

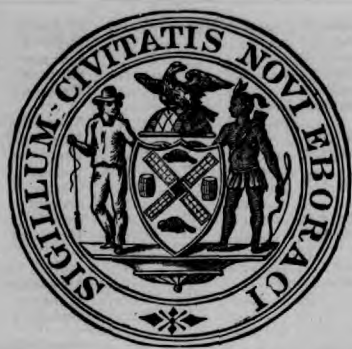

GAS COMMISSION.

THURSDAY, December 2, 1897.

The officers designated in section 69 of the New York City Consolidation Act met in the office of the Mayor at 1.30 P. M., Thursday, December 2, 1897.

All were present, viz.:

Hon. William L. Strong, Mayor; Ashbel P. Fitch, Comptroller; Charles H. T. Collis, Commissioner of Public Works.

The Secretary presented the following papers:

A resolution of the Board of Aldermen requesting that Hudson street, from Christopher street to Fourteenth street, be lighted by electric lamps. The Secretary reported there is no subway, and was directed to so inform the Board of Aldermen.

A resolution of the Board of Aldermen requesting that Leroy and Morton street be lighted by electric lamps. The Secretary reported no subway facilities, and was directed to so inform the Board of Aldermen.

A resolution of the Board of Aldermen requesting that Minetta lane and Minetta street be lighted by electric lamps. The Secretary reported there is no subway facilities, and he had caused additional gas lamps to be erected therein.

A resolution of the Board of Aldermen requesting an electric lamp at northwest corner of Twenty-third street and Ninth avenue. The Secretary reported that a lamp had been placed there. A resolution of the Board of Aldermen to light an electric lamp on West Washington place, about fifty feet west of Macdougall street. Secretary reported that this lamp had been a private lamp placed there by the late occupant of the premises. The paper was laid over.

A resolution of the Board of Aldermen requesting that Seventh avenue, from One Hundred and Tenth street to One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, and One Hundred and Forty-fifth street, from Lenox avenue to Harlem river, be lighted by electric lamps. The Secretary reported no subways there, and the paper was laid over.

A resolution of the Board of Aldermen requesting that Bailey avenue, from Sedgwick avenue to Kingsbridge road, be lighted by electric lamps. The Secretary reported that there were no lights of any kind on this avenue, and seven electric lamps were authorized to be placed on same.

A resolution of the Board of Aldermen requesting that Stebbins avenue, between One Hundred and Sixty-fifth and One Hundred and Sixty-sixth streets, be lighted by electric lamps. The Secretary reported that two lamps would be required, and the same were authorized.

A petition from property-owners for the lighting by electric lamps of One Hundred and Ninety-second street, adjoining Poe Park. Secretary reported that it would require about three lamps, and the same were authorized.

A resolution of the Board of Aldermen requesting the Commission for Lighting the City to investigate the merits of the Sunlight Incandescent Gas-lamp. Which was referred to the Secretary.

A communication from the Department of Parks requesting that lamps be placed on the bicycle path on Riverside Drive. The Secretary reported that as the contract for lighting authorizes the Commissioner of Public Works to increase or diminish the number of lamps, and as the New York and New Jersey Globe Gas-light Company, Limited, has a contract for lighting lamps on Riverside Drive, the additional lamps have been placed there.

A communication from the Department of Parks requesting that Welsbach lamps be placed on the lamp-posts around the circle at Fifty-ninth street and Eighth avenue. A resolution was adopted authorizing the placing of four electric lamps around the circle.

A petition from property-owners requesting that Railroad avenue, from One Hundred and Thirty-eighth to One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, be lighted by electric lamps.

On motion, thirteen lamps were authorized.

