Dear Sir—I beg to advise you further in regard to the resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen May 3, 1910, requesting the Public Service Commission to direct the Brooklyn Union Elevated Railroad Company to erect and maintain a station at Cumberland street, on the Myrtle avenue elevated line, Brooklyn, that the matter has been given careful attention and the Commission does not believe that it should at present take steps to secure the construction of the proposed station for the following reasons:

The average daily number of passenger fares collected at the Vanderbilt avenue and Navy street stations is only 1,300 each, making a total daily average originating passenger traffic of but 2,600 for the two stations. The proposed station might be expected to accommodate not more than one-third of this number, or about 830, but inasmuch as Fort Greene Park occupies a considerable part of the territory which would, theoretically, be served by the proposed station on the east side of Myrtle avenue, an originating traffic of even less than 830 might be anticipated. It does not seem, therefore, that there is any considerable passenger demand for the proposed station.

The proposed station would have to be erected on a 1 per cent. track grade, which is not considered advisable from an operating point of view.

The distance between the Navy street and Vanderbilt avenue stations is approximately 2,850 feet, and between Cumberland street and Vanderbilt avenue only about 1,050 feet. The former is not considered too great a distance between elevated stations, but the latter certainly is too short a distance.

Careful study of the subject has convinced the Commission that in a great majority of cases additional station stops which might accommodate a local demand would militate against the rapid transit needs of the vast majority.

Whereas, The custom has become almost universal in the City of New York, including Flatbush and the surrounding territory, when naming or renaming streets, of borrowing titles from foreign countries, the choice of which in some instances representing individuals, places or periods in history that are worthy of mention, but in other cases perpetuating memories that recall nothing but deeds of violence, bloodshed and the cruel oppression of human rights; and

Whereas, Considering its comparative brief existence among the great nations of the world, there is none that can rival this land of ours in the production of more striking examples of self-sacrifice, patriotism, generosity, at times shared by the whole world, or on the pages of whose history are recorded the lives of greater statesmen, more brilliant heroes or eminent citizens in every walk of civil or professional life, or on the pages of earth's literature are to be found anything more beautiful, quaint or tragic than that which is described in the annals of America's colonial days and the legends of the aboriginal tribes.

Resolved, That we deplore the practice of seeking names for our thoroughfares from abroad and declare it to be unpatriotic and a shameful ignoring of the multitude who, in the past, have sacrificed life and treasure for the preservation of this nation, and an apparent indifference of the many incidents entwined in our country's history that should be provided with monuments in some form whenever the opportunity offers; and be it further

Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be sent to the several members who compose the Special Committee of the Board of Aldermen appointed to select new names for streets.

To the Board of Aldermen, New York City:

Gentlemen—Whereas, For the past three years, three portable buildings have been used by Public School 15, The Bronx, causing great suffering to the pupils, many of whom have contracted rheumatism and other ailments, the ill effects of which they will feel for a long time.

Whereas, It is now proposed to continue and extend the portable buildings of Public School 15 by sending three more portables to that school, thus putting half the school in portables.

Whereas, A brook extending from the Catholic Protectory to the junction of Commonwealth and Westchester avenues, empties into one of the largest swamps in The Bronx immediately in the rear of Public School 15. This brook is used as an open sewer and is only 50 feet distant from proposed portables. The odor from the sewer and the swamps is extremely unhealthy.

Whereas, Physicians from the Health Department have declared the portables to be unsanitary; it is hereby

Resolved, That the United East Bronx Property Owners' Association is emphatically opposed to the erection of any more portables for Public School 15, The Bronx; it is further

Resolved, That a copy of the above resolutions be sent to the Board of Education, the Mayor of The City of New York, the Comptroller, the President of the Borough of The Bronx, the Board of Aldermen, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the "North Side News."

COMMUNICATIONS FROM CITY, COUNTY AND BOROUGH OFFICERS.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the Comptroller:

No. 1124.

Department of Finance, City of New York,
Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics,
June 6, 1910.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—Section 900 of the amended Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"It shall be the duty of the comptroller of said city to prepare and submit to the board of aldermen, at least four weeks before its annual meeting in each and every year, for the purposes of imposing the annual taxes, a statement setting forth the amounts by law authorized to be raised by tax in that year, on account of the corporation of the city of New York, as hereby constituted, or for city purposes within said city as created by this act, and purposes for which said city is liable, and on account of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, and also an estimate of the probable amount of receipts into the city treasury during the then current year from all sources of revenue of the general funds, including surplus revenue from the sinking funds of the mayor, aldermen and commonalty of the city of New York and of any of the municipal and public corporations, or parts of municipal and public corporations by this act consolidated with the municipal corporation known as the mayor, aldermen and commonalty of the city of New York, other than the surplus of revenues of any such sinking funds for the payment of interest on the city debt of the municipal corporation known as the mayor, aldermen and commonalty of the city of New York, or the like debts of the municipal and public corporations by this act consolidated as aforesaid, and the said board of aldermen is hereby authorized and directed to deduct the total amount of such estimated receipts from the aggregate amount of all the various sums which by law they are required to order and caused to be raised by tax in said year, for the purposes aforesaid, and to cause to be raised by tax only the balance of such aggregate amount after making such deductions."

Section 902 of the amended Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"In the statement submitted by the comptroller to the board of aldermen, as above provided in this chapter, he shall each year include and state specifically the sum or sums necessary to be raised to pay during the current year the salaries of the county officers and the other county charges and expenses in the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, respectively, and the board of aldermen is hereby authorized and directed to levy upon and collect from the taxable property within each of said counties, respectively, the sum or sums so necessary to be raised to pay the salaries of county officers and other county charges and expenses of such county; to the end that each of said counties shall ultimately bear and pay all expenses necessary to be incurred within the county for county as distinguished from city purposes."

In pursuance of the foregoing provisions of law, I have the honor to submit to your Honorable Body statement, as follows:

First—The Budget in detail, for the year 1910.

Second—The amount of County charges and expenses in the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, respectively, included in said Budget, as well as the amount of County charges and expenses paid during the year 1909 from the proceeds of special revenue bonds, which amounts together are to be raised respectively by levy upon taxable property within each of said Counties, as provided by section 902 of the Charter.

Third—The estimated receipts of the General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation.

BUDGET FOR 1910.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment makes this the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and ten, being: First, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of said City for the said year, viz., one hundred and fifty-three million seven hundred and seventy-five thousand one hundred and forty-five dollars and fifty-three cents (\$153,775,145.53); Second, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the charges and expenses of the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond for the said year, viz., five million three hundred and fifty-five thousand one hundred and twenty-four dollars and eighty-four cents (\$5,355,124.84), and, Third, the amount estimated to be the deficiency on January 1, 1909, in the product of taxes theretofore levied, deemed to be uncollectible and not otherwise provided for, as required by chapter 209 of the Laws of 1906, viz., four million dollars (\$4,000,000).

Be it further Resolved, That, in pursuance of the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment makes this the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and ten, with the exception that the items contained in the schedules under the titles "Salaries" or "Salaries and Wages," in the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City and County governments, shall be administered under the following terms and conditions:

First—That no change shall be made by any Board or head of an Office, Bureau or Department in the City or County governments in the schedules of "Salaries" and "Salaries and Wages," herein contained, except when authorized thereto by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and when such change will not increase the monthly rate of the total amount herein appropriated for the said schedules of "Salaries" and "Salaries and Wages" for monthly payrolls in the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County governments.

Second—(a) That the heads of the several Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City and County governments shall prepare their several payrolls for audit by the Department of Finance in accordance with the items of the aforesaid schedules, entitled "Salaries" and "Salaries and Wages"; and (b) set forth on monthly payrolls the monthly pro rata expenditures of (said) appropriations for monthly payrolls; (c) affix to all payrolls a certificate made by the person preparing such payrolls to the effect that there is a time record on file in said Board, Office, Bureau or Department, certified by the person or persons having knowledge of the facts, showing the character of service and the exact time of employment of such person or persons on said payrolls, and that the distribution or division of the time of such person or persons as shown on such payrolls is in accordance with such time record.

Be it further Resolved, That all appropriations for (1) supplies; (2) general supplies; (3) materials for repairs and replacements; (4) fuel, and (5) forage, to any Board, Office, Bureau or Department of the City or County governments, made in this Budget, be made under the following conditions:

First—That, in so far as practicable, all contracts and open market orders for the purchase of such "Supplies," "General Supplies," "Materials for Repairs and Replacements," "Fuel" and "Forage" be based upon specifications which are definite and certain as to character and quality, and which conform with standard specifications for the various classes of supplies, materials, fuel and forage hereafter to be promulgated by this Board.

