuisances.

The number of reports thereon received from the Sanitary Inspectors was 268.

During the past week 136 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were granted to the consignees of 38 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

71 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 171 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 115 houses, 115 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

32 cases of contagious disease were removed to the hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 544 births, 45 still-births, 189 marriages, and 741 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, December 31, 1881; this shows an increase of 29 births, and a decrease of 1 still-birth and 21 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1880, there was an increase of 21 births, 50 marriages, and 68 deaths, and a decrease of 10 still-births. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased 2; scarlatina, 1; diphtheria, 13; croup, 4; whooping cough, 5; erysipelas, 3; typhoid fever, 5; malarial fevers, 9; puerperal diseases, 1; diarrhoeal diseases, 1; inanition, 3; alcoholism, 2; rheumatism and gout, 1; bronchitis, 1; heart diseases, 2; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 3; meningitis and encephalitis, 8; apoplexy, 8; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 3; Bright's disease and nephritis, 8; cyanosis and atelectasis, 1; drowning, 2; while the deaths from measles increased 8; cerebro-spinal fever, 3; cancer, 6; phthisis pulmonalis, 3; pneumonia, 15; aneurism, 2; marasmus, tabes-mesenterica and scrofula, 2; convulsions, 3; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 1; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 1; premature and pretermatural births, 5; suicide, 2.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week 134 were in institutions, 400 in tenement-houses, 193 in houses containing three families or less, 7 in hotels and boarding-houses, 4 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 11 were on the basement floor, 132 on the first, 202 on the second, 146 on the third, 81 on the fourth, 26 on the fifth, 2 on the sixth. 735 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 6 non-residents; 95 were stated to be single, 174 married, 73 widowed, and the condition of 399 was not stated, these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 741; still-births, 45; bodies in transitu, 16; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births 62 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 544 births; 189 marriages; 45 still-births; 741 deaths; 16 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated. 60 searches of the registers of births, marriages and deaths were made, and 8 transcripts of the birth record, 6 of marriage and 24 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending Dec. 31, 1881, was 42.2 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.726, the mean humidity was 81, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,414, and the total amount of rain-fall was 1.38 inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

Present—The full Board.

The minutes of the meetings held October 26, and November 2 and 14, 1881, were read and approved.

An application was received from Funch, Edye & Co., for permission to lay rail tracks on Pier, new 54, North river, and, being read,

On motion, the communications from the said parties, dated June 16 and 25, and October 22, 1880, relating to leasing the said pier, were taken from the table and placed on file, and the following preamble and resolutions were unanimously adopted, to wit:

Whereas, This Board, as appears by its minutes of the meeting held June 30, 1880, notified Funch, Edye & Co., that their application of June 16, 1880, for a lease of a pier to be erected above Twenty-third street, North river, upon plans adopted for the permanent improvement of the water-front, would take priority of all other applications, that the terms and conditions for the lease would be as set forth in said minutes, and that whenever the Department was prepared to perfect an agreement, the said applicants would be advised, and

Whereas, The Department has since constructed the then contemplated pier, which is now completed and ready for occupancy, and known as Pier, new 54, North river; therefore

Resolved, That a lease of Pier, new 54, North river, be and hereby is granted to Funch, Edye & Co., agents, for a term of ten years from and after January 1, 1882, at an annual rent of \$20,000, payable quarterly in advance, with a covenant for a renewal term of ten years, at an annual rent of \$25,000, payable quarterly in advance; the said agents to file in this Department a written acceptance of the said lease, subject to the terms, as stated therein.

Resolved, That under the powers vested in this Board by subdivision 6, chapter 574, Laws of 1871, Pier, new 54, North river, be and hereby is appropriated to the sole use of the special kind of commerce carried on in steamships between Europe and this port, and that the Counsel to the Corporation be and hereby is requested to prepare in proper form a lease in triplicate for the said pier to Funch, Edye & Co., agents, for a term of ten years, from January 1, 1882, subject to the terms stipulated under resolution adopted by this Board this date; and that the officers of this Board be and hereby are authorized and empowered to execute the said lease when prepared as to form by said Counsel to the Corporation.

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted to Funch, Edye & Co., agents, lessees of Pier, new 54, North river, to place and maintain thereon, and upon and across the ground recently filled in thereat, but not to extend easterly from the inner end of said pier beyond the westerly line of Thirteenth avenue, where it has a width of 100 feet, rail tracks, for the purpose of facilitating the transportation, to and from said pier, of freight in cars drawn by steam; said tracks to be laid under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, in such manner as not to interfere with the ordinary use of the pier, to remain thereon only during the pleasure of this Board or its successor, to be removed whenever so ordered by this Department, free of expense to the city, this Department reserving the right to remove said track upon the refusal of the said lessee to comply with such demand, but at the cost and expense of said lessee; said tracks to be accessible to all lines of cars carrying freight connecting therewith, it being hereby expressly understood and provided that the said tracks shall, on request, be used by any railroad corporation landing freight in New York City upon precisely equal terms; and the Department expressly reserves the right to order the removal of said tracks for any violation of the above provisions.

