Resolved, That honorable mention be made in the records of the Department of the prompt and meritorious action of Patrolmen John Nugent, Thomas Ryan, and John McSweeney, of the Seventh Precinct, in rescuing the occupants of the burning building, No. 227 Cherry street, at 2:20 A. M., March 19, 1877; Dennis Duane, aged 75 years; Maria Duane, aged 56 years, were found by the officers in the midst of the flames, and were with great difficulty and danger removed by the officers and found to have been severely burned.

In connection with the general brave conduct of the officers in this case, let special mention be made of Patrolman John Nugent, Seventh Precinct, who returned to the burning building to satisfy himself that all the occupants had escaped, and was, upon his attempt to return, cut off by the flames and smoke and compelled to attempt his escape by jumping from an upper window; this attempt was frustrated by his clothing catching upon protruding nails, and he was suspended in a perilous position until rescued by Hook and Ladder Co. No. 6 of the Fire Department. For this officer's bravery under the circumstances, the Board of Police orders that the Chief Clerk cause highly honorable mention to be made in the records of the Department, and that this action be suitably engrossed upon parchment and presented to Patrolman John Nugent, Seventh Precinct; and that he be and is hereby promoted to be Roundsman, and assigned to duty in the Fifth Precinct.

Resolved, That Roundsman Frederick Gilbert, First Precinct, be and he is hereby remanded to patrol duty, and transferred to the Fifth Precinct.

#### Street Cleaning.

On recommendation of the Committee on Street Cleaning, it was  
 Resolved, That the proposal of Lombard, Ayres & Co., to take fifty scow loads of ashes, street  
 dirt, etc., delivered at the foot of West Sixty-sixth street, and to pay therefor the sum of two hundred  
 dollars, be and is hereby accepted.

 not to exceed \$40 per day each.

The Committee on Street Cleaning submitted the following report on the suggestion of Ambrose  
 Snow, Esq., President Board of Pilot Commissioners, relative to the construction of "Steam Hopper  
 Barges," which was approved:

"That it would require at least 20 Hopper Barges (to perform the work necessary to transfer  
 ashes, street dirt, and garbage from this city out to sea), which, at an estimated cost of \$60,000 each,  
 would involve an aggregate expenditure of about \$1,200,000. While the Committee are of the  
 opinion that vessels of this character are to be preferred for the purposes of this Bureau over the  
 present unseaworthy scows in use, the limited amount appropriated for the current year for street  
 cleaning purposes will not warrant this Committee in recommending the purchase of vessels of that  
 character."

front, south of Fourteenth street, as shall be designated, from time to time, by the Engineer.

All material will be measured, in bulk, on board the vessels, at the place of delivery.

The foregoing are the quantities which have been estimated approximately for the construction of that part of the bulkhead or river wall proposed to be completed during the present calendar year. They form, however, no part of the contract, and persons bidding are cautioned that the Department of Docks do not hold themselves responsible that any of them shall strictly obtain in the construction of the work, and reserve the right to terminate the contract at any time after the delivery of the following quantities, to wit:

Class 1. A—5,000 cubic yards.  
B—5,000 cubic yards.  
Class 2. 1,500 cubic yards.

Any bidder for this contract must be known to be engaged in and well prepared for the business, and shall give security for the faithful performance of his contract, in the manner prescribed and required by ordinance, in the sum of ten thousand dollars, in case the whole contract shall be awarded to him; or in the sum of eight thousand dollars for the contract for small cobble and rip-rap stone only, or in the sum of two thousand dollars for the contract for broken stone only; or in the sum of five hundred dollars for the contract for sand only.

Where more than one person is interested, it is requisite that the several materials stated therein are in all respects true.

The proposals shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders of the City of New York, with their respective places of business or residence, to the effect that if the contract be awarded to the person or persons making the bid, they will, on its being so awarded, become bound as his or their sureties for its faithful performance; and that if said person or persons shall omit or refuse to execute the contract, they will pay to the Corporation any difference between the sum to which said person or persons would be entitled on its completion, and that which the Corporation may be obliged to pay to any higher bidder to whom the contract may be awarded at any subsequent letting; the amount in each case to be calculated upon the estimated amount of the work by which the bids are tested.

The consent above mentioned shall be accompanied by the oath or affirmation, in writing, of each of the persons signing the same, that he is a household or freeholder in the City of New York, and is worth the amount of the security required for the contract, over and above all his debts of every nature, and over and above his liabilities as bail, surety and otherwise; and that he has offered himself as surety in good faith and with the intention to execute the bond required by section 27 of chapter VIII. of the Revised Ordinances of the City of New York, if the contract shall be awarded to the person for whom he consents to become surety. The adequacy and sufficiency of the sureties offered are to be approved by the Comptroller of the City of New York after the award is made and prior to the signing of the contract.

Bidders are informed that no deviation from the specifications will be allowed, unless under the written instructions of the Engineer-in-Chief.

No proposal will be accepted from, or contract awarded to, any person who is in arrears to the Corporation, upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the Corporation.

The right to decline all the proposals is reserved, if deemed for the interest of the Corporation.