Second—That, in so far as such standard specifications may hereafter be established by this Board, the Comptroller, at the time of certifying as to the sufficiency of appropriations out of which contracts for "Supplies," "General Supplies," "Materials for Repairs and Replacements," "Fuel" and "Forage" are to be paid, shall also certify that the specifications for such supplies or materials for which standard specifications have been prescribed, are in conformance with such standard specifications.

Third—That all open market orders issued by any Department for supplies or materials, for which standard specifications shall have been prescribed, shall contain a description of the goods ordered, conforming with such standard specifications.

Fourth—That the Comptroller shall, in auditing claims for goods delivered on open market orders, determine, through inspection or otherwise, whether the goods delivered conform with such standard specifications.

3. All institutions receiving public moneys and all their books of record and accounts shall at all reasonable times be open to the visitation, inspection and examination of duly authorized representatives of the Department of Finance and at all proper times the Department of Public Charities shall have access to the record of inmates.

4. Upon its appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interest to withhold payments to any charitable institution for which an apportionment has been made, he shall in his discretion suspend payments and give written notice to such institution of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to cease making further payments, and upon the determination of such Board that such payments shall terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment for services rendered thereafter shall thereupon end.

5. Where apportionments are made upon a per capita basis for inmates of private charitable institutions, there will be no payments unless the inmates shall have been accepted by the Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities as proper charges against the City; and except in emergency cases, the Commissioner of Charities shall not accept as proper charges persons capable of paying for their own support, or for whose care adequate provision can be made in public hospitals.

In determining the acceptance of patients in private hospitals as proper charges, the Commissioner of Charities shall first consider the nature of the services actually rendered to the patients by the hospitals. The records of the institutions and the bed-card notes showing the treatment given shall be received as the essential evidence in deciding acceptances or rejections. *The City shall not be liable for any payment to charitable institutions in excess of the apportionment which may have been made to such institutions, notwithstanding the acceptances of the Commissioner of Charities or any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for the inmates thereof.*

6. All institutions receiving money from the City are required to state specifically the amount so received, as from the City Treasury, in their printed annual reports.

7. No money shall be paid to any private charitable institution which pays any salary to or gives any consideration, financial or of any kind, for services to, or that has any business dealing with, or secures goods or merchandise, directly or indirectly, from any officer or trustee or member of its Board of Managers.

8. That charitable institutions for children now carried in the Budget and not sending their inmates to the Public Schools, and not sharing in the Corporate School Fund, and not receiving teachers and school supplies from the Board of Education, but giving in their own buildings secular education to the children resident in the institutions, shall be paid a per capita of 7 cents per day, five school days in the week, for each child receiving such instruction of four years of age and over during ten months in the year. This money to be paid under the authorization of section 230 of the Charter, but under the general conditions relating to institutions receiving Corporate School money, as provided in section 1154.

9. Magistrates are requested to transfer dependent, and when judicious, no proper guardianship children, and all cases coming to their attention in the courts where no crime is proven against the child, to the Commissioner of Charities, who can commit to institutions. Magistrates are earnestly requested not to commit a dependent child to an institution on a court commitment.

10. The Commissioner of Charities is instructed to take such steps, either by appeal to the national authorities or by proper bills to the Legislature, as to provide that the children of emigrants abandoned within one year after arrival in this City be returned to the country whence they came.

11. No dependent child under sixteen years of age shall be accepted as a proper charge upon the City and no money will be paid for the care, support, maintenance or education of such child unless it shall have been lawfully committed to a suitable private charitable institution having its own plant and equipment for the proper protection and care of children, under the supervision of the State Board of Charities, and has been placed in this Budget by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

This order has no relation to the class of children of such mental and physical condition as those cared for in the City Institution at Randall's Island.

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—On behalf of the committee appointed by the Board to report upon the standardization of contracts and specifications for highway work, and by authority of the said committee, I beg to suggest that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment recommend to the Board of Aldermen the adoption of a resolution authorizing the retention of certain percentages on contracts for asphalt and asphalt block pavements in all Boroughs.

On June 26, 1908 (see page 2689 of the Financial Minutes of that date), the Board recommended to the Board of Aldermen that it authorize the President of the Borough of Manhattan to provide in contracts for sheet asphalt and asphalt block pavements for the retention of 8 per cent. of the cost of the work as a guarantee for the necessary maintenance, the money so retained to be payable in equal installments at the end of the second, third, fourth and fifth years, this, of course, being applicable to contracts containing a guarantee for maintenance for five years. When the Board of Estimate and Apportionment took this action it had before it two different suggestions, one being the retention of 8 per cent. of the contract price, as above described, and the other being the provision annually of a certain sum, estimated to be \$15,000, for the Borough of Manhattan, from which the expense of repairs of pavements under guarantee could be met in case the contractor failed to live up to the obligations imposed by his contract for maintenance during the guarantee period. That some provision for promptly making such repairs is necessary is quite apparent, the President of the Borough of Manhattan having been very seriously embarrassed where the contractor has failed to make the repairs called for by his guarantee and where no funds were available for the purpose. Whether the Board ultimately adopts the plan of retaining a certain portion of the money earned, or whether it decides to provide annually a sum from which the expense of such repairs can be met and then recovers the amount so expended through suits brought against the contractors and their sureties, the authority to retain this percentage can be given whether it is availed of or not, and the committee therefore recommends the adoption by the Board of the accompanying resolution.

Gentlemen—At a meeting of your Board held May 13, 1910, there was referred to the Comptroller a resolution of the Board of Aldermen adopted April 19, 1910, approving the request of the President of the Borough of Richmond for an issue of special revenue bonds to the amount of \$285 to provide means for the payment of rent of premises for an office for the Engineers of the Bureau of Sewers. In connection therewith I submit the following report:

Under date of May 18, 1910, the Comptroller submitted a report to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, in which it is shown that the City, by an order of the President of the Borough of Richmond, took possession of the premises No. 205 Canal street, Stapleton, Borough of Richmond, on November 1, 1909, at a monthly rental of \$30, with the idea that the rent would be a proper charge against the Street Improvement Fund. The report further states that the Corporation Counsel had submitted to the President an opinion in which he stated that it would be improper to charge rent of the Engineers' office to the Street Improvement Fund. The President thereupon made request to the Board of Aldermen for an issue of special revenue bonds for \$285 with which to pay the rent, which is the matter under consideration. The question as to the reasonableness of the rent has been passed upon by the Comptroller in his report to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, in which it is recommended that the execution of a lease be authorized for the premises No. 205 Canal street, Stapleton, Borough of Richmond, for the use of the Engineers of the Bureau of Sewers for a period of fourteen months, from November 1, 1909, to December 31, 1910; the rent for the first five months being fixed at \$30 per month and the remaining nine months at \$15 per month.

In view of the facts, I would recommend that the request be approved subject to the concurrence of the Board of Aldermen to an amendment to its resolution adopted April 19, 1910, so as to read:

"Resolved, That, in pursuance of the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is hereby requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue special revenue bonds to the amount of two hundred and eighty-five dollars (\$285), the proceeds whereof to be used by

the Comptroller for the purpose of paying the rent of an office for use of Engineers on construction of sewers in Stapleton, in the Borough of Richmond."

Gentlemen—At a meeting of your Board held on May 6, 1910, a resolution presented from the Board of Aldermen recommending the authorization of the issue of special revenue bonds to the amount of \$800 to be used for the purpose of paying the rent of the premises No. 117 West One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street, Borough of Manhattan, for the accommodation of Nurses at Harlem Hospital, during the remainder of the year 1910, was referred to me for consideration.

I would report that the Sinking Fund Commissioners have approved of the lease of the building No. 117 West One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street, at an annual rental of \$1,200.

A schedule of premises rented for the use of City Departments is prepared annually, by the Sinking Fund Commissioners in anticipation of the Budget, in which provision is made for the payment of rentals of such premises for the ensuing year.

Under a resolution of the Sinking Fund Commissioner rents for buildings leased after the adoption of the Budget shall be assumed by the Department interested during the first year.

The President of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals states that the two adjoining buildings, Nos. 113 and 115 West One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street, have been occupied by Nurses from the Harlem Hospital. On account of the increased number of patients in the hospital, it has been found necessary to house nearly all the Nurses in the rented buildings. There are now seventeen Nurses and one Ward Maid in No. 113, and twenty-one Nurses and one Ward Maid in No. 115. In the latter building three Nurses are quartered in the basement.

The President says that owing to the increase in the number of patients in the hospital, ten additional Nurses have been appointed within the last two years, making a total of about fifty Nurses, most of whom have been accommodated in the two houses; that four Nurses live in a room which is barely large enough for two, and it is essential that additional quarters be provided.

