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Dr. W. H. Smith, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows: From January 30 to February 12, inclusive, the following operations were perat all of which the Attending Surgeons of their Assistants except in one instance (fourth gynaecological division): Bellevue Hospital, 97; Gouverneur Hospital, 30; Harlem Hospital, 34, and Fordham Hospital, 20.

A satisfactory attendance of the Visiting Physicians and Surgeons at the various hospitals during the month of January has to be reported.

In accordance with the rules a fire drill was held at Bellevue Hospital on February 2 and 10; at Gouverneur Hospital on February 2 and 10; at Harlem Hospital on February 1 and 8, and at Fordham Hospital on February 1 and 11.

Since the last meeting Miss Grace Armstrong, Nurse, ill with scarlet fever and diphtheria and Dr. Stimson, a member of the house staff, ill with scarlet fever, have been sent to the Minturn Hospital.

Several Special Nurses required for emergency cases have been authorized, and approval is asked for.

A requisition, approved by Dr. Norris, Director of Laboratories, has been received from the Cornell Division, asking to have one of their small laboratories in Pavilions A and B equipped for special examinations, cultures, vaccines and chemical analyses, which cannot be made by Internes. The apparatus required will cost about \$800. It is recommended that it be allowed, with the distinct understanding that the instruments placed in this laboratory shall be moved to the main pathological building as soon as the same shall become available for this work.

Attention is called to the following report of work done by the Egg Inspector of this Department, from January 18 to February 3, a period of eighteen days: 7.350 dozen eggs received: 3,120 dozen eggs rejected.

Richard D. Healy, orderly, employed in this Department for some years, became ill on November 13, and was treated in the wards of the hospital. He was continued on the roll until December 13, then dropped. Later it was learned that he was a veteran. He was notified on February 10 to report for duty on Friday, February 11.

He has not done so. It is recommended that charges be preferred against him for failure to report for duty, and for incompetency. In regard to the request of the Gouverneur Hospital Medical Board, it is recommended that, inasmuch as an Interpreter does not appear to be necessary, the request

In the Budget schedules for Gouverneur Hospital for 1910 three Coal Passers are allowed at \$2 a day. The work is now done by two Hospital Helpers at \$40 a month. From the list submitted it is not possible to select men who are as capable of doing the work as are the present incumbents. It is therefore recommended that the present incumbents be continued, and that a revision of schedules to cover them be authorized.

In the matter of the serving room of the new Nurses' residence, it appears that a ceiling ventilator was provided for in the plans and specifications, but was omitted, and should have been furnished and installed by the contractor.

apparently has no intention of so doing. It is recommended that the contract be declared off, and that the work be done by the departmental painters.

Inasmuch as permission has not yet been obtained to buy fresh fruits and vegetables for 1910 in the open maket, an advertisement is submitted herewith for obtaining fresh fruits and vegetables under contract until May 31. In the mean time orders have been issued to stand the surplus of fresh fruits and vegetables the surplus of the s have been issued to stop the purchase of fresh fruits and vegetables throughout this Department. It is my opinion that the purchase of fresh fruits and vegetables on contract is not only very unsatisfactory, but is unbusinesslike, and I recommend against the same, if, by any possibility, permission can be obtained to purchase fresh fruits and vegetables in the open market.

An advertisement for bids on coal in sufficient quantity to last until April 30 is herewith submitted. It appears from investigation that it is possible to burn buckwheat coal No. 1 instead of the pea coal now used at the Allied Hospitals. The former is much cheaper coal, and it is recommended that it be substituted for pea coal in this advertisement, and if, at the end of two months, it is found that it is entirely satisfactory, that it be permanently used at the Allied Hospitals.

It appears that if the new male dormitory is to be used at all prior to completion of the new boiler house, temporary pumping facilities must be provided. It is recommended that this matter be referred to the Building Committee.

A letter is herewith submitted from Mr. Hurley, representing the Hotel Belmont.

Mr. Hurley has a daughter in the training school in her first year, and on account of her recent illness he came often to the hospital and had ample opportunity to observe hospital work. Mr. Hurley offers ten casks of china, with the hope that it might be of use in this hospital. He states that they have difficulty in disposing of it all, inasmuch as they do not use any china that is chipped at all. It is recommended that the same be accepted.

It is recommended that the services of Mr. Frederick A. Ross, as Fire Expert, be continued during the year 1910.

It appears from the list of those eligible for appointment as Assistant Resident Physician, in charge of the alcoholic ward, that none of those willing to accept the position have proper qualifications for the same. It is recommended that steps be taken to enable the Board to make this appointment by selection, and not from the Civil Service list.

The plans and specifications for the proposed covered passageway are not approved by the Building Department on the ground that it is not fireproof. In view thereof, and inasmuch as the plans and specifications would need to be changed in the event of the extension of the psychopathic ward, it is recommended that the contract be not awarded at this time, and that the deposit of the lowest bidder be returned.

