

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

The 737 deaths represent a death-rate of 19.56 against 20.42 for the previous week, and 22.10 for the corresponding week of 1893. Contagious and infectious diseases show a slight increase, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox being respectively 108, 31, 28, 26 and 3 against 100, 16, 28, 37 and 1 for the previous week, a total of 196 against 182. The increase of diphtheria was mainly in the Tenth and Twelfth Wards, and the decrease in the Twenty-first Ward. The increase of measles was most marked in the Tenth and Nineteenth Wards, and the decrease in the Seventh, Twenty-first, Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards. The increase of scarlet fever was chiefly in the Seventh, Tenth, Thirteenth, Seventeenth and Twenty-third Wards, and the decrease in the Ninth and Twenty-second Wards. Thisteen of the 26 cases of typhoid fever were above Fortieth street, and six were below Fourteenth street. The cases of small-pox were on the west side, 2 below Canal street, and I above Fortieth street. By order of the Board.

LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT.
