BOROUGHS OF MANHATTAN AND THE BRONX.

A further comparison will show that this year the minfall was very low in April and Jane and quite large in May, and last year it was low in April and May and large in Jane. The rainfall of last May, while unsually large, was not of very much benefit, being very unevenly distributed, creating superabondance of flow in streams for a few days and intermediate dearth of flow. These candidates have produced the result that from the ret of April to the 11th of May the natural flow of the Cruton river furnished all the water required for the daily supply through the Croton Aquedacts. After May 11 continuous drafts on the storage reservoirs had to be made to the close of the quarter, as follows:

This is an average of 71,000,000 gallons per day for the fifty days that stored water had to be drawn to supplement the natural flow of the Croton river.

For the sanitary protection of this water supply the Department continues to operate the electroscone plant at the Village of Brewster, and the dry pan process at the Village of Mt. Kisco to desinfect and dispose of sewage which would otherwise pollute the water in the streams. A pairol of the entire watershed for this purpose also continues to be maintained, in conjunction with the face under the direction of the Aqueduct Commissioners.

With the exception of the water furnished the contractors for the construction of the Cornell Dam and to Sing Sing Pricon, which supply passes through the Old Aqueduct, all the water continues to be received through the New Aqueduct. The Old Aqueduct, so far as the city water supply is concerned, will have to continue out of service until the construction of the Jerome Park Reservoir, under the Aqueduct Commissioners, is sufficiently advanced to make and complete the connections between the aqueducts and that reservoir.

### MAINTENANCE OF AQUEDUCTS.

The new aqueduct has been operated without interruption or obstruction of any kind. The details of the maintenance work done on the eight sections comprising the two aqueducts, the Croton Dam and the receiving reservoirs in the city are given in the Chief Engineer's report, herste appended. I may mention as principal aggregate items of work done the following:

112 cubic yards of earth excavated in sunbankments.

317 cubic yards of dry masonry built in retaining-walls.

2,220 linear feet of any fences built.

8,488 linear feet of fraces repaired.

### BRONX AND BYRAM RIVER SUPPLY.

The rainfall in the Bronx and Byram river watersheds for the past quarter, as recorded by the rain gauge kept by the Department at the Kensico Reservoir, was 1.11 inches in April; 4.25 inches in May; 2.40 inches in June. Total for the quarter, 7.76 inches, which is very nearly 2 inches less than the total average in the Croton watershed for the same months. This system had to be put to a very severe strain to keep up the maximum daily supply of 20,000,000 gallons for the population of the Bosough of The Bronx, of which it is capable. To do this 445,000,000 gallons of water had to be drawn from the Rye Ponds Reservoir and the Kensico Reservoir, the draft being continuous from the beginning to the close of the quarter and averaging 4,900,000 gallons of water in the beginning to the close of the quarter and averaging 4,900,000 gallons a day, which is nearly one-quarter of the entire supply. At the same time the consumption of water by the people of the torough exceeded the supply to the extent of drawing down the depth of water in the receiving and distributing reservoir at Williamsbridge to feet. This caused a corresponding decrease of pressure in the distributing mains and elevation of delivery of water in the houses. In many of the houses the elevation of delivery was lowered two stories, and to nearly all of them at least one story. I present these facts as a repetition of the statements which I have had to put in each successive quarterly and annual report since January, 1598, and in several special reports, that the population and tuildings its the borough have long outgrown the capacity of the Broux and Byram river system. in provide a large increase of supply and greater elevation of delivery of the water by the construction of a high service pumping station adjuining the site of the Jerome Park Reservoir, and by drawing a supplementary supply from the Crotson Aspecture by a 48-lach man, to be had through the central and southerly sections of the brough and to be connected at an many points as necessary with the general system of distributing males. The prompt favorable action of the Board of Public Improvements on these measures was later followed by concurrent action by the Board of Public Improvements on tilese measures was later followed by concurrent action by the Board of Festimate and Apportionment and will laser by one of the two hearches of the Municipal Assembly, but the resolutions or ordinances for authorization of the works and the necessary bond senses are still pending in the other branch of the Assembly. All that the Department had obtained up to the close of last quarter was authority and funds for the construction of the foundations for the own high service pumping station, and in the meantime the inadequacy of water supply has become more detrimental to the convenience and comfort of the people from day to day.

