

LAWS OF NEW YORK, 1879.

CHAPTER 145.

An Act to further amend chapter one hundred and seventy-five of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy, entitled, "An act regulating the sale of intoxicating liquors.'

Passed April 4, 1879; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows

Section I. Section two of chapter one hundred and seventy-five of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy, entitled "An act regulating the sale of intoxicating liquors," is hereby further amended so as to read as follows:

and seventy, entitled "An act regulating the sale of intoxicating liquors," is hereby further amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 2. The mayor of each of the cities, except the cities of New York, Brooklyn, and Poughkeepsie, shall appoint the commissioners of excise in their respective cities within ten days after the passage of this act; but in the cities of New York, Brooklyn and Poughkeepsie, the mayor shall nominate three good and responsible citizens to the board of aldermen of such cities respectively, who shall confirm or reject such nominations. In case of the rejection of such nominees, or any of them, the mayor shall nominate other persons as aforesaid, and shall continue so to nominate, until the nominations shall be confirmed. The present commissioners of excise for the metropolitan district and the commissioners for the counties shall continue to exercise the duties of the office until such appointments, or some one of them shall be appointed in such cities respectively, as herein provided. Any one or more of the commissioners so appointed, shall have the power to act as a board of excise for the city in which he shall be appointed, until the others shall be duly appointed. Commissioners of excise in cities shall hold their office for three years, and until others shall be appointed in their places, and shall receive a salary not to exceed twenty-five hundred dollars a year each, to be fixed by the mayor and common council of their respective cities, and shall be paid as other city officers are paid. On the first Monday of April in every third year hereafter, the mayor and board of aldermen shall proceed to appoint, in the manner above described, persons qualified as aforesaid to be such commissioners of excise in their respective cities for the next three years, commencing on the first day of May in that year, and shall, from time to time, as often as vacancies shall occur, appoint persons qualified as aforesaid to fill the unexpired term of any commissioners who shall die, resign, remove from

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.
