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### BOARD OF ELECTIONS.

Meeting of the Board of Elections held Monday, August 29, 1904, at 2 o'clock P. M.

Present—Commissioners Voorhis, Page, Maguire and Fuller.

The reading of the minutes of the meetings of the Board held on the 2d, 10th, 16th, 23d and 26th inst. was dispensed with.

The following communications were received and disposed of as stated, viz.:

From Martin B. Brown Company, dated the 27th inst., in regard to procuring primary ballot paper from Vernon Brothers & Co. Communication filed and a copy thereof ordered to be transmitted to Vernon Brothers & Co.

From Jas. J. Kehoe, "Executive Member," dated Albany, August 28, 1904, in regard to the ballot boxes used "at the primary held in the Ninth Assembly District March 29, 1904." Filed.

From the Chief Clerk of the Manhattan Borough office, dated the 29th inst., transmitting a communication received at his office from Captain John D. Herlihy, Twenty-ninth Police Precinct, reporting that the premises designated for use as the polling place in the Twentieth Election District, Thirty-second Assembly District, New York County, at the primary election to be held on the 30th inst., viz., candy store at No. 2080 Second avenue, have been destroyed by fire, and recommending the designation of the vacant store at No. 2081 Second avenue in place thereof.

On motion, it appearing that the premises heretofore designated for use as the polling place for the primary election to be held on August 30, 1904, in the Twentieth Election District, Thirty-second Assembly District, New York County, viz., candy store at No. 2080 Second avenue, have been destroyed by fire, the vacant store at No. 2081 Second avenue, Borough of Manhattan, was designated for such use in place thereof.