Several petitions from property-owners of Unionport and West Chester, with two resolutions of the Board of Aldermen, requesting additional electric lamps at Unionport and West Chester, also a letter from Hon. F. D. Pavey, in relation to the same were received. The Secretary presented the following report of the Engineer of Finance Department and himself on these papers:

Hon. WILLIAM L. STRONG, Mayor; Hon. ASHBEL B. FITCH, Comptroller; Hon. CHARLES H. T. COLLIS, Commissioner of Public Works:

GENTLEMEN—In the matter of the several papers and petitions from citizens of Unionport and West Chester, and letter from Hon. Frank D. Pavey, requesting that additional electric lamps be placed in Unionport and West Chester, which were referred to us for examination and report, we beg leave to report. That we have made personal examinations of very many of the streets mentioned in the applications, and we find that there are more or less houses on some of the streets on which there are at present no lights, and we would recommend the following additional lamps:

- 4 lamps on Lyons avenue.
- 4 lamps on Commonwealth avenue.
- 4 lamps St. Lawrence avenue.
- 6 lamps on Columbus avenue, between West Farms road and Van Nest.
- 1 lamp on Main street, between Mary street and Halperin street.
- 5 lamps on Washington avenue, between Westchester avenue and West Farms road.
- 2 lamps on Silver street, between West Farms road and Main street.
- 1 lamp on Glebe avenue at Lyon avenue.
- 1 lamp on West Farms road at West Farms Bridge.
- 1 lamp on West Farms road at Van Nest Railroad station.
- 1 lamp on West Farms road, corner of Forest street.
- 1 lamp on Harlem railroad or Westchester avenue, opposite St. Peter's church.
- 1 lamp on Harlem railroad or Westchester avenue, between Avenue B and Glebe avenues.
- 1 lamp on Harlem railroad at drawbridge over Bronx creek.
- 12 lamps on White Plains roads, between Bronxdale and Williamsbridge road
- 1 lamp on Poplar street, south of Main street.
- 1 lamp on Thomas street.
- 1 lamp on Fifteenth street, between Avenues A and B.
- 1 lamp on Twelfth street, between Avenues A and B.
- 1 lamp on Second street, between Avenues B and C.

A petition was presented for the lighting of ninety-one various additional streets in the late Town of West Chester, which was laid over; also a petition for lighting five additional streets in West Chester, which was laid over. A paper was submitted through the Hon. Frank D. Pavey for electric lamps on forty-five additional streets in the late Town of West Chester, which was laid over.

A petition was received from property-owners of City Island requesting that the streets of City Island and others in Pelham Bay Park be lighted by electric lamps; also a communication from the Pelham Electric-light and Power Company, which had been referred to the Engineer of the Finance Department and himself for report, and the Secretary presented the following report:

NEW YORK, November 30, 1897.

Hon. WILLIAM L. STRONG, Mayor; Hon. ASHBEL P. FITCH, Comptroller; Hon. CHARLES H. T. COLLIS, Commissioner of Public Works:

GENTLEMEN—In the matter of the petition for electric lamps on City Island, and a letter from the Pelham Electric-light Company requesting the same, which were referred to us for examination and report, we beg leave to submit the following:

Main street, from Baychester Station to Pelham or Shore road, 1,600 feet; Pelham or Shore road, from Main street to city line at New Rochelle, 14,700 feet.

Old Boston road, from Pelham or Shore road north to city line at Mt. Vernon, 5,700 feet.

The road from Bartow Station to City Island bridge, 7,900 feet.

These roads are the old original roads, which are now within the confines of Pelham Bay Park. There are no houses on any of the same or near them, excepting such houses owned by the City as belong in Pelham Bay Park. On the Shore road within New Rochelle it is lighted with oil lamps about 600 feet apart. The road from Bartow Station to City Island bridge contains a horse car line, and this road is the only means of reaching City Island.

City Island is now lighted by 103 naphtha lamps at \$22 each per year. The Pelham Electric-light Company desire to light all the streets on City Island, including all such streets as are not lighted, such as King avenue, from Elizabeth street to Terrace Point, 1,300 feet, on which there are six houses.

Minneford avenue, from Terrace Point to Ditmars street, 3,050 feet, on which there are six houses between Terrace Point and Bowne street; between Bowne street and Ditmars street there is nothing but a common; no houses.

