Hon. JAMES KANE, Commissioner of Sewers:

DEAR SIR—In compliance with your instructions, I hand you herewith a report of the transactions of the Department of Sewers, Borough of Manhattan, for the quarter ending March 31, 1901.

12,783 linear feet of sewer and 21 basins connecting therewith have been built, making the present total length of the sewerage of this borough 2,624,160 linear feet (497 miles), with 5,960 basins, which number includes 32 built under special contract, as hereafter stated.

In the schedule accompanying this report you will find a detailed statement showing the status of the several contracts under charge of this Department.

Five sewer contracts and 32 basin contracts have been completed, viz.:

Sewer in Broadway, west side, between One Hundred and Fourteenth and One Hundred and Fifteenth streets.

Sewer in Avenue B, between Fourteenth and Fifteenth streets.

Outlet sewer and overflow at foot of Twenty-sixth street, North river, with alteration and improvement to sewers in Twenty-sixth street, between Eighth and Thirtieth avenues; in Eleventh avenue, between Twenty-sixth and Thirtieth streets; in Thirtieth avenue, between Twenty-sixth and Twenty-seventh streets; and to connections at Eighth, Ninth, Tenth and Thirteenth avenues and Twenty-seventh, Twenty-eighth and Twenty-ninth streets.

Sewers in Two Hundred and Fifth street, between Harlem river and Tenth avenue; in Ninth avenue, between Two Hundred and Fourth and Two Hundred and Sixth streets, and in Two Hundred and Fourth and Two Hundred and Sixth streets, between Ninth and Tenth avenues.

Sewer in Seventh avenue, east side, between Harlem river and One Hundred and Fifty-third street, and west side, between One Hundred and Forty-seventh and One Hundred and Fifty-third streets.

Alteration and improvement to receiving-basins on the northwest corners of East Broadway and Governor street, Division and Fourth streets, Canal and Orchard streets, Canal and Allen streets, Canal and Ludlow streets, Hester and Suffolk streets, Grand and Orchard streets, Henry and Pike streets, Pitt and Division streets, Broome and Lewis streets, Broome and Cannon streets, Stanton and Attorney streets, Stanton and Columbia streets, Eleventh street and Avenue A, Eleventh street and First avenue, Fifteenth street and Avenue D, Sixteenth street and Avenue C; on the southwest corners of Canal and Allen streets, Broome and Cannon streets, Delancy and Eldridge streets, Stanton and Willett streets, Sixteenth street and Avenue C; on the northeast corners of Canal and Baxter streets, Grand and Allen streets, Henry and Pike streets, Henry and Rutgers streets, Stanton and Eldridge streets, Fifteenth street and Avenue D, Sixteenth street and Avenue B; on the southeast corners of Stanton and Ludlow streets, Sixteenth street and Avenue B, and on the north side of Stanton street, between Bowery and Chrystie street.

There are now in progress 15 contracts for new sewers and 1 basin contract, as follows:

Outlet sewer and overflow in One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, between Hudson river and Manhattan street, etc.

Sewer in One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street, between Amsterdam avenue and Kingsbridge road, etc.

Sewer in Two Hundred and Seventh street, between Harlem river and Tenth avenue, etc.

Sewer in Two Hundred and Ninth street, between Harlem river and Tenth avenue, etc.

Sewer in Eleventh avenue, east side, between One Hundred and Seventy-fifth and One Hundred and Seventy-eighth streets.

Sewer in Eleventh avenue, east and west sides, between One Hundred and Seventy-eighth and One Hundred and Seventy-ninth streets.

Sewer in Eleventh avenue, east and west sides, between One Hundred and Seventy-ninth and One Hundred and Eightieth streets.

Sewer in Eleventh avenue, east and west sides, between One Hundred and Eightieth and One Hundred and Eighty-first streets.

Sewer in West street, between West Eleventh and Horatio streets, etc.

Sewer in Broadway, west side, between One Hundred and Nineteenth street and summit south.

Sewers in Naegle and Tenth avenues, between Academy and Two Hundred and Seventh streets, etc.