A communication was received from the Finance Department, advising that the penalty imposed by this Department upon Joseph Walsh, contractor for repairing and widening Pier 21, East river, is remitted by the Comptroller, and, being read,

On motion, the following preamble and resolution were adopted.

Whereas, By virtue of the power vested in the Finance Department, by section 31, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, the Comptroller has decided to remit the penalty imposed by this Department against Joseph Walsh, for non-completion of work within the time agreed upon under his contract for repairing and widening Pier 21, East river, dated August 5, 1881, and deducted the sum of \$1,500, from Audited Claims Nos. 7663 and 7120, on September 21, and October 26, 1881, respectively; therefore

Resolved, That a requisition be and hereby is directed to be drawn upon the Comptroller for the sum of \$1,500, being the amount now due said Joseph Walsh, under said audited claims, consequent upon the penalty being remitted, and that the bookkeeper charge the amount to the said contract, so that the accounts of the Department shall exhibit Estimates Nos. 1 and 2 (final), under said contract, as settled and paid in full in the sums of \$2,998.03 and \$7,401.97, respectively.

An application was received from the American Contracting and Transportation Company for permission to erect a temporary wharf in the vicinity of the foot of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, Harlem river, accompanied by the written consent of Wm. Lynch, the alleged owner of the upland thereat, and, being read,

On motion, it was

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted to the American Contracting and Transportation Company to drive piles and erect and maintain, during this pleasure of the Board, at or near the foot of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, Harlem river, a temporary platform or structure 90 feet by 45 feet, to connect with the upland by trestle work, to facilitate the filling in of sunken ground between One Hundred and Forty-third and One Hundred and Fifty-fifth streets, Harlem river, westerly of Eighth avenue; provided that the said structure shall not extend easterly of the established exterior pier and bulkhead line; that all the work shall be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, and upon plans to be first approved by that officer, and that the said company shall agree in writing to remove the said structure, when so ordered by this Department, free of cost and expense to the Corporation.

A communication was received from William Cruikshank, agent of the owners of Piers 6 and 7, North river, and John S. Krems, agent of the New York and Baltimore Transportation Line, lessees of the bulkhead between, requesting that the action of the Board in directing the said premises to be dredged be rescinded, and, being read,

On motion, the application of the New York and Baltimore Transportation Line, dated May 23, 1881, for such dredging, was taken from the table and placed on file, and the following resolution adopted, to wit:

Resolved, That the owners of Pier 6, North river, be and hereby are notified, that the dredging ordered by this Board to be done thereat, under date of August 26, 1881, must be proceeded with at once, it being the unanimous opinion of the Commissioners that it is necessary to dredge the premises, and that the work should not be further delayed.

An application was received from Richard Heckscher, Jr., for permission to place and retain two coal hoppers on the westerly half of Pier 53, East river, accompanied by the written consent thereto of the alleged owners of said premises, and, being read,

On motion, it was

Resolved, That Richard Heckscher, Jr., be and hereby is notified, to remove from the water-front without delay, the two coal hoppers now incumbering Pier 53, East river, and that if not so removed, this Department will make the removal, and hold him liable for all expenses therefor, his application to retain the said hoppers being denied.

An application was received from David Whipple, Wharfing, for permission to retain on the bulkhead between Piers 12 and 13, East river, the small watchman's house on which now located thereon, and a protest from Frederick W. Fisher against such retention, and a communication from the police captain of the precinct, recommending the removal of said house being also received, and, being read,

On motion, it was

Resolved, That David Whipple be and hereby is notified to remove from the water-front, within ten days from this date, the small house on wheels now incumbering the bulkhead between Piers 12 and 13, East river, and that if not so removed, this Department will make the removal and hold him liable for all expense incurred therefor, the police captain for the precinct having recommended that the structure be removed.

The following communications were received, read, and,

On motion, laid on the table to await action, as stated, to wit:

From New York, Lake Erie & Western R. R. Co.—Application to have reclaimed land between Piers, new 20 and new 21, North river, planked over.

From P. White's Sons—Reporting the bad condition of pier at Thirty-eighth street, North river. The Secretary stating that, by direction of the President on the 10th instant, the Engineer-in-Chief had been directed to examine and report the repairs necessary and cost of doing the work, such action was approved.

From New York City and Northern Railroad Co., lessee—Application for permission to erect a shed on bulkhead westerly of Pier 44, East river, accompanied by a plan therefor. Mr. William Allen Butler, Jr., of Butler, Stillman & Hubbard, was heard on behalf of company and further hearing postponed for one week.

The following communications relating to condition of certain wharf-property were received, read, and,

On motion, laid on the table, and the Engineer-in-Chief directed to examine the several premises named therein, and report the repairs necessary, and the estimated cost of doing the work in each case, respectively, to wit:

On motion, placed on file, action being taken where necessary, as stated, to wit:

From R. J. Cortis, agent—Application to occupy Pier, new 43, North river, from 27th instant to 22d proximo. The Secretary stating that, by direction of the President on the 10th instant, the applicant had been informed that the said pier, and Pier, new 37, North river, could be occupied at regular rates of wharfage, provided the Harbor-master for the district furnished berths thereat, such action was approved.

