Hon. JOHN W. KELLER, President, Department of Public Charities:

Sir—Having for the time assumed the charge and the management of the General Drug Department, I have the honor to submit herewith my report for the second quarter of the current year.

Before presenting an account of the work done, however, it is my painful duty to record the severe loss which this Department has suffered by the demise of its former Chief, Dr. Charles Rice, on Monday, May 13, 1901.

The deceased served the Department of Public Charities in the most creditable manner for the past thirty-six years as Apothecary, Chemist and Superintendent of the General Drug Department. In American pharmacy he occupied so high a place that his loss has been felt as a heavy blow to the progress of the pharmaceutical profession throughout the entire country. But all his manifold activities as editor, scientist, philologist and member of various scientific committees and societies were never allowed to interfere with a most scrupulous discharge of the duties of his office, and he attended to the work of the Department up to two days before his death.

I have been associated with Dr. Charles Rice for twenty-three years, and by myself, as by all the employees of the General Drug Department, his death is felt as a personal bereavement. His memory will be cherished by all who worked under him as that of a true gentleman and scholar.

Having paid this humble tribute to the merits of my departed Chief, I have the honor to submit a brief account of the transactions of this Bureau during the last quarter.

The Manufacturing Bureau has turned out the usual chemical and pharmaceutical preparations required by the institutions. The supplies received have been carefully examined, and the previous high standard of quality has been maintained. The preparation and sterilization of surgical sutures has been continued, and the cows' milk supplied to the Department has been controlled by daily inspection.

Material used: 100 pound white lead, 2 pounds Chrome yellow, 1 pound lamp black, 1 pound French ochre, 2 gallons turpentine 1 gallon boiled oil and 1/2 gallon Japan dryer.  
Second and third floors of the Female Helpers' dormitory, ceilings and sidewalls washed down, sized and kalsomined, window frames, wainscoting and all woodwork painted in 2 coats, grained and varnished. Bath rooms, ceilings and sidewalls washed down and painted in 2 coats, water and waste pipes painted in 1 coat asphaltum, partitions given 3 coats shellac, wainscoting,

window and door frames painted in 2 coats, grained and varnished. First and second floor ceilings and walls of the Female Employees' Dormitory repaired, 2 coats gauged on and hard finished, 60 square feet. Hallway of building, new laths, 3 patches put on 2 coats gauged and hard finished, 35 square feet.

Female Helpers' Dormitory, 2 patches put on ceiling, 2 coats-gauged and hard finished, 40 square feet. Laid new cement floor in bath room and water closet, 208 square feet.

Repaired ice box in Ward 11, putting new zinc bottom, using 3 pounds zinc and 1 pound solder.

Cleaned out hot water stove and pipes in Wards 14 and 16. Made 4 tin stoppers for flues. Repaired ice box with 1/2 pound solder. Lined draining board with 1/2 sheet of zinc. Repaired gutter, using 1 pound solder. Put up 25 feet of 3-inch leader pipe and 4 galvanized iron leader tubes.

Made 2 tin stoppers for flues in Ward 15. Repaired leader pipe, putting up 8 feet of new leader, galvanized iron.

Repaired water trough in Ward 24, using 1/2 pound solder.

Graded yard in front of Pavilions A, B and C with 10 cart-loads of ashes from gas house. Graded yard in front of Ward 15 building with 15 cart-loads of ashes from gas house. Repaired walk leading from Feeble-minded School to Quarantine buildings with 12 loads of ashes. Dug 15 flower beds for the children at the different ward buildings. Graded yard at Pavilion F with 30 cart-loads of ashes from the different boiler-rooms. Filled and graded at Henery with 35 loads of Ashes from the different boiler-rooms. Graded yard at cow stable with 35 cart loads of ashes from the different boiler-rooms.

SIR—The Hon. Francis J. Lantry, Commissioner, Department of Correction, under date of August 6, 1901, addressed the following communication to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

"I beg to transmit herewith a communication from Walter Dickson, architect for the New City Prison, inclosing specification for extra work in shafts of lifts extending from new kitchen down to a portion of the old structure.

"I also inclose proposal of P. J. Carlin & Co., contractors for the New City Prison, to do the work specified for the sum of three hundred and fifty-five dollars (\$355).