Sewer in Kingsbridge road (Broadway), between Harlem river and Terrace View avenue, South, etc.

Alteration and improvement to sewer in Twenty-third street, between new bulkhead-line and First avenue, etc.

Alteration and improvement to sewer in Forty-fifth street, between Third avenue and Depew place.

Alteration and improvement to sewer in Third avenue, west side, between Thirteenth and Seventeenth streets.

Receiving-basin, southeast corner One Hundred and Seventeenth street and Manhattan avenue.

Report of Work Done in the Construction Bureau of the Department of Sewers, Borough of The Bronx, during the Quarter ending March 31, 1901.

The total length of sewers constructed in the Borough of The Bronx, at the close of the quarter ending March 31, 1901, is 839,257.24 linear feet or 168.42 miles, being divided as follows:

\$44,498.87 linear feet or 159.943 miles in the regular "Combined System," according to filed District Drainage Maps for the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, west of the Bronx river, and 44,738.37 linear feet or 8.477 miles in the "Separate System," specially designed for the district east of the Bronx river (or Williamsbridge) previous to annexation.

13,264.77 linear feet or 2.512 miles of sewers were constructed during the quarter (exclusive of district east of Bronx river), being divided into 3,910.78 linear feet or .741 miles of brick sewer, 96 linear feet or .018 miles of iron pipe sewer and 9,257.99 linear feet or 1.753 miles of vitrified pipe sewers.

The total number of receiving-basins (west of Bronx river) is 1,990, twelve (12) having been constructed during the quarter.

DEAR SIR—I submit herewith the operations of the Department of Sewers, Borough of Brooklyn, for the quarter ending March 31, 1901.

There have been expended during the quarter the amounts as stated below against the various appropriations and bonded accounts.

In regard to work which has been performed in the construction of sewers, etc., in the Borough of Brooklyn, during the first quarter of the year 1901, the following tabular statements are respectfully submitted:

The length of the sewerage system in this borough on March 31, 1901, has been found to be 650,814 miles.

The length which has been constructed during the quarter is shown in the following table:

Six (6) receiving-basins have been built during the quarter, increasing the number connected with the sewerage system to a grand total of 7,758.

Forty-one (41) contracts are in the status of the guarantee for repair period—a period extending six months after the completion of all work.

Twenty-one (21) contracts have been in the course of construction; of these, twelve (12) have been completed in construction and placed in guarantee period, giving nine (9) contracts in course of construction at this time.

Five contracts have, as yet, not been commenced.

GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to submit the following report of work done under my supervision and charge for the quarter ending March 31, 1901:

NORTH RIVER.

Pier "A," N. R.

By resolution of the Board 20th March, 1900, an extension to the building on Pier "A" was authorized. Contract 684 was let for this work to N. W. Ryan, and the work of extending the building 50 feet inshore was completed.

Breakwater at Pier "A," N. R.

Under resolution of the Board of January 10, 1900, the work of constructing a permanent breakwater south of Pier "A" has been in progress. The work is now temporarily suspended.

Piers, New 16 and 17, N. R.

Pier, new 16, has been reconstructed by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company under permit from the Board of Docks, and the work of building sheds on Piers, new 16 and 17, and on the bulkhead between the piers by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company has been completed.

Pier, New 25, N. R.

A resolution of the Board of June 27, 1900, authorized the extension of this pier, and work has been in progress during the quarter.

Delancey Street Section.

The wall at this section is being built by the Pennsylvania Railroad Company under permit from the Board of Docks. The north ferry slip was completed some time ago, and work on the remaining portion of the wall is in progress, substantial advancement being made. The old ferry structures are being removed and new ferry buildings placed in accordance with the terms of the agreement with the Pennsylvania Railroad Company. The work of setting concrete blocks in the wall has been done by the Department's force for and at the cost of the contractor for the Pennsylvania Railroad Company.

Pier, New 37, N. R.

Under resolution of the Board of June 27, 1900, the outer end of this pier is being extended.

Pier, New 38, N. R.