From Maritime Association of the Port of New York—Requesting that no permit be granted to shed Pier 38, East river. The Secretary directed to reply that that the several suggestions contained therein will receive due and proper consideration before final action is had in the premises by the Board.

From his Honor Mayor Grace—Relative to employees of the Department being assessed for political purposes. The Secretary directed to reply, that the Board, and the Commissioners in their individual capacity, most fully and heartily concur in the views and sentiments expressed in said communication, and that the members of the Board are opposed to any such assessment upon employees, and are not aware that any has been laid upon any person employed in this Department.

From Quebec Steamship Company, lessees—Application for repairs to roadway to Pier, new 47, North river. The Secretary stating that, by direction of the President on the 5th instant, the said company had been informed that the repairs should be proceeded with as soon as practicable, such action was approved.

In accepting the resignation of the Secretary, the Board desires to enter upon its record this minute to testify to the high esteem in which he is held by its members, and to express their high appreciation of his ability as an officer of the Department, and of his sterling character and genial disposition, so uniformly shown during his eleven years of office; therefore

Resolved, That this Board hereby accepts with great regret the resignation of Mr. Eugene T. Lynch, as its Secretary, and extends to him the best wishes of its members for his future welfare and prosperity, and trust that his untiring energy, with his large business experience, will secure for his new undertaking a long-continued success.

Commissioner Laimbeer offered the following resolution, which was seconded by Commissioner Vanderpoel, to wit:

Resolved, That John T. Cuming be and hereby is appointed Secretary to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Eugene T. Lynch.

The President stated that he was unacquainted with the nominee and unadvised as to his special qualifications and fitness for so important an office, and that having failed, upon inquiry of his colleagues, to obtain any evidence justifying so prompt an indorsement by the Board for so responsible a position, he moved the nomination be laid upon the table for the purpose of affording an opportunity to the members of the Board to ascertain whether or not the nominee is a proper person to fill the office of Secretary.

The ayes and noes being called on the motion of the President to lay on the table, it was not adopted, by the following vote:

The ayes and noes were then called upon the resolution offered by Commissioner Laimbeer, which was adopted by the following vote, to wit:

On motion, the Board took a recess until the 17th instant, at 11 o'clock, A. M.

On convening after recess,

Present—The full Board.

A communication was received from the Engineer-in-Chief relative to the non-completion of the work under contract with John Gillies, for building pier and dumping board at Nineteenth street, North river, within the time stipulated therefor, and, being read,

On motion of the President, it was

Resolved, That this Board hereby certify to the Comptroller, that the failure of John Gillies, to complete the work specified in the final estimate (No. 3), within the time stipulated therefor

under his contract for building pier and dumping board at West Nineteenth street, North river, dated August 6, 1881, has not caused the corporation to sustain any loss beyond the amount of wharfage, which might have accrued from vessels berthed thereat by the Harbor-master for the district, and that the work under said contract was virtually completed, and the pier ready for use on October 24, 1881, being nine days after the date of the expiration of the contract.

A report was received from the Engineer-in-Chief as to the unsafe condition of pier at Thirtieth street, North river, and, being read,

On motion, the communication from J. J. Astor, dated 18th ultimo, relative to repairing said pier, was taken from the table and placed on file, and the following resolution adopted, to wit:

Resolved, That J. J. Astor, alleged owner of the southerly half of the pier at Thirtieth street, North river, be and hereby is notified, that the said pier is in an unsafe and useless condition and requires to be rebuilt without delay, and he is hereby requested to file in this office a written agreement to enter into contract jointly with the Corporation, owner of the northerly half of said pier, to rebuild the structure upon plans and specifications to be prepared by the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, which shall provide that the said pier shall not extend westerly of the established pier line.

The following communications were received, read, and,

On motion, placed on file, action, where necessary, being taken, as stated respectively, to wit:

From Union Dredging Company—Advising that \$540 had been deducted by the Finance Department from estimate No. 5, as audited by this Department under dredging agreement, dated May 9, 1881. Secretary directed to reply that the Comptroller has not applied to this Department for any explanation respecting said estimate nor for any information regarding the auditing thereof.

From Department of Public Works—Granting permission to tap the water-main at Twenty-fifth street, North river. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to make necessary requisition for labor and material to furnish water at that point for work of Department.

From Mutual Benefit Ice Company—Transmitting copy of summons and complaint in matter of Philip Franklin, administrator, vs. said company, for damage sustained at Pier at One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, North river, leased by said company. Secretary directed to request the Counsel to the Corporation to take such action in the premises, as may be required to protect the interests of the Corporation.

From John H. Strahan, attorney—Requesting to be informed of the grounds of the opinion held by the Department, that certain property between Sixtieth and Sixty-first streets, East river, belongs to the Corporation. Whereas, No necessity exists for the service of George S. Hunt, Messenger; therefore,

Resolved, That he be and hereby is discharged from further duty, to take effect from and after 30th instant.

Resolved, That Charles Miller, Jr., be and hereby is appointed a Messenger to this Department, at a compensation of fifty dollars per month, to take effect from and after this date.
