AN ORDINANCE providing for an issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000) to provide means for the acquisition of site and the construction of a building for an interior public bath in the Borough

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows: Section I. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment March 16, 1905, and authorizes the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount and for the purposes therein specified:

"Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 409 of the Laws of 1904, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000) for the purpose of providing means for the acquisition of site and the construction of a building for an interior public bath in the Borough of The Bronx, and that when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller is authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to the amount of seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000), the proceeds whereof to be applied to the purposes aforesaid."

And be it further Resolved, That an additional committee be likewise appointed to urge upon the Chamber of Commerce, the Maritime Exchange and all patriotic societies to provide a fund for the appropriate final burial and marking of the grave of the dead American hero.

Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company, No. 168 Montague Street, Brooklyn, N. Y., April 6, 1905.

Hon. Alexander E. Orr, President, Rapid Transit Commission, New York, N. Y.:

DEAR SIR—After careful study of the routes outlined by your Committee on Plans, the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company believes that certain alterations and additions to the plans so far laid down should be incorporated by your Honorable Commission in order to better meet the requirements of the transit situation of the Borough of Brooklyn, and I beg to submit herewith memoranda of such changes and alterations, together with a man proporty which the lines as laid down by the Commission are indicated. with a map upon which the lines as laid down by the Commission are indicated in green, and the additions as suggested by our company are indicated in red. The reasons for these proposed changes are, briefly, as follows:

First-Brooklyn.

The line indicated on Georgia avenue to Blake avenue and thence to the intersection of Eastern Parkway and Pitkin avenue reaches a populous and rapidly growing section of Brownsville, not now conveniently near any line of transit.

The line, as indicated on the map, from Palmetto street via Cypress avenue and Stanhope street to an intersection with your Committee's proposed line on Broadway,

would afford an additional outlet from a densely populated and rapidly growing section known as the Ridgewood District.

The line on Lafayette avenue, north to Broadway, is a substitute for the Committee's line on Gates avenue, and is proposed because it reaches the objective point by a straighter route, avoids two sharp curves and better divides the business with our Lexington Avenue Elevated line.

The line running through Stuyvesant avenue from Lafayette avenue to Bushwick avenue, and on Metropolitan avenue to a junction with the Commission's line at North Seventh street, carries the loop well into the rapidly developing business district in Grand street and Metropolitan avenue, besides serving an important growing interest on

Bushwick avenue itself. The line shown from Blackwell's Island Bridge, through Jackson, Manhattan and Driggs avenues and Roebling street, and its continuation beyond Gates and Bedford avenues to a possible junction with the proposed line on Eastern Parkway and the Brighton Beach Line of this company, makes a crosstown line connecting Flatbush district, Greenpoint and Long Island City, and forms an important and direct route via Blackwell's Island Bridge from the heart of Brooklyn to the upper part of Manhattan

Second-Manhattan.

We believe the lines thus far proposed for Brooklyn travel in Manhattan (viz.: on Centre and William streets from Delancey to Old Slip) are not adequate, nor would they carry people of Brooklyn far enough across nor far enough north in Manhattan to bring them within easy walking distance of their offices, stores or shops. It is estimated that twenty or twenty-five per cent. of the people working south of Fourteenth street in Manhattan live in the Borough of Brooklyn, and it would seem that any subway plan made with reference to this business should afford a continuous ride as far north in Manhattan at least as that street

To accomplish this, it is essential that the lines of the operating company should extend north of Delancey street and west of Broadway, and this map suggests University place, Wooster, Canal, Centre and William streets on the east, and Eighth avenue, Hudson street, Duane and West streets on the west, with connecting loops at Four-teenth street on the north and Cortlandt street and Maiden lane on the south.

With this plan supplementing or in substitution of others before your Commission.

With this plan, supplementing or in substitution of others before your Commission, continuous transit would be established between a large part, and in connection with the lines of this company every part of Brooklyn and the entire district of Manhattan south of Fourteenth street.

