To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

A plan together with specifications of the proposed bridge over the Harlem Ship Canal, on the line of the Kingsbridge road, the construction of said bridge being authorized by chapter 232, Laws 1892, were presented to this Board at the meeting held January 26, 1893, and referred to the Comptroller.

The Engineer of the Finance Department reports that the plan submitted, taken in connection with the specifications, are sufficient to form a good general idea of the work; the detail plans he states are well under way, those for the masonry being completed. The plans of the iron work are not so far advanced, but will be ready in a few days, and are satisfactory and furnish all the data required upon which to make bids for the work and for its prosecution. The expenses as esti-

mated come within the amount as limited by the act. The approval of the Secretary of War to the general plan will be necessary after having been submitted to and approved by this Board.

Wood & Tolmie, for erecting an addition to Grammar School No. 53; also to cancel a resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on November 4, 1891, appropriating the sum of \$9,116 from the proceeds of the sale of School-house Bonds under chapter 252 of the Laws of 1889, for the purpose of improving the lots Nos. 210 and 212, adjoining Grammar School No. 53, and to apply the amount in payment of the above-mentioned contract, a total of \$59,149, as the lots were never improved, but instead it is proposed to erect the addition upon them.

The matter was presented to this Board on January 23, 1893, and referred to the Comptroller.

The Engineer has made a careful examination of this matter; and from his report it appears that in carrying out the excavation to the 12-foot line below the fixed point therefor on the plan, a part of the wall was left without a sufficient foundation; it was therefore necessary to excavate below the line from which the excavation was provided for in the contract, the space built up, retaining walls placed lower, and concrete foundation under the walls to level of the foundations. A certain quantity of rock had also to be removed to bring the sidewalk to grade. An extra window in the third-floor hall was required, and a hard wood closet in the second-floor hall.

The account of these items is as follows:

SIR—The Board of Education by resolution adopted January 18, 1893, requests the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to an appropriation of \$1,406.08 to be applied in payment of the bill of Edward Gustaveson, dated October 26, 1891, for extra work in connection with his contract for erecting the new school building at Spuyten Duyvil Primary School, No. 46.

In preparing the foundation of this building it was found that carrying out the 12-foot line would leave part of the wall without a sufficient foundation, and excavation had to be made below that line, and the space built up, and the retaining wall also had to be placed lower. It was also necessary to place concrete under these walls to level off the foundation. At the end of the work it was found necessary to do certain excavations of rock to bring the sidewalk to grade.

There was also required to put an extra window in the third-floor hall, rear, and a hard-wood closet in hall of second floor.

The accounts for these items are as follows:

2,210 cubic feet of stone masonry in wall, at 18 cents per cubic foot;
996 cubic feet of stone masonry in retaining wall, at 18 cents per cubic foot;

3,206 cubic feet of stone masonry, at 18 cents per cubic yard \$577 08 |

Storm, for the sum of \$600, said sum to include all claims against the City for use and occupation of said land, all interest, and all claims for damages, and referring said purchase to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for approval.

These parcels of land are all necessary for the purposes of the dam, partly for roadways and partly for general uses. That marked "4 1/4" has been in use for construction purposes from the beginning of the work.

I think the price agreed upon reasonable, being at the rate of \$200 per acre, with an allowance of \$146 for interest and damages.

I see no reason why the purchase should not be approved.

The new lines approved by the Government officers will conform to the twelve feet contour line, bounding the land under water as described in the grant by the State to the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of this City, under chapter 469, Laws of 1885, "for land under water in the East river, for docks, and for the beneficial enjoyment of Riker's Island."

