Dear Sir—Your proposition of December 29, 1903, for making and furnishing four (4) separate maps, viz., Blackwell's Island, Randall's Island, New York City Farm Colony (located on Staten Island) and Kings County Hospital grounds (located in Brooklyn); these four maps, finished and arranged in a movable cabinet case, for the sum of five hundred and eighty-seven dollars and fifty cents, is accepted.

The Blackwell's and Randall's Island maps will be drawn on a scale of 100 feet to an inch, and the two last named maps possibly on a still larger scale. The size of these maps will be the same, about 5 by 7 feet, including a proper margin. They will show the streets and avenues laid out, the location and ground shape of all buildings, showing the same in tints, and giving on the map the names of the various buildings.

Referring to Blackwell's Island, the map will be made divided in halves, one half placed above the other and the adjacent shores shown on each side, indicating the commencing street lines, starting from the water front, and giving, in some instances, the names of the principal streets. You will also color or tint the water fronts and will show on the Randall's Island map what is called a "sub-plan" of Greater New York; a skeleton map only, on a very small scale, for the purpose of locating the different hospitals, coming within the limits of Greater New York.

On the large scale map, you will show recent important improvements proposed and under way, viz., the Blackwell's Island Bridge, the proposed Rapid Transit Railroad over Randall's Island, ferries, etc.

Each map will have its appropriate title, neatly lettered. You enclose with this estimate a piece of one of the pages of your City atlas, which will give a correct idea of the style of the work made in your office. The scale of this map is to be 80 feet to an inch, a little larger than the one you are now proposing to prepare for us.

To recapitulate: The price of the Blackwell's Island map is \$160, the Randall's Island map and Greater New York map is \$180, the Staten Island map \$12.50 and the Kings County map \$92.50, the specially constructed movable cabinet case \$42.50, making the sum total \$587.50.

In order to make the Kings County Hospital grounds map a little more prominent and to fill up some of the vacant space, you will add some of the surrounding lands, say, a block or two all around, this you will show in plain black, lighter lines, in order to distinguish more properly the hospital grounds.

Proceedings of the Municipal Explosives Commission at meeting held at Fire Department Headquarters at 9 a. m. on Tuesday, December 22, 1903.

Present—The Chairman, and Commissioners Charlton, Eaton and McKenna. Commissioner McKenna presented a report of his investigation of the conditions at the warehouse of the Mallinckrodt Chemical Company, No. 90 William street and Platt street.

The Chairman laid before the Commission a communication from the Mayor's office dated December 21, 1903, transmitting chapter III. of part VI. of the Regulations, Chemical Factories and Technical Establishments, and chapter III. of part IX., Acetylene, same having been approved by the Mayor on December 21; also part VII., Inflammable and Volatile Oils, with suggested amendment as to the maximum amount of naphtha to be stored in automobile storage stations in tanks. Upon motion the suggestions of the Mayor relative to modification of the suggested regulations as embraced in part VII. were then taken up for consideration.

It was regularly moved and seconded that the words on line 9, section 38 (a), of part VII., be amended to read "two hundred and seventy-five (275) gallons" instead of "one hundred and ten (110) gallons." Motion carried.

It was regularly moved and seconded that the Commission forward to the Mayor the completed printed form of all regulations now herewith and heretofore formulated by the Commission, and that same be submitted to His Honor for formal approval as a body of regulations. Motion carried.

A letter was then prepared, to be forwarded to the Mayor, as follows:

Hon. SETH LOW, Mayor, City of New York:

Sir—Having already forwarded to you the completed work of our Commission dealing with the regulation of the hazard in our City from explosives and combustibles, in the course of which we have been obliged to consider (1) blasting explosives, (2) ammunition, (3) fireworks, (4) drugs and chemicals, (5) inflammable and volatile oils, and (6) the general miscellaneous articles which in the practice of the arts are subject to risk of explosion or extremely rapid combustion, we feel that we should call your attention to some vital facts which concern the public and the general trade interests of our City.