One other measure now in contemplation to supplement the supply from the Brane and Byram system is to connect the East Branch Reservoir in the Croton Watershed with the Brane River Reservoir, so as to send into the latter reservoir any overflow from the East Branch Reservoir.

DISTRIBUTING MAINS, STOP-COCKS AND HYDRANTS.

In extending and improving the water service in the two boroughs, there were bild during the quarter :

7,000 linear feet of 36-inch mains, 3.533

Total 39,708 linear feet = 7.53 miles.

In connection with these mains 39 stap-cocks and 72 additional fire-hydrants were placed. The new mains are distributed over 15 different streets, four of which are in the Borough of Manhattan and eleven in the Borough of The Bronx.

Seven repair gangs have been engaged in the maintenance and repairs of the distributing system, and the following are the principal items of work done by this force:

212 new fire-hydrants set in place of defective ones.

2,529 fire-hydrants repaired.

58 new stop-cocks placed.

434 stop-cocks repaired.

240 leaks in water-mains repaired.

3,708 linear feet of new water-mains laid.

259 taps for house nervice mans, shat off in consequence of leakage.

The 36 inch water-main which is now being laid and may be completed in a few mouths in the Boulevard or Broadway, Eighty-sixth street, across Central Park in the transverse road and thence to Park avenue and East Eighty-first street in Third avenue, and which is designed to improve and enlarge the high service supply, especially for the section cast of the Central Park, will be of no benefit unless the Department is enabled to place at the same time two additional 15,000,000-gallon pumping engines at the high service station at Washington Bridge, for which anthority and funds were asked more than a year ago, but have not yet been granted by the Municipal Assembly.

In the Borough of Manhattan the average daily consumption of water has increased very little over the consumption for the corresponding quarter of last year, which is attributable to the comparatively moderate temperature during April, May and June. As the same time the increase of consumption from the Croton water supply has been from 237,000,000 gallons per day in April to 248,000,000 gallons in June or 11,000,000 gallons per day. The enormous increase which has taken place since the advent of hot and dry weather will be one of the subjects of the next quarterly report.

### BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

### SUPPLY AND CONSEMPTION OF WATER.

For convenience and brevity, the public water system handed over by the former City of Brooklyn, and comprising what is called the Long Island Watershed, from the Ridgewood Reservoir east to Massapequa, near the Suffolk County line, will be called the Ridgewood System or Ridgewood Supply. In April, the plant and property of the Long Island Water Supply Company were added to the public water system. This plant furnished in May a daily average supply of 3,861,861 gallons, and in June 3,682,890 gallons.

The foregoing figures make the total daily supply from the public water service in the Bosough of Brooklyn 91,877,708 gallons in April, 96,114,581 gallons in May and 99,542,241 gallons in June.

Although there has been little or no increase in the daily consumption of water from the Ridge-wood system over that of the second quarter of last year, the consumption has exceeded the sup-ply, as shown by the fact that the reserve supply held in the Hempstead, Ridgewood and Mount Prospect Reservoirs has been reduced at the average rate of 670,000 gallows per day during the quarter. The statistics to show the daily supply and consumption and the reserve supply in stor-age are given in the Chief Engineer's report.

### DISTRIBUTING SYSTEM.

Up to the close of the quarter the Department had not yet obtained the appropriation by bond issue of \$250,000, required to improve and extend the water service by the laying of additional distributing mains; and in the meantime applications and petitions for water-main extensions unlitiplied and became more urgent. Favorable reports have been made to the Board of Public Improvements, however, on petitions which call for an aggregate length of 4.6 miles of 6-inch, S-inch, 12-inch and 20-inch mains.

In consequence of necessary repairs to the low-service engines and reservoir at the Mount Prospect Station, the supply from that service had to be obtained in part from the high-service tower and in part from the Ridgewood reservoir, without causing any appreciable difference in the general service of pressure and delivery through the mains.

### WELLS AND PUMPING STATIONS.

Changes and improvements continue to be made in the pumping machinery at the Ridgewood.

At the New Utreet Station one of the Worthington engines has been thoroughly repaired, increasing its efficiency and performance.

At the Spring Creek Station 95 2-inch wells were drawn, cleaned, redriven and reconnected the water service, and are now in use.

At the Oconee Station the pumping machinery had to be shut down for ten days in April for

At the Occore Station the pumping machinery had to be shall down for ten days in April the thorough overhauling.

At the Jameso Station the cleaning of the deep 8-inch wells has been continued, and the same has been done at the Clear Stream Station.

