

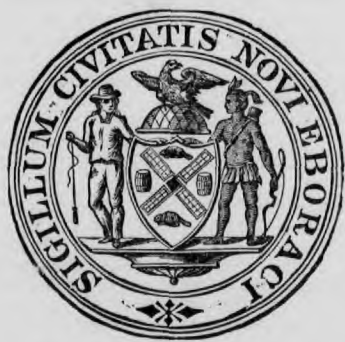

BOARD OF PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS.

The Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York met at the office of the Board, No. 21 Park row, on Wednesday, April 3, 1901, at 2 o'clock P. M., pursuant to notice.

The roll was called and the following members were present and answered to their names: The Comptroller (Deputy Comptroller Levey), the Commissioner of Water Supply (Deputy Commissioner Haslin), the Commissioner of Highways (Deputy Commissioner Shannon), the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, the Commissioner of Sewers, the Commissioner of Bridges, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the President of the Borough of The Bronx and the President of the Borough of Queens.

The President, Hon. Maurice F. Holahan, presided.

The minutes of the meeting of March 27, 1901, were approved as printed.

CLOSING BRADLEY AVENUE, QUEENS.

In the matter of closing and discontinuing that part of Bradley avenue lying between Howard street and Review avenue, within the lands of Calvary Cemetery, Borough of Queens, the report of the Secretary was read, showing that the matter had been duly advertised for a hearing, as required by law.

After hearing Mr. R. Horack, representing the Taxpayers' Association of the First Ward, Borough of Queens, in opposition to the proposed closing, nobody else appearing in opposition, the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, At a meeting of this Board, held on the 20th day of March, 1901, resolutions were adopted, proposing to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by the closing and discontinuing that part of Bradley avenue, from Howard street to Review avenue, within the lands belonging to Calvary Cemetery, in the First Ward, Borough of Queens, City of New York, and for a meeting of this Board to be held in the office of this Board on the 3d day of April, 1901, at 2 o'clock P. M., at which meeting such proposed closing and discontinuing would be considered by this Board, and for a notice to all persons affected thereby of the aforesaid time and place at which such proposed closing and discontinuing would be considered, to be published in the CITY RECORD for at least ten days continuously, exclusive of Sundays and legal holidays, prior to the 3d day of April, 1901; and

Whereas, It appears from the affidavit of the Supervisor of the City Record that the aforesaid resolutions and notice have been published in the CITY RECORD for ten days continuously, Sundays and legal holidays excepted, prior to the 3d day of April, 1901; and

Whereas, At the aforesaid time and place a public hearing was given to all persons affected by such proposed closing and discontinuing, who have appeared, and such proposed closing and discontinuing was duly considered by this Board; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 436 of chapter 378, Laws of 1897, deeming it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by the closing and discontinuing of that part of Bradley avenue, from Howard street to Review avenue, within the lands belonging to Calvary Cemetery, in the First Ward, Borough of Queens, City of New York, does hereby favor and approve of the same so as to close and discontinue the aforesaid avenue.

Resolved, That the foregoing resolution, approving of the above-named proposed change in the map or plan of The City of New York by closing Bradley avenue adopted, by this Board, together with a statement of its reasons therefor, be transmitted to the Municipal Assembly for its action thereon.

Affirmative—Comptroller, Commissioner of Water Supply, Commissioner of Highways, Commissioner of Street Cleaning, Commissioner of Sewers, Commissioner of Bridges and President of the Board—7.

Negative—President of the Borough of Queens—1.

In connection with the foregoing resolution, the following form of ordinance was approved for transmission to the Municipal Assembly:

IN MUNICIPAL ASSEMBLY.

Be it Ordained by the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York, as follows:

That, in pursuance of section 436 of the Greater New York Charter, the following resolution of the Board of Public Improvements, adopted by that Board on the 3d day of April, 1901, be and the same hereby is approved, viz.:

Resolved, That the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 436 of chapter 378, Laws of 1897, deeming it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by the closing and discontinuing of that part of Bradley avenue, from Howard street to Review avenue, within the lands belonging to Calvary Cemetery, in the First Ward, Borough of Queens, City of New York, does hereby favor and approve of the same so as to close and discontinue the aforesaid avenue.

REDUCTION OF ASSESSMENT ON BURNSIDE AVENUE, BRONX.

The matter of the reduction of assessment for the opening of Burnside avenue, from Tremont avenue to East One Hundred and Seventy-sixth street, Borough of The Bronx, was taken up.

