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BOARD OF EXAMINERS.

FEBRUARY 9, 1904.

Present—Messrs. William J. Fryer, Warren A. Conover, Charles Buek, William C. Smith, Charles G. Smith, and Walter Cook, Chairman.

Meeting called to order at 3 p. m.

Minutes of meeting of the 2d instant, on motion, approved as read.

Appeal 14—On presentation of report and on motion, appeal was denied.

Appeal 15—(Laid over at last meeting). Withdrawn by request of appellants, letter dated 6th instant.

Appeal 16—On presentation of report and on motion, appeal was denied.

Appeal 17—On presentation of report and on motion, appeal was denied (except as to front windows).

Appeal 18—On presentation of report and on motion, appeal was denied, as to windows on Hague street side of building.

Appeal 19 of 1904—New Building 46 of 1904, northwest corner Clinton avenue, Boston road and One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street, The Bronx; W. C. Dickerson, architect and appellant.

No. 1. Boston avenue front has excessive openings, pier of insufficient area as required by section 28 of Code.

No. 2. Thickness of wall checked must conform to section 32 of Code.

No. 3. Foundation court wall checked must conform to sections 70-26 of Code.

No. 4. Bearings of beams on girders must be at least 4 inches.

No. 5. Support of beams at stair-well is not clear.

No. 6. Metal thickness of columns of front must be specified.

No. 7. Permit for projection of show window must be obtained and filed.

It being impossible to comply with section 28 (that clause defining bearing walls with openings), owing to the design of building and for the purposes it was to be used, a different method of construction than that which would comply with the above mentioned section had to be employed.

No. 1. Boston avenue (front?) has excessive openings, piers of insufficient area as required by section 28 of the Code.

As the said building is to be used for offices and store purposes, and that the greatest possible area of light that could be obtained was desired, the method of construction as shown on plans and elevations was adopted, also as an architectural feature.

Mr. H. H. Avolin appeared before the Board. On motion, denied.

Appeal 20 of 1904—Fireproof Shutter Case No. 11 of 1904, Nos. 10 and 12 Jay street, Manhattan; A. O. Hoddick, architect and appellant.

On motion, referred to Chief Croker for examination and report with recommendation.

January 18—Payroll of the construction and repair forces, amounting to \$18,678.94, for the week ending January 15, 1904.

January 19—Car fare and incidentals (Audit Nos. 21835 to 21840), amounting to \$895.31.

The following communications were laid over:

From the Comptroller—

Returning bids of the J. W. Pratt Company and the Martin B. Brown Company for furnishing photo-lithographic copies of drawings under Contract No. 817, as requested.

From the Metropolitan Printing Company—

Asking to be advised as to what action the Department proposes to take in the matter of the bids received for printing and binding the Annual Report under Contract No. 820.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

Consolidated Telegraph and Electrical Subway Company—To run an electric light subsidiary connection to the church maintained by the Protestant Episcopal Church Missionary Society for Seamen, between Piers 29 and 30, East river, all granite pavement necessary to be disturbed to be taken up and relaid by the force of this Department at the cost and expense of the permittee.

Commonwealth Roofing Company—To build a fire and to place a tar kettle on the approach to Pier 35, North river, during the progress of repairs to the shed on said Pier, it being understood that the asphalt pavement thereat if damaged will be repaired at the cost and expense of the permittee, in accordance with agreement filed in this Department by applicant.

Standard Varnish Works—To construct a crib bulkhead along Richmond terrace east of Housman avenue, at Elm Park, in the Borough of Richmond, the work to be done in accordance with plans submitted.

Staten Island Railway Company—To construct a wooden frame storehouse 40 by 80 feet dimension at the foot of Amos street, Clifton, Borough of Richmond, the work to be done in accordance with plans submitted as amended.

The following permits were granted, to continue only during the pleasure of the Commissioner of Docks, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

Bolognesi, Hartfield & Co., Agents for the Italian Lines—To place and maintain temporarily two booths on the approach to the West Thirty-fourth Street Pier, pending repairs to the shed on said Pier recently destroyed by fire.

Heipershausen Brothers—To drive four fender piles on the northerly side of the Pier foot of Ninth street, East river, the consent of the lessees having been obtained to the driving of said piles.

