The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending February 12, 1881. The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,469, as follows, viz. : 3 public buildings, 717 tenement houses, 78 private dwellings, 90 other dwellings, 13 manufac-tories and workshops, 20 stores and warehouses, 27 stables, 1 lime-kiln, 14 slaughter-houses, 2 manure dumps, 1 garbage dump, 2 lodging-houses, 3 smoke-houses, 14 sunken and vacant lots, 44 yards, courts, and areas, 70 cellars and basements, 204 waste pipes and drains, 138 privies and water-closets, 4 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 5 dangerous stairways, 4 smoky chimneys, 2 cess-pools, together with 13 other nuisances. The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 511. During the past week 254 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.