King avenue, from Beach street to Ditmars street, 950 feet, which has no houses and is nothing but a common.

Southerland street, from Minneford avenue to the East Shore, 500 feet, not opened.

Elizabeth street, from Minneford avenue to the East Shore, not opened.

Cross street, from Main street to the East Shore, 600 feet, one house.

Beach street, from Main street to the East Shore, 750 feet. No houses and not graded.

Bowne street, from West Shore to East Shore, not opened.

Ditmars street, from East Shore to West Shore, 1,600 feet. There is one house between Main street and East Shore and three houses between Main street and West Shore, which has now two naphtha lamps.

Cemetery street, from Main street to Lafayette avenue, 600 feet, on which there is one house and a greenhouse.

Bay street, from Main street to West Shore, 1,500 feet. There are six houses and two naphtha lamps.

Vickery place, from Main street to Lafayette avenue, 400 feet. It is only a narrow lane.

Fordham avenue, West Shore to East Shore, twenty-three houses, 2,425 feet. It has five naphtha lamps.

Orchard street, from Orchard lane to East of Main street, 1,200 feet, seventeen houses, five naphtha lamps.

Prospect street, from West Shore to East Shore, 2,000 feet, thirty houses. There are twelve naphtha lamps.

Scofield avenue, from West Shore to East Shore, 1,800 feet, eighteen houses. There are ten naphtha lamps.

Centre avenue, from West Shore to Main street, 1,175 feet. There are nine houses. One naphtha lamp.

Pilot avenue, from West Shore to East Shore, 1,550 feet. There are thirteen houses. Five naphtha lamps.

Franklin avenue, from Main street to East Shore, 600 feet. There are four houses and two shops. No lamps.

Horton street, from Main street to East Shore, 675 feet. There are four houses and no lamps.

Washington avenue, from Main street to West Shore, 650 feet. There are three houses and no lamps.

South Elizabeth street, from West Shore to East Shore, 1,250 feet. Ten houses; no lamps.

Belden lane, from Main street to East Shore, 425 feet. This is a narrow lane, with three houses and no lamps.

Lafayette avenue, from Ditmars street to Fordham avenue. There are five houses and no lamps.

Orchard lane, from Orchard street to Fordham avenue, 250 feet. No houses and not graded.

Scofield lane, from Centre avenue to Prospect street. This is a narrow lane and has no houses.

North street, from Fordham avenue to East Shore, 600 feet. No houses.

Main street, from City Island Bridge to South Shore. This is the main street on City Island. It is quite well built up and is now lighted from end to end with naphtha lamps.

Bridge street, from Main street to Minneford avenue, 300 feet. There is one house and it is lighted by naphtha lamps.

Terrace Point, from Minneford avenue to King avenue, 300 feet. There are four houses, and it is lighted by naphtha lamps.

City Island had no street lamps of any kind until after the annexation of the territory to this city, when the citizens there petitioned for naphtha lamps; and nearly all of the streets are now lighted by naphtha lamps.

The Pelham Electric-light Company informs us that it will charge 40 cents per night, or \$146 per year, for each arc lamp, \$22.50 per year for each incandescent lamp, while the naphtha lamps are now lighted at a cost of \$22.

The lighting of the island, as also the road from City Island to Bartow Station, would cost as follows:

65 arc lamps, at \$146 per year.....	\$9,490 00
182 incandescent lamps, at \$22.50 per year.....	4,095 00
182 naphtha lamps, at \$22 per year.....	4,004 00

We think that the incandescent lighting would be the best—first, because it costs less than one-half the cost of arc lighting, and second, because the road from City Island to Bartow Station is a very narrow road, lined with trees on each side, and this road cannot be well lighted by arc lights, because the lamps would be hid by the foliage of the trees.

We would, therefore, recommend that the streets of City Island and the road from City Island to Bartow Station be lighted by about 182 incandescent electric lamps.

