To the Supreme Court, Part I., Trial Term for the May, 1907, Term:

The Grand Jury of the County of New York, empaneled in the Supreme Court, May Term, 1907, respectfully presents to the Court:

That it has considered the needs of this County, and incidentally those of The City of New York, in respect to an increase in the number of Patrolmen in the Municipal Police of this City. It is of the opinion that the present number is inadequate to properly police the City, and would be so even if the large number, over eleven hundred, now detailed to duty in courts, at City institutions and at City offices were available for patrol duty.

The Police Commissioner is of the opinion that such increase should be at least fifteen hundred men.

While expressing no opinion as to the number of Patrolmen which should be added to the force, it is clear to the Grand Jury that there should be a substantial increase, and the opinion of the Police Commissioner seems well supported by the data laid by him before this body.

Should the Court concur, it is the desire of the Grand Jury that a copy of this presentment be transmitted to the Mayor, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York.

The Vice-Chairman laid before the Board the following communication from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity:

Hon. P. F. McGOWAN, President, Board of Aldermen, City Hall, Manhattan:

Dear Sir—The rapid growth of the Borough of Queens has placed upon this Department and the several water companies supplying that section of the City demands for the extension of the water supply systems. On each 500 feet of pipe laid by the private water companies this Department, in order to afford proper fire protection, authorizes the setting of fire hydrants, for which the City pays an average rental of \$25 per year.

Of the money appropriated for this purpose, there is left available for additional hydrants not already authorized by permits issued to the water companies, the sum of \$235.44, which amount would pay for the rental of less than twenty new hydrants.

Where a few years ago were farm lands we now find graded streets lined with many homes, and owners demanding an adequate water supply with proper fire protection, and it is to meet the petitions of these owners that the water companies are extending their water service mains, and to guard against any possible loss to these properties the City recognizes the right and justice of affording the proper fire protection by the erection of hydrants.

To build the requisite number of hydrants for the line of pipe for which the private companies have already made application, there will be required the sum of \$2,500 additional, and I would respectfully ask that you submit for the consideration of your Board this application for an issue of Special Revenue Bonds for this sum of money.

The Vice-Chairman laid before the Board the following communication from the Commissioner of Bridges:

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Gentlemen—The University Heights Bridge, now nearing completion, will be opened for public use on or about August 1, 1907, and as no provision was made for the cost of maintaining and operating said bridge in the appropriation allowed this Department for the year 1907, in accordance with the recommendation of the Comptroller's expert, who, in his report on this matter, says:

"I would recommend that no allowance be made for this purpose in the Budget for 1907. If the bridge should be in operation before the end of 1907 the needed amount for maintenance may properly be met out of the proceeds of the issue of Special Revenue Bonds."

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment allowed the exact amount recommended in the aforesaid report of the Comptroller's expert.



I therefore submit the following detailed estimate of the cost of operating this bridge for five months:

And I respectfully ask your Honorable Board, pursuant to subdivision eight (8) of section one hundred and eighty-eight (188) of the Greater New York Charter, to request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize and direct the Comptroller of The City of New York to issue and sell Special Revenue Bonds of said City in the sum of eight thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,500), to defray the necessary cost of operating the University Heights Bridge for the five months ending December 31, 1907.

The Vice-Chairman laid before the Board the following communication from the Comptroller:

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—Section 900 of the amended Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"It shall be the duty of the Comptroller of said City to prepare and submit to the Board of Aldermen, at least four weeks before its annual meeting in each and every year, for the purpose of imposing the annual taxes, a statement setting forth the amounts by law authorized to be raised by tax in that year, on account of the Corporation of The City of New York, as hereby constituted, or for City purposes within said City as created by this Act, and purposes for which said City is liable, and on account of the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, and also an estimate of the probable amount of receipts into the City Treasury during the then current year from all the sources of revenue of the general funds, including surplus revenue from the Sinking Funds of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York and of any of the Municipal and Public Corporations, or parts of Municipal and Public Corporations, by this Act consolidated with the Municipal Corporation known as the Mayor, Alderman and Commonalty of The City of New York, other than the surplus of revenue of any such Sinking Funds for the Payment of Interest on the City Debt of the Municipal Corporation known as the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York, or the like debts of the Municipal and Public Corporations by this Act consolidated as aforesaid, and the said Board of Aldermen is hereby authorized and directed to deduct the total amount of such estimated receipts from the aggregate amount of all the various sums which by law they are required to order and cause to be raised by tax in said year, for the purposes aforesaid, and to cause to be raised by tax only the balance of such aggregate amount after making such deductions."

Section 902 of the amended Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"In the statement submitted by the Comptroller to the Board of Aldermen, as above provided in this chapter, he shall each year include and state specifically the sum or sums necessary to be raised to pay during the current year the salaries of the County officers and other County charges and expenses in the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, respectively, and the Board of Aldermen is hereby authorized and directed to levy upon and collect from the taxable property within each of said Counties, respectively, the sum or sums so necessary to be raised to pay the salaries of County officers and other County charges and expenses of such County, to the end that each of said Counties shall ultimately bear and pay all expenses necessary to be incurred within the County for County as distinguished from City purposes."

In pursuance of the foregoing provisions of law, I have the honor to submit to your Honorable Body statement as follows:

First—The Budget in detail for the year 1907.

Second—The amount of County charges and expenses in the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, respectively, included in said Budget, as well as the amount of County charges and expenses paid during the year 1906 from the proceeds of Special Revenue Bonds, which amounts together are to be raised respectively by levy upon taxable property within each of said Counties, as provided by section 902 of the Charter.

Third—The estimated receipts of the General Fund for the reduction of taxation. Concerning the receipts of the General Fund for the reduction of taxation, the following are the items of my estimate:

Metz, Comptroller of The City of New York, in compliance with section 900 of the amended Greater New York Charter, do hereby certify to the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York that the aggregate amount of the Budget for the year 1907, duly made and adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen, pursuant to section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, to be raised by tax in said year, is one hundred and thirty million four hundred and twenty-one thousand five hundred and five dollars and sixty-six cents (\$130,421,505.66), a copy of which Budget is hereto annexed.

## BUDGET FOR 1907.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment makes this the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and seven, being: First, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of said City for the said year, including State taxes, viz.: One hundred and twenty-two million seven hundred and fifty-six thousand six hundred and sixty-six dollars and sixteen cents (\$122,756,666.16); secondly, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the charges and expenses of the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond for the said year, viz.: Four million six hundred and sixty-four thousand eight hundred and thirty-nine dollars and fifty cents (\$4,664,839.50), and, thirdly, the amount estimated to be the deficiency on January 1, 1906, in the product of taxes theretofore levied, deemed to be uncollectible and not otherwise provided for, as required by chapter 209 of the Laws of 1906, viz.: Three million dollars (\$3,000,000), amounting in the aggregate to the sum of one hundred and thirty million four hundred and twenty-one thousand five hundred and five dollars and sixty-six cents (\$130,421,505.66).

## FOR CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

All such appropriations being made subject to the following conditions:

1. The accounts of all charitable institutions receiving public moneys shall be so kept as to show receipts and disbursements in such form as shall be satisfactory to the Comptroller, showing the addresses of the parents, guardians, or nearest relatives of inmates, and other information designed to facilitate inquiry into their financial inability to provide for such inmates.
2. Moneys received from the City Treasury shall be used by such institutions only for recurring expenses of "care, support, education and maintenance."
3. All institutions receiving public moneys shall be at all reasonable times open to the visitation and inspection of duly authorized representatives of the Department of Public Charities and the Department of Finance.
4. Upon it appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interests to withhold payments to any charitable institution for which an appropriation has been made, he shall give written notice to such institution of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to so withhold such payments, and upon the determination of said Board that such payments should terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment for services rendered thereafter shall thereupon cease.
5. Except where appropriations are made in bulk and not upon a per capita basis, no payment shall be made for inmates of private charitable institutions unless the same shall have been accepted by the Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities as a proper charge against the City, and except in emergency cases, Commissioner of Charities shall not accept as proper charges against the City inmates capable of paying for their own support or for whose care adequate provision can be made in public institutions. The City shall not become liable for any payment to a charitable institution in excess of the appropriation which may have been made to such institution, notwithstanding any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for the inmates thereof.
6. All institutions receiving money from the City are required to state specifically the amount so received, as from the City Treasury, in their printed annual reports.
7. "That no money be paid to any private charitable institution which pays any salary to or gives any consideration, financial or of any kind, for services to, or that has any business dealing with, or secures goods or merchandise, directly or indirectly, from any officer or trustee or member of its Board of Managers."
8. Where the City is paying 50 per cent. and upwards of the cost of maintenance of an institution the Board of Estimate and Apportionment requires representation in the board meetings of that institution, with the right of taking part in all business transactions. This representation shall be through the Comptroller, who may attend any meeting, either in person or through a representative appointed by him, of which appointment the Comptroller will give written notice to the board of the institution.
9. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment will not pay for the maintenance of dependent and delinquent children in the same institution.
10. The rates of payments to private charitable institutions, unless otherwise specially provided for, are fixed for the various classes of inmates as follows:

For infants under two (2) years of age, and in infants' hospitals also between the ages of two and five, per day.....	\$0 45
For dependent children, from two (2) to sixteen (16) years of age, per week.....	2 25
For delinquent children, per annum.....	135 00
For adult inmates of reformatories, committed by the Courts, per annum.....	135 00
For inmates in homes for unfortunate and friendless women, per annum.....	110 00
*For maternity cases, per case.....	18 00
*For homeless mothers, nursing infants, per month.....	12 00
To hospitals for medical treatment, per day.....	70
To hospitals for surgical treatment, per day.....	90

For services of Custodian, first year, \$900; second year, \$1,050; thereafter \$1,200 per annum.

That charitable institutions for children now carried in the Budget and not sending their inmates to the Public Schools, and not sharing in the Corporate School Fund, and not receiving Teachers and school supplies from the Board of Education, but giving in their own buildings secular education to the children resident in the institutions, shall be paid a per capita of 7 cents per day, five school days in the week, for each child receiving such instruction of four years of age and over during ten months in the year. This money to be paid under the authorization of section 230 of the Charter, but under the general conditions relating to institutions receiving Corporate School money, as provided in section 1154.

It is the judgment of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that all children should be fully surrendered by their parents or guardians to the institutions to which they may be committed, and the Commissioner of Charities is requested to secure such surrenders as far as possible.

Magistrates are requested to transfer dependent, and when judicious, no proper guardianship children, and all cases coming to their attention in the Courts where no crime is proven against the child, to the Commissioner of Charities, who can commit to institutions. Magistrates are earnestly requested not to commit a dependent child to an institution on a Court commitment.

\* Institutions shall be paid \$18 for the care of the mother and child during fifteen days of her confinement, and for every day thereafter shall be paid at the rate of 45 cents per day for the support of the child, and also \$12 per month for the maintenance of the mother, if she remain in the institution nursing infant after the expiration of the fifteen days.

The Commissioner of Charities is instructed to take such steps, either by appeal to the national authorities or by proper bills to the Legislature, as to provide that the children of immigrants abandoned within one year after arrival in this City be returned to the country whence they came.