"I would respectfully request that the above amount be allowed, and charged to the appropriation entitled "Building Fund," Department of Correction, chapter 626, Laws of 1896, as amended by chapter 642, Laws of 1897.

Section 3 of chapter 626, Laws of 1896, in compliance with which P. J. Carlin & Co. are contractors for erecting the City Prison, provides that

"The Commissioner of Correction, with the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment first had and obtained, is hereby authorized and empowered, with the consent, in



writing, of the contractor and his sureties, to alter any plans and the terms and specifications of any contract entered into by authority of this act, provided that such alterations shall in no case involve or require an increased expense greater than five per centum of the whole expenditure provided for in said contract."

The contract of P. J. Carlin & Co., the contractors for general construction, amounts to \$545,000, and 5 per cent. of this amount is \$27,250.

Under this provision of the law, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has heretofore approved of changes on the contract of P. J. Carlin & Co. to the extent of \$13,784, and adding the amount of the change now asked for by the Commissioner, \$235, will make a total of \$14,019. It is therefore within the limit of the law.

The work designated as "extra work" by the Commissioner, not forming part of the present contract, can only be done in compliance with the law above quoted.

The specifications submitted by the architect, Walter Dickson, and the order of the contractor to perform the work for the sum of \$555, having been approved by the Commissioner, and the consent of the committee being duly given, the requirements of the law are fulfilled, and I think the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may properly give its approval to the change proposed.

In reply I would report that there is considerable settlement in Corleas Hook Park, due to natural settlement or an undermining by water, from leaks from the old water-mains around the Park. Some of the park pavement is in such a condition that it is dangerous to walk over, and is fenced off by the park warden, and in my judgment should be repaired immediately.

If, as claimed, the old house-connection taps are defective they should be removed and replaced with plugs.

The Engineer's estimate is as near as can be made in advance for work of this character.

Inasmuch as this is repair work and Section 48 of the Greater New York Charter only authorizes the "Acquisition and Construction of Parks," I do not think that bonds can properly be authorized for this work, pursuant to this section, but would suggest that the Commissioner of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, apply to the Municipal Assembly, in accordance with the provisions of subdivision 8 of Section 100 of the Greater New York Charter, for the necessary funds for this work.

DEAR SIR—The dearth of rainfall in the summer and autumn of last year reduced the water supply in the Borough of The Bronx far below that required for comfort, or even for absolute necessities, and culminated early in November in an emergency which called for immediate and drastic measures. It became the duty of this Department to meet the emergency with all possible and available means. To this end the Municipal Assembly and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorized the issue of revenue bonds to the amount of \$80,000, to provide additional pumping facilities and connections with the distributing system to take and distribute water from the Croton Aqueduct. Unfortunately the request of this Department that it be authorized to procure the pumping plant and connections without contract at public letting, so as to avoid the delays of preparing contract and specifications; approval of the same by the Corporation Counsel as to form; advertising; letting; approval of sureties by the Comptroller; certification of the Comptroller on award of the contract that there were sufficient moneys to pay for the contract, etc., was not granted, and in the meantime the drought continued and the emergency became daily more acute. The Department therefore ordered the smaller plants to obtain water from the Croton Aqueduct, and ordered the laying of mains to convey the water into the distributing mains, by which means the distress caused by the utterly inadequate supply was in some measure and in some sections of the borough relieved before the larger plant provided for under the \$80,000 appropriation by revenue bonds could be put in place and in operation.

For these preliminary works there was expended:

In placing pumps, boilers and appurtenances and operating the pumps during February, March and April, 1901.....	\$12,578 00
In laying mains and appurtenances in February, 1901.....	2,820 00

After letting and awarding the contract for the large pumping plant, with mains to the distributing system, it was found that there would be a large surplus in the \$80,000 appropriation by revenue bonds.