The following communication from the Chairman of the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment was read:

NEW YORK, April 2, 1901.

JOHN H. MOONEY, Esq., Secretary, Board of Street Opening:

MY DEAR SIR—I wish to thank the Board for the opportunity it has given me of being present at the meeting to be held to-morrow, April 3d instant, at 2 P. M. I have an engagement for that hour, and I may not be able to attend, but my presence could not be of much, if any, service. I have no suggestions or comments to make respecting the view that Mr. Charles L. Guy has taken of the law. The legal questions are such as come up every day that the Board assembles, and I do not wish to consume time in discussing them. If the Commission on which I am acting is to decide them, its members will endeavor to conform to established precedents.

With respect to the opening of Burnside avenue, from Tremont avenue to East One Hundred and Seventy-eighth street, I beg leave to lay before the Board the following facts that are within my own knowledge: Mr. P. A. Walsh, Mr. James O'Farrell and myself were the Commissioners on the Public Place at Tremont avenue. In the course of the proceedings we discovered that the map and the papers left out of the parcel to be taken a sliver of land (it cannot be called anything else) that ought obviously to have been condemned with the rest of the tract, of which it formed a part. The omission of that thin slice of land, varying in width from an inch to several inches, left private property between the Public Place and Burnside avenue. That the piece was not included was, as we were told, because the Engineer had made his map in his office without having a clear remembrance of the tract; he did not know that he was leaving a knife-blade between the Public Place and the street. The Commissioners were willing to make an allowance for the knife-blade, and the property-owners were willing to convey it to the City, and the propriety of solving the difficulty in that way was discussed, but Mr. Dunn was of opinion that the safer course was to take the omitted fragment by regular proceedings in the courts. Hence the proceeding now pending.

I have said to Mr. Guy that it is the fault of the City's employees that a second proceeding had to be taken. I mean, of course, the fault of the City Engineer, and not the fault of Mr. Dunn. The expenses of the second proceeding ought, in my judgment, to be borne by the City. The property-owners were ready to convey without any proceeding; all they asked was pay for the little narrow strip, and a trifle would have satisfied them.

Mr. James B. Brady, one of the Commissioners on the second proceeding, has recently died, and the other, Mr. William Minor Laurence, will not, I believe, disagree with the opinion I have expressed.

REDUCTION OF ASSESSMENT ON RYER AVENUE, BRONX.

The hearing in the above matter was opened, and after hearing Honorable Charles L. Guy in support of the petition, on motion of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That so much of the resolution, relating to the opening of Ryer avenue, from Tremont avenue to Burnside avenue, in the Twenty-fourth Ward, adopted by the Board of Street Opening and Improvement on the 18th day of June, 1897, as provides "that the entire cost and expense of said proceedings shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby," is hereby amended so as to read "that one-half of the entire cost and expense of said proceedings shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby, and one-half shall be borne and paid by The City of New York."

Affirmative—Commissioner of Water Supply, Commissioner of Highways, Commissioner of Street Cleaning, Commissioner of Sewers, Commissioner of Bridges, President of the Borough of The Bronx and President of the Board—7.

REDUCTION OF ASSESSMENTS.

On motion of the Deputy Comptroller, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the attention of the Corporation Counsel be and is hereby called to his opinions to this Board dated August 8, 1899, and June 28, 1900; and that he be respectfully requested to advise the Board of Public Improvements whether power exists in said Board to modify, alter or amend resolutions adopted by the Board of Street Opening and Improvements of The City of New York as constituted prior to January 1, 1898, authorizing the opening of streets, parks and public places and determining what proportion of the cost thereof should be borne by The City of New York and by the property benefited.

ESTABLISHING GRADES THIRTEENTH AVENUE, MANHATTAN.

In the matter of establishing the grades in Thirteenth avenue, from West Twenty-sixth to West Thirty-third street, Borough of Manhattan, the report of the Secretary was read, showing that the matter had been duly advertised for a hearing as required by law.