In the first place, we should report to you that although in some instances we met with opposition in the beginning from interests whose representatives supposed that we were unwisely hampering their business, yet in every case we have closed our work with the general acquiescence and hearty support of every trade interest represented, even where in some cases severe restrictions have been imposed in novel ways. The explanation of this is found in the full comprehension reached ultimately by all good citizens who deal with these articles of the real right possessed by the municipal authorities to watch over and provide for the safety of life and property in a City whose activities are growing at a pace which when set down in figures would appear to be fabulous.

We wish to call your attention to the fact that in the future every trade interest will find a flexible system of ordinances and regulations embodied in this set now forwarded to you and included in them in such a way that any hazardous articles, either newly discovered or suddenly coming into use in unusually large quantities and thus for the first time making a hazard, shall come automatically under the control of the Fire Department. In this way, also, unfair pressure upon the user of such articles can be avoided by the appeal which will always lie from the Fire Department to the Municipal Explosives Commission, which latter is carefully selected and designed to avoid unfairness and to be in fact a Board of Arbitration in questions arising under the explosives regulations.

Finally, we would wish to call your attention to the fact that in our studies and work upon this subject we have communicated with the authorities of all the large and important cities of Europe and America and have used such portions of material thus obtained as was applicable to the conditions here, and have been aided constantly by the great experience of the Fire Underwriters of this country upon this subject.

We hope, therefore, and believe, that we present herewith to you a system of regulations of explosives and combustibles which if enforced and observed will throw around the risk which is inherent in the use of such articles in New York City the greatest degree of safety compatible with the necessary latitude required by the commercial interests engaged in these very active industries.

It is proper to call your attention to the fact that in no city in the world, so far as our investigations have disclosed, are there regulations which even approximately approach the completeness of these here presented, and there is no city, either in Europe or America, which has approached this important problem in the same exhaustive and methodical way; and as indicative of the general interest in the matter we would also add that we are constantly in receipt of requests from the authorities of other cities for copies of our work.

Reading of the minutes of previous meeting was dispensed with.

Commissioners McKenna and Charlton, as a sub-committee appointed at meeting of December 14 to visit and report upon the conditions found at the drug storage warehouse of the Mallinckrodt Chemical Works, No. 80 William street, presented the following report:

New York, December 29, 1903.

Hon. THOMAS STURGIS, Chairman, Municipal Explosives Commission:

Dear Sir—We have the honor to report as follows upon the conditions found by us at the warehouse of the Mallinckrodt Chemical Works, No. 80 William street, in the Borough of Manhattan, having in view the fact that they wish to apply for supplementary permits for the storage of ethers and certain other chemicals.

Upon our visit to that warehouse we found the conditions and description of the premises in full accord with survey on file in the Bureau of Combustibles. We found that the storage vault for ethers, which is located in the yard in the angle made by the William street building and its L to Platt street, is a one-story brick building of very substantial construction, provided with an underwriter's double safety door of entrance. The cleanliness of the place and freedom from packing material or dangerous light stuff was remarkable. Ether is stored in large quantity in five-gallon drums, and also there is a very considerable amount of ether on shelves in the usual one, two and five-pound cans. This firm does a very large daily business in supplying the hospitals with ether and chloroform.

We have only one feature of this storage place to call attention to, and that is, it is so very substantial and, as it were, rigid, that in case of an explosion within it the damage would be greater than if there were some part of the structure that could yield more easily. We would therefore recommend for your consideration the question as to whether a trap-door could not and should not be provided in the roof of this brick vault, so arranged that, while fully protecting the vault from the weather, would yet be ready to lift and allow a more easy escape for gases that might result in case of fire in the vault.

Regarding the storage of chemicals, among which may be included the cylinders of compressed gases which this firm carries in the basement of this building, we believe that they should have, if they request it, more latitude than is given in the maximum schedules for wholesale storage, because we find that they do not keep a heterogeneous assortment of chemicals, that their storage room is very spacious, not at all crowded, and extremely well ordered and kept, and, finally, that the experience which the manager of the establishment has is of the best type. From all this we believe that if they make an application for a supplementary permit for larger quantities than they are now allowed, and give proof of the necessity in their business for the carrying of such quantities, that such permit may be safely granted to them.