GENERAL—The Harbor Line Board for New York Harbor and its adjacent waters, constituted by Special Orders No. 49, Headquarters Corps of Engineers, October 5, 1888, to comply with section 12 of the River and Harbor Act of August 11, 1888, has had under consideration the application of the City of New York, through Mr. Simon Stevens, dated September 22, 1892, and through the Comptroller of the City, Theodore W. Myers, dated September 30, 1892, that the harbor lines around Riker's Island, New York Harbor, established by the Secretary of War January 9, 1891, be extended outwards to the twelve-foot contour line, under water around said island, in accordance with the grants from the State of New York, authorized by the Legislature of the State of New York, under chapter 262 of the Laws of 1884, amended by chapter 469 of the Laws of 1885.

The papers in the case were forwarded for the action of the Board by your indorsements of September 29, 1892 (5571-1892), and October 3, 1892 (5572-1892), respectively.

The harbor lines around Riker's Island which were recommended by the Harbor Line Board for the approval of the Secretary of War, December 23, 1890, were those which had previously been established by the State in 1857.

The island was purchased by the City of New York for the use of the Department of Public Charities, under chapter 262 of the Laws of the State of New York, 1884. The purchase perfected in that year, and including "all upland and land under water there, and all water rights thereat," embraced 87½ acres, more or less.

Under chapter 469 of the State Laws of 1885, the State of New York granted to the City of New York a supplementary grant of land under water defined by certain metes and bounds, and following generally the 12-foot curve, "for docks and for the beneficial enjoyment of Riker's Island by the Corporation of the City of New York, the owners thereof, represented by the Commissioners of Public Charities and Correction of said City." The City claimed the right under this latter grant to "crib in, fill up and make additional dry land of nearly 400 acres," and in 1886 the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City made an appropriation of \$50,000 for the furtherance of this end, but it was never so applied. The Corporation Counsel of the City stated to the Board that, in his opinion, the Act of 1885 in effect extended the harbor lines out to the 12-foot curve.

At the time of the meeting when this matter was considered no representative appeared before the Board in behalf of the City, and in the absence of any opposing voice, the Board considered and adopted for recommendation the State lines of 1857, no other lines being before it. It now appears that the City has taken steps to utilize the water grants of 1884 and 1885, subject to the approval of the Secretary of War, by inclosing the outlying shoal to the 12-foot curve with cribwork and filling in the same with city refuse for occupancy as sites for charitable institutions, replacing like structures now located upon Blackwell's Island.

If harbor lines be drawn according to State grant of 1885, and the land under water be surrounded by a bulkhead and filled in, Riker's Island will have its area increased to 500 acres approximately. The width of the main ship channel on the north side will remain unchanged at 1,300 feet, and that of the secondary channel on the south side, leading to and from Flushing Bay and beyond, will be 1,000 feet, which is ample for navigation on that side.

After careful examination of the subject the Board recommends that the application of the City of New York to take advantage of the grants of land under water made by State Acts of 1884 and 1885, and to fill them in for public purposes be granted, and that coincident pier and bulkhead lines be drawn around the exterior of the grant of 1885, with authority for the City to construct on the north shore two open piers between the 12 and 20 foot curves in such a way as not to contract the channel nor unnecessarily obstruct current flow—one located on the west side of the northern part of the island, and the other near the centre line of the proposed enlarged island. The final location of these two piers should be subject to the approval of the Secretary of War.

A tracing accompanies this report upon which are delineated the modified harbor lines around Riker's Island which are herein recommended.

A supplementary chart is sent herewith showing the relations which the recommended lines bear to the existing lines.