The following permits were granted, to continue during the pleasure of the Commissioner of Docks, but not longer than May 1, 1904:

Al Foster—To land the steamer "Angler" at the Battery Landing, compensation to be charged therefor at the rate of \$4 per day, payable at the end of each week to the Dockmaster.

C. J. Conlon—To land the steamer "Edmund Butler" at the Battery Landing, compensation to be charged therefor at the rate of \$5 per day, payable at the end of each week to the Dockmaster.

The following permits were revoked:

New York Yacht Club—To maintain two floats at the foot of Twenty-third street, East river, to take effect as of January 1, 1904.

O'Brien Brothers—To load stone at the Pier foot of East Forty-ninth street, to take effect January 4, 1904.

Bouker Contracting Company—To load stone at the Pier foot of East Forty-ninth street, to take effect as of December 31, 1903.

The following communications were received, action being taken thereon as stated:

From the Comptroller—

1st. Stating that, in accordance with an opinion from the Corporation Counsel, the voucher prepared by this Department for the acquisition of property between Thirteenth and Fourteenth streets, North river, drawn to the order of Cornelius Le Roy White, has been changed so that the warrant may be drawn to the order of Cornelia Le Roy White, pursuant to the provisions of an order of the Supreme Court, and that the voucher prepared in the matter of the acquisition of dock property between Twelfth and Fourteenth streets, North river, drawn to the order of Elizabeth H. Warren, has been changed so that the warrant may be paid to the Chamberlain of The City of New York, said Elizabeth H. Warren having been declared a lunatic. Auditor reports that the changes have been noted on the Department copies of the vouchers. Filed.

2d. Stating that on January 14, 1904, his certificates were attached to the following contracts:

No. 823, for paving, Phoenix Construction and Supply Company, contractors.

No. 782, for granite, Booth Bros. and Hurricane Isle Granite Company, contractors. Engineer-in-Chief and Auditor notified accordingly.

From the Corporation Counsel—

1st. Stating that the proposed lease to Cosmas Vilias for the occupation of space on the marginal street between Twenty-second and Twenty-third streets, East river, with the privilege of erecting and maintaining a stand for the sale of newspapers, etc., is not legal, and that no power exists in the Commissioner of Docks to make the lease in question. Lease canceled, and said Vilias notified that if he will call at this office, the amount deposited as rental under the lease will be returned to him.

2d. Stating that no claim was made before the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment for the machinery stored in the building at No. 23 Tenth avenue; that he understands the machinery to be of but little value, and that he is of the opinion that the interests of the City would be best subserved by surrendering possession of the machinery to the claimant, J. M. Loeser, upon the furnishing of proof showing his purchase of such machinery from the former owners, and that Loeser should be required to release the City from any claim for damage by reason of the action of the Department in removing and storing the machinery. Said Loeser notified that upon presentation of satisfactory proof of ownership and of a statement from him exonerating this Department from all claims for damages by reason of the removal and storage of such machinery and fixtures, the property will be surrendered to him.

3d. Approving forms of contracts and forms of advertisements for portland cement under Contract No. 827, and for small cobble and rip-rap stone under Contract No. 829. Said contracts ordered advertised.

4th. Approving blank form of Contract No. 831, with form of advertisement therefor, for constructing extensions to Piers 27 and 28, North river. Contract ordered advertised.

5th. Transmitting bills of costs in proceedings for the acquisition of property between Bloomfield and Little West Twelfth streets, North river. Auditor directed to draw the necessary voucher for transmission to the Department of Finance.

6th. Stating that the City is now the owner of practically all the property at Broad channel, Shad creek, Jamaica bay; that no structures upon any of the lands under water thereat should be erected without permission from the Department and the payment of rent, and asking that an investigation be made to ascertain whether rent is paid to the City by the occupants of the several structures now maintained on the premises. Comptroller notified that under the provisions of the Charter the sole and exclusive government of the water front within The City of New York is vested in this Department, and the Comptroller was requested to submit a detailed statement showing what leases or privileges he has so far granted to the occupants of structures at the locality in question, together with the rentals fixed for same and the tenure of the leases or permits; and also directed to furnish this Department with a copy of the survey of the premises in question.