At the Millburn Station an average of 40,000,000 gallous of water was pumped per day, which is the maximum quantity which the present brick constitution receive and convey from that point.

The Department begoes to be able at an early day to advertise the contract for the installation of filtering plants at Springfield and Baisley's Streams, so as to again utilize the new polluted supply of six to eight million gallons of water per day from these sources.

### CONDUITS AND RESERVOIRS.

The repairs begun early in the quarter at the Mount Prospect Reservoir are still in progress, as well as repairs of feuces and gates. Minor repairs, detailed in the Chief Engineer's report, were made at the Ridgewood Reservoir.

Along the line of the brick conduit the work of fencing-in property has been continued, culverts have been cleaned, and constant inspection of the tributary streams has been maintained for the smiltary protection of the water supply.

133 chemical analyses.

103 partial chemical analyses 243 microscopical examinations.
675 bacteriological examinations.
599 bacteriological examinations—coli tests.
21 analyses of coal samples.
18 bricks tested.

### GENERAL WORK.

The Engineer's Bureau in Brooklyn has been gathering additional data concerning the works and plant of the Flatbush Water Works Company, which must either he acquired by the City or the present unexpired contract between the former City of Brooklyn and the company be extended or renewed from and after January 1, 1901.

Surveys have also been under at and around Massapequa and the East Meadow Swamp, near that station, with the view of gaining increased storage capacity and additional water supply.

This large increase has been caused principally by the establishment of two large new factories, the resumption of business in several old factories and the reaccupany of dwelling houses which had for a long time been vacant.

In the maintenance and repairs of the distributing mains and appurtenances, 5 new stop-cocks and 6 new fire-hydrants were placed; 11 stopcocks repaired; 31 fire-hydrants repaired and 1,173 linear feet of new water-mains laid.

The appropriation by bond issue for water-main extensions in this borough, to extend the water service into new streets and houses, to improve the circulation of water, and to make the service from the different pumping plants interchangeable by interconnection, for which this Department made application more than two years ago, is very much needed.

### BOROUGH OF RICHMOND.

The small pumping plant which the City owns at the Village of Tottenville has fornished an average daily supply of S1,000 gallons.

The pumping plant, wells, distributing mains and other property have been kept in good arder, and to additional tape for house service pipes have been placed.

Nine thousand two hundred million gallons run to waste over Croton Dam. Thirty-seven thousand million gallons in storage reservoirs. Work on the improvement of White Pond and outlet has been steadily prosecuted.

Not being able to fill all of the storage reservoirs, the reservoir at Williamsbridge has been drawn down to feet, and the houses in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Ward saupplied from same layer lost one to two stories in pressure. Two hundred and sixty-seven thousand eight hundred dollars was appropriated in May by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for laying a 48-inch main from the Old Croton Aqueduct to the lower portions of the Twenty-third

Ward to supply the low grounds from the Croton river supply and thus relieve the Bronx river supply. This is now before the Municipal Assembly for their action.

### NEW AQUEDUCT.

All of the water furnished from the Croton river passes through this aqueduct, except that furnished Sing Sing Prison and the contractors at Cornell Dam.

### SANITARY PROTECTION OF THE WATERSHEDS.

The electrozone plant treating the sowerage of Brewster's, and two hundred dry pans at Mount Kisco, has been continued. The water-heds are policed by the members of the Engineer Corps of this Department and the Aqueduct Commission.

### WATER-MAIN FUND NO. 3.

The contractor at Jerome Park Pumping Station has continued his work, and is now building the necessary sewers, and has a force at work cutting stone, etc., for the foundation. Awaiting the action of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in appropriating moneys for the engine and holler houses, engines and stand-pipe, only the foundations can be completed this season.

The work along line of Aqueduct during the past quarter has been care and maintenance. The principal work has been building, repairing and painting fences, and cutting grass. The more particular work on each division has been as follows:

The loss in the storage for the quarter, omitting the independent supply of the Long Island Water Supply Plant, and, as shown above, averages 670,000 gallons per day; the condemnation proceedings for acquiring the plant of the Long Island Water Supply Company were finally manipleted early in the quarter, and the plant was taken possession of by this Department on April 9, since which time it has been operated under the direction of this office; the recards of the plant have only been kept by this Department since May 1, at which time there was in storage 3,007,000 gallons, so that the total loss of the past two months has been 330,000 gallons, or about 5,400 gallons day; the gain in the Ridgewood Basin No. 1, as shown in the table, is due to the basin baving been refilled and restored to service. Omitting the plant of the Long Island Water Supply Company for purposes of comparison, the records show that the average daily concumption for the quarter was 3,500,000 gallons less than for the same quarter of last year and a little less than 1,000,000 gallons more than that of two years ago.