Under a resolution of the Board of June 27, 1900, the outer end of this pier is being extended.

Pier, New 39, N. R.

Under a resolution of the Board of December 7, 1900, the outer end of this pier is being extended.

Pier, New 40, N. R.

Under a resolution of the Board of December 7, 1900, the outer end of this pier is being extended.

Pier, New 43, N. R.

Offices are being placed on this pier by the Catskill and New York Steamboat Company under a permit from the Board.

Christopher Street, N. R.

An awning shed in front of the ferry premises is being erected by the Hoboken Ferry Company, under permit from the Board of Docks.

Improvement of the Water Front Between Piers, New 46, and Gansevoort Street.

The bulkhead at this section was practically completed for the full length of the section in a previous quarter, and during the present quarter filling has been placed behind the wall.

Oyster Basin.

Some slight work of placing dock on the "L" to the Pier at the foot of Bloomfield street was done.

Chelsea Section.

On December 28, 1900, the Board authorized the construction of a section of the bulkhead-wall between Bloomfield and West Twenty-third streets. Work of dredging at certain localities between these points has been done, and pavement along the bulkhead between Sixteenth and Eighteenth streets has been removed.

Pier, West Fifty-seventh Street, N. R.

An extension to the outer end of this pier has been in progress. The work is well under way.

West Fifty-ninth Street Section.

The Board, by a resolution passed on the 27th of June, 1900, authorized the construction of the bulkhead or river wall in the vicinity of Fifty-ninth street and North river, and the construction of a new pier at the foot of the street. Work on the wall has been in progress, and 65 linear feet completed. The old pier at the foot of the street was removed.

Pier, Fifty-ninth Street, N. R.

Contract No. 692 has been awarded for preparing for and building the new pier, and substantial progress made in the work. Contract No. 697 has also been let for the construction of a freight shed on the pier, and work thereunder has been begun.

Claremont Section.

The Board by a unanimous resolution passed on November 16, 1900, authorized the construction of a bulkhead wall in the vicinity of One Hundred and Twenty-ninth and One Hundred and Thirtieth streets on the North river. Work on this section has been begun by the removal of the crib and pier at the foot of West One Hundred and Thirty-first street, and the pavement in front of the same.

EAST RIVER.

Broad Street Section.

The Board at a meeting held on December 22, 1899, authorized the construction of a section of the bulkhead wall between Whitehall street and Pier, new 7, on the East river, and the construction of two new piers. Substantial work has been done on the section, and the bulkhead wall completed for a large distance of the way. Filling has been placed behind the wall. A freight shed is in course of construction upon Pier, new 4, under Contract No. 688.

Catharine Section, East River.

The work on this section has been temporarily suspended and no work has been done during the quarter. The wall has been completed as far as practicable until further property has been acquired.

Market Section.

The Board by a resolution of the 23d of February, 1900, authorized the construction of the bulkhead or river wall in the neighborhood of Market street and work has been in progress during the quarter. Granite has been set and about 43 linear feet of new wharfage room made.

Piers, New 29 and 30, East River.

Piers, old (new) 29, old 38 and old 39, East river, are being removed to make way for the construction of Piers, new 29 and 30. A contract, No. 692, for the construction of these two new piers has been let and work thereunder is in progress.

Pier, New 31, East River.

The work of constructing a new pier west of Pike slip has been in progress under contract No. 686.

Rutgers Section.

Substantial progress has been made in the work at this section. About 187 linear feet of new wharfage room has been made during the quarter. Filling is being placed behind the bulkhead-wall.

East Twenty-third Street Section.

By resolution of the Board the work on this section has been divided into two parts, known as Section A and Section B. The work has been in progress at both of these divisions and about 391 linear feet of new wharfage room made. Earth filling has been placed behind the bulkhead-wall and is being graded. Sewer foundations are being placed at Twenty-first and Twenty-second streets. The old ferry structures at the north side of East Twenty-third street and at the south side of East Twenty-fourth street are being removed. A portion of the marginal street has been paved, and a plank approach laid to the Twenty-second street pier and the Twenty-third street ferry.

