

DEPARTMENT OF BUILDINGS.

Report for the Quarter ending March 31, 1879.

DEPARTMENT OF BUILDINGS, Office of Superintendent, No. 2 Fourth Avenue, New York, April 1, 1879.

Hon. EDWARD COOPER, Mayor of the City of New York:

Sir-I have the honor herewith to submit my report of the transactions of this Department for the three months ending March 31, 1879.

NEW BUILDINGS.

The number of plans and specifications submitted for new buildings was 211, and the number of buildings embraced therein was 393. Of these plans 165 were, upon examination, approved; 24 were rejected, but subsequently amended and approved, and 22 wholly rejected. The estimated cost of the erection of these buildings was \$3,137,663.

The number of new buildings commenced during the quarter was 237, the number completed 247, and 672 are now in process of erection. The classification of the buildings proposed to be executed was as follows:

Of the foregoing buildings, 293 were to be erected in that portion of the city north of Fortieth

ALTERATIONS TO BUILDINGS.

The number of plans and specifications submitted for alterations to buildings was 339, and the number of buildings embraced therein was 361. Of these plans 286 were, upon examination, approved; 32 were rejected, but subsequently amended and approved, and 21 were wholly rejected; 112 were to be increased in height, 120 extended, 199 altered internally, and 218 externally. The estimated cost of the alteration of these buildings was \$637,630.

The number of alterations commenced during the quarter was 253, the number completed 185, and 166 are now in process of alteration. The classification of the buildings proposed to be altered

UNSAFE BUILDINGS.

The number pending on December 31, 1878, was 72, and the number since reported was 145,

making a total of 217.

Of this number 11 have been taken down and entirely removed, 107 have been repaired and made safe, and 99 are in process of removal or repair.

The number of violations of the law reported during the quarter was 68, and in 39 of these cases the law has been complied with, and 66 violations reported prior to and pending on January 1 have been removed, making the total number removed during the quarter 105.

63 cases are now in the hands of the Attorney of the Department for prosecution.

COMPLAINTS

Received from the public during the quarter, 78; in 32 cases no cause for complaint was found; 13 were removed upon verbal notification given by the Examining Inspector; 24 proved unsafe buildings; and 9 violations of the various provisions of the law, of which the owners were duly notified.

The number of buildings reported as requiring means of escape in case of fire during the quarter

was 140.

Of these 77 were made to conform to the law upon notice, and 63 are now under process.

The number of cases of this class reported prior to January 1 and since removed, is 160, making a total of 237 cases in which buildings were provided with means of escape in case of fire.

IRON WORK.

Arch girders tested during the quarter, 34; iron beams, 45; and iron lintels, 16; all of which having been found capable of sustaining the weight proposed to be imposed thereon were approved.

LEGAL BRANCH.

During the quarter 26 cases have been sent to the Attorney for prosecution, 14 of which were for insufficient means of escape in case of fire, 6 of which were for unsafe buildings, and 6 for violations of various provisions of the law.

The number of notices and notes issued and served during the quarter was 2,022.

Of this number 492 were for additional means of escape in case of fire, iron shutters, and unprotected hoistway and elevator openings, 136 for various other violations of the law, 495 were for unsafe buildings, and the balance, 899, miscellaneous.

CONCLUSION.

In conclusion, I beg particularly to invite your attention to the conduct of this Department in In conclusion, I beg particularly to invite your attention to the conduct of this Department in relation to a matter now very properly exciting much public interest, viz., the "Tenement-house Question." I will state that since I have had the honor to be at the head of this Department I have insisted upon the carrying out of many material improvements in the manner of erecting this class of buildings, conforming not only to the Building and Health laws and rules, but in strict accordance with general sanitary principles, as to light, ventilation, etc., which are required to exist throughout all parts of the building, and not in front and rear alone as heretofore.

During the quarter ending March 31, 1879, seven meetings of the Board were held. Thirty-nine petitions were filed to modify the law, relative to the erection of buildings, of which 29 were granted and 10 denied; 26 petitions were filed to modify the law relative to the alteration of buildings, 16 of which were granted and 10 denied, and 21 applicants were examined as to their qualifications to fill the position of Inspector of Buildings.

Fifteen thousand six hundred and twenty-eight dollars (\$15,628) were expended by the parties in interest, in securing and repairing the foregoing buildings under the orders of the Department. The number of cases of unsafe buildings sent to the Attorney of the Department for prosecution during the quarter was six (6), and in six (6) cases legal surveys were held, the proper parties having failed to comply with the requirements of the Department within the time allowed.

Four hundred and ninety-five (495) notices of unsafe buildings, consisting of "cautionary or first notices" and "second notices," etc., were issued and served during the last three months.