The President claims that there is not sufficient unencumbered balance remaining in any other fund to permit of the transfer therefrom of the amount required for this purpose.

In view of the facts above stated, I recommend the authorization of the issue of special revenue bonds to the amount of \$800 to provide for the payment of rent of No. 117 West One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street, Manhattan, during the remainder of the year 1910, beginning May 1, subject to the concurrence of the Board of Aldermen in an amendment of its resolution adopted April 12, 1910, so as to read as follows:

Resolved, That, in pursuance of the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue special revenue bonds to the amount of eight hundred dollars (\$800), the proceeds whereof to be used by the Comptroller for the purpose of meeting rent of premises No. 117 West One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street, Borough of Manhattan, for accommodation of Nurses at Harlem Hospital during the remainder of the year 1910.

Gentlemen—Under date of March 11, 1910, the President of the Borough of Richmond requested the establishment of the grade of the position of Superintendent of Buildings, with a salary at the rate of \$3,000, which matter was referred by your Board to a Select Committee consisting of the Comptroller and the President of the Board of Aldermen.

In the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn and The Bronx the rate of compensation for the Superintendent of Buildings is \$5,000 per annum. The rate paid in the Borough of Queens is \$3,000. The present rate of Richmond, therefore, is \$500 less than the lowest rate paid for similar service in the city.

The President has stated that the present incumbent is a man of large experience in the building line and that he has served in the capacity of Superintendent of Buildings since 1902, receiving the sum of \$2,500 per annum during the entire term of service.

In view of the facts submitted, your Committee recommends the adoption of the resolution attached hereto.

I have held the office of Park Commissioner in these Boroughs now for almost five months and my experience has shown me most clearly that in order to do efficient work as Park Commissioner I must be supplied with an automobile.

At present the Park Commissioner is obliged to make his trips to Departments and over the parks of the City in a single seated carriage. Time and time again we have been subjected to the ridiculous necessity of going forth on important park errands, myself in the first single seated carriage, the Chief Engineer following in another single seated carriage, and after him the Landscape Architect in another single seated carriage.

I might dwell also on the vast loss of time, due not only to such a condition of affairs, but to the fact that I myself, in attempting to cope with the vast activities of this office, must attempt to cover long distances and reach numerous points behind a slow-going team of horses.

In brief, I consider the automobile which I now ask your Honorable Body to permit me to purchase without public letting an absolute necessity. I therefore beg leave to submit to your Board the following resolution for your consideration:

Whereas, Sites in these localities have been negotiated and reported by the Comptroller to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in December of last year for acquisition by private purchase or by condemnation proceedings; and

Whereas, An appropriation was made in May of 1909 in the sum sufficient for the purchase or condemnation thereof; and

Whereas, No action has been taken by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment looking towards the acquisition of these sites so recommended to be acquired since 1909; therefore be it

Sir—It is my desire, if possible, to do away with the nuisance which is created when the drivers of Department ash and garbage carts dump the material from the cans into the carts. Clouds of dust arise when the ashes are emptied, and a disagreeable odor escapes when the garbage cans are dumped.

Several propositions have been made regarding the covering of carts, or installing a new kind of conveyance, some of which are reasonable. Another plan is to purchase an automobile truck upon which cans may be placed and carried to the water-front before dumping, thereby saving the work of four or five horses and carts.

To carefully investigate this matter, I request that your Board authorize an issue of special revenue bonds to the amount of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000). Such an expenditure will be economical and valuable, for whatever money is put into covered carts or an automobile truck will be of great use to this Department.

Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, President of the Board of Aldermen:

Sir—In the Budget appropriations for this Department for the present year, 1910, provision is made for coal supply for the Municipal Ferry Service in the sum of \$360,000.

This amount has been estimated as being sufficient to meet requirements for the year 1910, but with the expenditure of this amount alone the Department would be left at the end of the year with no available coal contract for deliveries after January 1, 1911, and it would then be necessary to enter into new contracts in midwinter, the most inopportune time of the year to enter into such contracts.

The Department is at present receiving its coal supply for the Ferry Service under contracts entered into in 1909, and it is estimated that on these contracts the sum of about \$150,000 will be charged against the 1910 Budget appropriations.

In order, therefore, that the Department may be placed in position to advertise and enter into new contracts for coal supply for the remainder of this year and for the first part of the year 1911, to take advantage of the low prices obtainable at this time of the year, it will be necessary to make available an additional sum of about \$150,000 to offset the amount expended and charged against the Budget appropriations for coal already contracted for, and I therefore hereby respectfully request that, pursuant to the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Charter, a resolution be adopted by you requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the Comptroller to issue special revenue bonds in the sum of \$150,000 for the purpose of permitting the Department to enter into a contract this summer for a supply of coal for the Municipal Ferry Service to meet the requirements of the Ferry Service until the summer of 1911.

As hereinbefore stated, if this additional amount is not available the Department could only contract for deliveries for the remainder of the year 1910, much to the City's disadvantage.

The Department cannot advertise a contract for a year's supply at this time under the present appropriation, leaving a portion of the contract to be certified against the funds to be provided in the Budget for the year 1911, as such procedure would be contrary to the provisions of section 1542 of the Charter, which provides that expendi-

tures shall not exceed appropriations, and the only method therefore available is to provide the funds by the issuance of the special revenue bonds.

Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, President of the Board of Aldermen:

Sir—As part of the reorganization of the Engineering Bureau, I believe that much greater efficiency and considerable economy in the operation of the repair gangs in the distribution system would be secured by assigning to these gangs auto-trucks, similar to those now used by the gas companies in their emergency work, since, by this means, not only would time be saved in the transportation of these gangs, but it would be unnecessary to have three shifts for every day of horses and wagons, as at present.

Before adopting this as a general measure, I think it advisable to make a preliminary trial by purchasing only one auto-truck, which will be particularly assigned to respond in cases of breaks or other emergencies in the mains, hydrants or valves in the high pressure fire system, where quick action is imperative.

The Sinking Fund Commission has allotted to this Department the ground floor of a building at North Moore street and West Broadway, which will be the quarters for an emergency gang, and where there is sufficient space for storing the auto-truck. It is not practicable to prepare contracts and specifications upon which competitive bids can be received, as there is no doubt that all auto vehicles are patented, and if one particular style were selected as a standard, the Department could not consistently ask for competitive bids. A suitable auto-truck can be purchased for about \$3,000, and the Department, I believe, can secure the best vehicle if it has authority to purchase the style best adapted for the Department's requirements after due examination and trial.

I would therefore respectfully request that, under the provisions of section 419 of the Charter, authority be given to expend \$3,000 for the purchase of an auto-truck for the purpose above stated, without the formality of advertising for competitive bids or proposals.

Dear Sir—Under a resolution passed by the Board of Aldermen May 10, 1910, which, it seems, became effective May 24 without the signature of the Mayor, a drinking fountain is now being erected on Broad street, opposite the New York Stock Exchange. This fountain, which is of large and ungainly proportions and anything but picturesque, is being placed on the sidewalk immediately in front of our banking office, and we wish to enter a respectful but vigorous protest against its erection. Broad street is occupied almost entirely by banking and brokerage offices, and is one of the busiest thoroughfares in the city between the hours of 10 and 3 o'clock. It is the concourse for thousands of people, up and down, many of whom, including messenger boys, are the bearers of securities and cash whose valuation runs into hundreds of thousands of dollars. The fountain is liable at times to attract large crowds, and if permitted to remain in its present position will make it an easy matter, owing to the already congested condition of the street, for pickpockets to rob runners and messengers.

For the reason above given, therefore, we urge that the fountain, if necessary, should be located lower down Broad street, where there is more room, and respectfully request that the Board of Aldermen withdraw its permission for the continuance of the fountain in the location mentioned.

Inasmuch as this appropriation cannot be made available until June 15 at the earliest, the Committee has reduced the amount and recommends that the accompanying resolution for \$7,263.35 be adopted:

Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, President, Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—Your attention is called to the necessity of keeping accurate records of all subsurface constructions. The Bronx is growing so rapidly, and sewers, gas mains, water mains and conduits for telephone, telegraph and electric light and power lines are being constructed in such large numbers that unless the work of preparing accurate maps is taken up at once the opportunity will be lost.

The importance of such records can hardly be overestimated. The location, size and character of all existing subsurface work should be determined as soon as possible, in order that new work may be properly located, that street openings for connections may be as small and as few as possible, that corporations and contractors doing work in the streets may have accurate information as to the conditions which they may expect to find, and, in general, that the City may be in a position to know what subsurface structures have been built, when, and by whom, and may direct where new structures may be built to the best advantage.