From the Bureau of Sewers, Borough of Queens—Stating that at the time of the reconstruction of the Broadway sewer it was agreed between the Sewer Department and the Dock Department, that in future all repairs to the pier foot of Broadway, Astoria, Borough of Queens, would be made by the Department of Docks and Ferries, the pier having been turned over for the purposes of a public dock. President of the Borough of Queens notified that this Department is not aware of any such agreement in reference to keeping said pier in repair, and the said Borough President was directed to have the pier repaired and placed in safe condition.

From Edwin Hunstel—Requesting lease of ice bridge privilege on platform at the approach to Pier 47, North river. Lease granted and same was directed to be sent to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for their approval.

From the Secretary—Recommending that the action of the former Commissioner of Docks in awarding Contract No. 825 for rope to Charles McAllister be rescinded, and that the contract be ordered readvertised, information having been received that the material can be purchased at a much lower figure. Recommendation approved.

From Willard Hawes & Company—Requesting a lease of the south half of the East Eighth Street Pier for a period of nine years, and offering therefor a rental of \$1,500 per annum, and stating that if granted a lease they will put the pier in safe condition for their business and will hold themselves liable for any accidents that may occur on the said side of the pier during their occupancy. Lease granted, to commence on a date thirty days after approval of same by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and to terminate on June 1, 1912, the date of expiration of lease of the northerly side of said pier; rental to be paid therefor at the rate of \$1,500 per annum, payable quarterly in advance to this Department; it being understood that the lessees will make the necessary repairs to the southerly half of the pier in order to place premises in suitable condition for use, and that they will hold the City harmless for any damages on account of any accidents that may occur thereat during their occupancy of the premises.

From the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company—Stating that they claim title to the land under water south of Riverdale, Spuyten Duyvil creek, North river, under letters of patent granted in 1873, and that they therefore removed from the property the piles driven by this Department. Referred to Corporation Counsel for an opinion.

From the War Department—Requesting that dredging be done in the slip on the westerly side of Pier, new 12, East river. Engineer-in-Chief directed to order dredging to a depth of 30 feet at mean low water under Contract No. 768.

From T. E. Quinn—Requesting an extension of time for the completion of Contract No. 815 for repairing and painting the building on Pier "A," North river, and enclosing consent of the Aetna Indemnity Company as surety to an extension on said contract to and including January 21, 1904. Extension granted to and including January 21, 1904.

From R. G. Packard Company—Enclosing consent of the Empire State Surety Company to the extension of time granted to and including March 1, 1904, for the completion of dredging on the North river, between Twenty-first and Twenty-third streets, under Contract No. 749. Comptroller notified accordingly.

From Louis O. Van Doren, Attorney for Daniel E. S. Coleman et al.—Asking that the privilege granted the Department of Street Cleaning for the maintenance of a dumping board at the foot of Eightieth street, East river, be discontinued. Communication referred to Corporation Counsel for advice.

From the Engineer-in-Chief—

1st. Reports for the weeks ending January 2, 9, 16, 1904, regarding progress and completion of work done under his supervision. Filed.

2d. Recommending that the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey be notified that Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment have been appointed for the acquisition of property between Fifteenth and Sixteenth streets, North river, in order that the company may make whatever arrangements they desire for vacating the property. Said company so notified.

3d. Reporting that Thomas Conley has failed to furnish tugboats in accordance with the provisions of Contract No. 769, and recommending that said Conley be declared in default, and that the sureties on the contract be notified that the Department will hold them liable for any excess of cost which the Department may be put to by reason of the cancellation of the contract; and further, that specifications and form of contract be prepared for 2,500 hours of towing, as may be required from time to time, should the Commissioner see fit to cancel said Contract No. 769. Contract canceled and the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to prepare specifications and form of contract for 2,500 hours of towing, as may be required from time to time by the Department.

4th. Reporting the removal of certain old buildings on the block between Bloomfield and Little West Twelfth streets, and between West Thirteenth and West Fourteenth streets, North river, and recommending that the bonds given for the removal of said buildings be released. Bonds released.

5th. Reporting that Goodwin Bros. have filed with him plans for a dumping board proposed to be placed on the pier at the foot of Twenty-first street, East river, and requesting that he be given instructions as to what action to take in relation thereto. Action of former Commissioner in awarding lease rescinded and check deposited by Goodwin Bros. ordered returned.