Whereas, The incidental expenses contingent to the Department of Health have recently been augmented by reason of the supervision and inspection of raw milk coming into The City of New York from farms located in six different states; and the incidental expenses of said department have also been augmented by reason of the increased examinations and inspections under the Pure Food Law, and such examinations and inspections have necessarily involved increased expenditures from the contingent account of this department; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen be and is hereby requested to adopt a resolution substantially as follows:

"Resolved, That for the purpose of defraying any minor or incidental expense contingent to the Department of Health, the Secretary of the Board of Health of the Department of Health, may, by requisition, draw upon the Comptroller of The City of New York, for a sum not exceeding ten thousand dollars (\$10,000); the Secretary of the Board of Health of the Department of Health may in like manner renew the draft as often as the Board of Health may deem it necessary to the extent of the appropriation set apart for contingencies of the Department of Health, but no such renewal shall be made until the sum paid upon the preceding draft shall be accounted for to the Comptroller by the transmittal of a voucher or vouchers certified by the Commissioners of the Board of Health covering the expenditure of money paid thereon."

Sir—At a meeting of the Board of Health of the Department of Health, held May 28, 1907, the following preambles and resolution were adopted:

Whereas, By a recent decision of one of the courts in the Borough of Richmond, New York City, it was held that the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals had not the legal right to collect license fees for dogs, and that the law under which such licenses were issued by a private society was null and void; and

Whereas, A number of persons have recently been attacked by dogs running at large in the public streets and highways in said borough, and in several instances such dogs have been found to be suffering with rabies; and

Whereas, It is the opinion of this Board that the keeping of dogs in The City of New York should be regulated or forbidden, and the Board of Aldermen, under section 51 of the Greater New York Charter, is given power, among other things, to regulate or forbid the keeping of dogs; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen be and is hereby respectfully requested to appoint a committee with which this Board may confer, with a view to having formulated and adopted suitable ordinances, under the provisions of the Charter above referred to, by which the keeping of dogs in The City of New York may be regulated or forbidden.

Board of Aldermen:

Sirs—I have received from your Honorable Board a communication transmitting copy of the following resolution which was adopted April 30, 1907:

"Resolved, That the opinion of the Corporation Counsel be requested to inform this Board by what right, grant or franchise (if any) the Union Railway Company and the Westchester Electric Railway Company are operating what are known as 'New Rochelle Express' cars from New Rochelle in Westchester County to the Bronx Park 'L' terminal in Webster avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, which said cars are run at an illegal speed and make only four (4) stops within the city limits, upon signal from passengers or intending passengers."

Upon receipt of your request I had a thorough examination made of the subject by my office and the Bureau of Franchises, as a result of which the following facts appear:

The "New Rochelle Express" line operates within The City of New York as follows:

"Beginning at the Bronx Park 'L' terminal in Webster avenue at about Two Hundredth street; thence north on Webster avenue to Gun Hill road; thence east on said road to White Plains road, thence north on White Plains road to the City line."

The right to operate on Webster avenue and Gun Hill road within the limits named was granted by the Common Council of The City of New York by resolution of the Board of Aldermen adopted August 23, 1892, and approved by the Mayor August 26, 1892. This resolution contained the following clause:

"That the said railway company and any person or corporation using the track or any part of the track extended, constructed or laid out under or pursuant to this consent, shall comply with all reasonable ordinances or regulations which the local authorities having charge of the aforesaid extensions or branches shall make as to the rate of speed \* \* \*."

The right to operate on White Plains road from Gun Hill road to Fifteenth avenue (now East Two Hundred and Twenty-ninth street) was granted by the Village of Williamsbridge, acting by the Board of Trustees of said village, to the Union Railway Company of New York City on September 22, 1892. The resolution making such grant contained no express provision regarding the rate of speed of said railway.

Section 98 of the Railroad Law would, however, apply. This section reads, in part, as follows:

"the local authorities \* \* \* may make such reasonable regulations and ordinances as to the rate of speed, mode of use of tracks and removal of ice and snow as the interests or convenience of the public may require. The corporation whose agents or servants wilfully or negligently violate such an ordinance or regulation shall be liable to such city or village for a penalty not exceeding five hundred dollars, to be specified in such ordinance or regulation."