Pier, Twenty-first Street, E. R.

The work of constructing a new pier at the foot of Twenty-first street has been completed during the quarter under Contract No. 694.

East Thirty-eighth Street Section.

The Board by resolution passed on May 4, 1900, authorized the construction of a new section in the vicinity of East Thirty-eighth street; work has been in progress during the quarter. Foundation piles were driven for the tunnel outlet-pipe of the General Tunnel Engineering Company.

East Seventy-fourth Street Section.

The Board having authorized the construction of a section of the wall at this locality by resolution passed May 11, 1900, the work of construction has been in progress during the quarter. Loose stone, mud and other material has been pumped from the wall foundation, and concrete in bags and in mass has been set. Concrete blocks have also been placed. Work has also been done on the intake pipe of the Manhattan Elevated Railroad at the cost and expense of the same.

One Hundred and Thirty-second Street and Park Avenue, H. R.

Filling is being deposited along the water-front of these premises by Frank Buckley, under permit of the Board.

One Hundred and Thirty-eighth Street, West of Gerard Avenue, H. R.

Filling is being deposited in this vicinity by Jordan L. Mott, under permit of the Board.

One Hundred and Forty-fourth Street, East Side of Harlem River.

Filling is being deposited in this vicinity by John Cromwell, under permit of the Board.

One Hundred and Forty-seventh Street and Ninth Avenue, H. R.

Filling is being deposited to a grade of 5 feet above high water, between One Hundred and Forty-seventh and One Hundred and Fiftieth streets, and from Lenox to Seventh avenue, by John J. Crimmins, under permit of the Board. This work was begun in 1897 and was completed on March 6, 1901.

Morris Heights, H. R.

Filling is being deposited at the above premises and retaining structure built to hold the same by the Gas Engine and Power Company and C. L. Sealury Company, consolidated, under permit of the Board.

Tibbets Street, Spuyten Duyvil Creek.

A crib bulkhead has been erected at these premises by T. and W. Thorne, under permit of the Board.

Broadway, Spuyten Duyvil Creek.

Filling is being deposited at these premises and retaining structure to hold the same constructed by J. C. Rogers, under permit of the Board.

Willow Avenue, Bronx River.

Filling at these premises is being extended and retaining structure built to hold the same by the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company, under permit of the Board.

Oak Point, Bronx River.

Filling is being deposited and other improvements made by the East Bay Land and Improvement Company, under permit of the Board.

Cabot Street, Oak Point, E. R.

Rip-rap was deposited in front of the freight yard of the New York, New Haven & Hartford Railroad Company, under permit of the Board. An addition to the westerly rack of the transfer bridge of The New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company is being constructed under permit of the Board.

Westchester Creek, Fort Schuyler Road.

Filling is being deposited in this vicinity by John S. Bash, under permit of the Board.

Clason's Point, Long Island Sound.

The salt meadows in this vicinity are being filled in and a small pier erected by Clinton Stephens.

Metropolitan Hospital Coal Dock.

A new coal dock has been built on the easterly side of Blackwell's Island for the Department of Charities.

*BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.**Sheepshead Bay.*

The Manhattan Hotel and Land Company are pumping and depositing sand at Manhattan Beach.

Between Fifty-sixth and Fifty-seventh Streets.

The water-front in this locality is being improved by the Morse Iron Works and Dry Dock Company.

Pier, Fifty-fifth Street.

The erection of a new pier and return is in progress under a permit to the Morse Iron Works and Dry Dock Company.

Between Fifty-fourth and Fifty-fifth Streets.

A new dock and cribwork foundations for coal shed are being erected by the Kings County Gas and Illuminating Company.

Between Fortieth and Forty-first Streets.

A new pier is being constructed between these streets by the Bush Company, Limited, under permit of the Board.

Between Twenty-fifth and Twenty-sixth Streets, Brooklyn.

Improvements to water-front are being made by the Brooklyn Dock and Terminal Company, under permit of the Board.

Conover Street, Brooklyn.

