Alexander C. Chenoweth, to load excavated material at the Pier foot of East Sixtieth street, compensation to be paid therefor at the rate of \$2 per scow per day.

William Ryno, to maintain a watchman's shanty, about 4 by 6 by 8 feet, on the Pier foot of West Thirty-fifth street.

The following permit was granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

Gas-engine and Power Company, to drive piles at Morris Heights, Harlem River, for a launching ways, the work to be kept within the established pierhead and bulkhead line.

The following permit was granted on the usual terms:

Merritt & Chapman Derrick and Wrecking Company, to land machinery and cable on the bulkhead at the Pier foot of East Twentieth street.