Dear Sir—In further explanation of the subway plan submitted with my letter of even date, it would be possible to operate certain lines as a double loop. Trains would run in either direction on the eastern and western legs of the loops in Manhattan; and in Brooklyn in the same way. Trains running via Lafayette and Bedford avenues and North Seventh street would stop at various intersecting points and pick up surface car passengers. On the loop upon Bushwick and Metropolitan avenues and North Seventh street, the trains would run in either direction, both local and express, the local trains picking up passengers from surface cars and the express trains transferring passengers from the elevated trains and furnishing an express service directly to the heart of New York. elevated trains and furnishing an express service directly to the heart of New York

You will also notice that on many of the lines as proposed by your Committee, and which are included in our plan, we have suggested an increase from two to four tracks. The reason for this is evident in connection with the method of loop operation above outlined, and we feel satisfied that as this proposed construction is not for to-morrow or for five years from now, but for a long period of years, this provision of four tracks will be fully warranted by the traffic which the comprehensive system proposed will daily be called upon to handle.

Amended report of the Committee on Plans and Contracts was presented as follows:

THE BOARD OF RAPID TRANSIT RAILROAD COMMISSIONERS, No. 320 Broadway, April 13, 1905.

To the Board:

The Committee on Plans and Contracts herewith submits its report as to additional rapid transit lines in the boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn and The Bronx.

In laying out the present subway system early in the year 1897, it will be remembered that the Board was restricted by the decision of the court in the use of the City's credit to a sum which should be much less than \$50,000,000. The road which was planned, in view of this restriction, and which is now under operation by the Interborough Rapid Transit Company, was for this reason confessedly inadequate in extent even at that time, when The City of New York consisted only of the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx. The creation of Greater New York and the enlargement by the Legislature of the powers of this Board so as to cover all of the boroughs and all of the bridges between them, has only served to make the first municipal rapid transit system appear even more inadequate from the point of view of the City at large. The Board, however, has always been under the belief that the completion of the first subway system, by its demonstrated success, would lead to the early undertaking of other lines. So, indeed, it has proved; and the time seems now to have arrived in which the attempt should be made to plan a system of rapid transit railroads at least partially commensurate with all the needs of the present City.

Your Committee considers that the work which the Board is about to undertake is, in many respects, even more important than the work previously done; and that the year 1905 may, perhaps, be of more real moment in the rapid transit annals of the City than the year 1900. For while five years ago the great work of building the first municipal railroad was begun, the present year ought to witness the laying out of a large and comprehensive system of municipal railroads, the adoption of which will doubtless, to a large extent, determine the principal lines of intramural communication for this City for many years to come.

Your Committee has

for many years to come.

Your Committee has therefore approached the subject with a keen appreciation of the responsibility imposed upon it.

The completion of the first subway railroad and its success in operation, both from the point of view of the traveler and of the operating company, have very naturally induced many persons, property-owners as well as investors, to interest themselves in plans for additional railroads.

plans for additional railroads.

The result has been, in the first place, a wealth of suggestions for additional lines from residents of all parts of the City who are interested, both as property-owners and as daily travelers, in additional means of access to the more remote parts of the City. Most of the suggestions thus submitted have been excellent. They have been carefully thought out by those interested, and they apparently reflect with accuracy the general sentiment of the different localities.

It will be readily understood that all of these local suggestions could not be adopted. They would, in some respects, be inconsistent with each other, and they would constitute a system so vast as to be beyond the contemplation of your Committee. To undertake the construction of all the lines that have been suggested by the various local interests would involve an expenditure exceeding \$200,000,000, a sum, of course, quite out of the question, if the credit of the City alone is to be used; for The City of New York, rich and powerful as it is, cannot engage its credit without limit in rapid transit enterprises.

Many suggestions have also been received from persons or associations anxious to undertake the work of building and operating railroads. It is fortunate for the City that an important revolution in opinion has taken place since the contract of 1900 was that an important revolution in opinion has taken place since the contract of 1900 was let. At that time the local transportation companies, without exception, were unwilling to engage in subway projects. So pronounced was this attitude that when bids were invited in the latter part of 1899 for the contract which has now proved itself to be so profitable, not one single interest identified with passenger transportation of any kind in The City of New York was to be found among the bidders. The only two persons who submitted bids were not railroad men in any sense of the word.

The completion of the subway has now produced a result which should accrue to the immense benefit of the City. The principal local transportation interests seem now to be anxious to compete for future subways. Your Committee has received from the Interborough Company, who are the lessees of both the present subway and the elevated system in Manhattan and The Bronx, and from the Metropolitan interests, who are the owners of all the principal surface lines in these two boroughs, repeated per-

sonal assurances of their desire to bid for additional rapid transit lines. Similar assur-

ances have been received from other interests.

