Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending April 17, 1875. The total number of inspections made by the Inspectors was 1,429, as follows, viz.:

14 public buildings, 544 tenement houses, 132 private dwellings, 136 other dwellings, 10 manufacturing and workshops, 10 stores and warehouses, 66 stables, 1 market, 63 slaughter-houses, 9 fat-rendering establishments, 1 pier and dock, 6 tripe establishments, 29 sunken and vacant lots, 73 yards, courts, and areas, 46 cellars and basements, 74 waste-pipes and drains, 100 privies and water-closets, 17 street-gutters and sinks, 9 dangerous stairways, 2 dangerous and smoky chimneys, 1 piggery, 4 cisterns and cesspools, 12 other nuisances, together with 67 visits of the Inspectors to cases of contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 562.
During the past week 71 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Inspectors for investigation and report.
56 permits were issued to consignees of ves-

sels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of this port.

225 permits were granted to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 58 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 49 houses, 49 privy-sinks, together with clothing, etc.

35 cases of small-pox were removed to the Hospital, and 2 dead bodies to the Morgue, by the Ambulance Corps.

The following number of cases of contagious diseases was reported during the week ending April 17, 1875:

Typhus fever, 3; typhoid fever, 10; scarlet fever, 45; measles, 8; diphtheria, 87; small-pox, 51; and cerebro-spinal meningitis, 2.

4,214 cans of night-soil were removed by the scavengers from the privy-vaults of the city.

The following amount of meat and fish was condemned by the officers as unfit for human food during the week ending April 17, 1875: Cattle, 1 carcass; calves (bob), 36 carcasses; calves (case), 2 carcasses; hog, 1 carcass; beef, 25 pounds; veal, 80 pounds; and fish, 3,019 pounds.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

During the week ending April 17, 1875, there were issued from this Bureau 572 burial permits for city deaths, 21 for bodies *in transitu*, and 48 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 572 deaths, 146 marriages, 493 births, 48 still-births, 21 applications for transit permits, and 55 returns from Coroners. There were 18 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 1 transcript of birth-record, 4 of marriage, and 16 of death were issued from this Bureau; 2 cases of deaths were referred to the Coroners.

To the Secretary of the Board of Health:

SIR—In the week that ended on Saturday, the 17th inst., there were 572 deaths reported in this city. Precisely the same number was reported in the previous week, and twenty-one more, which occurred in that week, were reported and verified in the succeeding week. With that addition, the death-rate in the week ending on the 10th inst. was equal to 29.65 per 1,000 inhabitants annually. This has been the average rate for the corresponding week in the past five years.

There was an increased mortality from croup diphtheria, and whooping-cough last week, and a marked decrease in that from small-pox and the diseases of the brain and nervous system. Bronchitis and pneumonia were charged with 88 deaths last week, phthisis with 104, and diseases of the heart with 29, against a weekly average of 17 in the last five years.

The mean temperature was 41.3 degrees Fahr. at the Central Park Observatory; the extreme range was 39 degrees, and the mean pressure of the atmosphere was marked at 29.73 inches of the mercurial column.

TERMS OF SALE.

Twenty per cent. on the yearly rent bid for each parcel to be paid to the Collector of the City Revenue at the time and place of sale; and the successful bidder will be required, at the same time, to have an obligation executed by two sureties, to be approved by the Comptroller, for carrying into effect the terms of sale.

The twenty per cent., when paid, will be credited on the first quarter's rent; or forfeited, if the lessee does not execute the lease and bond within fifteen days after the sale; and the Comptroller shall be authorized, at his option, to resell the premises bid off by those failing to comply with the terms as above; and the party so failing to comply to be liable for any deficiency that may result from such resale.

No person will be received as lessee or surety who is delinquent on any former lease from the Corporation. No bid will be accepted from any person who is in arrears to the Corporation upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as security or otherwise, upon any obligation to the Corporation. (Sec. 99 of Charter of 1873.)

The leases will contain the usual covenants and conditions, reserving to the Corporation the right to cancel the lease whenever the premises may be required by them for public purposes.

All repairs will be made at the expense of the lessees, and no deduction whatever will be allowed for damage by reason of any sickness or epidemic that may prevail in the city during the continuance of the lease.

The lessees will be required to give a bond for double the amount of the annual rent, with two sureties, to be approved by the Comptroller, conditioned for the payment of the rent quarter-yearly, and the fulfillment on their part of the covenants of the lease.

The leases, bonds, and revenue stamps to be at the expense of the lessees.

Should the Corporation sell, lease, rebuild, or remove any of the Markets during the term for which the lease is granted, the lessees for the cellars and other premises in or under the Markets so sold, leased, rebuilt, or removed, are to be canceled at the option of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and no deduction or award for damages will be made by the Corporation therefor.