Nobody appearing in opposition to the proposed grades, the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, At a meeting of this Board, held on the 13th day of March, 1901, resolutions were adopted proposing to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by establishing the grades in Thirteenth avenue, from the centre line of West Twenty-sixth street to the centre line of West Thirty-third street, in the Twentieth Ward, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, and for a meeting of this Board to be held in the office of this Board on the 3d day of April, 1901, at 2 o'clock P. M., at which meeting such proposed grades would be considered by this Board, and for a notice to all persons affected thereby of the aforesaid time and place at which such proposed grades would be considered to be published in the CITY RECORD for at least ten days continuously, exclusive of Sundays and legal holidays, prior to the 3d day of April, 1901; and

Whereas, It appears from the affidavit of the Supervisor of the City Record that the aforesaid resolutions and notice have been published in the CITY RECORD for ten days continuously, Sundays and legal holidays excepted, prior to the 3d day of April, 1901; and

Whereas, At the aforesaid time and place a public hearing was given to all persons affected by such proposed grades, who have appeared, and such proposed grades were duly considered by this Board; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 436 of chapter 378, Laws of 1897, deeming it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by establishing the grades in Thirteenth avenue, from the centre line of West Twenty-sixth street to the centre line of West Thirty-third street, in the Twentieth Ward, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, does hereby favor and approve of the same so as to establish the grades in the aforesaid avenue as follows:

1st. Beginning at the intersection of the centre line of West Twenty-sixth street and the easterly curb-line of Thirteenth avenue, elevation 5.33 feet above city datum;

2d. Thence northerly along said curb-line 264.19 feet to centre line of West Twenty-seventh street, elevation 4.34 feet;

3d. Thence northerly along the said curb-line, distance 132.09 feet, elevation 5.00 feet; thence northerly, distance 132.09 feet, to centre line of West Twenty-eighth street, elevation 4.16 feet;

4th. Thence northerly along the said curb, distance 132.09 feet, elevation 5.00 feet; thence northerly 132.09 feet to the centre of West Twenty-ninth street, elevation 4.25 feet;

5th. Thence northerly along said easterly curb-line, distance 131.23 feet, elevation 5.00 feet; thence northerly 128.75 feet to centre line of West Thirtieth street, elevation 4.47 feet;

6th. Thence northerly along said curb-line, distance 257.50 feet, to centre line of West Thirty-first street, elevation 5.14 feet;

7th. Thence northerly along said easterly curb-line, distance 257.50 feet, to centre line of West Thirty-second street, elevation 6.00 feet;

8th. Thence northerly along said curb-line, distance 128.75 feet, elevation 6.75 feet; thence northerly to centre line of West Thirty-third street, elevation 6.30 feet;

9th. Thence westerly along the centre line of West Thirty-third street, distance 80 feet, to the westerly line of Thirteenth avenue, elevation 5.50 feet;

10th. Thence southerly along the westerly line of Thirteenth avenue, distance 257.50 feet, elevation 6.50 feet;

11th. Thence southerly along said westerly line, distance 257.50 feet, to a point opposite centre line of West Thirty-first street, elevation 6.00 feet;

12th. Thence southerly along said westerly line, distance 257.50 feet, to a point opposite centre line of West Thirtieth street, elevation 5.50 feet;

13th. Thence southerly along said westerly line, distance 128.75 feet, elevation 5.75 feet; thence southerly along said westerly line, distance 130.85 feet, to the centre line of West Twenty-ninth street, elevation 5.25 feet;

14th. Thence southerly along said westerly line of Thirteenth avenue, distance 132.09 feet, elevation 5.75 feet; thence southerly along said westerly line, distance 132.09 feet, to centre line of West Twenty-eighth street, elevation 5.25 feet;

15th. Thence southerly along the westerly line of Thirteenth avenue, distance 132.09 feet, elevation 5.75 feet; thence southerly along said line, distance 132.09 feet, to centre line of West Twenty-seventh street, elevation 5.25 feet;

16th. Thence southerly along the westerly line of Thirteenth avenue, distance 264.19 feet, to centre line of West Twenty-sixth street, elevation 6.00 feet;

17th. Thence easterly along the centre line of West Twenty-sixth street and across Thirteenth avenue to the easterly curb, distance 82.05 feet, elevation 5.33 feet.

Resolved, That the foregoing resolution, approving of the above-named proposed change in the map or plan of The City of New York by establishing the grades in Thirteenth avenue, adopted by this Board, together with a statement of its reasons therefor, be transmitted to the Municipal Assembly for its action thereon.

CHANGE OF GRADES, SEVENTY-FIFTH STREET, BROOKLYN.

The following report from the Chief Topographical Engineer was read :

TOPOGRAPHICAL BUREAU, March 30, 1901.

Mr. JOHN H. MOONEY, *Secretary, Board of Public Improvements* :

SIR—The Board of Public Improvements at the meeting of February 20, 1901, passed a resolution to give a public hearing on March 13, 1901, in the matter of changing the grade of Seventy-fifth street, from Sixth to Eleventh avenue, in the Thirtieth Ward, Borough of Brooklyn, in accordance with a certain map and technical description ; this hearing of March 13, 1901, was postponed to March 20, 1901, and again to March 27, 1901.