As shown in the above table, the minfall for the quarter has been higher than that for the corresponding quarter of last year and lower than that for the same quarter in 1898.

The supply furnished from the Ridgewood, Gravesend and New Utrecht systems has been comparatively free from organisms during the larger part of the quarter, but the recent growths of asterionella and synedra in the Mount Prospect reservoir and of synedra in the Ridgewood Basin Nn. 3 are producing a characteristic odor in the districts supplied from these basins. Complaint has also been received of the quality of the water supply from the East New York reservoir at the Long Island Water Supply Plant owing to the growth of algre and the unamitary condition of the reservoir lasin. It is proposed to clean the latter as soon as possible.

### DISTRIBUTION.

No work has been done during the quarter on the extension of the distribution, but twelve petitions for extensions have been canmined and reported on invorably; the length of pipe amounts to 4.6 miles 6-inch, 8-inch, 12-inch and 20 inch pipe. The work done on the maintenance of the system is shown in the annexed tables. In the latter part of April it became necessary to supply a portion of the Mount Prospect low service in part from the Mount Prospect low service in part from the Mount Prospect low service and in part from the Ridgewood Low Service systems in order to make repairs to the Low service engines and to the reservoir; these changes resulted in the former case in giving a stiffactory service without the necessity of a second pumping at Mount Prospect, while in the latter case a considerable area was farnished with an adequate pressure, which had previously not been maintained and which it is now found must be command until a prospect rearriang ment of the pumping mains from the Mount Prospect Low Service can be carried into effect. This change, however, has taxed the Mount Prospect High Service engines far beyond the work which should be expected from them and will be again referred to. Specifications have been prepared for deinbing-foundning and for mains necessary to connect dead ends and restore circulation. Work on the connection between the Ridgewood main on Twenty-scond avenue and the New Utrecht main on Avenue I has been begun. on Avenue I has been begun.

### FUMPING STATIONS.

The increased requirement of the high-service origines at Mount Prospect has been already noted, the average daily pumping now a gregating nearly 4,000,000 gallons a day as compared with 2,700,000 gallons in the same quarter of 1899 and 2,800,000 gallons daily in 1898; to pump this amount of water requires the constant use of engine No. 5 in connection with either engine No. 5 or 4, so in case of accident to No. 5, or necessity of them shutting down, there will be a shortage in the service of approximately 1,800,000 gallons a day. The necessity of the additional engines recommended last went in connection with the re-modeling of the high service is thus once more emphasized. Engine No. 2 has been overhauled and repaired during the quarter by the builder. The maximum steam pressure in bother No. 2 having been reduced, on the 18th of June by the Folice Department to 75 pounds and the same not being sufficient to run the engines, arrangements were made for renting a boiler until such time as new and adequate boilers can be installed.

the builder. The maximum mean pressure in boiler No. 2 having been reduced, on the 18th of Jane by the Police Department to 75 peunels and the same not being sufficient to run the engines, arrangements were made for renting a boiler until such time as new and adequate boilers can be installed.

At the New Utrecht Station Worthington engine No. 1 has been repaired in part by the hailders and in part by our own force; the high-pressure valve seals have been straped, jucketinger traceved and a new set of valves formished for the six-chamber; similar work will some beindertaken for engine No. 2. The grading about the new pipe-line and the 2-inch wells has been finished and the brick walls back of the boilers have been rebuilt.

The plant of the Long Island Water Supply Company, when possession passed to this Department, was badly deteriorated, the boilers being in especially poor condition. The arrangement of the boilers and stacks is unsatisfactory and the draft to weak for good combastion. Plans have been made for the extension of the boiler-room and for the erection there of a steel chimacy formerly used at Ridgewood, but now not of service; the new stack will be 52 inches in diameter and about 76 feet high, the top to be guyed on four sides with one-half-inch steel wire rope. The boilers, which were hally scaled, have been cleaned and several of them furnished with new tabes. The duples engine, air-pump and feed-pump were all overhauled and put in as good condition as time would permit. The plunger-pumps were repacked completely and now operate much better. A G-inch Ashcroft relief-valve was connected to discharge-main, so that the plant can be operated with direct pressure if required. The fire service has been improved and made adequate to the engineers and former: the window-asabes, trames and wainscoting have been painted.

