

COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE DEPARTMENTS AND CORPORATION OFFICERS.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the Public Administrator, transmitting annual report:

LAW DEPARTMENT—CITY OF NEW YORK,
BUREAU OF THE PUBLIC ADMINISTRATOR, No. 49 BEEKMAN STREET,
NEW YORK, January 12, 1884.

To the Honorable the Common Council of the City of New York :

The Public Administrator in the City of New York, pursuant to section 29 of article I, entitled "Of the Public Administrator in the City of New York," title 6, chapter 6, part 2 of the Revised Statutes, herewith exhibits to the Common Council of the City of New York a statement on oath of the moneys received by him for commissions and expenses, and the total amount of his receipts and expenditures in each case in which he took charge of and collected any effects, or on which he administered on any estate during the year 1883, with the name of the deceased, his occupation, the place of his residence at the time of his death, where known, and the country or place from which he came if he were not a resident of this State at the time of his death.

And, in compliance with the Revised Ordinances of the Common Conneil, he also transmits a transcript of such of his accounts as have been closed or finally settled during the year 1883.

The statement heretofore referred to, shows in what estates any money was received by him during the past year, and the amount so received.

The balance of moneys standing to the credit of the Public Administrator and the Comptroller on the first day of January, 1884:

In the Importers and Traders' National Bank was the sum of one hundred and six thousand two hundred and seventy-two dollars and eighty-four cents (\$106,272.84), and in the Continental National Bank the sum of ninety-five thousand two hundred and five dollars and eighty-six cents (\$95,205.86), making together the sum of two hundred and one thousand four hundred and seventy-eight dollars and seventy cents (\$201,478.70), which includes interest allowed by said banks on

The total amount of moneys which came into the hands of the Public Administrator during the year 1883, was the sum of one hundred and forty-nine thousand seven hundred and one dollars and fifty-eight cents (\$149,701.58), and the amount distributed by him for expenses, payments to creditors and to next of kin, etc., was the sum of ninety-nine thousand three hundred and ninety

dollars and eighty-six cents (\$99,390.86). The total amount paid into the City Treasury during the year 1883 was the sum of twelve thousand two hundred and three dollars and sixty-seven cents (\$12,203.67), being for commissions and intestate estates.

When the undersigned took possession of his office he found that the account of the Public Administrator and Comptroller with the Guardian Savings Institution showed a balance due from that bank of fourteen thousand two hundred and thirty-three dollars and sixty cents (\$14,233.60).

The undersigned has made diligent efforts to collect the amount from the Receiver of the said institution, and has succeeded in collecting the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000), leaving a balance still due amounting to the sum of twelve thousand two hundred and thirty-three dollars and sixty cents (\$12,233.60), exclusive of interest.

By reason of such uncollected balance a number of estates cannot be finally closed.

AT 9.30 P. M. ON THURSDAY THE 15TH instant, the aqueduct had to be shut off to repair a large leak that could not be repaired in the usual manner from the exterior. This leak had suddenly devoloped in the section south of Yonkers, where smaller fissures had preciously occurred.

trom the exterior. In seak had studenly devoloped in the section south of Yonkers, where smaller fissures had previously occurred.

The examination showed fissures aggregating 2,000 feet in length. The repairs were fini-hed and water was again turned on by 4 P. M., on Saturday, the 17th instant. While the flow through the aqueduct was interrupted the supply in the Central Park reservo'r was drawn down five eet.

This loss of supply in the city reservoirs, occurring now, as winter is approaching, makes it necessary to take extra precautions against waste of water. Being aware of the temptation to leave faucets open in cold weather to prevent freezing in the pipes, I specially protest against that practice, and appeal to all criziens to abstain from wasteful use of water in any manner whatever. The present condition of the supply and the possibility of a recurrence of similar leaks in the aqueduct make it my duty to give this public notice that I shall hereinafter resort to the peremptory measure of shutting off the water in all places where persistent waste is discovered.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines if unpaid will be centered as judgments upon the property of the deliminents.

All good citizens will ad the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, sammer absences, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt. Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer, it is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.