Work of this character is being done with success elsewhere, notably in Brooklyn, Philadelphia and Boston. In Brooklyn the Bureau has been in satisfactory operation for three or four years. In Philadelphia a large force is kept busy making and maintaining the records. The information is sold to interested parties, and the revenue derived from that source is sufficient not only to support the Bureau, but also to return a very considerable profit.

It is believed that such a system could be devised for this Borough, and that the Bureau could be operated without cost to the City. In order to properly inaugurate this work and to secure the locations, etc., of all existing structures, it will be necessary to immediately organize a force whose entire time would be devoted to the work. An approximate estimate of the annual cost is as follows:

The necessity for the immediate organization of a Bureau of this sort cannot be too strongly urged. Delay would not only increase the expense of gathering information relating to existing work, but would postpone the enjoyment of the advantages which such a Bureau would bring.

It is calculated, as previously shown, that the estimated cost for continuing this work for one year would be \$13,400. Four months of 1910 being past, the estimate for carrying on the work for the remaining eight months of the present year, on the above basis, would be \$9,000, and request is hereby made that a resolution be adopted by the Board of Aldermen asking the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the Comptroller to issue special revenue bonds for the purpose described to the amount of \$9,000.

Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, President of the Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—On January 24, 1910, a contract was made between The City of New York and George M. Dunn to construct sewers, etc., in East One Hundred and Fortieth street, between Park avenue and Canal place, and in East One Hundred and Forty-first street, between Park avenue and Canal place, and in Canal place, between East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street and East One Hundred and Forty-fourth street.

Although Canal place was made by filling in the old canal bed, it was assumed from the results of the soundings taken before this work was started, and on which the estimate of the quantities was based, that the mud in the bed of the old canal had been consolidated by the weight of the material placed thereon in grading the street, and it was also thought that the filling had reached its final settlement. The ground at the subgrade in Canal place for a distance of about 100 feet south of One Hundred and Fortieth street was apparently good. At about 105 feet south of East One Hundred and Fortieth street very soft ground was encountered. The work was then stopped and a re-examination of the ground made. It was then found that the soft mud still existed below the filling in the street, even under that portion of the street where the sewer had already been built. In other words, the filling of Canal place is floating on soft mud.

In view of these conditions, it is considered advisable to build the sewer on a pile foundation, including the sewer which has already been built, which must be taken up and rebuilt. This involves extra work not included in the contract, which amounts to about \$4,000.

In view of the urgency of this work, it is respectfully requested that the Board of Aldermen give the Borough President authority to order this work without public letting, according to section 419 of the Charter, which provides:

"* * * Whenever any work is necessary to be done to complete or perfect a particular job, or any supply is needful for any particular purpose, which work and job is to be undertaken or supply furnished for the city of New York, and the several parts of the said work or supply shall together involve the expenditure of more than one thousand dollars, the same shall be by contract, under such regulations concerning it as shall be established by ordinance or resolution of the board of aldermen, * * * unless otherwise ordered by a vote of three-fourths of the members elected to the board of aldermen."

The conditions existing on this contract could not be foreseen. It therefore had to be suspended the moment they were discovered.

In order not to unduly delay this work, I would again urge that the Board of Aldermen authorize the Borough President to order this work without public letting.

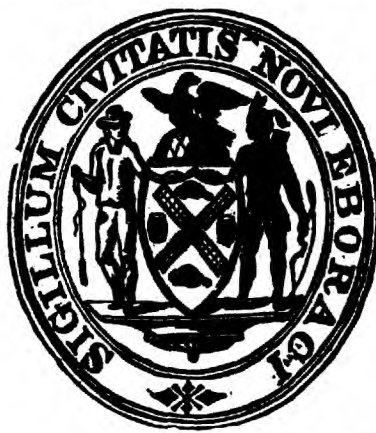

Proposed Form of Contract.

This contract, made this day of 1910, by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the Forty-second Street, Manhattanville and St. Nicholas Avenue Railway Company (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesses:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate an extension to its present street surface railway, with the necessary wires and equipment, for the purpose of conveying passengers only in the Borough of Manhattan, in The City of New York, upon the following route, to wit:

Beginning at and connecting with the existing tracks in Manhattan street, at or near the easterly line of Twelfth avenue; thence, by double track, curving westerly in and upon Manhattan street to Twelfth avenue; thence, southerly by double track, in and upon Twelfth avenue to West One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street; thence curving easterly into West One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street to the center line of West One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street; thence easterly by single track, in and upon West One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street to Manhattan street, and there connecting with the existing east bound track in Manhattan street.

The said route with turnouts, switches and crossovers hereby authorized is shown upon a map entitled:

Sec. 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—The consent in writing of the owners of half in value of the property bounded on said streets and avenues to the construction and operation of said railway shall be obtained by the Company within three (3) months from the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and a copy of such consent shall be filed with the Board within such time, or in the event that such consent is not obtained within such time, the Company shall, within said three (3) months or within one (1) month thereafter, make application to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners in the manner provided by the Railroad Law to determine if said railway ought to be constructed; otherwise this grant shall cease and determine.

Second—The said right to construct, maintain and operate said railway shall be held and enjoyed by the Company for the term of ten (10) years from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for the further period of fifteen (15) years, upon a fair revaluation of such right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two (2) years and not later than one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the sum required to be paid during the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding ten (10) years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound upon request of the other to enter into a written agree-

ment with each other fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, but in no case shall the annual rate so fixed be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate and at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six (6) months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three (3) months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. During the second term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than one hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$175) and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of one hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$175).

The gross annual receipts mentioned above shall be that portion of the gross receipts of the Company from all sources within the limits of the City as shall bear the same proportion to such gross receipts as the length of the extension hereby authorized shall bear to the entire length of the railway of the Company in operation within the limits of the City.

The annual charges shall commence from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

All annual charges as above shall be paid into the treasury of the City on November 1 of each year, and shall be for the amount due to September 30 next preceding. Provided that the first annual payment shall be only for that portion of the first annual charge as the time between the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor and September 30 following shall bear to the whole of one year.

Whenever the percentage required to be paid shall exceed the minimum amount as above, then such sum over and above such minimum shall be paid on or before November 1 in each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding.

The annual charges herein provided are intended to include the percentages of gross receipts now required to be paid by railway companies to the City pursuant to the Railroad Law as amended.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in addition to any and all taxes of whatever kind or description now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City, or resolution of the Board, or any law of the State of New York.

Fourth—The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract (whether original or renewal), notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other railway or railroad company providing for payment for railway or railroad rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted (whether original or renewal), or of any part thereof, or of any of the routes mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract, and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Fifth—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual or other corporation a similar right or privilege, upon the same or other terms and conditions, over the same streets and avenues hereinbefore described.

The use of the railway constructed by the Company under this contract, including the tracks, wires and other equipment, or any structures used in connection therewith, in streets and avenues hereinbefore described shall be permitted by the Company to any individual or corporation to which the City may have granted or may hereafter grant the right or privilege to use such streets and avenues for street railway purposes, upon payment of an annual sum by such individual or corporation to the Company which shall equal the legal interest on such proportion of the actual cost of the construction of such railway and structures, and additions and betterments thereto, as the number of cars operated by such individual or corporation shall bear to the number of cars operated by the Company then using the same; and also such proportion of the cost of keeping the tracks and electrical equipment in repair, and the cost of additions and betterments thereto, such proportion of laying and repairing of pavement and removal of snow and ice, and all other duties imposed upon the Company by the terms of this contract in connection with the maintenance or

the operation of said railway as used, as the number of cars operated by such individual or corporation shall bear to the number of cars operated by the Companies then using the same, together with the actual cost of the power necessary for the operation of the cars thereon or such individual or corporation. Provided, however, that if in the opinion of the Company the legal rate of interest upon the cost of such railway shall be an insufficient sum to be paid for the use of such tracks, it may appeal to the Board, and the Board may fix a percentage upon the cost to be paid to the Company at a sum in excess of the legal rate of interest if in its opinion such action is justified.

The Company shall not at any time oppose, but shall upon the request of the Board, consent to the construction or operation of any street surface railway which may necessitate the use of any portion of the railway which shall be constructed by the Company pursuant to this contract.