On December 5, 1906, bids were received for installation of a fire alarm system at Bellevue Hospital. Joseph Cherry was the lowest bidder at \$910. The deposit was returned March 18, 1907. Inasmuch as the work has never been done, and it is evident that it was decided not to have this work done, and inasmuch as a new appropriation has been greated for installation of the first black of the first leaves the second of the first leaves the first le propriation has been granted for installation of the fire alarm system, it is recommended that this amount of corporate stock be reported to the Comptroller in the Corporate Stock Budget as not required.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the General Medical Superintendent was instructed to submit a report of the steps necessary to secure the proper training of male orderlies. The amended rules in regard to medical appointments, as recommended for

adoption by the Committee on Rules on January 25 and made a special order of business for this meeting, were reconsidered, and, upon motion, duly seconded and carried, it was

Resolved, That the rules in regard to medical appointments be and hereby are adopted, as follows:

Rules Adopted June 25, 1906.

1. The Medical Board shall receive all applications for appointment, which shall be in such form as the Board of Trustees may prescribe, and thoroughly examine the qualifications of all applicants to fill vacancies or otherwise on the medical staff of the hospital, and shall report in writing, with recommendation, to the Board of Trustees on all such applicants.

2. Such report and recommendation shall thereupon be referred to a Conference Committee, consisting of two members of the Board of Trustees, appointed by the President, and of two members of the Medical Board of the hospital, appointed by such Board, for consideration and report to the Trustees. Rules Adopted January 28, 1908, Amended February 15, 1910.

3. All applications for appointment on the medical staff of any hospital in this Department shall be made in writing, and give the date and place of graduation, both in medicine and arts, if so graduated; whether an Interne in a hospital, if so, when and where; whether connected with any out-patient department, if so, when, where, and in what capacity; whether connected with any hospital as a member of the attending or assistant attending staff; whether connected with any medical college, if so, in what capacity; publications, if any.

4. The applications shall be accompanied by indorsements from three or more

regular physicians in good professional standing.

5. Applications for the position of Attending Physician, Surgeon or Gynaecologist shall be from men of not less than ten years' professional experience. Application for appointment to the positions of Assistant Attending Physician, Surgeon or Gynaecol ogist shall be from physicians of not less than five years' experience; for Adjunct Assistant Attending Physician, Surgeon or Gynaecologist, from men of not less than three years' professional experience, except that such standards shall not be exacted in cases of persons already in the service (excluding the house staffs of the several hospitals), who may be recommended for promotion.

6. All applications shall be transmitted to the Board of Trustees in compliance with the rule of June 25, 1906.

Consideration was given to the question of the assignment of special Nurses for patients receiving treatment for the alcohol and drug habit under the care of Dr. Alexander Lambert. After a discussion, it was, upon motion, duly seconded and car-

ried,
Resolved, That two special Nurses should be appointed for the care of these cases at present.

MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting Held Monday, January 24, 1910.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York, Held at the Offices of the Commission, No. 299 Broadway, on Monday, January 24, 1910, at 10 o'clock a. m.

Present-President John C. McGuire, and Commissioners Richard Welling and Alexander Keogh.

The President, Mr. John C. McGuire, presided.

On the recommendation of the Committee on Appeals, the examination papers of Mary Kelly, of No. 150 East Fifty-second street, an applicant for the position of Police Matron, who had signed her number to the report paper, were forwarded to the Examiners to be rated and returned to the Commission for final consideration.

On the recommendation of the Committee, the appeal of Rhoda R. Ross, of No. 67 Seventh avenue, Brooklyn, an applicant for the position of Nurse, that her papers he rated was denied, it appearing from the records that the candidate withdrew from the examination before the same was completed.

On the recommendation of the Committee, the appeal of Frank J. Sharp, of No. 2037 Third avenue, New York City, for a re-rating on his Government paper was denied, no errors of marking or rating having been shown.

On the recommendation of the Committee, the agreal of Seymour P. Bradley, a candidate for the position of Inspector of Supplies and Repairs, for a re-rating on his arithmetic paper was denied, no errors of marking or rating having been shown.

The appeal of John Petz, a candidate for promotion to Engineer of Steamer, Fire Department, that his papers be rated was denied, he having been disqualified for communicating. The report of the Examiners relative to the disqualification of candidate 223 in the

examination for first grade Clerk was refered back for further information. The appeal of Frank Hehn, Jr., of No. 414 East Eighty-first street, that his papers in the examination for promotion to Engineer of Steamer, Fire Department, be rated was again denied, he having been disqualified for signing his name to the paper on rules and regulations.

A report was presented from Mr. Thomas C. Murray, Assistant Chief Examiner Charge of Promotions, dated January 17, 1910, relative to the request of Miss Isabella A. Clark, a second grade Typewriting Copyist in the Tenement House Department, for permission to amend her application for promotion to third grade Type-writing Copyist to read: "third grade Stenographer and Typewriter." The report stated that under date of January 13, 1910, Commissioner Murphy had requested that all Typewriting Copyists who had filed applications for promotion to Stenographer and Typewriter be permitted to take the examination. On motion, the request was

A report was presented from Mr. Thomas C. After consideration of the matter, the Secretary was directed to place the names of Messrs, Hogrefe and Marrin upon a preferred list of General Foreman.



A pier layout is therefore shown in red lines, and when such piers are constructed, they will tend to greatly relieve the wharfage congestion in this vicinity. There is embodied in the plan a proposed modification of the bulkhead line, and request for same has been made to the War Detartment, which will no doubt be approved. The marginal street, wharf or place, as shown on the plan adopted December 19, 1888 is to be discontinued, as there is no necessity for it; adequate access to the proposed piers can be had by the way of East street.
