At a meeting of the Board of Docks held January 5, 1888.

The minutes of the meeting held December 30, 1887, were read and approved.

The following communications were received, read and,

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, action being taken where necessary, as stated to wit:

From E. V. Loew, Comptroller—Transmitting four maps of plans of improvement of the water-front between Eighty-sixth street, East river, and Third avenue, Harlem river, approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on the 19th day of December, 1887.

On motion, the said plans were ordered to be filed in the Department.

From Theodore W. Myers, Comptroller—Stating that the Counsel to the Corporation had made a settlement with the New York, Lake Erie and Western Railroad Company for rent of the north half of Pier 29, North river, from February 1, 1880, to August 12, 1881, for the sum of \$7,500, and enclosing check for that amount drawn to the order of E. V. Loew, Comptroller.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to notify the Chief Clerk that the claim against the said company had been settled by the Counsel to the Corporation for \$7,500.

From F. T. Volk—Requesting permission to retain boat-house located on a large rock near the foot of West One Hundred and Fifty-eighth street, North river. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

From New York Litterage Company—Requesting permit for derrick on south side of Pier 6, East river. The action of the President in issuing a permit, the derrick to remain thereat during the will of the Board, was approved.

From F. W. J. Hurst, manager National Line of Steamships—Requesting use of Pier, new 43, North river.

From John H. Schinnagel—Requesting permission to lay a new drain-pipe from No. 90 South street through bulkhead near Pier 21, East river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.

From James Cruikshank, agent—Requesting permission to drive piles at Pier 3, East river. The action of the President in issuing permit, the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, was approved.

BOARD OF ARMY COMMISSIONERS.

MAYOR'S OFFICE, No. 61 CHAMBERS STREET,
NEW YORK, January 11, 1888.

A meeting of the Army Board was held this day, at 1.30 P.M., at the office of his Honor Mayor Hewitt.

Present—The Mayor, the President Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments, the Commissioner of the Public Works Department, and Colonel Emmons Clark.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

A letter was read from Messrs. A. R. Whitney & Co., relating to balance claimed to be due them on one of their contracts for Twelfth Regiment Army work. The Clerk was directed to see the Auditor about the missing papers and do what was proper in facilitating the payment.

NEW YORK, December 20, 1887.

M. COLEMAN, Esq., Secretary of the Army Board of the City of New York:

DEAR SIR—In June, 1885, we think the date was the 16th instant, the Army Board passed a resolution that a contract be made with us for furnishing the window guards for the drill-room of the Twelfth Regiment Army and for furnishing steel inside shutters for windows of drill-room under galleries.

The sum to be paid for the guards was \$792, and for the shutters, \$171. The work was done, approved by the architect, and the Army Board, in the usual manner, ordered said bills to be paid.

We obtained from the Comptroller the proper amount for the guards, but payment was deferred on the shutters till the Auditor could satisfy himself that said shutters had been properly ordered, he thinking this work was merely a change, and was in violation of a contract that we had previously made with the Army Board.

We then sent to the Comptroller's office your order for us to do the work, and in fact all the documents we had relating to the matter, and subsequently, for the purpose of more clearly explaining the matter, gave to the Comptroller a tracing showing that the work done was not a change but was additional specific work made necessary by the fact that galleries were not provided for in the original plan, and that special windows had to be provided under the galleries for the purpose of lighting the space there.

We have called several times during the past year for this money, but could not obtain it, for the reason that the papers could not be found by the Auditor, who thinks now they were possibly returned to the Army Board for further information.

We now ask that the Army Board cause duplicate documents to be issued to us, so that we may obtain the money due us for two years past, or if the originals are in the hands of the Army Board that same may be returned to the Auditor, so that a settlement can be made with us, as we understand that now we can obtain our money if the documents be forthcoming.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be asked to concur in the appropriation of \$225 from the General Army Fund to the account of the Eighth Regiment Army, and also in the sum of \$260 from the same fund to the account of the Twenty-second Regiment Army to pay the bills of Ammerman & Ford for surveying and making soundings and calculations of the sites for said armories, and that vouchers for the amounts be forwarded for payment.

A letter was read from Captain Thomas Killilea, of the Twenty-second Precinct, in relation to the Twelfth Regiment Army. It was laid on the table.

If liable, he must also answer in person, giving full and correct name, residence, etc., etc. No attention paid to letters.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called to pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents.

All good citizens will aid the cause of justice, and secure reliable and respectable jurors, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States jurors are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. RULES AND REGULATIONS ESTABLISHED for the government and proper care of piers, bulkheads, slips and other wharf property under the provisions of sections 711 and 717 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, and Chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, to take effect on and after

JANUARY 1, 1888.
