HEALTH DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, New York, November 30, 1881.

The Board met this day. The bids for erection of a hospital for contagious diseases, were opened, as follows : P. K. Horgan, \$74.000 and \$4 per cubic foot for rock blasting. Robinson & Wallace, \$77,700, and \$2.90 per cubic foot for rock blasting. Mahoney Bros., \$64,900, and \$1 per cubic foot for rock blasting.