A petition was received from property-owners on the upper west side of the city, requesting that the streets be lighted by electric lamps. The Secretary reported that there were no subways in that part of the city, and the paper was laid over.

A petition was received from property-owners for electric lamps on Seventh avenue, north of One Hundred and Tenth street. Which was laid over.

Communications were presented by the Mayor from the Brush Electric Illuminating Company, Edison Electric Illuminating Company, Mount Morris Electric-light Company, and the Manhattan Electric-light Company, furnishing a list of additional streets in which the companies could light lamps during the year 1898, if so ordered. Which were referred to the Engineer of Finance Department and the Secretary of the Board.

A petition was received from property-owners requesting that Park avenue, from One Hundred and Tenth street to the Harlem river, be lighted by electric lamps; also a letter from Mr. William A. Soles, President of the Park Avenue Property Owners' Association in relation to the same.

A communication was received from Mr. E. A. Leslie, Vice-President of the Manhattan Electric-light Company, in relation to the lighting of Park avenue, north of One Hundred and Tenth street. Which papers are referred to the Secretary for a report.

The Commissioners of Public Works presented the following paper:

DECEMBER 2, 1897.

Hon. WILLIAM L. STRONG, Chairman Gas Commission:

DEAR SIR—I desire to call the attention of the Gas Commission to the lighting of Fifth avenue. With the exception of seven blocks this avenue is now resurfaced with asphalt from Waverley place to Central Park, and the whole improvement will be completed during the present month. All obstructions upon the sidewalks, such as old gas lamp-posts, fire-hydrants and carriage-steps have been removed, and an eight-inch smooth-dressed curb substituted for the five-inch quarry dressed curb.

The finest hotels and restaurants and handsomest club-houses in the world are located on this avenue. It is the popular line of travel for all pleasure vehicles and the favorite promenade for pedestrians. From sunset until after midnight this great thoroughfare is thronged to its full capacity with carriages going to and from railroad ferries and stations, theatres, hotels and restaurants, while thousands of people on foot are crossing and recrossing the street at every intersection. Fifth avenue is to New York what the Thames Embankment is to London, and the Grand Boulevards are to Paris. It has been in the past, and ought to be in the future, the pride of New York.

What it now needs more than anything else is additional illumination, not only to make it more attractive and famous, but for the better protection of the thousands of citizens who use it. There are at present about three twin electric lights to each block. With your permission I propose to double this number from Fourteenth street to Fifty-ninth street. This would require only the setting of about ninety additional posts, which would be maintained at a cost of \$16,425 per annum.

I do not believe any expenditure could be made which would produce more satisfactory results to the city and its citizens, or which would prove more attractive to the large number of strangers whose visits should, in the interest of our commerce and trade, be encouraged by every available means which does not involve extravagance.

GENTLEMEN—In the matter of the several communications from the Brush, Edison, Mount Morris and Manhattan Electric-light Companies, containing lists of streets and numbers of

additional lamps which the companies state they could light during the year 1898, if so ordered by the Gas Commission, which papers were referred to us for examination and report, we beg leave to report:

That there are 127 various streets on the several lists, covering 700 additional lamps; all of the streets, excepting about five, contain or will contain subway facilities for electric lighting, and the streets are proper thoroughfares for such lighting.

DEAR SIR—I would draw your attention to the fact that this portion of the city has very little public electric lighting of its streets. If you think circumstances justify it, will you not ask the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to include the avenues and principal streets hereabouts in the system of electric lighting as now being arranged for next year.

You have very rightly said that we often go to the City Hall with requests for this section; in defense I would say that large tracts hereabouts which but six or eight years ago were truck farms, even with the streets uncut, are now built up into large blocks of buildings, paying to the City heavy taxes. In short, I doubt if the City revenues from any portion of its territory have increased at such a rapid rate in recent years as from the section west of the Central Park.