Four hundred and ninety-two (492) notices for fire escapes, hoistways, iron shutters, etc., consisting of "cautionary or first notices" and "second notices," were issued and served during the last three months, and fourteen (14) cases have been sent to the Attorney for prosecution. Seven hundred and seventy-nine (779) buildings have been examined by the Inspectors of this Bureau, and, except those reported, have been found provided with all the requirements of the law.

By referring to Exhibit "I," it will be noticed that there are one hundred and sixty-one (161) cases for additional means of escape in case of fire still in process of removal, for many of which contracts are out and the proper work is being done. Of these cases in process of removal seventy-nine (79) are in the hands of the Attorney for prosecution, in addition to which the Attorney also has one (1) case for repairs to hoistways and three (3) cases for iron shutters.

R. Patrick, State Agent, and a permit in writing duly issued by him authorizing the introduction into or removal from the city limits of such animals; therefore

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,524, as follows, viz.: 4 public buildings, 711 tenement-houses, 128 private dwellings, 38 other dwellings, 16 manufactories and workshops, 26 stores and warehouses, 45 stables, I garbage dump, 30 slaughter-houses, I glycerine works, I stock yard, 2 fat-rendering establishments, 2 ash dumps, I brewery, 18 manure dumps, I lime kiln, 23 sunken and vacant tots, I public sewer, 60 yards, courts, and areas, 42 cellars and basements, 102 waste-pipes and drains, 96 privies and water-closets, 157 street-gutters and sideswalks, 5 dangerous stairways, 3 cesspools, 10 other nuisances.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 572.

During the past week 104 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 58 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

117 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The certificates of 480 births, 48 still-births, 123 marriages, and 534 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this bureau during the week ending Saturday, April 5, 1879. This shows a decrease of 160 births, 6 marriages, and 23 deaths, and an increase of 8 still-births, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1878, there was an increase of 50 births, 18 still-births, 17 marriages, and 25 deaths. SIR—There were 534 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, April 5, 1879, which is a decrease of 23, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 25 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1878. The actual mortality for the week ending March 29, 1879, was 558, which is 20.4 above the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 26.52 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,093,901.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 79 were un institutions, 294 in tenementhouses, 150 in houses containing 3 families or less, 3 in hotels and boarding-houses, 6 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 8 were on the basement floor, 104 on the first, 144 on the second, 110 on the third, 55 on the fourth, 26 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth. 532 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 2 non-residents. 52 were stated to be single, 157 married, 64 widowed, and the condition of 261 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 354; still-births, 46 were upon certificates received from the Coroners. 480 births, 123 marriages, 48 still births, 534 deaths, 29 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated. 315 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 1 transcript of the birth record, 6 of marriage, and 28 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending April 5, 1879, was 38.3 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29,468, the mean humidity was 62, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 2,054, and the total aunount of rain-fall was. 18 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

A T A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH

held at its office on the 4th day of March, 1879, the iollowing resolution was adopted:
Resolved, That under the power conferred by law upon
the Health Department, the following additional sections
to the Sanitary Code, for the security of life and health,
be and the same are hereby adopted and declared to form
a portion of the Sanitary Code.
Section 202. Any cattle, meat, birds, fowl, fish, fruits,
or vegetables, found by any inspector or officer of this Department in a condition which is, in his opinion, unwholesome or unfit for use as human food, shall, upon the order
of the Sanitary Superintendent, be removed from any
market, street, or public place, and the owner or person in
charge thereof, when so directed by the said inspector or
by such order of the Sanitary Superintendent, shall remove, or cause the same to be removed, to the place
designated by the Sanitary Superintendent, or to the offail
dock, and shall not sell, or offer to sell, or dispose of the
same, for human food. And when, in the opinion of the
Sanitary Superintendent, any such meat, fish, fruits, or
vegetables shall be unfit for human food, or any such animal, cattle, sheep, swine, or fowls, by reason of disease,
or exposure to contagious disease, shall be unfit for human
food, and improper or unfit to remain near other animals
or to be kept alive, the Board of Health may direct the
same to be destroyed, as dangerous to lite and health, and
may order any such animals, sheep, swine, or fowls, to be
removed by any inspector, police officer, officer, or agent
of this Department, and to be killed and taken to the offal
dock.
Section 203. That hereafter no person shall gather,
collect, accumulate, store, expose, carry, or transport in

dock.

That hereafter no person shall gather, collect, accumulate, store, expose, carry, or transport in any manner through the streets and public places of this city, or in or to any tenement-house, cellar, or house in said city, any bones, refuse, or offensive material, without a special permit in writing from the Board of Health, in accordance with the conditions and subject to the limitations thereof, and in such manner as not to cause offensive odors or any nuisance whatsoever.
