

The 1,056 deaths represent a death-rate of 29.32, against 30.31 for the previous week and 27.30 for the corresponding week of 1892.

Contagious and infectious diseases show a decided decrease, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever, typhus fever and small-pox being respectively 97, 51, 162, 20, 14 and 6, against 122, 132, 201, 16, 4 and 14 for the previous week, a total of 450 against 489. Diphtheria increased slightly in the Fifth, Ninth, Fourteenth, Fifteenth and markedly in the Twenty-third Ward, while there was a notable decrease in the Eleventh, Twelfth and Nineteenth Wards. The increase of measles was chiefly in the Ninth, Twelfth and Seventeenth Wards, while the decrease was most noticeable in the Thirteenth, Eighteenth, Nineteenth and Twentieth Wards. Scarlet fever increased in the Nineteenth, Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, but the decrease was very marked in the Seventh, Twelfth, Thirteenth, Sixteenth and Twenty-second Wards. Nine of the 20 cases of typhoid fever were above Fortieth street, and 6 of the remaining 11 were below Fourteenth street. Ten of the 14 cases of typhus fever and 5 of the 6 cases of small-pox were above Fourteenth street.