But beyond the mere willingness to bid, it is thought by your Committee that the demonstration of the feasibility of construction and the profits of operation will unquestionably enable the Board to let contracts on terms far more favorable to the City than those which were embodied in the Manhattan-The Bronx contract. The great advantage to any corporation of reducing fixed charges to the lowest possible point will, it is hoped, lead responsible and experienced bidders to offer to build largely with their own money. This was actually done by the Interborough interests in their bid for the Brooklyn extension, where the road is to be completed at a cost to the City of only about twenty per cent, of the actual cost.

In the light of the assurances which the Committee has received and which plainly indicate that more than one interest is prepared to construct and operate rapid transit railroads without calling upon the City to advance its credit in the undertaking to the full extent, or perhaps not to any considerable extent at all, your Committee has felt itself justified in laying out a far more comprehensive and elaborate system of lines than it could have ventured to do had the prospects for active competition been less bright. This report is therefore largely based upon such prospects, and if we are disappointed in this regard the City will be able to contract, at the present time, for only a small portion of the routes now suggested.

But while it is fortunate for the City that powerful competing interests are prepared to enter the field as bidders, this very fact has made the task of your Committee an exceedingly difficult one. How to lay out routes calculated to provide the largest possible measure of rapid transit for the City and at the same time so arranged as to promote vigorous competition, has been the problem.

The Committee in its study of the situation first went over all the suggestions from the local associations. These were worked out carefully upon a map in connection with the previous studies of the late Chief Engineer of the Board, Mr. Parsons, as outlined in his reports of February 19 and March 12, 1903, and December 29, 1904, and the former suggestions made some time ago to the Board by the Interborough and Metropolitan interests. With these before it, the Committee laid out, with the assistance of the Acting Chief Engineer, the lines which were given to the public through the newspapers on February 28, 1905, and formally reported to the Board at its meeting on March 9, 1905. The Committee then called upon the various interests who had signified their intention to become bidders to give the Committee the benefit of their suggestions, and all who desired to do so were given separate and special hearings by the Committee, and their suggestions received and examined in detail.

It has been the effort of the Committee to arrange new routes so that each of them should be capable of separate operation and should be practicable to build at once, both from engineering, transportation and financial standpoints, having regard to transportation conditions now existing or which may shortly be expected to be in force. In particular the effort has been made to lay out routes so that they could be operated advantageously in connection with other existing means of passenger transportation in the City.

The estimated cost of the rapid transit railroads and routes now proposed, and for which the Committee believes there are probable bidders, will very materially exceed the means now available to the City for construction; but, as already stated, there is reason to believe that bids may be anticipated whic

Several lines of railroad which seem to meet with the conditions above laid down, the Committee recommends that such routes, although distinct, should nevertheless be approved at the present time and together.

Even if the Board should be disappointed in the expectation that a large amount of private capital is now available for this municipal work, nevertheless the City will be amply protected. It is not expected that the contracts would all be let at once, although the routes might all be approved at the same time. No contract can be let, under the provisions of section 37 of the Rapid Transit Act, as amended by chapter 562, Laws of 1904, unless and until the Board of Estimate and Apportionment "shall have consented thereto and prescribed a limit to the amount of bonds" to be issued under the contract. It is quite impossible for anybody at the present time to form an opinion as to the amount of money which the City may be called upon to furnish for the purposes of the rapid transit extensions now suggested. If these extensions shall be approved by the Board it will be necessary to get the consent and approval of the Board of Aldermen, and also the consent and approval of a majority of the property-owners along the several lines, or, in default thereof, the approval of the courts. With the utmost diligence these steps, as experience has abundantly proved, require much time. Until they had been completed invitations to bidders cannot be issued, and the terms of a contract cannot be formulated. The only way to find out what the City may be called upon to do will be to prepare contracts after the routes have been officially approved and to invite proposals from bidders. By submitting the various routes to competition in turn, beginning with those which seem most urgent, the extent to which the City can undertake additional building will be accurately ascertained. rately ascertained.

To a great extent, especially in roads leading into and through the Borough of Brooklyn, quite independent lines are proposed by your Committee. These will no doubt compete to some extent with existing surface or elevated roads, but they will not compete with the municipal railway now under construction. In the Borough of doubt compete to some extent with existing surface or elevated roads, but they will not compete with the municipal railway now under construction. In the Borough of Manhattan, however, any north-and-south lines which may be laid out will necessarily be in some degree either extensions of or competitors to the existing subway. It is desirable, on the one hand, to avoid useless duplication of existing transportation facilities. On the other hand, the Committee believe that it is essential for the Board to avoid laying out lines which only one single bidder could afford to build. In order to afford the fullest opportunity for competition between the principal rival interests which have indicated their desire to bid for routes which are in part identical, as in the cases of Seventh and Lexington avenues, the Committee has pursued the policy of making one route of the part desired by both. Such route may be bid for in combination with other routes in such a manner as to permit both interests to have an equal chance in the bidding. The result is some apparent complexity, but it is believed that a careful study of the lines laid out will show how such combinations of lines can be effected, and the main reasons for the choice of the routes which have been adopted.

Your Committee has been strongly urged to recommend to the Board the granting of a franchise to the Manhattan Railway Company, under section 32 of the Rapid Transit Act, for an increase of its facilities along Second avenue. It is proposed to four-track the elevated railroad, beginning with about One Hundred and Fiftieth street and Third avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, and thence southerly and along Second avenue and First avenue, in Manhattan, to a point near First street. At that point it is proposed to divert two of the elevated tracks by passing through private property and thence becoming a subway railroad along Chrystie and Centre streets and under Chambers street to the Hudson river.

Your Committee do not recommend the grant of such a franchise,

Your Committee do not recommend the grant of such a franchise, which would necessarily have to be perpetual. They think it inadvisable because they believe that grants of perpetual franchises should not be made under such circumstances as these because they believe that at least in the more thickly settled parts of the City, except under very exceptional conditions, no further additions should be made to the elevated railroad systems. And because they believe that if the City entered upon the policy of increasing the facilities of the elevated roads it would tend to discourage persons who might otherwise be bidders for new municipal subway systems.

The result of the various considerations which have been briefly outlined above is the recommendation to the Board by the Committee of the following additional lines:

A three-track elevated road on Jerome avenue, from Clarke place to Woodlawn.

A two-track subway beginning at One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street and Third avenue; thence west through One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street to Gerard avenue, through Gerard avenue to Jerome avenue at Clarke place, where it may be connected with the proposed Route No. 16.

ute No. 10. Beginning at One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street at West Farms road; thence a three-track elevated road on West Farms road to Morris Park avenue; thence on Morris Park avenue and White Plains road to Wakefield at Becker avenue.

Beginning at Third avenue and One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, a three-track subway east on One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street to Southern Boulevard; thence a three-track elevated road on Southern Boulevard to Westchester avenue; thence on Westchester avenue to the Village of Westchester at Williamsbridge road.

Public hearing was given on the application of the Interborough Rapid Transit Company for authority to four-track its Second Avenue Elevated System, and to construct a subway in connection therewith from First avenue and Third street via Chrystie

street, etc., to the City Hall.

E. P. Bryan, Vice-President; Julian T. Davies and Delancey Nicoll, of Counsel, spoke for the Interborough Rapid Transit Company, promising, in response to questions of the Board, to give free transfers between all lines operated by this company, both subway and elevated, throughout the city. They also stated as among the additional benefits which would accrue to the travelling public, that there would be a saving in

time between the City Hall and the Borough of The Bronx, over the best time possible in the subway, of twelve minutes, providing the proposed application were granted. They estimated that the work could be completed in two years, and said that it was the purpose of the company to attempt to purchase outright at the beginning from abutting owners, all easements for the construction and operation of the proposed line.

Mr. Holmes and Mr. Johnson, representing property owners along the proposed line, Mr. Rogers on behalf of the East Side Tax Payers Association, the East Side Harlem Real Estate Association, etc., Mr. Stover, representing the East Side Civic Club, Mr. Steckler of the East Side Rapid Transit Association and Mr. Clark of the City Club, requested the Board to grant further public hearing, which was decided upon.

DEAR SIR—I beg to report in regard to the additional tracks on Fulton street and Flatbush avenue, which are proposed and referred to in the Committee's report as Route 9-D, as follows:

These tracks are necessary for the connection of the present subway known as Contract No. 2 with the Fulton street line, with the route from Flatbush avenue along Flatbush avenue extended over the Manhattan Bridge, with a route under Lafayette avenue and also with the route under Fourth avenue.

Connections with these various routes are all provided for in the plans, and I think should be built at the present time, if it is ever contemplated to connect the present subway with these various routes. The cost of these additional tracks owing to the complicated connections, the change in the present contract and the delays incident to changing the present work I estimate to be about \$2,000,000.

This work if allowed by the Board will not interfere with any competitor who would wish to bid on the other Brooklyn routes as already suggested.

Whereas, This Board did, on the 24th day of January, 1901, adopt certain routes and general plan for a rapid transit railroad in The City of New York, a copy of which is hereto annexed entitled "Copy Routes and General Plan Adopted 24 January,

Whereas, The said routes and general plan were afterwards duly approved by the municipal authorities of The City of New York, and were duly consented to by commissioners appointed by the Appellate Divisions of the Supreme Court, both in the First and Second Departments, which consents were duly confirmed by the said Appellate Divisions, in lieu of the consent of the owners of a majority in value of the property

Whereas, Thereafter, and on or about the 21st day of July, 1902, The City of New York did by this Board enter into a certain contract with Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company for the construction and operation of the said rapid transit rail-

Whereas, It is the interest of The City of New York, and in the opinion of the said Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, it is likewise in its interest as such contractor, and the said company desires that said routes and plan shall be changed in the respect hereinafter mentioned, but without other change in the said routes and general plan.

Now, therefore, it is

Resolved, That, subject to the consents and approvals to be first obtained as in
this resolution hereinafter mentioned the said routes and general plan heretofore
adopted by this Board be and they hereby are modified as follows:

1. By striking out from the said routes and general plan the words:

"For the portion of the route above described, beginning at a point in the Borough of Brooklyn, in Joralemon street opposite the Kings County Court-house near the junction of Joralemon street with Fulton street and running thence along Fulton street to the end of the said route at or near the intersection of Flatbush avenue with Atlantic avenue, there shall be four tracks substantially parallel and placed on substantially the same level, except at the following points where provision is to be made for connections with certain subways or tunnels which are expected to be hereafter constructed and which are expected to run as follows, that is to say: First, northwesterly under Fulton street from its junction with Joralemon street; second, northwesterly from Flatbush avenue under the proposed extension of Flatbush avenue toward the Manhattan Bridge; third, northeasterly from Flatbush avenue under Lafayette avenue; and fourth, southerly from Flatbush avenue under Fourth avenue. At and near each of the said points, at which provision is now to be made for future connections, one or more additional tracks may be constructed as a part of the railway herein described, and any one or more of the tracks of said railway may be depressed below the remaining tracks as far as shall be found necessary in order to avoid grade crossings, but not exceeding twenty feet. Along the whole of that portion of the route above described which lies under Flatbush avenue there may be an additional or fifth track for use as a siding. And for the remainder of the route above described, being all of the said route lying westerly from the Kings County Court-house both in the Borough of Brooklyn and in the Borough of Manhattan and including each of the branches and loops aforesaid, there shall be two parallel tracks."

"No wall of the tunnel or part thereof shall, except along the southerly side of Fulton street, between Bond street and Flatbush avenue, and except at the stations, station approaches, curves and places of access to subsurface structures as hereinafter provided, be within a distance of five (5) feet of the exterior line or side of a longitudinal street of the route."

"The franchise hereby granted shall, if the Board shall so determine, become void unless within one year after the time of the acceptance of this certificate by the Tunnel Company, that company shall further and in due and lawful form, obtain the consent of the owners of one-half in value of the property bounded on the portion of each street under or through which the railroad or any part of the route thereof runs, to the construction and operation of the railroad, or such part thereof, or in case the consent of such property owners cannot be obtained, then the determination of Commissioners, to be appointed pursuant to law by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court in the First Department, that the part of the railroad under or through said street ought to be constructed and operated, the said determination of such commissioners, when confirmed by the Appellate Division, which shall have appointed such commissioners to be ta' en in lieu of such consent of property owners. Since that time, the company has been diligent in prosecuting applications for the necessary consents of property owners, but has been unable to obtain the same. On the 2d of November, 1904, this company applied for an extension of the time within which to obtain such property consents; or, in lieu thereof, the determination of commissioners to be appointed pursuant to law, and by resolution of your Honorable Board, the time for obtaining such consents of property owners, or such determination of commissioners, was extended to the 28th day of May, 1905. Since such extension was granted, application has been made to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court in the First Department for the appointment of commissioners in accordance with law, and such proceedings are now pending before said Appellate Division.

Letters of the Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company as to interference with the work at the foot of Joralemon street by the New York Dock Company were read as follows:

Hon. Alexander E. Orr, President, Board of Rapid Transit Commissioners, No. 320 Broadway, New York City:

DEAR SIR—The New York Tunnel Company, sub-contractor under Contract No. 2 of the East river tunnel work, has had occasion to complain constantly of interference with its work by the New York Dock Company, and we are to-day advised by the New York Tunnel Company that for the express and avowed purpose of interfering with the progress of the work on the tunnels between Piers 17 and 18, East river, in the Borough of Brooklyn, and between the bulkhead and pierhead lines, the Dock Company has moored empty heavy railroad floats, upon which they are not loading material, but noorea emp which are placed there simply for the purpose of preventing the sub-contractor from

which are piaced there simply for the purpose of preventing the sub-contractor from prosecuting the work.

This delay is peculiarly injurious at the present time, because of the break which occurred on March 27, 1905, in the tunnel between the points indicated, which has made it absolutely imperative to deposit a clay blanket over the line of the tunnel at this point, for which the Acting Chief Engineer of your Board has issued his permit, and which has also been authorized by the United States authorities.

We are informed that the City has already acquired, by appropriate condemnation proceedings, the easement of right to construct the railroad along the line where this work was being prosecuted, and over which the Dock Company has moored its barges, as above referred to, the condemnation proceeding having been had, pursuant to the resolution adopted by your Board on January 16, 1904, which we are advised has resulted in title vesting in the City, and that included in the easement so acquired is the right to enter upon the premises described, so far as may be necessary for the construction, maintenance and operation of the railroad.

We therefore invoke the provision in the contract between the City and this company, whereby the City covenants to secure to the contract of the right to construct and operate the railroad, free of all interference on the part of any owner or other person (page 40), and beg that your Honorable Board will take immediate steps to remove the interference which now delays the progress of the work at this important point. Dear Sir—We are advised that the New York Dock Company has brought an action against the New York Tunnel Company, sub-contractor on the work of constructing the tunnels between Manhattan and Brooklyn, and procured an injunction, restraining the Tunnel Company from dumping clay on the river bottom over the line of the tunnel, and also requiring the Tunnel Company to show cause why a broader injunction should not be granted, preventing the prosecution of the work under the property of the New York Dock Company at the foot of Joralemon street in the Borough of Brooklyn

Brooklyn.

In accordance with the provisions of Contract No. 2, we have therefore to request that the City will take steps to protect us against the interference in the prosecution of the work by the New York Dock Company.

Mr. Rives stated that in accordance with the instructions given to him by the Vice-President on receipt of the first of the above letters, he had an interview with some of the directors of the New York Dock Company in reference to the matter set forth in the letter of Mr. Belmont, dated April 5, 1905.

On Friday, April 7, the New York Dock Company obtained an injunction from Judge Maddox restraining the sub-contractor from carrying on the work of tunneling at the foot of Joralemon street through the slip between Piers 17 and 18. The motion to continue the injunction was argued on Monday, April 10. At the close of the argument, Judge Maddox stated that he would allow the plaintiffs two days in which to file additional affidavits in reply to any new matter brought out by the defendant, but that unless he found there was some rule of law positively requiring him to grant the injunction, he should vacate it.

but that unless he found there was some rule of law positively requiring him to grant the injunction, he should vacate it.

On the following day, Tuesday, April 11, a conference between counsel resulted in an agreement on the part of the attorneys for the New York Dock Company to vacate the injunction by consent, provided the maps and descriptions in the condemnation proceedings might be amended so as to show more distinctly what property of the New York Dock Company was to be affected. As it was believed that this would not in any way increase the liability of the City, an agreement to that effect was made, in which the Corporation Counsel united, and the injunction was accordingly dissolved.

The amended maps and resolutions will be prepared as soon as possible and presented to this Board, in accordance with the agreement of counsel.

Upon their approval by the Board, the action will be discontinued and the appeal heretofore taken in the condemnation proceedings will be abandoned. The injunction has been vacated, the contractors are at work and all obstacles are removed. 

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract mest be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and fur-

or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
