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ORDINANCE Relating to Hay and Straw [To take effect March 7, 1875.]

AN ORDINANCE to amend Article II. of Chapter XXXVI. of the Revised Ordinances of 1866. The Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, do ordain as follows :

SECTION 1. Article II. of Chapter XXXVI. of the Revised Ordinances of 1866, is hereby amended by adding thereto two additional sections, as follows :

SEC. 14. Hereafter it shall not be lawful for any SEC. 14. Hereatter it shall not be having for any person to sell, or offer for sale, within the corpo-rate limits of the City of New York, any hay or straw by the bale, unless the exact gross and net weight shall be legibly and distinctly marked on every such bale of hay or straw, under a penalty of ten dollars for each bale of hay or straw so sold or offered for sale in contravention of the provis-long of the ordinance. ions of this ordinance. SEC. 16. The Commissioners of Police are here-

SEC. 16. The Commissioners of Police are here-by directed to cause the provisions of the ordi-nance hereby amended to be rigidly enforced. SEC. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in-consistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed. SEC. 3. The ordinance shall take effect five months after the date of its adoption.