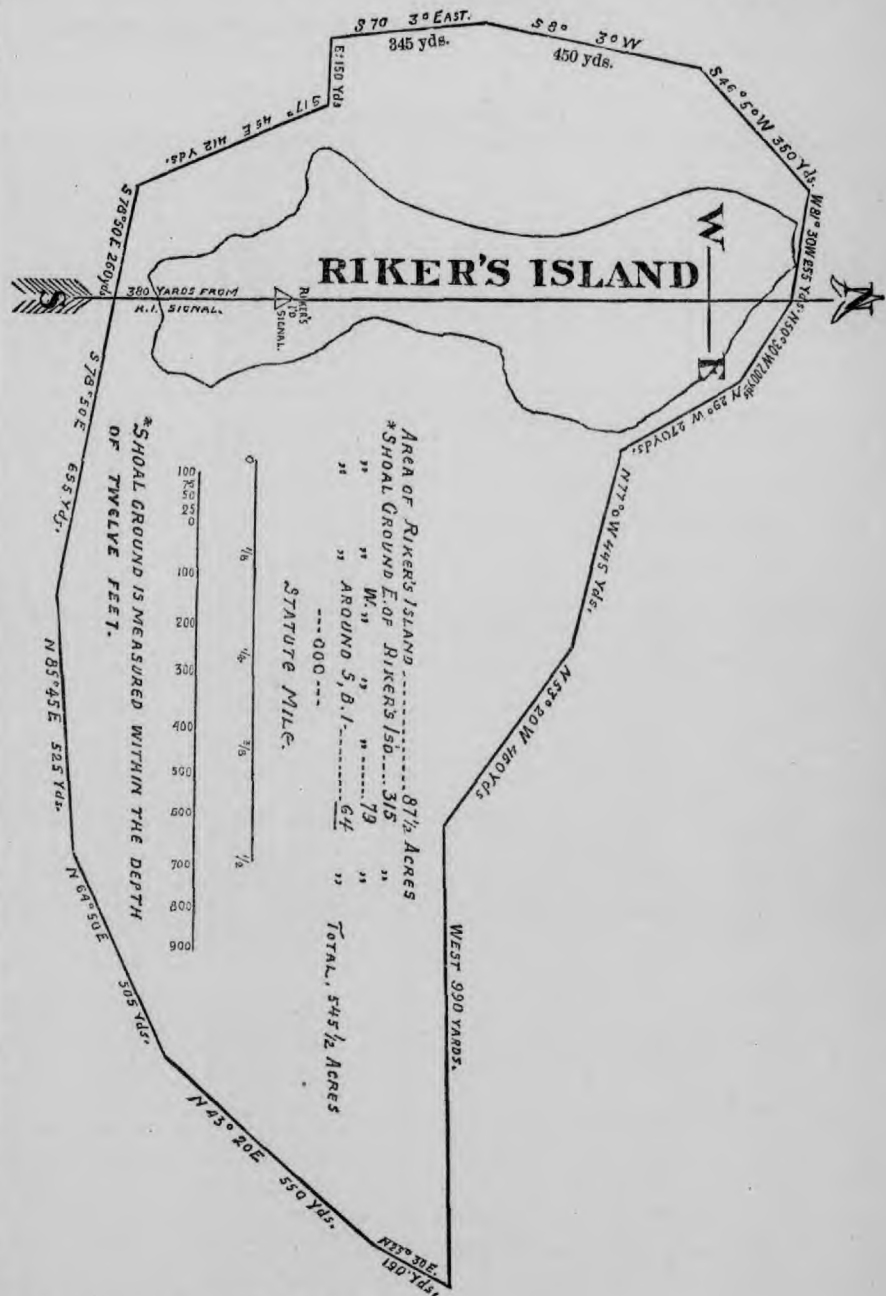

The bills for advertising the official canvass of the election of November 8, 1892, have been presented to the Comptroller for payment as follows: N. Y. News Publishing Company, \$19,688.10; The Tribune Association, \$15,606.90; total, \$35,295. These newspapers were designated by the Board of Police to advertise the canvass for one day only, pursuant to the provisions of section 1929 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882.

The bills are certified as correct by the Board of Police. The amount is larger than usual, as the names of the Presidential Electors of each party, with the votes given for each, are necessarily included in the advertisement.

The sum of \$40,000 was appropriated for election expenses for 1892. Of this sum, \$22,857.70 has already been expended for advertising election districts, polling places and the election notices, by the Clerk of the Common Council and by the Sheriff, leaving only \$17,142.30 available for the payment of these bills. The deficiency of \$18,152.70 may be provided for by a transfer from the appropriation for "Judgments" for last year, which has a surplus sufficient for this purpose.