Two of the new Worthington engines of the North Side Ridgewood Pumping Station have been in constant service during the quarter, while the third was shut down for needed repairs or alter

house; a ventilating skylight has also been provided for the auxiliary pump-room. The pump-room has been ceiled and will shortly be painted. The grading and seeding of the grounds around the south side station has greatly improved their appearance; foundations have been provided for gate-posts, which, together with an iron fence around the grounds, will be set at soon as men can be spared for the work. The z-isach automatic air valve purchased for use on the Millburn force main was attached to the main from the Davidson engine in the engine-room, where its operation could be closely abserved; the results obtained having been satisfactory, it will some be set ap at the place for which it was intended.

Ninety-five of the z-inch wells of the Spring Creek plant have been pulled up, cleaned, pumped clear, redriven and connected to the main and are now in use. The necessary equipment for cleaning the 8-inch deep wells is now being put in place, preparatory to pulting them in good condition. The arch in the wall spanning the boilers of the old station, which was sprung early in the year, is now being replaced by two g-inch steel beams, and the greater portion of the east wall of the boiler-house, which was cracked by the load thrown on it from the arch, is being torn down and rebuilt; all of this work is being done by our own men.

The Oconee Pumping Station was shut down early in April for ten days and the pumping plant theoroughly overhanded. Two of the 8-irch wells have been washed out and their yield restored and a third, which after repeated efforts falled to give satisfactory results, was pulled up and sank 27 test further back from the suction-main; the pipe was found to be in good condition and not corroded.

At the Jamesco Pamping Station the work of cleaning the 8-inch deep wells was continued, and four mass have been walls four mass bear have been walls and condition.

and not corroded.

At the Jameso Pumping Station the work of cleaning the S-Inch deep wells was continued, and four more have been washed out and pumped clear, resulting in considerable increase in the supply. One of the engineers' houses have been thoroughly overhauled and painted throughout; two of the other engineers' houses have been painted. Minor repairs and alterations have been made to the engine-house and coal shel.

The Springfield boilets are worn out and should be replaced by new ones; these are included in the work recommended for the filter plant proposed at this station. Plans have been made for taking out the Venturi meter which, owing to the action of the water, failed to give satisfaction at this count, and placing the same on the force main of the Long Island Water Supply plant. Some little difficulty has been experienced with a few of the driven wells, and they have had to be temporarily cut out of service. The engineer's house has been painted and repaired and the chimney relimit.

persily cut out of service. The engineer's house has been painted and repaired and the chimney rebill.

On May 21 the work of cleaning the driven wells at the Clear Stream Station was begun, and up to the present time forty of them have been pailed up, cleaned, redriven, pumped clear and again placed in service. The old well points were corroded and in many cases the screens broken, new well points being generally required. The coal shed, stovehouse and part of the exterior of the pumping station have been painted and minor repairs made to the woodwork.

The outside of the coal shed and a portion of the pumping station at Forest Stream has been repainted, the roof of the coal shed and storehouse repaired, and an extension built to the engine-house for use as a workshop and store-room.

The average daily pumping at Milliam for the quarter has been approximately 40,000,000,000 gallons, or about the maximum that could be oftened with the present conduit facilities. This has required the operation of four of the engines, one being shut down at a time for repairs as required. The west side battery of boilers was stated up in April and has been in use since that time; the other hattery is being overhanded completely and put in good condition. The dynamo and electric plant still remain useless, pending the purchase of a new generator. The chimney of the rast hattery of boilers was struck by lighting early last month and damaged to such an extent that the upper 25 feet will probably have to be torn down and rebuilt.