A basin is being constructed at the foot of Conover street by H. B. Kirkham & Son, under permit of the Board.

South Second Street, Brooklyn.

An iron tower to support ash elevator is being erected at this bulkhead by the American Sugar Refining Company, under permit of the Board.

Newtown Creek.

A shed is being erected on the property of James D. Leary, under permit to the Rockland-Rockport Lime Company.

Lake Street and Mocker Avenue, Newtown Creek.

Two platforms in this vicinity are being erected by E. J. McKeever.

Stewart Avenue, Newtown Creek.

Coal pocket and tower are being erected by C. H. Reynolds & Sons, under permit of the Board.

Temple and Elm Streets, Astoria.

A crib bulkhead with return was constructed in this locality by Frederick W. Stevens.

*BOROUGH OF RICHMOND.**St. George.*

A coal pier was constructed between Nicholas and Henry streets by the Staten Island Rapid Transit Company, under permit of the Board.

West New Brighton.

A pier was constructed at the foot of Van street by Mary A. Bodine.

A pile and timber dock was constructed between Broadway and John street by Thomas F. Quinlan, both under permit of the Board.

Mariners' Harbor.

Foundation piles were driven for a factory between Central and Van Pelt avenues by the International Glass Company.

Shoeters' Island.

A bulkhead was built on the property of the Townsend & Downing Ship Building and Repair Company.

Tottenville.

A new dock was built on the property of Edward F. Keegan, between Fisher and Henry streets, under permit of the Board.

PAVING MARGINAL STREETS, N. R.

Asphalt pavement has been laid at various places along the North river under Treasurer's Orders therefor.

Granite pavement has been laid at various places along the water-front under sundry Treasurer's Orders.

The pavement along the North river water-front between Pier "A" and Fifty-seventh street has also been kept in repair.

PAVEMENT ON THE EAST RIVER.

Pavement has been repaired from time to time along the East river water-front, as required.

TIMBER BASIN, NORTH RIVER.

At the timber basin, timber has been received under Treasurer's Orders and contracts, cared for and issued as required. The timber basin has been maintained in good order and condition.

PILE BASIN ON THE NORTH RIVER.

Pile basins, between One Hundred and Fifty-third and One Hundred and Fifty-fourth streets, and between One Hundred and Fifty-eighth and One Hundred and Fifty-seventh streets on the North river, have been maintained in good order and condition.

TIMBER BASIN AT WALLABOUT BASIN, BROOKLYN.

At this basin old material has been rafted and cared for.

DEPARTMENT YARDS AT WEST FIFTY-SEVENTH AND EAST TWENTY-FOURTH STREETS.

At the Department Yards the force of the Department has been engaged in the construction of concrete blocks, the handling and cutting of granite, the care of material, and the issue of supplies for various pieces of work. The yards have been maintained in good order and condition.

RECREATION BUILDINGS.

Recreation buildings on the North and East rivers have been maintained and cared for.

FLAATING PROPERTY.

All the floating property of this Department has been cared for during the quarter, and has been repaired from time to time.

SURVEYING PARTY.

Surveys of the water-fronts and the structures thereon on the North, East and Harlem rivers, in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx have been made.

A detailed survey of the east shore of the Bronx river, extending from Oak Point to Long Island Sound, is in progress.

An extensive survey of the water-fronts of the boroughs of Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond is in progress. All the lines, levels, grades, surveys, soundings and examinations have been made and given as required.

DREDGING.

All the dredging has been supervised, whether done by the Department or by private parties.

REPAIRS.

Repairs other than dredging have been made at various places under order or permit from the Board of Docks. Repairs, alterations and other pieces of work by private parties under order or permit from the Board of Docks have been supervised during the quarter.

DRAUGHTSMEN.

In the office of the Engineer-in-Chief the Draughtsmen have been engaged on plans and studies for contract work, plans for the improvement of the water-front, plans and specifications for new piers and repairs, change of lines, examination of plans submitted by private parties, solar printing and general office work.

The total new wharfage room made by the Department of Docks and Ferries for the quarter amounted to 3,050 linear feet.