Objections having been made to certain elevations shown on the map of the Topographical Bureau, a second map or plan entitled "Plan and profile showing change of grade in Seventy-fifth street, from Sixth to Eleventh avenue, in the Thirtieth Ward, Borough of Brooklyn," was prepared, which is herewith forwarded, with a new technical description, for a public hearing and adoption.

This second plan adheres more closely to the sketch made by City Surveyor F. L. Bartlett and recommended by the Local Board of the Fifth District on January 4, 1901.

In addition I recommend that the original resolution of the Board of Public Improvements of February 20, 1901, advertising for a public hearing in this matter, be rescinded. Sketch of F. L. Bartlett is herewith returned.

Resolved, That the resolution adopted by this Board on the 20th day of February, 1901, relating to changing the grades in Seventy-fifth street, from Sixth avenue to Eleventh avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, be and the same is hereby rescinded.

Affirmative—Comptroller, Commissioner of Water Supply, Commissioner of Street Cleaning, Commissioner of Sewers, Commissioner of Bridges and President of the Board.
Negative—None.

The following resolution was then unanimously adopted :

Resolved, That the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 436 of chapter 378, Laws of 1897, deeming it for the public interest so to do, proposes to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by changing the grades in Seventy-fifth street, from Sixth avenue to Eleventh avenue, in the Thirtieth Ward, Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, more particularly described as follows :

- 1st. The elevation at the intersection of Seventy-fifth street and Sixth avenue to be 67 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore ;
- 2d. The elevation at the intersection of centre lines of Seventy-fifth street and Seventh avenue to be 82.5 feet above mean high-water datum ;
- 3d. The elevation at the northeastern curb intersection of Seventy-fifth street and Seventh avenue to be 82.4 feet above mean high-water datum ;
- 4th. The elevation at the southeastern curb intersection of Seventy-fifth street and Seventh avenue to be 83.54 feet above mean high-water datum ;
- 5th. The elevation at the intersection of centre lines of Seventy-fifth street and Fort Hamilton avenue to be 92.3 feet above mean high-water datum ;
- 6th. The elevation at the southeastern curb intersection of Seventy-fifth street and Fort Hamilton avenue to be 92.0 feet above mean high-water datum ;
- 7th. The elevation at the northeastern curb intersection of Seventy-fifth street and Fort Hamilton avenue to be 91.84 feet above mean high-water datum ;
- 8th. The elevation at a point distant 200 feet easterly from the intersection of the northern side line of Seventy-fifth street with the eastern side line of Fort Hamilton avenue to be 95.0 feet above mean high-water datum ;
- 9th. The elevation at the intersection of Seventy-fifth street and Tenth avenue to be 85.0 feet above mean high-water datum ;
- 10th. The elevation at a point distant 350 feet easterly from the eastern side line of Tenth avenue to be 86.5 feet above mean high-water datum ;
- 11th. The elevation at the intersection of Seventy-fifth street and Eleventh avenue to be 85.0 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore.

All elevations refer to mean high-water datum as established by the Department of Highways, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

Resolved, That the President of this Board cause to be prepared, for submission to this Board, three similar maps or plans for certification and filing, in the manner required by law, showing as nearly as possible the nature and extent of the proposed change of grades of the above-named street, and the location of the immediate adjacent or of intersecting open or established public streets, avenues, roads, squares or places, sufficient for the identification and location thereof.

Resolved, That this Board consider the proposed change of grades of the above-named street at a meeting of this Board to be held in the office of this Board on the 24th day of April, 1901, at 2 o'clock P. M.

Resolved, That the Secretary of this Board cause these resolutions, and a notice to all persons affected thereby that the proposed change of grades of the above-named streets will be considered at a meeting of this Board to be held at the aforesaid time and place, to be published in the CITY RECORD and corporation newspapers for ten days continuously, Sundays and legal holidays excepted, prior to the 24th day of April, 1901.

LAYING OUT PUBLIC PARK AT BENSONIA CEMETERY.

The following report from the Chief Topographical Engineer was read :

TOPOGRAPHICAL BUREAU, April 2, 1901.