None of the five driven-well stations cast of Millburn have been operated during the quarier, the gravity supply from the new watershed having been sufficient to meet the pumping capacity at Millburn; the stations however, have been kept in repair and ready for service. The engine-house at Merrick has been thoroughly overhauled, a stort-house boult, new flooring lead and a concrete floor put down in front of the boilers. The steel smokestacks of the stations have been painted with two coats of Dixon's grap

### CONDUITS AND RESERVOIRS.

The much-needed repairs were undertaken at the Mr. Prospect Reservoir early in the quarter and are yet in progress. A new retaining wall at the entrance to the tower has been built as a foundation for a fence and gates, which will soon be erected, thus protecting the reservoir at night from intruders and enabling us to make use of this approach to the grounds. The lower part of the slope along the Eastern parkway, which was ragged and sed never been trummed, was dressed and sodded under contract and a privet hedge set out along the toe. The upper part of this slope will be graded by our own force at such time as the men can be used for the purpose. The concrete walks along the parkway and those forming a part of the approach to the tower have all been substantially repaired; the walls of the approach and the lower part of the tower have been repointed by our own men, and all of the apper partion of the brick slope of the reservoir, which was badly cracked, has been carefully gone over, the old bricks out out and new bricks substituted, and the whole carefully pointed; the old cement paint coating over the upper portion of the reservoir than in former years, and in the fall it is hoped to plant the same and make the whole surroundings more in harmony with the adjoining grounds of Prospect Park. It is also proposed at an early date to thoroughly repair the old fence around the grounds and to make a few alterations in alignment, where the same is needed for better protection.

The work of cutting rabbets in the gate-house of liasin No. 1 at Ridgewood was finished early in the quarter, and the reservoir, which had been drawn down nearly to the bottom, again restored to service; at this time a new flooring was provided for the gate-house. A measuring boot for determining the depth of water in Basin No. 3 has also been set up, so that the depth of water in all three basins is now determined by similar methods. Work has been begun an the construction of a suitable roadway up the south bank of the reservoir to the mete

influx chamber.

The work of fencing the conduit lines has also been continued during the past quarter and some of the culverts have been cleaned. The stream inspection has been continued and a detailed report made of all of the principal nuisances on the watershed, and the same transmitted to the Health Department.

### OFFICE AND IN GENERAL.

Additional data has been gathered during the quarter concerning the Flathush Water Works. Numerous examinations have been made of the Millburn Reservoir slopes, a plan perfected for making the repairs required, and specifications and estimates prepared therefor. The cross-sectioning of the East Meadow swamp, began early in the year, has been finished, the survey envering about 800 acres; the plotting of the notes is now in progress. Some headway has also been made in similar work at Massapequa.

### BOARD OF PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS.

The Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York met at the office of the Board, No. 21 Park row, on Wednesday, November 21, 1920, at 2 deleach P. M., pursuant to notice.

The roll was called, and the following members were present and answered to their names:

The Commissioner of Water Supply, the Commissioner of Highways (and Deputy Commissioner Shannon), the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, the Commissioner of Sewera, the Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, the Commissioner of Bridges (Deputy Commissioner Vork), the President of the Borough of Machattan, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn and the President of the Borough of Oneses.

The President, Honorable Maurice F, Holahan, presided.

The minutes of the meetings of November 9 and 14, 1900, were approved as printed.

ACQUIRING TITLE TO BEDFORD AVENUE, BROOKLYN.

The Commissioner of Sewers moved to take from the table the matter of the improvement or Bedford avenue, which was laid over at the meeting of the 14th (Minutes, page 2045), which motion was carried.

The following resolution was then submitted:

Resolved, That the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of chapter 704, Laws of 1900, requires that the title to the lands and promoes required for the opening and extending of Bedford avenue, from a point in the Eastern parkway, where said Bedford avenue is already opened, and extending in a southerly direction to Flatbash avenue, in the Twenty-Forth Ward, Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, should be acquired by The

the Twenty-fourth Ward, Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, should be acquired by The City of New York.

Resolved, That the Board of Public Improvements hereby requests the Corporation Counsel to lake the necessary proceedings, in pursuance of the provisions of chapter 764, Laws of 1900, in the name of The City of New York, to acquire title, whenever the same has not heretofore been acquired, for the use of the public, to the lands, tenements and hereditaments that shall or may be required for the purpose of opening and extending Redford avenue, from a point in the Eastern parkway, where said Bedford avenue is already opened, and extending in a southerly direction to Flatbush avenue, in the Twenty-fourth Ward, Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York.

After hearing Mr. Ruggles, representing property-owners in the neighborhood, in favor of the resolution, the Commissioner of Sewers moved that the resolution be adopted.

The President of the Borough of Brooklyn moved that the matter be laid on the table, which motion was lest by the following vote:

APPROACH TO ONE HUNDRED AND FORTY-NINTH STREET BRIDGE, BRONX.