To this end the Municipal Assembly and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorized the issue of revenue bonds to the amount of \$80,000, to provide additional pumping facilities and connections with the distributing system to take and distribute water from the Croton Aqueduct. Unfortunately the request of this Department that it be authorized to procure the pumping plant and connections without contract at public letting, so as to avoid delays of preparing contract and specifications, approval of the same by the Corporation Counsel as to form, advertising, letting, approval of sureties by the Comptroller, certification of the Comptroller on award of the contract that there were sufficient moneys to pay for the contract, etc., was not granted, and in the meantime the drought continued and the emergency became daily more acute. The Department therefore ordered the smaller plants to obtain water from the Croton Aqueduct, and ordered the laying of mains to convey the water into the distributing mains, by which means the distress caused by the utterly inadequate supply was in some measure and in some sections of the borough relieved before the larger plant provided for under the \$80,000 appropriation by revenue bonds could be put in place and in operation."



"For these preliminary works there was expended:

"In placing pumps, boilers and appurtenances and operating the pumps during February, March and April, 1901.....	\$13,378 00
"In laying mains and appurtenances in February, 1901.....	2,520 00
Total.....	\$15,898 00

"After letting and awarding the contract for the larger pumping plant, with mains to the distributing system, it was found that there would be a large surplus in the \$50,000 appropriation by revenue bonds.

"I therefore respectfully request that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment will authorize the transfer of \$15,380.00 from that appropriation for the purpose of paying for the smaller pumps, boilers, etc., and operating the same during February, March and April of this year, and for the laying of mains and appurtenances in February of this year."

By resolution, approved by the Mayor February 19, 1901, the Municipal Assembly requested the Board of Estimate and Apportionment "to authorize the expenditure of \$50,000 so that the Commissioner of Water Supply may be enabled to procure the installation and operation of a temporary pumping plant to pump from the old Croton Aqueduct, north of Gun Hill road, in the Borough of The Bronx, a supply of from five to ten million gallons of water every twenty-four hours into the 30 inch water main in Van Cortlandt avenue, near Jerome avenue, to be distributed thence through the distributing mains in the said Borough of The Bronx."

In accordance with this request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on February 19, 1901, authorized the expenditure of \$50,000 by the Commissioner of Water Supply, for the purpose stated, and authorized the Comptroller to issue revenue bonds to that amount, in the manner provided by subdivision 5 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter.

As stated by the Commissioner, there arose last autumn an emergency which called for immediate action in the matter of the water supply in the Borough of The Bronx.

"The Department therefore ordered the smaller plants to obtain water from the Croton Aqueduct and ordered the laying of mains to convey the water into the distributing mains."

This was done before the passage of the resolution above quoted. The action appears to have been necessary, but no provision was made by any authority for paying for the work. In other words, there was no justification for incurring the liability for payment of the two bills, amounting to \$15,380.00, except the emergency which then undoubtedly existed.

But the resolutions quoted having been adopted after this action had been taken, and no mention having been made in them relative to such action, I do not see how the transfer asked for by the Commissioner can be legally made. In any event the Board of Estimate and Apportionment could not properly authorize, of itself, such a transfer until some such action shall have been taken in the matter by the Municipal Assembly, which initiated the action of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by its request.

Some means should be provided for paying these emergency accounts. I only notice in this report the plan suggested by the Commissioner.

Resolved, That, under the power conferred by law on the Board of Health of the Department of Health, the following additional amendment to the sanitary Code for the security of life and health be



and the same is hereby adopted and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code.

Sec. 63. No milk which has been watered, adulterated, reduced or changed in any respect by the addition of water or other substance, or by the removal of cream, shall be brought into, held, kept or offered for sale at any place in the City of New York, nor shall any one keep, have or offer for sale in the said city any such milk.

The term "adulterated," when so used in this section, means:

First—Milk containing more than eighty-eight per centum of water or fluids.

Second—Milk containing less than twelve per centum of milk solids.

Third—Milk containing less than three per centum of fat.

Fourth—Milk drawn from animals within fifteen days before or five days after parturition.

Fifth—Milk drawn from animals fed on distillery waste, or any substance in a state of fermentation or putrefaction, or on any indigestible food.

Sixth—Milk drawn from cows kept in a crowded or unsanitary condition.

Seventh—Milk from which any part of the cream has been removed.

Eighth—Milk which has been diluted with water or any other fluid, or to which has been added, or into which has been introduced, any foreign substance whatever.

Ninth—Milk, the temperature of which is higher than 45 degrees Fahrenheit.