Sixth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Seventh—Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the tracks and equipments of the Company constructed pursuant to this contract within the streets and avenues shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this contract, as above, the Board shall so order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of its tracks and other equipment constructed pursuant to this contract and the said streets and avenues shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Eighth—The Company shall commence construction of the railway herein authorized within three (3) months from the date upon which the consents of the property owners are filed with the Board, or from the date upon which the order of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court that such railway ought to be constructed is rendered in favor of such consents, and shall complete the construction and place the same in full operation within six (6) months from the date of filing such consents or such order, otherwise this right shall cease and determine, and all sums paid, or which may be deposited with the Comptroller of the City, as hereinafter provided, shall thereupon be forfeited to the City; provided that such periods may be extended by the Board for a period or periods not exceeding in the aggregate six (6) months each; and provided, further, that when the commencement or completion of said construction shall be prevented by legal proceedings in any court or by works of public improvement, or from other causes not within control of the Company, the time for the commencement or completion of such construction may be extended for the period of such prevention, but no delay shall be allowed for unless the court proceedings shall be diligently prosecuted by the Company, and provided, further, that in no case shall such delay be deemed to begin until the Company shall have given written notice to the Board of any such court proceedings or other occasion of delay, and deliver to the Board copies of any injunction or other orders, and the papers upon which the same shall have been granted, and unless upon the request of the Board the Company shall, in writing, consent that the Board, either in its own name as a party, or in the name of the City as a party, may intervene in any such proceedings.

Ninth—Said railway shall be constructed and operated in the latest approved manner of street railway construction and operation, and it is hereby agreed that the Board may require the Company to improve or add to the railway equipment, including rolling stock and railway appliances, from time to time, as such additions and improvements are necessary, in the opinion of the Board. Upon failure on the part of the Company to comply with the direction of the Board within a reasonable time, the rights hereby granted shall cease and determine.

Tenth—Said railway shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters as provided by the Charter of the City.

No construction upon said railway shall be commenced until written permits have been obtained from the proper City officials. In any permits so issued such officials may also impose such conditions as a condition of the granting of the same as are necessary for the purpose of protecting any structures in the streets and avenues over which such officials have jurisdiction, and the Company shall comply with such conditions.

The electrical equipment to be installed by the Company for the operation of the railway within the limits of the City, whether the same be upon streets and avenues or upon private property, shall be constructed and maintained under the supervision and control of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Eleventh—Said railway shall be operated by underground electric power substantially similar to the system of underground electric power now used by the street surface railways in the Borough of Manhattan, provided that any other power may be used except locomotive steam power, horse power or overhead electric power which may be lawfully used, approved by the Board and consented to by the abutting property owners in accordance with the provisions of law and by the Public Service Commission for the First District of the State of New York.

Twelfth—No wires for the transmission of power shall be permitted unless they be placed in conduits underneath or along the side of the railway. When such conduits are constructed the Company shall provide two (2) conduits not less than three (3) inches in diameter each for the exclusive use of the City. The Company hereby agrees that such conduits shall be used only by the Company and the City as above.

Thirteenth—The rate of fare for any passenger upon said railway shall not exceed five (5) cents and the Company shall not charge any passenger more than five (5) cents for one continuous ride from any point on its road or any road, line or

branch operated by it or under its control to any other point thereof or any connecting branch thereof within the limits of the City.

Fourteenth—No cars shall be operated upon the railway hereby authorized other than passenger cars and cars necessary for the repair or maintenance of the railway, and no freight cars shall be operated upon the tracks of said railway, and the tracks hereby authorized shall not be used for the storage of cars.

Fifteenth—The Company shall attach to each car run over the said railway proper fenders and wheel guards, in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Sixteenth—All cars which are operated on said railway shall be heated during the cold weather, in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Seventeenth—All cars operated on said railway shall be well lighted by electricity, or by some lighting system equally efficient, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Eighteenth—The Company shall at all times keep the streets and avenues upon which the said railway is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and for a distance of two (2) feet beyond the rails on either side thereof, free and clear from ice and snow; provided, however, that the Company shall, at the option of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, enter into an agreement for each winter season or part thereof, to clean an equivalent amount of street surface from house line to house line.

Nineteenth—As long as said railway, or any portion thereof, remains in any street or avenue, the Company shall pave and keep in permanent repair that portion of the surface of the street or avenue in which the said railway is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and for a distance of two (2) feet beyond the rails on either side thereof, whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe. And the City shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of any street or avenue, and in that event the Company shall be bound to replace such pavement in the manner directed by the proper City officer, at its own expense, and the provision as to repairs heretofore made shall apply to such renewed or altered pavement.

Twentieth—Any alteration to the sewerage or drainage system, or any other subsurface or to any surface structures in the streets, required on account of the construction or operation of the railway, shall be made at the sole cost of the Company, and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Twenty-first—It is agreed that the right hereby granted to operate a street surface railway shall not be in preference or in hindrance to public work of the City, and should the said railway in any way interfere with the construction of public works in the streets and avenues, whether the same is done by the City directly or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall, at its own expense, protect or move the tracks and appurtenances in the manner directed by the City officials having jurisdiction over such public work.

Twenty-second—Should the grades or lines of the streets and avenues in which the railway is hereby authorized be changed at any time after the railway has been constructed and during the term of this contract, the Company shall, at its own expense, change its tracks and appurtenances to conform with such new grades and lines, and during the construction of any public improvement upon said street the Company shall take care of and protect the tracks and appurtenances at its own expense, all to be done subject to the direction of the City official having jurisdiction over the construction of such change.

The Company shall, within sixty (60) days from the commencement of the operation of the railway hereby authorized, remove, at its own expense, the four tracks, together with the cross-overs, conduits and other equipment now existing in Manhattan street; such tracks being as shown by dashed lines upon the map or plan attached hereto and made a part of this contract, and shall restore the street to its original condition. In case of the failure of the Company within such time to comply with the provisions relative to the removal of the tracks, cross-overs, conduits and other equipment in Manhattan street, and the restoring of the surface of the street to its original condition, the rights hereby granted shall cease and determine.

Twenty-third—The Company shall submit to the Board a report not later than November 1 of each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding, and at any other time, upon request of the Board, which shall state:

1. The amount of stock issued, for cash, for property.
2. The amount paid in as by last report.
3. The total amount of capital stock paid in.
4. The funded debt by last report.
5. The total amount of funded debt.
6. The floating debt as by last report.
7. The total amount of floating debt.
8. The total amount of funded and floating debt.
9. The average rate per annum of interest on funded debt.
10. Statement of dividends paid during the year.
11. The total amount expended for same.
12. The names of the directors elected at the last meeting of the corporation held for such purpose.
13. Location, value and amount paid for real estate owned by the Company as by last report.
14. Location, value and amount paid for real estate now owned by the Company.
15. Number of passengers carried during the year.
16. Total receipts of Company for each class of business.
17. Amounts paid by the Company for damage to persons or property on account of construction and operation.
18. Total expenses for operation, including salaries.

—and such other information in regard to the business of the Company as may be required by the Board.

Twenty-fourth—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross earnings from all sources within the limits of the City, and shall, on or before November 1 of each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company, for the year ending September 30 next preceding, in such form as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain a statement of such gross receipts, the total miles in operation within the limits of the City and the miles of railway constructed and operated under this contract, and such other information as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report, and may examine its officers under oath.

Twenty-fifth—In case of any violation or breach of any of the provisions of this contract, or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained or with any orders of the Board acting under the powers herein reserved, the franchise or consent herein granted may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel on notice of ten (10) days to the Company, or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the railway constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Twenty-sixth—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fail to maintain its structures and equipment as herein provided in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, the Company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250) as fixed or liquidated damages, or the Board, in case such structures or equipment which may affect the surface of the streets shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid, shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided for.

Twenty-seventh—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the railway authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or default of the Company.

Twenty-eighth—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500), either in money or securities, to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all of the terms and conditions of this contract and compliance with all orders of the Board acting under the powers herein reserved, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privilege hereby granted, the rendering of efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, the repairs of the street pavement, the removal of snow and ice and the quality of construction of the railway and the maintenance of the property in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, and in case of default in the performance by the Company of such terms and conditions the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice and shall collect a reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings; or after default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund after ten (10) days' notice to the Company; or in case of failure to observe the said terms and conditions of this contract and orders of the Board acting hereunder, relating to the headway, heating and lighting of cars, fenders, wheel-guards and watering of street pavements, the Company shall pay a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each day of violation, and the further sum of ten dollars (\$10) per day for each car that shall not be properly heated, lighted or supplied with fenders or wheel-guards, in case of a violation of the provisions relating to those matters, all of which sums may be deducted from the said fund.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties in this contract shall be as follows:

The Board, on complaint made, shall give notice to the Company directing its President or other officer to appear before the Board on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why the Company should not be penalized in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or, after a hearing, appears in the judgment of the Board, to be in default, said Board shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to the Board to be just, and without legal procedure direct the Comptroller to withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund by the Company, upon ten (10) days' notice in writing, pay to the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of five hundred dollars (\$500), and in default thereof this contract shall be canceled and annulled at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or right under the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City.

