On motion, it was Resolved, That, under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following additional amendment of the Sanitary Code for the security of life and health be and the same is hereby adopted, and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code : Resolved, That section 210 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended so as to read as

Resolved, That section 210 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended so as to read as follows: Section 210. It shall be the duty of every undertaker having notice of the death of any per-son within the City of New York of small-pox, diphtheria, scarlet fever, yellow fever, typhus fever, Asiatic cholera, measles, or any other contagious disease dangerous to the general health of the community, or of the bringing of the dead body of any person who has died of any such disease into such city, to give immediate notice thereof to this Department. And no undertaker shall retain or expose, or assist in the retention or exposure of the dead body of any such person except in a coffin or casket properly sealed ; nor shall he allow any such body to be placed in any coffin or casket unless the body has been thoroughly disinfected and wrapped in a sheet saturated with a proper disinfecting solution and the coffin or casket be immediately and permanently sealed ; nor

proper disinfecting solution and the coffin or casket be immediately and permanently sealed; nor shall be assist in the public or church funeral of any such person. Pursuant to notice in the CITY RECORD for proposals for two hundred and fifty tons of white-ash coal for Willard Parker Hospital, the Board proceeded to the opening of proposals for the same, as follows:

#### Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending August 13, 1892 :

There were 13,165 inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police. There were 651 complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police. There were 521 complaints received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors and Sanitary Police for investigation and report. There were issued to the consignees of vessels, to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 67 permits. There were issued to consignees, to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 5 permits. There were issued under the Sanitary Code, 2 miscellaneous permits. There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks, 50 permits.

The 853 deaths represent a death-rate of 24.26 against 33.61 for the previous week, and 31.68 for the corresponding week of 1891. The decrease of 328 deaths was mainly due to a decrease of 7 in the deaths from diphtheria, of 8 from measles, of 10 from whooping-cough, of 73 from diarrheeal diseases, of 62 from diseases of the nervous system, of 13 from heart diseases, of 18 from pneumonia, ot 13 from Bright's disease and of 142 from sunstroke. There was an increase of 7 in the deaths from scarlet fever and of 13

from phthisis. The deaths from diphtheria were most numerous in the Nineteenth Ward, and from scarlet fever also, while the 7 deaths from measles scattered over 7 different wards.