Mr. JOHN H. MOONEY, *Secretary, Board of Public Improvements* :

SIR—In reply to the action taken by the Board of Public Improvements, referring for report a communication from the President of the Borough of The Bronx, stating that the resolution of the Local Board of the Twenty-first District, adopted December 27, 1900, in relation to the laying out as a public playground the block bounded by German place, St. Ann's avenue, Rae street and Carr street, Borough of The Bronx, was rescinded March 7, 1901, and recommending that the above-described block, which comprises the former Bensonia Cemetery, be laid out as a public park, I transmit herewith a map entitled "Map or plan showing the locating and laying out of a public park on the plot of ground known as Bensonia Cemetery, bounded by Rae and Carr streets, St. Ann's avenue and German place, Borough of The Bronx," was prepared and is herewith submitted with a technical description for a public hearing and adoption.

Papers in the matter herewith returned.

Resolved, That the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 436 of chapter 378, Laws of 1897, deeming it for the public interest so to do, proposes to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by the laying out as a public park of the land known as Bensonia Cemetery, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, more particularly described as follows :

CHANGE OF GRADE OF ATLANTIC AVENUE, BROOKLYN.

CHANGE OF GRADE OF SEVENTY-SECOND STREET, BROOKLYN.

The following report from the Chief Topographical Engineer was read, and the matter was referred to the Local Board :

Mr. JOHN H. MOONEY, *Secretary, Board of Public Improvements* :

SIR—In reply to the action taken by the Board of Public Improvements, referring for report a communication from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, recommending the change of grade of Seventy-second street, between Fort Hamilton avenue and Tenth avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, as described in an attached report of the Department of Highways, suggesting a grade elevation of 88 feet, distant 150 feet easterly of Fort Hamilton avenue, I transmit herewith a map entitled "Plan and profile showing change of grade in Seventy-second street, from Seventh avenue to Twelfth avenue, in the Thirtieth Ward, Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York."

The resolution of the Local Board of the Borough of Brooklyn limits the change of grade to one block, from Fort Hamilton avenue to Tenth avenue, but this proposed change affects the block from Fort Hamilton avenue to Seventh avenue, and the block from Tenth avenue to Twelfth avenue, and I recommend, therefore, that the matter be referred back to the Local Board for a new resolution which includes the blocks between Tenth avenue and Twelfth avenue, as shown on the submitted map.

The grade proposed at the intersection of Seventy-second street and Tenth avenue is 76.6 feet above high-water datum, and since the distance from Tenth avenue to Eleventh avenue is 700 feet, which requires a difference of grades of at least 3.5 feet, the filed grade at the intersection of Eleventh avenue, which is 78.9 feet above high water, is not sufficient, and a change to 80.5 feet is proposed.

This alteration will naturally affect the block from Eleventh avenue to Twelfth avenue again, and the submitted plan has therefore entirely different limits from those given in the resolution of the Local Board.

SIR—In reply to the action taken by the Board of Public Improvements, referring for report a communication from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, recommending the change of grade of Seventy-third street, from Fort Hamilton avenue to Tenth avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, as suggested by the Department of Highways, I transmit herewith a map entitled "Plan and profile showing the change of grades in Seventy-third street, from Fort Hamilton avenue to Twelfth avenue, in the Thirtieth Ward, Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York," and recommend that the matter be referred back to the Local Board for a revised resolution, because the submitted map shows change of grade over a larger extent than originally recommended.

The communication from the Deputy Commissioner of Highways suggested a crown between Fort Hamilton avenue and Tenth avenue at the point 205 feet along the centre line east of the easterly line of Fort Hamilton avenue, at an elevation of 89.8 feet above high water, and at the intersection of Tenth avenue and Seventy-third street the elevation to be 80.3 feet above high water.

The change naturally affects the block to Eleventh avenue, and because the intersection of Eleventh avenue had to be changed to obtain sufficient fall, the block from Eleventh avenue to Twelfth avenue had to be considered.

DEAR SIR—Replying to your communication of the 16th inst., transmitting copy of petition to the Board of Public Improvements, asking that the title to East One Hundred and Sixty-sixth street, from Morris to Webster avenues, be vested, I beg to report as follows :

Upon investigation, I find that there was a petition presented to the Local Board for a sewer in East One Hundred and Sixty-sixth street from Morris to Webster avenues, and that this petition was returned to the original signers by the Local Board, because of the fact that the title to this street was not vested in the City; so that when these petitioners state that the contract for the construction of sewer in East One Hundred and Sixty-sixth street, between Morris and Webster avenues is about ready to be let, such is not the case.

However, should title to this street be vested in the City, proceedings could be begun and pushed to a conclusion for the construction of this sewer.