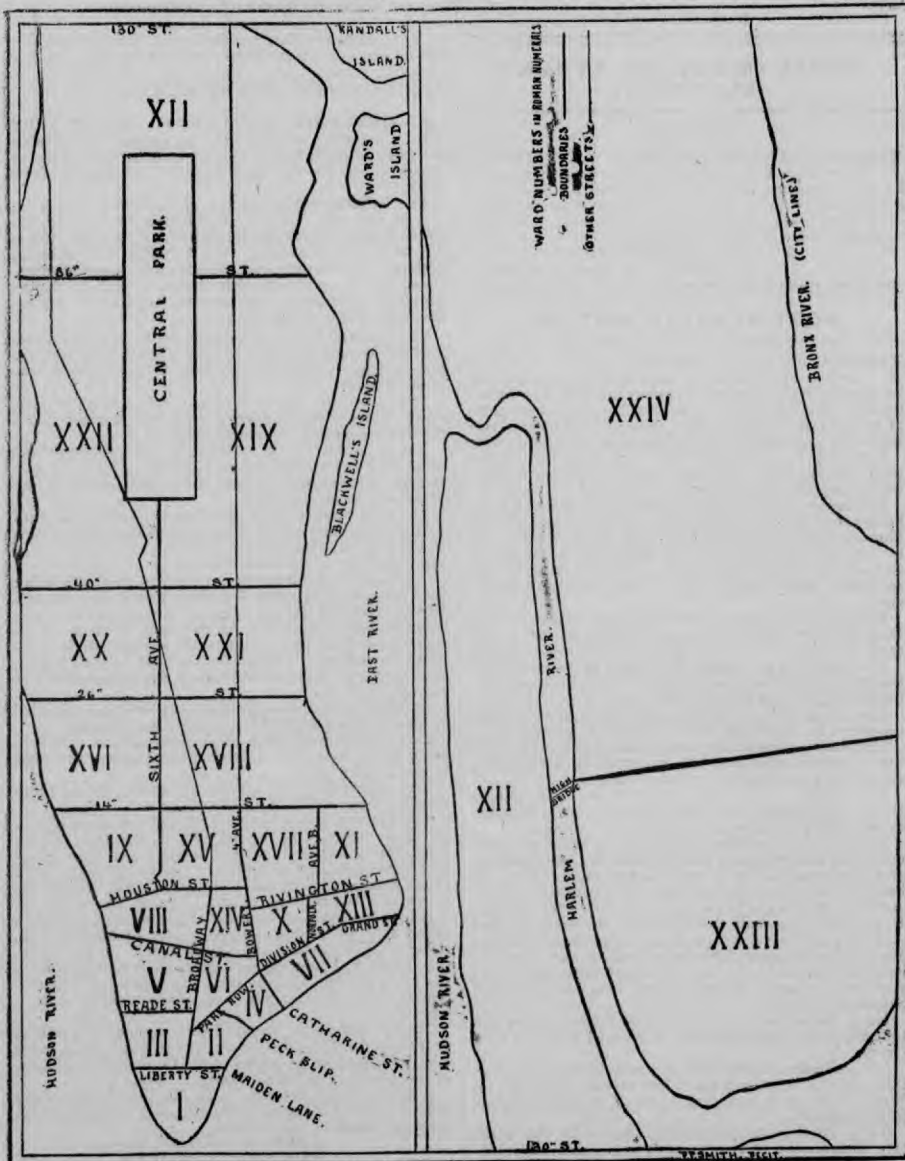

The 829 deaths represent a death-rate of 23.20, against 24.25 for the previous week and 26.29 for the corresponding week of 1892.