Twenty-ninth—The words "notice" or "direction" whenever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed to the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Thirtieth—The words "streets or avenues" and "streets and avenues," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean "streets, avenues, highways, parkways, driveways, concourses, boulevards, bridges, viaducts, tunnels, public places or any other property to which the City has title or over which the public has an easement," encountered in the route hereinabove described, and upon or in which authority is hereby given to the Company to construct a railway.

Thirty-first—If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned or intended to be mentioned, shall be transferred by law to any other Board authority, officer or officers, then and in such case such other Board authority, officer or officers shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officer or officers.

Sec. 3. Nothing in this contract shall be construed as in any way limiting the present or future jurisdiction of the Public Service Commission under the Laws of the State of New York.

Sec. 4. This grant is also upon the further and express condition that the provisions of Article IV, and other provisions of the Railroad Law pertinent thereto, shall be strictly complied with by the Company.

Sec. 5. The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to, abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

In witness whereof the party of the first part, by its Mayor, thereto duly authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City, has caused the corporate name of said City to be hereunto affixed; and the party of the second part, by its officers, thereto duly authorized, has caused its corporate seal to be hereunto signed and its corporate seal to be hereunto annexed the day and year first above written.

Whereas, This Board has made inquiry as to the money value of the franchise or right applied for, and proposed to be granted to the Union Railway Company of New York City, and the adequacy of the compensation proposed to be paid therefor; now therefore it is

Resolved, That the following form of the resolution for the grant of the franchise or right applied for by the Union Railway Company of New York City, containing the form of proposed contract for the grant of such franchise or right, be hereby introduced and entered in the minutes of this Board, as follows, to wit:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to the Union Railway Company of New York City the franchise or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying all the terms and conditions, including the provisions as to rates, fares and charges, upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract, contained in the City Record of the City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows, to wit:

Proposed Form of Contract.

This contract, made this day of 1910, by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the Union Railway Company of New York City (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesseth:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate a double-track extension to its present street surface railway, with the necessary wires and equipment, for the purpose of conveying passengers only, in the

Borough of The Bronx, in The City of New York, upon the following route, to wit:

Beginning at and connecting with the tracks of the Company in Westchester avenue, at its intersection with East One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street; thence southwesterly in and upon East One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street to the intersection of East One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street at Fox street or Simpson street; thence westerly in and upon East One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street to Franklin avenue; thence southerly in and upon Franklin avenue to East One Hundred and Sixty-eighth street; thence westerly in and upon East One Hundred and Sixty-eighth street to Webster avenue; thence southerly in and upon Webster avenue to East One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street; thence westerly in and upon East One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street and the Transverse road underneath the Grand Boulevard and Concourse, and again in and upon East One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street to Jerome avenue, and there connecting with the existing tracks of the Company in Jerome avenue.

The said route, with turnouts, switches and crossovers, hereby authorized is shown upon a map entitled:

"Map showing proposed extension of the Union Railway Company in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, to accompany petition dated February 9, 1910, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment."

—and signed by F. W. Whitridge, receiver; Edward A. Maher, president, and F. Mulvaney, chief engineer, a copy of which is attached hereto, is to be deemed a part of this contract, and is to be construed with the text thereof, and is to be substantially followed, provided that deviations therefrom and additional turnouts, switches and crossovers which are consistent with the foregoing description and the other provisions of this contract may be permitted by resolution of the Board.

Sec. 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—The consent, in writing, of the owners of half in value of the property bounded on said streets and avenues to the construction and operation of said railway shall be obtained by the Company within three (3) months from the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and a copy of such consent shall be filed with the Board within such time, or in the event that such consents cannot be obtained within such time, the Company shall within said three (3) months or within one (1) month thereafter, make application to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners in the manner provided by the Railroad Law to determine if said railway ought to be constructed; otherwise this grant shall cease and terminate.

Second—The said right to construct, maintain and operate said railway shall be held and enjoyed by the Company from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor until March 1, 1924, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for the further period of twenty-five (25) years, upon a fair revaluation of such right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two (2) years and not later than one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient, if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the sum required to be paid during the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding twenty-five (25) years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound, upon request of the other, to enter into a written agreement with each other fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, but in no case shall the annual rate so fixed be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate and at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six (6) months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three (3) months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall, in any event, be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of this original contract. If in any case the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate therefore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each paying one-half thereof.

Third—The Company shall pay to the City for the privilege hereby granted the following sums of money:

(a) The sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000) in cash within three (3) months after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor and before anything is done in exercise of the privilege hereby granted.

(b) During the first term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500).

During the second term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than three thousand dollars (\$3,000), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of three thousand dollars (\$3,000).

During the remaining term, expiring March 1, 1924, an annual sum which shall in no case be less than thirty-six hundred dollars (\$3,600), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of thirty-six hundred dollars (\$3,600).

The gross annual receipts mentioned above shall be that portion of the gross receipts of the Company from all sources within the limits of the City as shall bear the same proportion to its whole such gross receipts as the length of the extension hereby authorized shall bear to the entire length of the railway of the Company in operation within the limits of the City.

The annual charges shall commence from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

All annual charges as above shall be paid into the treasury of the City on November 1 of each year, and shall be for the amount due to September 30 next preceding. Provided that the first annual payment shall be only for that proportion of the first annual charge as the time between the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor and September 30 following shall bear to the whole of one year.

Whenever the percentage required to be paid shall exceed the minimum amount as above, then such sum over and above such minimum shall be paid on or before November 1 in each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding.

The annual charges herein provided are intended to include the percentages of gross receipts now required to be paid by railway companies to the City, pursuant to the Railroad Law as amended, and such charges as are required under chapter 340 of the Laws of 1892 to be paid by the Company for this extension, if said act applies to or controls the Company in relation to the right and privilege hereby granted.

The City does not and shall not demand or require the payment by the Company of a percentage of gross receipts under the provisions of chapter 340 of the Laws of 1892 for the gross receipts earned on the extension constructed pursuant to this contract.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in addition to any and all taxes of whatever kind or description, now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City or resolution of the Board or any law of the State of New York.

Fourth—The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract (whether original or renewal), notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other railway or railroad company providing for payment for railway or railroad rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted (whether original or renewal), or of any part thereof, or of any of the routes, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract; and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Fifth—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual or other corporation a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions, over the same streets and avenues, hereinbefore described.

The use of the railway constructed by the Company under this contract, including the tracks, wires and other equipment or any structure used in connection therewith, in streets and avenues hereinbefore described shall be permitted by the Company, to any individual or corporation, to which the City may have granted or may hereafter grant the right or privilege to use such streets and avenues for street railway purposes, upon payment of an annual sum by such individual or corporation to the Company, which shall equal the legal interest on such proportion of the actual cost of the construction of such railway and structures, and of the cost of operation and maintenance thereof, as the number of cars operated by such individual or corporation shall bear to the number of cars operated by the companies then using the same; and also such proportion of the cost of keeping the tracks and electrical equipment in repair, and the cost of additions and betterments thereto, such proportion of laying and repairing of pavement and removal of snow and ice and other duties imposed upon the Company by the terms of this contract in connection with the maintenance or the operation of said railway so used, as the number of cars operated by such individual or corporation shall bear to the number of cars operated by the companies then using the same, together with the actual cost of the power necessary for the operation of the cars thereon of such individual or corporation. Provided, however, that if, in the opinion of the Company, the legal rate of interest upon the cost of such railway shall be an insufficient sum to be paid for the use of such tracks, it may appeal to the Board and the Board may fix a percentage upon the cost to be paid to the Company, at a sum in excess of the legal rate of interest, if, in its opinion, such action is justified.

The Company shall not at any time oppose, but shall, upon the request of the Board, consent to the construction or operation of any street railway or other railway which may be necessary for any portion of the railway which shall be constructed by the Company pursuant to this contract.