The following communication from the Commissioner of Bridges was read :

Hon. MAURICE F. HOLAHAN, Fresident, Board of Public Improvements:

Sm.—The Commissioners of Estimate appointed to condemn land for the appenach to the bridge over the Harlem river at One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, as provided by resolution of your Board, dated August 9, 1899, filed their oaths October 8, 1900. You will therefore please have resolution prepared for adoption by the Board at its next meeting, fixing a definite time for the vesting of title.

The following resolution was thereupon adopted:

"Whereas, The Board of Public Improvements, on the 9th day of August, 1899, adopted a resolution directing that, upon a date to be thereafter more fully specified, not less than six months after the filing of the oaths of the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment who might be appointed by the Supreme Court in proceedings for the acquisition of title to the approaches to the bridge over the Hartem river at East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, in the Borough of The Browx, City of New York, the title is any piece or parcel of land lying within the lines of such approaches, so required, should be vested in The City of New York; and "Whereas, The Board of Public Improvements has received written notice from the Corporation Counsel that Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment have been appointed by the Supreme Court in proceedings to acquire title to said the land and premises required for such approaches, and that the oaths of smal Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment were duly filed, as required by law, on the Sth day of October, 1900; therefore be it "Resolved, That the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York, in persuance of the provisions of section 900 of chapter 378, Laws of 1807, directs that, upon the 19th day of April, 1901, the title to each and every piece or parcel of land lying within the lines of said approaches to the bridge over the Harlem river at East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, in the Borough of The Broax, City of New York, so required, shall be vested in The City of New York.

ASSESSMENT FOR WIDENING ELM STREET, MANHATTAN.

The matter of the application for the reduction of the assessment for the widening and extending of Elm street, which was set for a hearing on November 21, was taken up.

Ludwig, Estate Catharine Bradley, American News Company, and many others respectfully petition your Honorable Board for relief from the onerous assessment laid upon their property for the openin widening and extending of Elm street in The City of New York.

First—Elm street, prior to its widening in 1807, had been an open traveled street for nearly a century. It was regulated, graded, paved and sewered. Broadway, one hundred feet wide, was only one block west of it, and Centre street, also one hundred feet wide, was only one block to the east of it. It asswered every purpose of the owners of property on Elm street, and the Board of Street Opening and Improvement in 1850 refused to widen and extend Elm street because of the strenamus opposition of owners of property on Elm street. It has not been widened for the benefit of these owners, or at their request, but for the henefit of the whole city.

Second—The demand for rapid transit in The City of New York citated a necessity for relieving some of the traffic on Broadway. The Rapid Transit Commissioners had decided to use Broadway for the underground road. The Appellate Division decided, however, that Broadway could not be med for the reason that the property to be acquired was as expensive that the cost of constructing the road would bring the City beyond the constitutional limit of indebted-

ness. It, therefore, became necessary to select another route, and Elm street was chosen. But in order to stillize it for the purpose of the Rapid Transit Road, it had to be widened and extended.

Third—The widening and extending of Elm street made it possible to construct the Rapid Transit Road at a cost which would not bring the City beyond the constitutional limit of indehedness. Under the original plan for building the Rapid Transit Road, under Broadway, the estimated cost was fifty million of dollars; under the new plan the contract to build the road has been awarded for therefore million of dollars.

Fourth—In the year 1897 the counsel for the Rapid Transit Commissioners, at the request of the City, had chapter 641, Laws of 1899, passed, vesting in the City the title to all the property to be acquired on May 1, 1897, so that there would be no delay in the construction of the Rapid Transit Road. Every step taken to widen this street was opposed by owners of property on Elm street, but it was urged that the needs of the city demanded this improvement, and the protests of the current were overruled.

Fifth—The Board of Street Opening and Improvement resolved to widen and extend Elm street in September, 1593, and recognizing that this improvement was for the general good of the City, passed a resolution placing one-half of the cost on the city at large. This action was based on a report by Chief Engeneer McLean that the improvement would cost only three million of dollars, and that the owners of property within the arra of assessment would only be assessed one million five handred thousand dollars.

The cost of the improvment is \$5,401,377 instead of \$3,000,000, an increase of 80 per cent., and the hurden placed on the property-owners is \$2,700,000 instead of \$1,500,000. Therefore a much greater burden has been placed upon them than the Board intended, and no relief can be had unless the resolution be reconsidered.