6th. Reporting that a dirt scow owned by the N. Y. & N. J. Tunnel Company lies sunk at the bulkhead between Piers, new 41 and 42, North river, and recommending that the said company be directed to immediately raise and remove the scow from the premises and to replace the two fender piles which were torn from their fastenings on the south side of Pier, new 41, North river, by the sinking of the scow in question. Recommendation adopted.

7th. Reporting that the work of repairing the pier at the foot of Stanton street, East river, under Class 1 of Contract No. 819, was commenced by Bernard Rolf, the contractor, on January 16, 1904; and that the work of building a rip-rap embankment on the easterly side of Riker's Island, under Contract No. 776, was commenced by O'Brien Brothers, the contractors, on January 18, 1904. Comptroller notified accordingly.

8th. Reporting that the work of furnishing and delivering Portland cement under Contract No. 794 was completed by the John P. Kane Company, the contractors, on December 23, 1903. Comptroller notified accordingly.

9th. Stating that Commissioners of Estimate and Appraisal have been appointed for the acquisition of the property owned by the City, for the improvement of the water front between Fifteenth and Eighteenth streets, North river, and recommending that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be asked to have title to that portion of the property between Fifteenth and Seventeenth streets, North river, vested in the City. So ordered.

The Auditor was directed to collect the following amounts for work done by the force of the Department in accordance with reports of the Engineer-in-Chief on Bureau Orders:

No. 1958. Empire City Subway Company, cost of superintending opening of pavement to permit the placing of a subsidiary connection to Pier 40, North river, \$4.95.

No. 1959. Empire City Subway Company, cost of superintending opening of pavement in front of Pier 35, North river, to permit the placing of a subsidiary connection to said pier, \$4.95.

No. 1960. Empire City Subway Company, cost of superintending opening of pavement in front of Pier 26, North river, to permit the placing of a subsidiary connection to said pier, \$4.95.

No. 1961. Empire City Subway Company, cost of superintending opening of pavement in front of Pier 44, North river, to permit the placing of a subsidiary connection to said pier, \$4.95.

No. 1962. Stephen Ransom, cost of superintending opening of pavement to permit repairs to water pipe leading to Pier 39, North river, \$4.95.

The Auditor was also directed to collect from the Department of Street Cleaning the sum of \$805.80, being the cost of material, labor, etc., supplied to said Department in connection with work of repairing the dumping board at the foot of Division avenue, Borough of Brooklyn.

The following actions were taken in regard to employees:

From the Municipal Civil Service Commission—

1st. In relation to the desired change in title of James Doran from Laborer to Diver's Tender. The Board of Examiners in the Department having certified that James Doran is qualified to discharge the duties of Diver's Tender, said Doran was appointed Diver's Tender with compensation at the rate of 43 cents per hour from January 23, 1904.

2d. Stating that they have noted upon their records the action taken by the former Commissioner of Docks in reinstating George Vigor as a Laborer in the Department. Filed.

3d. Stating that they have no eligible list for the position of Machinist, and that emergency appointments can therefore be made. Thomas F. Cooke and Thomas Keeley were appointed Machinists temporarily, with compensation at the rate of 50 cents per hour while employed.

4th. Stating that the salary of Lucius C. Higgins, Clerk, at the rate of \$1,800 per annum, will be passed upon the payroll when presented. Approved.

5th. Stating that John Hauck failed to pass examination for transfer to position of Watchman. Filed.

From the Engineer-in-Chief—

1st. Reporting that Herman Goldberg, who was appointed as Topographical Draughtsman in the Department on October 20, 1903, has failed to report for duty, and recommending that his appointment be canceled. Appointment canceled January 16, 1904.

2d. Recommending that the salary of Berthold Sommer, Clerk, be fixed at \$2,400 per annum. Salary increased to \$2,400 per annum January 21, 1904.

From John McBride—Stating that he is unable to do laboring work; that he is a veteran of the Civil War, and asking that he be transferred to the position of Watchman. McBride was cited to appear before the Commissioner on January 16, 1904, and it having been ascertained that he is unable to perform laboring work, said McBride was transferred to the position of Watchman, with compensation at the rate of 25 cents per hour while employed, subject to approval by Municipal Civil Service Commission.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either enclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
