CHILDREN'S COURT.

SECOND DIVISION, BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

A Part of the Court of Special Sessions of the Second Division of The City of New York.

Annual report of James P. Sinnott, Clerk of the Children's Court, Second Division, Borough of Brooklyn, a part of the Court of Special Sessions of the Second Division of The City of New York, for the term ending December 31, 1903.

To the Honorable GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor of The City of New York:

In pursuance of the provisions of section 1408 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 150 of the Laws of 1903, I herewith respectfully submit the following detailed report of the business transacted at the Children's Court, Second Division, Borough of Brooklyn, a part of the Court of Special Sessions of the Second Division of The City of New York, for the four months ending December 31, 1903.

The following named Justices of the Court of Special Sessions of the Second Division have officiated at this Court during said period ending December 31, 1903: Robert J. Wilkin, Thomas W. Fitzgerald, Howard J. Forker, Patrick Keady and John Fleming.

The statute under which this Court was organized took effect on the 14th day of April, 1903, and the Court was opened for the transaction of business on September 9, 1903.

Under the authority of the statute the Justice assigned to the Court, during the month of August, called a meeting of all those interested in charitable, benevolent and philanthropic work in the Borough of Brooklyn, and committees were appointed at this meeting who recommended the appointment of Patrick Mallon, agent of the St. Vincent de Paul Society, Henry Veld, superintendent of the Hebrew Educational Society, and W. E. Davenport, head worker of the Italian settlement, as Probation Officers of the Court, and they have served to the present time. The probation system, which has been established with the assistance of these gentlemen, has shown most excellent results, as will be seen from the table contained in this report.

When a child is arrested in the Borough of Brooklyn, charged with any offense, the parents are immediately notified by the police, and, if the offense be of a minor character, the child may be returned to its parents on the parent giving a written promise to have the child in court the following day. If this is not done, the child is sent to the Shelter of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children, where it is cared for gratuitously until arraigned in court. When taken to court, if the parents are unable to employ a lawyer the Court assigns one who works gratuitously.

If the child is found not guilty it is immediately returned to its parents, but if found guilty it is either permitted to go home if the circumstances will warrant such leniency, or is re-committed to the care of the Society, to appear two days later for sentence.

Before the sentence day the agents of the Society have made an investigation as to the home surroundings, character of the parents and the reputation and behavior of the child, which is written out in the form of a brief and submitted to the Court. If the sentence is but a warning or a light fine the case is immediately disposed of, but if the charge is more serious and the home surroundings or the past record of the child will not warrant it, the child is committed to one of the reformatory institutions for children, or is placed under the charge of a Probation Officer. In the latter case the child is permitted to go to its home, but if under the age of fourteen years is required to attend school regularly, to report to the Probation Officer as he may require, and at a stated time, usually one month later, reports back to the Court. If over fourteen and working, the same requirements are exacted, except that night school is substituted for day attendance. On the return day, the Probation Officer hands in to the Court a written report of his findings, the child presents his report card showing that he has regularly reported, and also a report from the school authorities, whereupon either sentence is suspended or the parole is continued for another month. The habit has been that usually the parole is extended for a term of three months before sentence is finally suspended and the child is permitted to go free.

The business of the Court in detail is hereafter presented, and special attention is called to the result of the probation system, which will be found in Table C.

not generally shown on the ordinary wall maps.