Wharfage room destroyed by the City in preparing for new improvements was 4,500 linear feet.

The area of the City's piers has been increased 135,700 square feet.

The total increase of wharfage room made by private parties has been 4,950 linear feet.

Whereas, It is evident that the best interests of this city require that public school property and the lives of the pupils therein should be protected against fire; therefore

Resolved, That recommendation be and hereby is made to the Board of Public Improvements, City of New York, that prompt and favorable consideration and action be given the aforesaid subject whereby the requirements above set forth be promptly responded to.

Public hearing was afforded upon the petition to grade, curb and flag Cleveland avenue, from Greenpoint avenue to Thomson avenue, in Second Ward, Borough of Queens, and no one appearing in opposition thereto, the President declared the hearing closed, whereupon, on motion, final action thereon was postponed for one week.

Resolved, That the proposition to recommend the legal opening of Titus street in its entire length, between Broadway and Jamaica avenue, and also Ditmars avenue, from the Old Bowery Bay road to the bulkhead-line in the East river, based upon petition filed to legally open same in part only, be noticed for public hearing to be had on Friday, May 3, 1901.

As soon as the Board organized for business, on motion of Councilman Van Nostrand, the record of the proceedings of this Board, as entered upon its minute book, was approved.

The Comptroller presented the following report and accompanying resolution relative to the redemption of six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock of the County of New York, maturing July 1, 1901:

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN:—Six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock, amounting to eight million eight hundred and eighty-five thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,885,500), which was issued by the County of New York prior to its consolidation with the former City of New York, matures on July 1, 1901.

The said stock is all held by the public and is payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), under the provisions of section 413 of chapter 374 of the Laws of 1897.

Under an amendment to the Constitution of the State of New York adopted at the general election held in the year 1895, the said stock is exempted from the debt-restrictive purposes of section 10 of article VIII of the Constitution, from classification as a City debt.

In view of the present heavy demands upon the City's debt-incurring capacity, especially for rapid transit and bridge construction, it is desirable to retain the advantage gained by such exemption. This advantage would be practically lost as to the amount of said stock if it were to be redeemed out of the Sinking Fund, or if it were refunded by the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York.

I therefore propose to extend the maturity of a considerable proportion, if not the whole of such stock, for periods not exceeding twenty years, under the authority conferred upon me by chapter 430 of the Laws of 1900, upon the best obtainable terms for the City.

It is not unlikely, however, that it may prove impossible to extend certain portions of said stock upon advantageous terms, and I therefore recommend that a resolution be adopted authorizing the Comptroller to redeem from the Sinking Fund such portions of said stock.

Gold Consolidated Stock issued by the County of New York prior to its consolidation with the former City of New York, amounting to eight million eight hundred and eighty-five thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,885,500), matures July 1, 1901, and is payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), under the provisions of section 413 of chapter 374 of the Laws of 1897:

Whereas, the Comptroller proposes, under the authority of chapter 430 of the Laws of 1900, to extend for periods not exceeding twenty years the maturity of as much of said stock as he may be able to so extend upon terms advantageous to the City; therefore

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is is hereby authorized to pay out of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), such portion of the six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock of the County of New York, payable July 1, 1901, as he may be able to extend upon terms deemed by him to be advantageous to the City.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

For the reasons set forth in the foregoing report to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller of The City of New York will avail himself of the provisions of chapter 430 of the Laws of 1900, which reads as follows:

CHAPTER 430.

An Act to authorize the extension of the funded indebtedness of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond.

ACCEPTED BY THE CITY.

Became a law April 23, 1900, with the approval of the Governor. Passed, a majority being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. It shall be lawful for the comptroller of the city of New York, in his discretion, to provide for the extension of all or any part of the funded indebtedness of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, as the same may from time to time mature. Certificates of stock or bonds so extended shall bear interest at a rate not exceeding three and one-half per centum per annum, and shall be stamped across their face with the terms of such extension, which shall be for a period not exceeding twenty years.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.