Sixth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company, or by operation of law whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Seventh—Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the tracks and equipments of the Company constructed pursuant to this contract within the streets and avenues shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this contract as above, the Board shall so order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of its tracks and other equipment constructed pursuant to this contract and the said streets and avenues shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Eighth—The Company shall commence construction of the railway hereby authorized within

three (3) months from the date upon which the consents of the property owners are filed with the Board or from the date upon which the order of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court that such railway ought to be constructed is signed in lieu of such consents, and shall complete the construction and place the same in full operation within twelve (12) months from the date of filing such consents or such order, otherwise this right shall cease and determine, and all sums paid, or which may be deposited with the Comptroller of the City, as hereinafter provided, shall thereupon be forfeited to the City; provided, that such periods may be extended by the Board for a period or periods not exceeding in the aggregate six (6) months each; and provided, further, that when the commencement or completion of said construction shall be prevented by legal proceedings in any court or by works of public improvement, or from other causes not within the control of the Company, the time for the commencement or completion of such construction may be extended for the period of such prevention, but no delay shall be allowed for unless the court proceedings shall be diligently prosecuted by the Company, and provided further, that in no case shall such delay be deemed to begin until the Company shall have given written notice to the Board of any such court proceedings or other occasion of delay, and deliver to the Board copies of any injunction or other orders, and the papers upon which the same shall have been granted, and unless upon the request of the Board the Company shall, in writing, consent that the Board, either in its own name as a party, or in the name of the City as a party, may intervene in any such proceedings.

Ninth—Said railway shall be constructed and operated in the latest approved manner of street railway construction and operation, and it is hereby agreed that the Board may require the Company to improve or add to the railway equipment, including rolling stock and railway appliances, from time to time, as such additions and improvements are necessary, in the opinion of the Board. Upon failure on the part of the Company to comply with the direction of the Board within a reasonable time, the rights hereby granted shall cease and determine.

Tenth—Said railway shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided by the Charter of the City.

No construction upon said railway shall be commenced until written permits have been obtained from the proper City officials.

In any permits so issued such officials may also impose such conditions, as a condition of the granting of the same, as are necessary for the purpose of protecting any structures, in the streets and avenues over which such officials have jurisdiction, and the Company shall comply with such conditions.

The electrical equipment to be installed by the Company for the operation of the railway within the limits of the City, whether the same be upon streets and avenues or upon private property, shall be constructed and maintained under the supervision and control of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Eleventh—Said railway may be operated by overhead electric power substantially similar to the overhead electric system now in use by street surface railways in the Borough of The Bronx, or by any other motive power, except locomotive steam power or horse power, which may be approved by the Board, and consented to by the abutting property owners, in accordance with the provisions of law, and by the Public Service Commission for the First District of the State of New York.

Twelfth—Upon six (6) months' notice by the Board to the Company, all wires for the transmission of power, except trolley wires, for the operation of the railway, upon all or any portion of the route hereby authorized, shall be placed in conduits beneath or alongside of the railway. The Company shall provide in such conduits two (2) ducts, not less than three (3) inches in diameter for the exclusive use of the City. Such ducts shall be used only by the Company for the operation of its railway and by the City, as above.

Thirteenth—The rate of fare for any passenger upon said railway shall not exceed five (5) cents and the Company shall not charge any passenger more than five (5) cents for one continuous ride from any point on its road or on any road, line or branch operated by it, or under its control, to any other point thereof, or any connecting branch thereof within the limits of the City.

The Company shall carry free upon the railway hereby authorized during the term of this contract all members of the Police and Fire Departments of the City, when such employees are in full uniform.

Fourteenth—No cars shall be operated upon the railway hereby authorized other than passenger cars and cars necessary for the repair or maintenance of the railway, and no freight cars shall be operated upon the tracks of said railway.

Fifteenth—The Company shall attach to each car run over the said railway proper fenders and wheel guards, in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter during the term of this contract be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Sixteenth—All cars which are operated on said railway shall be heated during the cold weather, in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Seventeenth—All cars operated on said railway shall be well lighted by electricity, or by some lighting system equally efficient, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Eighteenth—Cars on the said railway shall run at intervals of not more than thirty (30) minutes, both day and night, and as much oftener as reasonable convenience of the public may require, or as may be directed by the Board.

Nineteenth—The Company, so long as it shall continue to use any of the tracks upon the streets and avenues in which said railway shall be constructed, shall cause to be watered at least three (3) times every twenty-four (24) hours when the temperature is above thirty-five (35) degrees Fahrenheit, the entire width of the streets and avenues, except when the width of such streets and avenues shall exceed sixty (60) feet between curb lines, in which case the Company shall cause to be watered only sixty (60) feet in width of such roadway, and the Company shall provide for such purpose at least one tank car, the capacity of which shall be sufficient to water such streets and avenues in a satisfactory manner.

Twentieth—The Company shall at all times keep the streets and avenues upon which the said railway is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and for a distance of two (2) feet beyond the rails on either side thereof, free and clear from ice and snow; provided, however, that the Company shall, at the option of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, enter into an agreement for each winter season, or part thereof, to clean an equivalent amount of street surface from house line to house line.

Twenty-first—As long as said railway, or any portion thereof, remains in any street or avenue, the Company shall pave and keep in permanent repair that portion of the surface of the street or avenue in which the said railway is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and for a distance of two (2) feet beyond the rails on either side thereof, under the supervision of the local authorities, whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe. And the City shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of any street or avenue, and in that event the Company shall be bound to replace such pavement in the manner directed by the proper City officer, at its own expense, and the provisions as to repairs herein contained shall apply to such renewed or altered pavement.

Twenty-second—Any alteration to the sewerage or drainage system, or to any other subsurface or to any surface structures in the streets, required on account of the construction or operation of the railway, shall be made at the sole cost of the Company, and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Twenty-third—It is agreed that the right hereby granted to operate a street surface railway shall not be in preference or in hindrance to public work of the City, and should the said railway in any way interfere with the construction of public works in the streets and avenues, whether the same be done by the City directly or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall, at its own expense, protect or move the tracks and appurtenances in the manner directed by the City officials having jurisdiction over such public work.

Twenty-fourth—Should the grades or lines of the streets and avenues in which the railway is hereby authorized be changed at any time after the railway has been constructed and during the term of this contract, the Company shall, at its own expense, change its tracks and appurtenances to conform with such new grades and lines, and during the construction of any public improvement upon said street the Company shall take care of and protect the tracks and appurtenances at its own expense, all to be done subject to the direction of the City official having jurisdiction over the construction of such change.

Twenty-fifth—The Company shall submit to the Board a report not later than November 1 of each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding, and at any other time, upon request of the Board, which shall state:

1. The amount of stock issued, for cash, for property.
2. The amount paid in as by last report.
3. The total amount of capital stock paid in.
4. The funded debt by last report.
5. The total amount of funded debt.
6. The floating debt as by last report.
7. The total amount of floating debt.
8. The total amount of funded and floating debt.
9. The average rate per annum of interest on funded debt.
10. Statement of dividends paid during the year.
11. The total amount expended for same.
12. The names of the directors elected at the last meeting of the corporation held for such purpose.
13. Location, value and amount paid for real estate owned by the Company as by last report.
14. Location, value and amount paid for real estate now owned by the Company.
15. Number of passengers carried during the year.
16. Total receipts of Company for each class of business.
17. Amounts paid by the Company for damage to persons or property on account of construction and operation.
18. Total expenses for operation, including salaries, and such other information in regard to the business of the Company as may be required by the Board.

Twenty-sixth—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross earnings from all sources within the limits of the City, and shall, on or before November 1 of each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company, for the year ending September 30 next preceding, in such form as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain a statement of such gross receipts, the total miles in operation within the limits of the City and the miles of railway constructed and operated under this contract, and such other information as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report, and may examine its officers under oath.

Twenty-seventh—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, or with any orders of the Board acting under the powers herein reserved, the franchise or consent herein granted may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, on notice of ten (10) days to the Company, or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the railway constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Twenty-eighth—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fail to maintain its structures and equipment as herein provided in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, the Company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250) as fixed or liquidated damages, or the Board, in case such structures or equipment which may affect the surface of the streets shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid, shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided for.

Twenty-ninth—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the railway authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or default of the Company.

Thirtieth—This grant is upon the express condition that any and all sums of money or any

securities heretofore deposited with the Comptroller by the Company under and pursuant to the franchises heretofore granted to it by The City of New York for the faithful performance by the Company of the several franchises so granted shall likewise form a fund for the performance by the Company of all the terms and conditions of this contract and compliance with all orders of the Board acting under the powers herein reserved, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privilege hereby granted, the rendering of efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, the repairs of the street pavement, the removal of snow and ice, the quality of construction of the railway and the maintenance of the property in good condition throughout the whole term of the contract, and in case of default in the performance by the Company of such terms and conditions, or compliance with such orders, or either or any of them, the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof, after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings; or, after default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund after ten (10) days' notice to the Company or in case of failure to observe the said terms and conditions of this contract and orders of the Board hereunder, relating to the roadway, heating and lighting of cars, fenders, wheel-guards and watering of street pavements, the Company shall pay a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each day of violation, and the further sum of ten dollars (\$10) per day for each day that shall not be properly heated, lighted or supplied with fenders or wheel-guards, in case of the violation of the provisions relating to those matters.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties in this contract shall be as follows:

The Board, on complaint made, shall give notice to the Company, directing its President or other officer to appear before the Board on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why the Company should not be penalized in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or after a hearing appears in the judgment of the Board to be in fault, said Board shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to the Board to be just, and without legal procedure direct the Comptroller to withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice in writing, pay to the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount, and in default thereof this contract shall be canceled and annulled at the option of the Board, acting on behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or right under the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City.

