

THE CITY RECORD.



The 937 deaths represent a death-rate of 28.40, against 29.82 for the previous week and 42.07 for the corresponding week of 1891. Contagious and infectious diseases showed a considerable decrease, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever, typhus fever and small-pox being respectively 109, 448, 229, 11, 2 and 20, against 143, 502, 250, 11, 7 and 16 for the previous week, a total of 819 against 929. Diphtheria increased below Canal street, between Broadway and the Bowery, between Division and Fourteenth streets, west of Norfolk street and Avenue B, and between Fourteenth and Twenty-sixth streets, East, the decrease being most marked between Fortieth and Eighty-sixth streets, East. Measles increased markedly below Liberty street, and between Canal and Fourteenth streets, on the west side, decreasing, as a rule, elsewhere. Scarlet fever increased between Four-teenth and Twenty-sixth streets, West, and between Fortieth and Eighty-sixth streets, West, decreasing, as a rule, elsewhere, the decrease being most noticeable above Eighty-sixth streets, West, the 20 cases of small-pox were below Fourteenth street.