Contagious and infectious diseases show a slight increase, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox being respectively 98, 78, 154, 11, 30 and 6, against 99, 97, 141, 9, 16 and 7 for the previous week, a total of 377 against 369. Diphtheria increased noticeably in the Nineteenth Ward and decreased in the Seventh, Twentieth and Twenty-second Wards, the changes elsewhere being slight. There was a slight increase of measles in the Seventeenth, Eighteenth and Nineteenth Wards, while the decrease was very marked in the Seventh, Eleventh and Twenty-third Wards. The increase of scarlet fever was most marked in the Eleventh, Sixteenth, Seventeenth, Eighteenth, Twenty-second and Twenty-fourth Wards, and the decrease in the Thirteenth and Twentieth Wards; 5 of the 11 cases of typhoid fever were below Fourteenth street, and the remaining 6 were above Fortieth street. Typhus fever was more widely distributed than heretofore, 14 of the 30 cases having been reported from above Fourteenth street; 5 of the 6 cases of small-pox were between Twenty-sixth and Fortieth streets, West.

DEAR SIR—We have the honor to present to you the following suggestions in regard to the better lighting of the city:

That Columbus avenue, as well as the district south of Washington Square for several blocks, and the tenement district east and west of the Bowery be lighted by electricity. We furthermore beg to press upon your attention the insufficient light generally furnished by the gas companies to the City in the street lamps.

We trust you will have these important matters duly considered at the next meeting of the Gas Commission.

The question of lighting the streets at Woodlawn Heights was then discussed, and the Secretary stated that about fifty-six electric lamps would be required to light the same, and the matter was then referred to the Commissioner of Public Works to see if a less number of electric lamps would not suffice.

A GENERAL INVITATION IS HEREBY extended to architects to furnish competitive designs and plans for an armory building for the use of Troop A, of the National Guard of the State of New York.

The building to be erected on the ground 200 x 100 feet in the rear of the Eighth Regiment Armory, between Ninety-fourth and Ninety-fifth streets, and fronting on Madison Avenue. The building to be of brick, with stone trimmings, and provided with a roof of glass, slate, tile or other durable material, and in design should harmonize as near as possible with the Eighth Regiment Armory adjoining.

The excavation for the building to be over the whole area of 200 x 100 feet, and to give a depth that will insure nine feet clear from the floor of the cellar to the ceiling above.

The cellar to contain a target range, marker's pit, large saddle room, armorer's room, boiler room and a runway for horses to the floor above.

The remainder of the cellar to be left unfinished and to be used as a stable, and to be fitted up by the Troop at their own expense, and not to be provided for in the present plans or estimates.

The main floor, on street level, is to be occupied with a ring of tan bark or dirt (similar to riding school rings) of the largest possible dimensions. This floor to be supported on columns and arches.

The plans to show accommodation in the building for Troop Meeting-room, Captain's Room, Lieutenant's Room, First Sergeant's Room, Quartermaster Sergeant's Room, Janitor's Apartments, Kitchen, with range, etc.; Locker-rooms, with lockers, to be provided for 100 men; suitable Water-closets, Bath-rooms, etc.; as much Gallery and Seating Accommodations as possible.

Building to be lighted by electricity and gas. Heated by steam. Ample provisions made for drainage.

Plans to be submitted, to be drawn scale 1/8 inch equal to one foot with a perspective drawing, rendered in black and white.

The entire cost of building, as called for in these specifications, shall not exceed \$140,000.

The Armory Board reserves the right to reject any or all plans which may be offered if, for any reason, they deem it best to do so, and in case any plan is accepted as presented or with alterations or suggestions of the Armory Board, and it is subsequently found that a contract satisfactory to the Armory Board can be made for the complete erection of the building as herein called for, for a sum, including the architect's fees, which shall not exceed the appropriation for the work, the architect presenting such plans shall be engaged for the work and his compensation for plans and superintendence shall be four per cent. of the amount of such contract.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners

of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act:

When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
