The Board of Examiners met this day, 3.40 P. M.

The roll was called with the following result :

Present—Thomas J. Brady, Commissioner of Buildings for the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, in the chair, and Messrs. Dobbs, Bonner, Fryer, McMillan, Moore, O'Reilly, Conover; absent, Mr. Post.

The minutes of February 1 and 8, 1898, were read and approved.

Petitions were then submitted for approval as follows :

Plan 756, New Buildings, 1897—John Fish, petitioner—To allow first-story brick floor arches between I-beams to be laid in cement and lime mortar, composed of two parts cement and one part machine-made lime mortar, instead of cement mortar, as stated in petition ; Nos. 75 and 77 East One Hundred and Tenth street. Approved on recommendation of Mr. O'Reilly.

Plan 182, New Buildings, 1896—Ernest Flagg, petitioner—To allow reconsideration of decision of Board at meeting held February 1, 1898, so as to permit columns of large interior hall to be fireproofed with steel angles, expanded metal lath and plaster, arranged in such a way that there will be an air space of about three inches between plaster and columns, partitions between columns to be built of blocks, as per sketch and as stated in petition ; northwest corner of Chrystie and Livingston streets. Mr. Flagg appeared before the Board and explained the former petitions made, dated February 25 and May 12, 1896, and stated that the work was completed and that there was put one iron bedstead and a chair in each room ; and it having appeared that the former requirements of the Board were misunderstood, the petition was approved.

Rapp system of fireproof floor construction to be used for the first floor of buildings, as stated in petition ; south side of One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street, 145 feet west of Brown place. Plan 46, New Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow the main entrance halls to be inclosed by 4-inch angle iron partitions, filled in with 4-inch hollow burnt fireproof blocks, as stated in petition ; No. 102 Sullivan street. Petitioners, Schneider & Herter. For summer, gray flannel sack coat, single-breasted, of the same shade, rolling collar, five buttons made like above.

Trousers of the same material, with welt of red cloth on the outer seam.

Cap of the same shade and material as the rest of the uniform, of shape known as the United States Navy Cap, with straight visor of patent leather and patent-leather band held at each end by a white metal button; in front of the cap the officer's number and the words "Special Officer" in white metal.

For summer wear, a hat may be worn of the same style and description as those of letter carriers; in front of the hat the officer's number and words "Special Officer" in white metal; hat to be of pearl grey felt.

Overcoat, double-breasted sack, to be of same color, heavier weight, rolling collar, coat to extend to three inches below the bend of the knee and to button with six buttons, of the style prescribed above, on each side, pockets to show on the outside.

Resolved, That the resolution of the Board of Police, adopted February 2, 1898, requesting the Municipal Assembly to authorize and approve of the location, establishment and provision for station-house purposes of certain premises be amended by adding: The portion of premises required in the Jamaica Town Hall includes eight rooms in the basement, of the following dimensions: 30 by 27½, 44 by 27½, 15 by 17½, 12½ by 17½, 27½ by 17, 27 by 11, 21½ by 27, and 30 by 27. Also in the basement floor ten brick cells. Upon the first floor three rooms, the dimensions of which are respectively as follows: 29 by 27½, 36 by 27½, and 27 by 19½. On the second floor two rooms, the dimensions of which are as follows: 27 by 18, and 50 by 66. On the top floor one room, now used as a lodge room.