It is very important for the University that the lamp-posts where these stand should be taller than the usual pattern and that they should have strong Welsbach burners. I write to ask, in case the University were willing to replace the ordinary lamp-posts by posts of a special design, whether it could obtain the permission to do so, and whether the City, in consideration of the presentation of such posts, would continue to furnish the light for them notwithstanding the more powerful burners that will be needed. If any special action is required by the authorities outside of your own Department, if you will be kind enough to tell me what ought to be done in the premises, I shall be glad to see that the necessary steps are taken if the suggestion commends itself to your judgment.

General Collis submitted the following letter:

NEW YORK, December 10, 1897.

Hon. WILLIAM L. STRONG, President, Gas Commission:

DEAR SIR—As you are aware, Park avenue, from Fifty-sixth to Ninety-sixth street, has been reggraded and resurfaced with asphalt and is becoming an exceedingly popular highway, especially at night time, when it is used by large numbers of carriages and bicycles.

The lighting of the street has always been very poor, and I have asked the Consolidated Gas Company to illuminate it for a few days with Welsbach burners, so that you and the Comptroller can have an opportunity of inspecting it and determining whether it is advisable to incur the additional annual expense for lighting it in this method. Of course, if you disapprove, the burners will be immediately replaced by those of the old type. The additional expense will be \$3,648 per annum.

There are no electric subways on this avenue, otherwise I would submit an alternative proposition for electric light.

DECEMBER 15, 1897.

The officers designated in section 69 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882 met in the office of the Mayor at 12 o'clock M. of Wednesday, December 15, 1897.

Present—Hon. William L. Strong, Mayor; Charles H. T. Collis, Commissioner of Public Works.

The reading of the minutes of the meeting of December 14, 1897, was dispensed with.

The list containing the various streets which could be lighted by electric lamps in 1898 was taken up and considered, and the various streets were ordered to be included in the advertisement, with the proviso that subways were to be applied for and constructed in all of the streets which did not now contain subways for electric lighting.

The lighting of Park avenue, from One Hundred and Tenth street to One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, to be by arc lamps on the sidewalks where practicable, and by incandescent lamps under the railroad structure.

Mr. Michael J. Kelly then addressed the Board in relation to a proposed amendment to the specifications which would permit of bids being received from parties not having an electric light plant, and the proposed amendment was rejected.

The communication from the Commissioner of Public Works in relation to an improvement of the lighting of Fifth avenue, from Fourteenth street to Fifty-ninth street, by doubling the present number of electric lamps, was taken up and considered, and General Collis read extracts from letters which he had received from many hotel proprietors and property-owners highly commending the improvement.

The Mayor then suggested an amendment that the improved lighting should be from Washington Square to Fifty-ninth street, instead of from Fourteenth street to Fifty-ninth street. The Commissioner of Public Works accepted the amendment, and a resolution was then adopted that the lighting of Fifth avenue, from Washington Square to Fifty-ninth street, be improved by doubling the present number of electrical lamps. The Mayor and the Commissioner of Public Works voting in the affirmative.

The communication from the Commissioner of Public Works, in relation to an improvement in the lighting of Park avenue, from Fifty-sixth street to Ninety-sixth street, by the substitution of Welsbach burners in lieu of the present and ancient system of gas burners, was then taken up and considered.

General Collis explained that the avenue could not be lighted by electric lamps for the reason that electric light subways had not been constructed therein.

On motion of the Mayor, the substitution of Welsbach burners on Park avenue, from Fifty-sixth street to Ninety-sixth street, was authorized, the cost not to exceed \$3,648 per annum, the Mayor and Commissioner of Public Works voting in the affirmative.

A communication from Mr. Seth Low in regard to the substitution of Welsbach burners on two city lamp-posts opposite the south court of Columbia University, was taken up and the substitution of Welsbach burners on the two lamp-posts was authorized in case the University should substitute two lamp-posts of a special design in place of the old city lamp-posts.

Wednesday, December 29, 1897, at 12 o'clock M., was designated as the time and the office of the Mayor as the place for receiving and opening the proposals.

DECEMBER 7, 1897.

S. McCORMICK, Esq., Supt. of Lamps and Gas, and Secretary of Gas Commission:

SIR—At a meeting of the Board of Parks, held on the 6th instant, an application of the North River Electric-light and Power Company for permission to erect poles and run wires for the purpose of furnishing electric light on Washington Bridge and Park and on the Harlem River Drive-way, from One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street to Dyckman street, was granted, upon condition that the said wires shall be placed under ground, and also that the work shall be done without expense to this Department, and under the direction of the Superintendent of Parks, who shall designate the number and locations of the poles.

The minutes of December 28, 1897, were read and, on motion, approved.

The following applications being unfinished business of the Department of Buildings as here before constituted, were then considered and passed upon, it being distinctly understood that the action taken thereon was not to be construed as a precedent.

Plan 1136, Alterations to Buildings, 1897—H. G. Knapp, petitioner—To allow a one-story frame extension to be erected on south side of present building, to be used as a summer garden in connection with existing building, south front of said garden to be left open, sides to be covered with sheet metal and roof with plastic slate, or tin; also to utilize the space over present verandas by inclosing and roofing same in the manner shown and described for other portions of building, this roof also to be covered with plastic slate, or tin, all as stated in petition; northeast corner St. Nicholas avenue and One Hundred and Eleventh street. Laid over.

Plan 373, New Buildings, 1897—Israel & Harder, petitioners—To allow doors at head of stairs from cellars to be made of hard wood tinned on inside and painted with a fireproof solution on outside, instead of metal doors originally called for, as stated in petition; south side of Seventy-seventh street, 145 feet east of Madison avenue. Denied.

Plan 1099, Alterations to Buildings, 1897—Henry Elias Brewing Company, petitioners—To allow first-floor beams to remain as they are, buildings to be used as tenement-houses, as stated in petition; east side of First avenue, 25 feet north of Fifty-fourth street. Denied.

Plan 674, New Buildings, 1897—H. Stern, petitioner—To allow open fire-places without trimmer arches to be used, as stated in petition; No. 179 Clinton street. Denied.

Plan 1160, Alterations to Buildings, 1897—William J. Fryer, petitioner—To allow the several walls to be increased one story in height and to remain their present thickness, making building eight stories high and built entirely fireproof; also skylight to be placed on slant of roof tower, above elevator in the staircase inclosure on Laight street, all as stated in petition; Nos. 429 to 433 Greenwich street. Approved, subject to the approval of the construction by the Commissioner of Buildings. Messrs. Fryer and McMillan not voting.

Plan 176, New Buildings, 1897—Harding & Gooch, petitioners—To allow the erection of a pent house on roof, as shown on plan and as stated in petition; Nos. 290 to 294 Broadway. Approved, on condition that the construction is fireproof and found by the Department to be of sufficient strength, subject to the approval of the construction by the Commissioner of Buildings. Mr. Conover not voting.

Plan 933, New Buildings, 1897—Horenburger & Straub, petitioners—To allow oak treads 1 1/2 inches thick to be used on main stairs, under side of said stairs to be wire lathed and plastered; also outside wall of staircase at second story to be 12 inches thick of brick; also inclosing partitions of first-story entrance hall to be constructed of 4-inch channel irons and 4-inch I beams as uprights, set about 2 feet apart, fastened to angle irons at bottom and top, and built in with 4 inches of brickwork; also steel floor beams of first floor in rear part of cellar, to be supported by two 8-inch steel beams and 5-inch cast-iron columns, instead of 8-inch brick wall; also front wall on Ludlow street, to be built with more than 25 per cent. of openings, all as stated in petition; No. 97 Rivington street. Bidders will write out the amount of their estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Payment will be made by a requisition on the Comptroller, in accordance with the terms of the contract.

The form of the contract, including specifications, and showing the manner of payment, will be furnished at the office of the Department, and bidders are cautioned to examine each and all of its provisions carefully, as the Board of Public Charities will insist upon its absolute enforcement in every particular.
