

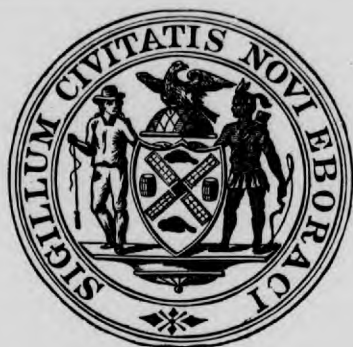

### POLICE DEPARTMENT.

Report for the Quarter ending June 30, 1878.

POLICE DEPARTMENT—CITY OF NEW YORK,

To the Honorable SMITH ELY, JR.,  
Mayor of the City of New York:

SIR—Pursuant to section 27 of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, the Board of Police of the Police Department of the City of New York, hereby respectfully submit the following report of the operations and transactions of the Police Department, for the three months ending June 30, 1878.

#### REPORT.

On the 30th day of June, 1878, the number of members of the force, of the several grades, including Surgeons, was 2,539.

#### SICK TIME.

The time lost by members of the Police Force, by reason of sickness, disability and injuries, for the quarter ending June 30, 1878, and the details thereof, are shown in the annexed table, marked "A," from which it will be seen that the time lost was 6,198 days:
