MOTIONS, ORDINANCES AND RESOLUTIONS.

Alderman Harnischfeger asked for and obtained unanimous consent to introduce the following:

No. 1031.

Whereas, God, in His infinite power, has taken to a higher realm that noble patriot, illustrious citizen and hero in more than one cause for freedom, General Franz Sigel, and

Whereas, The lessons of his life, teaching as they do everything in consonance with the spirit of the founders of our republic, will ever live as inspiring influences to the people of our nation, to whose cause he was devoted and for whom he labored in trying times of war with a steadfastness of purpose rarely recorded in the history of the conflicts of the world; and

Whereas, General Franz Sigel, German patriot and hero of the War of the Rebellion, true American citizen, loving friend and parent, is no more and has left the people of his adopted country to mourn the loss of one who shall ever live in its history; therefore

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York hereby notes upon its record its sincere regret at the death of the brave soldier and patriot, General Franz Sigel, and extends to his family sincere sympathy in the hour of their affliction. We join with the nation in saying, "A good man has gone to his reward."

Resolved, further, That a copy of the foregoing preamble and resolution be suitably engrossed and duly authenticated by the City Clerk and transmitted to the family of the late General Franz Sigel.

MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

The President laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor:

City of New York, Office of the Mayor,
August 6, 1902.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

I return herewith, without my approval, resolutions suspending the ordinance relating to the discharge of fireworks, adopted by the Board of Aldermen July 31, 1902, as follows: Permitting a display in the streets of Harlem on August 4, 1902; permitting a display by the St. Bartholomeo Society on August 29 and 30, 1902; permitting a display in the Fifty-ninth Aldermanic District on August 15, 1902; permitting a display at North Eighth street and Union avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, August 18, 1902; permitting a display at the celebration of the St. Maria della Libera of Brooklyn on August 4, 1902.

My objection to these resolutions is that it has appeared, from reports made to me by the Fire Commissioner, that such suspensions of the ordinance in relation to fireworks have become more and more frequent, and have led to increased fire hazard and consequent increased insurance rates. Protests have also been filed by citizens with me and with your Honorable Board, and your Committee on Laws and Legislation has reported that such complaints of citizens had foundation in fact.

It therefore seems to me that such displays should be allowed only when a permit is obtained from the Fire Commissioner and under such regulations as he shall prescribe.

Resolved, That the ordinance relating to the discharge of fireworks be and the same is hereby suspended so as to permit of a display in the streets of Harlem on August 4, 1902.

Resolved, That the ordinance relating to the discharge of fireworks be and the same is hereby suspended so as to permit of a display in the streets of Harlem on August 4, 1902.

PETITIONS AND COMMUNICATIONS.

No. 1032.

Preamble and resolutions adopted by the Board of Directors of the Merchants' Association of New York at a meeting of the Board held on the first day of August, 1902:

"Whereas, The chief impediment to the greater growth of The City of New York as a commercial centre has been and is the difficulty in housing its population, and consequently the need of extended and more expeditious means of transportation; and

"Whereas, This great need has been recognized and effort is now being made to meet it through building bridges and tunnels between the commercial Borough of Manhattan and the neighboring Borough of Brooklyn and the great extent of suburban territory lying beyond; and

"Whereas, The plans of the Pennsylvania, New York and Long Island Railroad Company to build a tunnel under the North river, under the Borough of Manhattan and under the East river to the Borough of Brooklyn, would open easy access from Manhattan to the large residential section extending in both directions; and

"Whereas, The effect of a larger area of residential location must inure to the advantage of all citizens in affording to them more comfortable quarters and lower rents and in prospects of more accessible suburban homes; and

"Whereas, It is desirable that all concessions or privileges granted by The City of New York be hedged around with every practicable protection of the civic interest, and utmost compensation for benefits granted; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Rapid Transit Commission did wisely in favoring the project of the Pennsylvania, New York and Long Island Railroad to build tunnels as already set forth, which is a work of transcendent importance to the City; and be it further

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen did well in closely scrutinizing the details of the proposed franchise; and be it further

Resolved, That the accomplishment of the project in question is a matter of vast, far reaching and supreme importance to the commercial advancement of the City and to the welfare of all classes of its citizens, for which reasons it is urged that the pending negotiations may have the prompt attention and helpful co-operation of the City authorities, to the end that this most important work be promptly undertaken and so prosecuted as to insure its completion at the earliest possible time."

No. 1033.

To the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Demand or claim of Louis J. Morelius against The City of New York, the New York Telephone Company and the Bronx Gas and Electric Light Company, respectfully shows:

That on the 25th of February, 1902, about 7.30 o'clock p. m., claimant stepped upon two wires lying upon the east sidewalk of Avenue C, between Fourth and Fifth streets, in Unionport, in the Borough of The Bronx, in The City of New York; that one of said wires was that of The City of New York, used in its Fire Department system, which fact claimant has but recently learned; that the other of said wires was that of the New York Telephone Company; that through the negligence of said City and said Telephone Company, both of said wires had fallen from the line of poles upon which they had been strung and were carelessly and negligently left upon said sidewalk by said City by said Telephone Company for a long time prior to said time; that said wires were charged with a powerful electric current from their contact with the wire of The Bronx Gas and Electric Light Company, at the corner of Avenue C and Fourth street; that the proximity of said three wires was caused through the negligence of said City and said two companies, and was in violation of the requirements of the City governing the construction and operation of poles, wires, conduits, subways and other electrical appliances in the streets of said City; that claimant was seriously injured by said electricity and by his fall; that claimant suffered for weeks from partial nervous shock; that ecchymotic spots appeared on the outside of his right leg; that his knee was much swollen; that he walked with a limp; that he suffered with much pain in his hip and leg, and that he was unable to attend to his duties, to his great damage, five thousand dollars.

Wherefore claimant demands the adjustment and payment of said damage.

Hon. BIRD S. COLER, Comptroller:

Sir—Hon. James P. Keating, in communication dated December 18, 1901, requests the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 211 of the Laws of 1897, to provide the necessary funds for the construction of a bridge to extend East One Hundred and Eighty-ninth street, over the New York and Harlem Railroad. The Commissioner's estimate of the cost is \$19,000.

In reply I would report that the bridge is a simple girder and truss bridge, eighty feet in width, with two roadways each 22 feet 6 inches wide and two sidewalks 17 feet 6 inches each on the sides of the bridge.

The plans and specifications do not call for an elaborate bridge, only a good and substantial structure, and no better than is required for the purpose.

One Hundred and Eighty-ninth street, from Webster avenue to Third avenue, is being regulated and graded by contract, dated April 24, 1900; hence a bridge at the proposed location will be necessary to make a continuous street.

I would therefore recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to chapter 211 of the Laws of 1897 and the provisions of chapter 169 of the Greater New York Charter, authorize the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock to the amount of \$19,000 to provide for the construction of a bridge to extend East One Hundred and Eighty-ninth street, over the New York and Harlem Railroad.

Hon. CHARLES V. FORNES, President, Board of Aldermen:

Sir—During the present coal strike this Department has been put to considerable difficulty in procuring necessary supplies of coal for the various pumping stations throughout the City. Certain purchases of coal, both anthracite and bituminous, were made of certain coal dealers, on what are known as emergency orders. The vouchers in favor of these dealers are being held up by the Comptroller on the ground that the purchases, in the aggregate, exceed one thousand dollars, and therefore the supplies in question, under section 419 of the Charter, should have been procured under a contract after public letting. The Comptroller, however, is willing to certify the vouchers in question, and such other vouchers as may be sent to him by the Department for all subsequent deliveries of coal, provided your Board will pass a resolution in the form which I inclose.

I respectfully urge that your Board give me the authority stated in the inclosed form of resolution, so that the supply of coal necessary for pumping may be obtained. I also request that this resolution be brought up at the earliest possible opportunity and if possible receive unanimous consent for immediate consideration.

Sir—I have received your letter dated August 11, 1902, requesting me to advise you if the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the several boroughs, under the provisions of section 18 of the Charter, have a vote in filling the vacancy occasioned by the death of the late James J. Bridges, of the Forty-sixth District, Borough of Brooklyn.

Section 18 of the Charter contains the following clause:

"The phrase, 'all the members of the Board of Aldermen,' wherever used in this act, shall be taken and held to mean all the members of said Board, including the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the several boroughs. The phrase, 'members elected to the Board of Aldermen,' wherever used in this act, shall be taken and held to mean all the members of said Board except the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the several boroughs. Any vacancy which may occur among the members elected to the Board of Aldermen shall be filled by election, by a majority of all the members elected thereto, of a person who must be of the same political party as the member whose place has become vacant, and the person so elected to fill any such vacancy shall serve for the unexpired portion of the term."

In the present case a vacancy has occurred "among the members elected to the Board of Aldermen." This expression is defined in the above quotation to mean all the members of said Board except the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the several boroughs.

It seems clear, therefore, that the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the several boroughs are not entitled to vote at the election of a successor to Mr. Bridges.

 AN ORDINANCE to license persons operating automobiles, locomobiles and similar vehicles in The City of New York

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. No person shall hereafter operate any automobile, locomobile, motor-vehicle, or other similar vehicle, whether the motive power thereof be electricity, steam, gas, gasoline, oil, naphtha or other similar source of energy and whether used as public hack, truck, or for hire, or for private use, for pleasure or business, until such person has first obtained a license to operate the same.

Sec. 2. The Mayor shall designate three persons having sufficient knowledge of the subject to intelligently act thereon, who shall hold office for two years and who shall be known as a Board of Examiners of Automobile Operators, and whose duty it shall be to carefully examine every applicant for a license to operate any vehicle referred to in section 1 hereof as to such person's general and special fitness to operate such vehicle and to make their written report to the Mayor on such application, with their recommendation thereon. The compensation of the members of said Board shall be fixed by the order of appointment. The Mayor shall have the power to remove such appointees, or any of them, at any time, at his pleasure, and shall have the power and it is hereby made his duty to fill vacancies in said Board from whatever cause arising, and shall have the power and it is hereby made his duty to appoint successors to the members of said Board on the expiration of the term for which they were appointed. Said Board may adopt and enforce such rules and regulations for the performance of the duties imposed upon it as it shall deem necessary, and shall hold stated meetings at some convenient place in said City to be designated and provided for that purpose by the Chief of the Bureau of Licenses, said place to be located in one of the public buildings of said City, if possible, in the City Hall; they shall keep an accurate record of all their proceedings; they shall have a person now in the employ of said city to be assigned by the Mayor to act as Secretary of said Board; and the salaries of the members of said Board, as well as all other proper and necessary expenses incurred in carrying out the requirements and provisions of this ordinance shall be paid monthly, out of the moneys paid for licenses, hereunder, sufficient of said moneys being retained by said Bureau of Licenses to meet such charges, the surplus, if any, to be paid to the City Chamberlain and to become a part of the general fund of said City.

Sec. 3. Persons desiring a license hereunder shall make written application to the Bureau of Licenses, in such form and containing such information as said Board of Examiners of Automobile Operators shall specify. Such application shall at once be referred to the aforesaid Board of Examiners, who shall as soon as convenient appoint a time and place for hearing thereon, and the Secretary of said Board shall at once notify the applicant thereof; the applicant shall personally appear before the said Board at the time designated or at any other time to which such hearing shall be adjourned, and shall submit to such examination by said Board as it shall prescribe. The Board in its report shall state whether the application is approved or rejected, and if rejected, the reason therefor. Such report shall forthwith be forwarded to the Mayor for approval or rejection. If approved, and if the report is in favor of granting the license, the Bureau of Licenses shall, on compliance by the applicant with the other requirements hereof, at once issue the license, which shall be good for one year from its date unless sooner suspended or revoked, as herein otherwise provided for. If the report of the Board be against granting the license and if such report is approved, no license shall be granted on such application; if the Mayor shall disapprove such report rejecting said application the same shall go back to the Board of Examiners for further hearing.

Sec. 4. All licenses issued under the provisions of this ordinance shall be by authority of the Mayor of The City of New York and shall be issued by the Bureau of Licenses, but only after the requirements of sections 3, 5 and 7 of this ordinance are complied with. Such licenses shall be good for one year from the date thereof, unless sooner revoked or suspended, and may be renewed from year to year, if not so revoked or suspended, either with or without further examination of the licensee, as the said Board of Examiners may determine, on payment to the Bureau of Licenses of one-half the sum paid therefor for the first year. The Mayor shall have power, after a hearing, for any of the causes specified in section 6 hereof, or for any other cause sufficient to him and materially affecting the safety or well being of persons using the streets, avenues, roads, alleys, lanes, boulevards, highways, concourses, parks, parkways or other public places within said City, or disturbing or tending to disturb

the good order or peace of said City to suspend or revoke any such license. A license issued hereunder shall not be transferable; and the licensee must produce and exhibit the same whenever required so to do by any police officer or magistrate of said City.

Sec. 5. Licenses issued hereunder shall contain the name and address of the person in whose favor issued, the kind of vehicle to be operated thereunder, with a sufficiently definite description thereof, and shall otherwise be in such form as may be prescribed by the said Board of Examiners of Automobile Operators; and shall be numbered and registered by and with the Bureau of Licenses with the full name and address of the person to whom issued, with the number thereof, in a book to be provided for that purpose, which book shall be open to inspection by the public during office hours. Every person to whom any license is issued, before attempting to operate any such vehicle thereunder, shall cause the vehicle mentioned therein to be equipped with two suitable lamps, to be approved by the Mayor or by the Chief of the said Bureau of Licenses, one to be carried forward on each side of such vehicle, and shall have securely fastened across the middle of the outside of each lamp a metal band not less than two inches in width, out of which the official numbers of such license shall be cut after the manner of a stencil plate, the component figures of such numbers shall not be less than one and one-half inches in height and of a style to be approved by the Mayor or by the chief of the said Bureau of Licenses, and said number shall be so placed as to be easily seen from either side of such vehicle by day as well as at night, and such lamps shall be kept brightly burning from one-half hour after sunset, so long as said vehicle is used at night.

Sec. 6. It shall be sufficient cause for suspending or revoking such license that the person to whom it has been issued has violated any law, ordinance, regulation or resolution of said City or any Department thereof in regard to the rate of speed at which such vehicles as are affected by this ordinance are permitted to be operated or run; or has wilfully violated any other law, ordinance, regulation or resolution of said City or of any Department thereof or any law of the State of New York operative in said City relating to or controlling or regulating the use, operation or management of such vehicles; or that said licensee has on any of the streets, avenues, roads, alleys, lanes, boulevards, highways, concourses, parks, parkways, or other public places within said City, operated or attempted to operate any such vehicle while such licensee was in a state of intoxication or while in other respects incompetent to or incapable of properly and safely operating the same, or has operated any such vehicle or attempted so to do on any of the aforesaid public places in a reckless or careless manner or so as to endanger the life, person or property of other users of such public places; or that such licensee has knowingly permitted or allowed a person not having a license hereunder to operate on any of the aforesaid public places, any such vehicle owned or controlled by such licensee; or carelessly or negligently permitting or allowing any such vehicle owned or controlled by such licensee to stand or remain unattended on any such public places; or refusing on demand to exhibit or display to any police officer or Magistrate of said City his license obtained hereunder.

Sec. 7. The fee to be paid for licenses under this ordinance shall be as follows:

For any vehicle affected by the provision hereof, operated as a public hack, cab, coach or truck or for hire, if intended to carry one or two persons, three dollars; if intended to carry more than two persons, five dollars.

For any such vehicle operated for private use, either for business or pleasure, ten dollars.

Sec. 8. Any person operating or attempting to operate any vehicle covered by the provisions of this ordinance on any of the streets, avenues, roads, alleys, lanes, boulevards, highways, concourses, parks, parkways or other public places within said City of New York without first obtaining a license so to do, or violating any of the other provisions or requirements of this ordinance, shall for each offense be fined not less than ten dollars nor more than fifty dollars, or shall be imprisoned not less than two days nor more than ten days, or shall suffer both fine and imprisonment.

Sec. 9. Nothing herein contained shall be construed to apply to any vehicle propelled by horse power or by human energy, nor to any motor-cycle or bicycle or tricycle, nor to any street car, by whatever motive power propelled, nor to any elevated or steam railroad or railway car, or the engine or other motive power used to propel the same; nor to any vehicle mentioned in section 1 hereof owned or employed by The City of New York or by the Government of the United States, or by any regularly constituted hospital in said City of New York.

Sec. 10. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed; provided that in a case when the operator of any vehicle referred to in section 1 hereof, operated as a public hack, cab, coach, truck or other vehicle used for hire, has obtained a license hereunder, no other license for such public hack, cab, coach, truck or other vehicle used for hire shall be required, the provisions of the first six clauses of section 4 of an ordinance entitled "A general ordinance in relation to business requiring a license and the regulation thereof in The City of New York," approved May 29, 1899, so far only as they apply to the class of vehicles mentioned in section 1 of this ordinance being hereby suspended.

Sec. 11. It is hereby made the duty of the Chief of Police and of the entire police force of said City of New York to enforce the terms and provisions of this ordinance.

Sec. 12. This ordinance shall go into effect immediately, except that sixty days from its approval shall be allowed all persons now operating any vehicles affected hereby to procure the required license hereunder.

By the same—
 AN ORDINANCE carrying into effect certain provisions of section 50 of the Greater New York Charter relating particularly to the placing of signs,

sign posts, awnings, awning posts, horse-troughs, storm-doors, etc., and to the exhibiting of banners, placards or flags.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. No person, firm or corporation shall hereafter erect, place, keep or maintain any sign, sign post, awning or marquee, awning-post, horse-trough or storm-door, or exhibit any banner, placard or flag in or across any street or thoroughfare, or from houses or other buildings, unless a license therefor shall have been granted as hereinafter more specifically provided.

Sec. 2. All licenses shall be granted by authority of the Mayor and issued by the Bureau of Licenses, for such terms as are hereinafter named, and shall be in force and effect for the term specified, unless sooner suspended or revoked by the Mayor. The Chief of the Bureau of Licenses shall have power to hear and determine complaints against any of the licensees hereunder, and impose a fine of two dollars (\$2) for any violation of the regulations herein provided, and, subject to the approval of the Mayor, shall have power to suspend the license pending payment of such fine. All such fines, when collected, shall be paid into the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt.

Sec. 3. Signs and Sign Posts—Signs, showbills and showboards may be placed on the fronts of buildings, with the consent of the owner thereof, and shall be securely fastened. They shall not project more than one foot from the house wall, except that signs may be hung or attached at right angles to any building and extend not to exceed three feet therefrom in the space between the second floor (the ground floor being considered the first floor), and a point eight feet in the clear above the level of the sidewalk in front of such building. Signs may be attached to the sides of stoops, but not to extend above the railing or beyond the stoop-line of any stoop. No sign, showbill or showboard shall be placed, hung or maintained except as in this section prescribed, and for each sign, showbill or showboard so placed, hung or maintained a license fee of three dollars (\$3) shall be paid.

Transparencies may be placed on public lamp-posts, not to exceed the number of six, by any church, educational, charitable or beneficial association, upon the payment of a license fee of one dollar (\$1), and such permission shall continue only for a period of thirty days from the date of the issue of such license.

Sec. 4. Awnings (or Marquises) and Awning Posts—Awnings (or marquises) of tin or other light metal, or canvas, or of iron and glass, may be erected across the sidewalks of any of the streets of The City of New York, except Broadway, Fifth avenue, Lexington avenue, Madison avenue, and the Bowery, in the Borough of Manhattan, provided any and every such awning shall not be higher than the floor of the second story of the building (the ground floor being considered the first floor), but in no case to be covered with wood, and every awning or water-shed of any kind covering one-half, or less, than the full width of the sidewalk, shall have connected therewith a gutter and leader of material and size sufficient for conducting the water from the same to the outer line of the curbstone. Drop-awnings, without vertical supports, may be erected within the stoop-lines, but in no case to extend beyond six feet from the house-line, and to be at least eight feet in the clear above the sidewalk.

Sec. 5. All posts fixed in any street for the purpose of supporting any awning shall be of iron not exceeding six inches in diameter, and the rail crossing the same shall be also of iron; the said posts shall be placed next to and along the inside of the curbstone, and the cross-rail, which is intended to support the awning, shall not be less than eight, nor more than ten, feet in height above the sidewalk, and the said cross-rail shall be strongly secured to the upright posts. No portion or part of any canvas or cloth, or tin, or other light metal, used as an awning, shall hang loosely or project upward or downward from the same over any sidewalk or footpath. Iron posts for awnings shall be well and securely braced from the building with wrought-iron rails or rods at least one inch in diameter, in the proportion of one brace for every post.

Sec. 6. The President of a borough shall order and direct any awning, awning post or bracket, which may be erected contrary to the provisions of this ordinance, to be forthwith removed; and any person who shall neglect or refuse to comply with such direction and order shall forfeit and pay for every such offense the sum of ten dollars.

Sec. 7. No awning shall be erected except as prescribed in sections 4 and 5, and for each awning so erected a license fee of five dollars (\$5) shall be paid.

Sec. 8. Horse Troughs—Horse troughs may be placed on sidewalks, adjacent to the curb, provided they be of a size and pattern approved by the President of the Borough in which they are located, and shall in no way prove an impediment to pedestrians. For each horse-trough located in The City of New York the licensee therefor shall stipulate with the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity to pay as compensation such amount as shall be deemed an equivalent or as may be provided by the scale of water rents for the water supplied.

Sec. 9. No horse-trough shall be placed except as prescribed in section 8, and for each horse-trough so placed a license fee of five dollars (\$5) shall be paid.

Sec. 10. Storm Doors—Storm doors, not exceeding ten feet in height, nor more than two feet wider than the doorway or entrance of any building, may be temporarily erected within the stoop-lines, but in no case to extend more than six feet outside the house-line. No structure under the name of "storm-door" shall be lawful which shall practically be an extension of the building front or house front within the stoop-line, or an enlargement of the ground floor of any premises.

Sec. 11. No storm-door shall be erected except as prescribed in section 9, and for each storm-door so erected a license fee of five dollars (\$5) shall be paid.

Sec. 12. Ornamental Lamp-posts—Ornamental lamp-posts may be erected within in stoop-lines and on sidewalks adjacent to the curb, provided that the lamps thereon shall be kept lighted during the same hours as the public lamps; that the dimensions of each post shall not, at the base, exceed eighteen inches in diameter, if circular in form, and if upon a square base no side thereof shall exceed eighteen inches; that no post nor lamp shall be used for advertising purposes, and that the gas, or other illuminant employed, shall be at the expense of the licensee.

Sec. 13. No ornamental lamp-posts shall be erected, except as prescribed in section 12, and for each ornamental lamp-post so erected a license fee of two dollars (\$2) shall be paid.

Sec. 14. Temporary Shelter for Relays of Horses—Temporary open structures for the shelter of relays of horses in use by street surface railroad companies, may be erected in the centre of the carriageway of thoroughfares, where the width thereof is sufficient to allow it, and in the carriageway, near the curb, with the consent of the abutting property owner; they shall be permitted only during the months of June, July, August and September of each year, and shall be removed at once thereafter at licensee's expense.

Sec. 15. No temporary open structure for the shelter of relays of horses shall be erected except as prescribed in section 14, and for each structure so erected a license fee of five dollars (\$5) shall be paid.

Sec. 16. Banners, Placards and Flags—No banner, placard or flag shall be hung or suspended from houses or poles, or attached thereto, and stretched across the carriageway of any street (except that it shall be lawful to display the national or state colors or emblems at any or all times), unless it be by and with the consent of the owners of the property from which such banner, placard or flag shall be hung or suspended.

Sec. 17. For every banner, placard or flag hung or suspended as allowed under section 11 a license fee of one dollar (\$1) shall be paid, and such permission shall continue only for a period of thirty days from the date of issue of such license.

Sec. 18. Any person, firm or corporation seeking a license under the provisions of this ordinance shall file in the Bureau of Licenses an application, setting forth the kind of license desired, having indorsed thereon the consent of the Aldermen of the district in which the privilege to be granted thereunder is to be exercised; in the event of a refusal of the Alderman of the district to consent to the granting of a license the Local Board of Improvements, by a vote of a majority of the members elected, may declare that a license issue in accordance with the application filed.

Sec. 19. All licenses granted under the provisions of this ordinance shall be for the term of one year from the date of issue thereof, except as otherwise provided, and any license before its expiration or within fifteen days thereafter may be renewed for another term, upon the payment of one-half the license fee designated therefor. Notices of expiration of licenses shall be served upon licensees by the Police Department, upon information furnished by the Chief of the Bureau of Licenses. Failure to renew a license within the time herein prescribed, shall be forthwith reported by the Police Department to the President of the Borough, who shall at once direct that the encroachment, whatever it may be, shall be removed.

Sec. 20. Any person, firm or corporation engaging in or attempting that which is contrary to the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misde-

meanor and upon conviction thereof by any Magistrate, either upon confession of the party or competent testimony, may be fined in a sum not less than two dollars (\$2), nor more than ten dollars (\$10) for each offense, and in default of payment of such fine may be committed to the City Prison by such Magistrate until the same be paid; but such imprisonment shall not exceed ten days.

Sec. 21. All ordinances of the former municipal and public corporations consolidated into The City of New York, inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance, are hereby repealed.

Sec. 22. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the board of aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to The City.

The contracts must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of The City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by The City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