Thirty-first—The words "notice" or "direction," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Thirty-second—The words "streets or avenues" and "streets and avenues," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean streets, avenues, highways, parkways, driveways, concourses, boulevards, bridges, viaducts, tunnels, public places or any other property to which the City has title or over which the public has an easement, encountered in the route hereinabove described, and upon or in which authority is hereby given to the Company to construct a railway.

Thirty-third—If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned or intended to be mentioned, shall be transferred by law to any other Board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such case such other Board, authority, officer or officers shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officer or officers.

Sec. 3. Nothing in this contract shall be construed as in any way limiting the present or future jurisdiction of the Public Service Commission under the Laws of the State of New York.

Sec. 4. This grant is also upon the further and express condition that the provisions of Article IV, and the other provisions of the Railroad Law pertinent hereto shall be strictly complied with by the Company.

(b) During the first term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than twelve hundred dollars (\$1,200), and which shall be equal to two (2) per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of twelve hundred dollars (\$1,200).

During the second term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,500), and which shall be equal to two and one-half (2½) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,500).

During the remaining term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than forty-five hundred dollars (\$4,500), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of forty-five hundred dollars (\$4,500).

The annual charges shall commence from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

All annual charges as above shall be paid into the treasury of the City on November 1 of each year and shall be for the amount due to September 30 next preceding. Provided that the first annual payment shall be only for that proportion of the first annual charge as the time between the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor and September 30 following shall bear to the whole of one year.

Whenever the percentage required to be paid shall exceed the minimum amount as above, then such sum over and above such minimum shall be paid on or before November 1 in each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind and description now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City, or resolution of the Board, or any law of the State of New York.

Third—The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract (whether original or renewal), notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other company providing for payment for similar rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted (whether original or renewal), or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract, and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Sixth—The Company shall construct, maintain and operate its protection system, subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters under the Charter of the City, and in strict compliance with all laws or ordinances, now in force or which may be adopted, affecting companies operating electrical conductors in the City.

Ninth—The Company shall file with the Board on the first day of November in each year a map or plan upon which shall be plainly indicated the number of wires which are in use by the Company on that date, and the streets in which the same are located, and also those which were put in use during the preceding year.

(b) For interior manual fire alarm protection, installed according to the requirements of the National Board of Fire Underwriters, the annual charge for service shall not exceed the sum of twenty-five dollars (\$25) for the first manual fire alarm box, and the sum of five dollars (\$5) per annum for each additional manual fire alarm box in the same building, where there are sufficient subscribers within the same city block to require not less than fifty manual fire alarm boxes, and the Company shall make no charge for installation of equipment in such buildings.

Fifteenth—It is a condition of this contract that the Company shall bear the entire expense of all work undertaken by reason of this grant.

Sixteenth—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fail to maintain its structures and equipment as herein provided in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, the Company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) as fixed or liquidated damages, or the Board, in case such structures or equipment which may affect the surface of the streets shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid, shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided for.

Seventeenth—If for a period of twelve consecutive months, the fire alarm and burglar alarm systems of the Company shall not be operated, or if the same shall not be operated for a period of eighteen months out of any consecutive twenty-four months, the Board may declare the right and franchise and this contract terminated without further proceedings at law or in equity.

Eighteenth—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account and shall, on or before November 1 in each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company for the year ending September 30 next preceding. Such report shall contain a statement of the gross receipts received from the operation of the systems hereby authorized from all subscribers served by the Company, together with such other information and in such form and detail as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report and may examine its officers under oath.

Nineteenth—The Company shall submit to the Board a report not later than November 1 of each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding, and at any other time, upon request of the Board, which shall state:

1. The amount of stock issued, for cash, for property.
2. The amount paid in as by last report.
3. The total amount of capital stock paid in.
4. The funded debt by last report.
5. The total amount of funded debt.
6. The floating debt as by last report.
7. The total amount of floating debt.
8. The total amount of funded and floating debt.
9. The average rate per annum of interest on funded debt.
10. Statement of dividends paid during the year.
11. The total amount expended for same.
12. The names of the directors elected at the last meeting of the corporation held for such purpose.
13. Location, value and amount paid for real estate owned by the Company as by last report.
14. Location, value and amount paid for real estate now owned by the Company.

15. Number and location of premises served by the Company.

16. Total receipts of the Company for each class of business.

17. Amounts paid by the Company for damage to persons or property on account of construction and operation.

18. Total expenses for operation, including salaries and such other information in regard to the business of the Company as may be required by the Board.

Twenty-first—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, within ninety (90) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000), either in money or securities to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all of the terms and conditions of this contract, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privileges hereby granted, in default of which payment of the annual charges the City shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund after ten (10) days' notice to the Company.

In case of failure of the Company to comply with the terms of this contract relating to the filing of annual statements, furnish service to applicants as herein provided or its neglect or refusal to comply with any demand or direction of the Board or other municipal officials, made pursuant to the terms of the contract, or under the authority of any laws or ordinances now or hereafter in force, in such case and in any of these events, the Company, except as herein otherwise provided, shall pay to the City a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) for each violation. The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties in this contract shall be as follows:

The Board, on complaint made, shall give notice to the Company, directing its President or other officer to appear before the Board on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why the Company should not be penalized in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or, after a hearing, appears in the judgment of the Board to be in default, said Board shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to the Board to be just, and without legal procedure direct the Comptroller to withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF Health of the Department of Health, held May 25, 1910, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the following rules and regulations governing the breaking out of eggs for sale and governing the business of breaking out eggs to be canned, frozen, dried or used in any other manner, and the willful cracking or checking of eggs intended for sale in the shell; and in relation to keeping, selling or offering for sale of "spots" and "spot eggs," be and the same are hereby adopted, said rules to be immediately published in the City Record, and to take effect throughout the City of New York on the first day of June, 1910:

Eggs broken from the shell intended for food purposes shall be promptly cooled to a temperature not to exceed 50 degrees Fahrenheit and shall be deemed adulterated for the purposes of this section if the temperature at the time of delivery to the consumer be above said temperature.

No person conducting the business of trucking or draying, or engaged in the transportation of goods or merchandise, or conducting the business of storing food or other products in cold storage buildings, shall be required to have a permit for receiving, holding, transporting or keeping eggs opened from the shell, whether canned,

frozen, dried or treated in any other manner, provided that such person shall show to said Board, when required, satisfactory proof of the ownership of such eggs.

No person shall receive, have, hold, sell or offer for sale, or deliver in the City of New York any eggs broken from the shell, designed for use in manufacturing processes or for tanning, unless the same shall have been denatured with some denaturant approved by the Board of Health. The cans or receptacles containing eggs broken from the shell designed for use in manufacturing processes or for tanning, shall be plainly and indelibly labeled with the words "for manufacturing purposes—denatured with," to which shall be added the name of the denaturant.

The term "denaturized" where used herein as applied to eggs, means eggs that are broken into receptacles into which has previously been placed a denaturant or denaturants approved by the Board of Health in proportions as may be prescribed and the mixture thus made thoroughly stirred, or which are transferred to receptacles promptly after breaking and on the premises where broken to receptacles into which has previously been placed a denaturant or denaturants approved by the said Board in proportions as may be prescribed, and the mixture thus made thoroughly stirred.

No person shall wilfully or intentionally crack or check eggs intended for sale in the shell, the shells of which are whole and sound, with intent to make any false representation in respect to the quality thereof or as being what the same are not, as respects wholeness, soundness, or safety for food. Wilful cracking or checking of eggs to be sold in the shell shall be prima facie evidence of intent to deceive.

Every person who shall receive, hold, keep, sell or offer for sale or deliver in the City of New York any eggs known as "Spots" shall keep a record in a manner approved by the Board of Health, of all such "Spot Eggs" received or held by him and the disposition of such eggs.

Every person who conducts the business of breaking out eggs for canning, freezing, drying or other purposes or for preparing eggs for tanners or manufacturing usages shall keep a record in a manner approved by the Board of Health, of all eggs received or held by him and the disposition of such eggs.