Sixth—That since the vesting of title in 1897, and the taking down of the buildings, the title to which vested in the City by chapter 641, Laws of 1897, the street has not been in a asale condition. This has cannied great loss on the owners of abuting property, and the City, on the other hand, has saved money since, for had it pavel, regulated and graded the same, it would have to be torn up again for the construction of the road. This loss ought to be the only contribution by way of assessment that the owners should be called upon to pay.

Seventh—The law governing assessments for benefit is that the property assessed receives a special and direct enhancement in valid different from the benefit which the City at large receives. In this case the Commissioners of Estimate have been told that they have nothing to do with the question whether property-owners have been benefited which the City at large receives. In this case to the subset of the criticens is not fair, just or equitable

In the case of Guest vs. City of Brooklyn, Chief Justice Church said:

"To force an expensive improvement upon a few property-owners against their consent,
and compel them to pay the entire expense under the delusive pretense of a corresponding
specific benefit conferred upon their property, is a species of despotism that ought not to be
perpetuated under a government which claims to protect property equally with life and
literty."

Ninth-The purpose of having a large area of assessment was to lighten the burden on all

property-owners.

property-owners.

In this case that purpose has been defeated by levying the assessment in the same manner as when new streets are opened through acreage property. To adopt that system in widening a street like Elm street is unjust and unfair.

When new streets have been created it has been considered fair to place the heaviest part of the assessment on abutting owners and a graded scale to the limit of the area.

Where all owners are financially affected the same by the widening of the street, all should be assessed equally.

Tenth—We beg leave to call your attention to some of the assessments, which will show that the very purpose of a large area of assessment which was to minimize the burden on individual owners, has been set aside and abutting towners assessed at confiscating rates.

Eleventh—This is the most onerous assessment ever laid on individual owners of property in The City of New York. It is almost confiscation. The method of assessment violates the fundamental principle under which all assessments should be levied, that of equality and uniformity. To impose a tax on A and B and exempt C and D, similarly benefited, is not taxation but exaction and confiscation; to take from individuals and corporations thousands of dollars when their property is not benefited mote than the general benefit to all the citizens of the municipality is to deprive them of their property without due process of law. In Colwer vs. Texas, 197 U. S. Rep., p. 692, it was held:

"Due process of law is so secured by laws operating on all alike and not subjecting the individual to the arbitrary exercise of the government unrestrained by the established principles of private right and distributive justice."

Twelfth—We destre to say, in conclusion, to your Honorable Board, that the total cost of this improvement should be placed upon the City, for the following reasons:

a. Elm street has been widened and extended for the benefit of the whole city, and it will be a benefit to the whole city, all of the citizens thereof should share equally in its burdens.

b. That this widened street is to be used for the Rapid Transit Road to the benefit of all the

d. That the wislening of Elm street was to relieve traffic on Broadway for the convenience and advantage of all the clitzens of the municipality.

We, therefore, respectfully pelition your Honorable Board for a hearing, so that we may state our grievances more in detail and obtain such relief as equity and justice entities as to receive as clitzens of our city.

DEAR SIR - Under date of 18th ultimo, the Fresident of the Borough of The Bronz addressed to you a communication, embodying a resolution of the Local Board of the Twenty-first District, which calls for the laying of water-mains in East One Hundred and Forty-first street, between Beekman avenue and the Southern Boulevard, which was referred to me for investigation and report at the meeting of the Board held on the 21st ultimo.

In reply I desire to state that I have report from the Chief Engineer of this Department that it is necessary to lay water mains in One Hundred and Forty-first street, between Robbins and Beekman avenues, covering the request of the Local Board of the Twenty-first District, the distance being 900 feet, with four houses requiring water supply and fire protection, and the estimated cost is \$1,100.

The Chief Engineer also reports the necessity of laying water-mains in Washington avenue.

The Chief Engineer also reports the necessity of laying water-mains in Washington avenue, between Third avenue and One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, Borough of The Bronx, in place of a main which has been deeply buried in consequence of regrading the street to a higher grade. The distance is 4,800 feet, and the estimated cost is \$16,000.

The Chief Engineer further reports the necessity of laying water-mains on the east side of Elackwell's Island, between the reservoir and the Charity Hospital, with necessary connections. The distance is 3,000 feet, and the estimated cost \$7,000.

I therefore respectfully recommend the adoption by the Board of the annexed resolution, anthorizing the laying of these mains, and the transmission to the Municipal Assembly for adoption of a corresponding resolution or ordinance, the entire cost to be paid from the appropriation for "Laying Croton Pipes, Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx," for toot.