The sewer in East One Hundred and Sixty-sixth street, from Morris to Webster avenues, which these petitioners are anxious to procure, would act as an outlet sewer into Webster avenue, for the following streets :

Teller avenue, from One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street to the summit north of East One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street.

Findley avenue, from One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street to One Hundred and Sixty-eighth street.

College avenue, from One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street to One Hundred and Sixty-eighth street.

To none of these streets has the City title.

I would therefore recommend that the Board of Public Improvements be urged to not only act upon this petition and vest title to One Hundred and Sixty-sixth street, from Webster to Morris avenues; that is, if the Commissioners for the said proceedings have been appointed by the Supreme Court; but also that if Commissioners have been appointed by the Supreme Court for the proceedings of opening Teller, Findley and College avenues, from East One Hundred and Sixty-fourth to East One Hundred and Seventieth street, that title be vested in these streets also so that the sewers can be built in East One Hundred and Sixty-sixth street, from Morris to Webster avenues, and the branches in Teller, Findley and College avenues, also under the same contract. However, should the Commissioners not have been appointed for Teller, Findley and College avenues, it would not be advisable to wait for such proceedings, but it would be best to vest title in East One Hundred and Sixty-sixth street, from Morris to Webster avenues at once, if possible, and proceed with the construction of sewer in East One Hundred and Sixty-sixth street only.

DEAR SIR—In compliance with a letter dated February 21, 1901, from the Secretary of the Board, transmitting resolution adopted by the Local Board of the Twenty-first District, Borough of The Bronx, recommending that East One Hundred and Seventy-second street, between Third avenue and Park avenue, be paved with sheet asphalt on a concrete foundation, I beg to report that title to this street has been acquired by the City; that the roadway has been regulated and graded, and that a sewer has been constructed therein. It is necessary that the improvement provided for in the resolution be carried out as early as practicable, and I recommend accordingly. The estimated cost of the work, including five years' maintenance, is \$11,000, and the assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$393,300.

river, be regulated and graded, curbstones set and sidewalks flagged a space four feet wide through the centre thereof, crosswalks laid (approaches built and fences erected where necessary) and trees planted on the sidewalks, I beg to say that I have made an investigation, and find that the City has acquired title to the street, and that a sewer has been constructed in the greater part thereof. This street forms an important cross-town connection, and it is necessary to improve it as soon as possible. I therefore recommend that the work called for in the resolution of the Local Board be authorized.

The estimated cost, including six months' maintenance, is \$53,000, and the assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$486,635.

DEAR SIR—On January 23, 1900, the Secretary of the Board transmitted to this Department a resolution adopted by the Local Board of the Twenty-first District, Borough of The Bronx, recommending the regulating and grading, setting of curbstones, flagging of sidewalks, a space four feet wide through the centre thereof, the laying of crosswalks, the building of approaches, and the erection of fences where necessary, in East One Hundred and Seventy-eighth street (formerly Elmwood place), between Prospect avenue and Franklin avenue, Borough of The Bronx.

I have made an investigation and find that the City has not yet acquired title to that section of East One Hundred and Seventy-eighth street, but it is understood that proceedings to vest in the City title to the street have been initiated. It is desirable and necessary that the proposed improvement be carried out when title to the street is acquired, and the awarding of a contract and the prosecution of the work can be postponed until that time.

The estimated cost of the improvement is \$3,800, and the assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$48,050.

I recommend that the work be authorized.

DEAR SIR—On January 17, 1900, I wrote you as follows:

"I understand that a petition has been presented to the Board of Public Improvements for the extension of John street, from its present terminus to Franklin street, Borough of Richmond. I am also informed that this extension is included in the street system now being prepared, and is shown on the map of the city.

It appears that John street is at present a deadened street about four or five hundred feet in length. The grade of the street runs downward from the connection with Richmond terrace to the southerly end thereof, causing a swampy condition at that point, there being no outlet for the storm water which, if John street were properly graded, would be carried off by other streets. There are a number of small houses on this street, and a great deal of sickness has been caused by the swampy condition of the ground. It is therefore very necessary that the work of extending John street should be pushed ahead as rapidly as possible."

I am in receipt of a communication from the Deputy Commissioner of Highways, Borough of Richmond, that the residents and property-owners of the district affected by the extension of John street are constantly inquiring why the street is not extended as petitioned for. The Deputy Commissioner further states that the swampy condition of the ground continues to be the cause of much sickness, and that therefore prompt action is very necessary.
