Since the last meeting of the Board of Education there have been retired from the public school system, in pursuance of action previously taken by this Board, one District Superintendent, twelve Principals and a number of Teachers, all of whom have devoted the greater part of their mature lives to the teaching profession. The action heretofore taken in regard to the retirement of these members of the teaching and supervising staff has been of a formal and legal character. It seems appropriate, however, that the close of their active careers in the field of educatheir prolonged, honorable and devoted service. It may truthfully be said that the influence which they have exerted upon other members of the staff and upon uncounted numbers of children—the service in one case extending over a period of sixty-eight years—has been of immeasurable benefit to the community which they have served so long and faithfully. While many of them, doubtless, were reluctant to abandon the work to which they have given themselves unreservedly, they have, without exception, earned the retirement and leisure upon which they have entered. The Board of Education takes this opportunity to express its commendation of their good work, its appreciation of their extended service, and its wish that each and all of them may enjoy for many years the freedom from exacting cares to which they are so well entitled.

> Many more have received like offers, but have remained with the Board of Education through hope of merited advancement, which it is regretted the Board of Education has not been able to grant, by reason of lack of funds.

The condition now is that the great majority of clerical employees of this Board have not yet reached, after some years of service, what is considered in many other departments a minimum or beginning wage. Other departments are bidding for the services of such employees, and offering higher salaries and this Board cannot, in fairness, oppose the transfers.

It should be a fundamental proposition that employees who have had training and experience in this Department are worth more here than elsewhere. The principle that experience renders an employee more valuable is recognized in the commercial world, and business houses give their employees more or less assur-ance that faithful and valuable service will be rewarded. The City, generally speaking, does not recognize such principle, although some step in this direction has been taken by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in appointing a 1912, in pursuance of the policy of the Committee to consider the matter.

If a high state of efficiency is to be at reasonably regular intervals, and that salaries throughout the City be equalized to an extent that will discourage the transfer of employees from one branch of the City service to another where, for the performance of the same labor, the employee will be paid 50 per cent. more in salary.

In connection with the large number of transfers and resignations, the Civil Service regulations regarding promotion do not operate to the advantage of the Department. The Civil Service rules require the automatic promotion from lower to higher grades according to salaries which the employees have qualified for by competitive examination, but without regard to the particular class of clerical work for which the employee may have a pe-culiar and temperamental aptness. The result is that each cessation of service necessitates a more or less complete shifting of duties of a number of employees who are eligible to the salary of the out-

going Clerk. The next in rank is promoted, his place in turn being filled from below, until the chain is completed by the appointment of a \$300 Office Boy. This procedure, of itself, is meritorious and just. The point is that necessity for adjustment arises so frequently as to be a positive harm from the point of office organization.

There is pressing necessity for some remedy, but your Committee is aware that nothing can be accomplished in the way of adjustment until the Budget of 1913 is under consideration. Your Committee suggests that a copy of this report be sent to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and that that body be urged to make a liberal appropriation in 1913 for salary increases for the clerical force of this Department.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the pursale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the

faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

on thereafter as practicable Each bid or estimate shall contain the nam and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so inter-ested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as conbecome interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or

the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the mat-ters set forth in the blank forms mentioned be-

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