The right to operate from Fifteenth avenue north to the city line was granted to the Union Railway Company on April 13, 1894, by the Village of South Mount Vernon. The grant contained no express provision as to the rate of speed over the route specified, but stated that chapter 565 of the Laws of 1890 (which contained section 98 of the Railroad Law, as already quoted) should be applicable.

The powers of the Board of Aldermen to regulate the use of streets are found in section 50 of the Greater New York Charter, which states in part:

"Subject to the constitution and laws of the State, the Board of Aldermen shall have power to regulate the use of streets and sidewalks by foot passengers, animals or vehicles; to regulate the speed at which vehicles shall be driven or ridden and at which vehicles shall be propelled in the streets \* \* \* and to make all such regulations in reference to the running of stages, omnibuses, trucks and cars as may be necessary for the convenient use and accommodation of the streets, piers, wharves or stations \* \* \* whenever the word 'vehicle' or the plural thereof occurs in this section it shall be deemed to include wagons, trucks, carts, cabs, carriages, stages, omnibuses, motors, automobiles, locomobiles, locomotives, bicycles, tricycles, sleighs or other conveyances for person or property \* \* \*. The Board of Aldermen shall not pass any special ordinances in relation to any of the matters mentioned in this section. All ordinances in relation thereto shall be general ordinances which may either apply throughout the whole city or throughout specified portions thereof, and shall provide for the enforcement thereof, as specified in section 44 of this act, as amended."

By chapter 629 of the Laws of 1905, this section was amended inter alia by adding the following clause:

"But no ordinance herein adopted or power hereafter exercised by the Board of Aldermen shall limit, apply to or affect any franchise, grant, contract or resolution in the nature of a franchise hereafter made, approved or authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, as in this act provided, or by the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners of The City of New York."

As the franchises to operate over the route in question were granted in 1892 and 1894, they do not fall under this exception, and the powers of the Board are not limited thereby.

It is my opinion that the companies operating over the route in question would be subject to any regulation adopted by your Board fixing the rate of speed and regulating the operation of cars. Attention should, however, be called to the fact that your Board could not specifically regulate the operation of cars over this particular route, and any regulation by way of an ordinance which did not cover the operation of cars of all routes in that particular borough or section of the city would be of questionable force and validity. Such an ordinance could not, of course, apply to or affect any franchise, grant, contract or resolution in the nature of a franchise made or authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment subsequent to May 26, 1905, as provided by chapter 629 of the Laws of 1905, supra.

Whereas, It is deemed important that such additional work should be executed by some one specially trained in that work, to be chosen by such Board of Trustees, rather than by competitive bidding; therefore it is

Resolved, pursuant to section 419 of the Greater New York Charter, That the Board of Trustees of the College of the City of New York be and it hereby is authorized, without publicly inviting competition and awarding the contract to the lowest bidder, giving security for its performance, to award a contract or contracts to provide for the decorative painting of the walls and ceilings of the assembly hall in the Townsend Harris Hall, reading room, faculty room and executive offices, in accordance with and in the manner directed by the architect, so that the color scheme shall be harmonious to the design and details of the rooms, in an amount not to exceed three thousand five hundred dollars (\$3,500), the said amount to be charged to and paid out of an appropriation duly made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment January 13, 1905.

No. 1624—(G. O. No. 304).

The Committee on Finance, to whom was referred on February 26, 1907 (Minutes, page 517), the annexed resolution in favor of an issue of \$25,000 Special Revenue Bonds to pay expenses of special counsel to assist the Corporation Counsel, respectfully

#### REPORTS:

Corporation Counsel Ellison, together with Assistant Sterling, appeared before the committee and urged the adoption of this resolution. This present year's Budget,



contrary to past custom, only appropriated \$5,000 for special counsel, whereas in the past between \$25,000 and \$50,000 was allowed. The committee has been very averse to allowing anything additional for special counsel, as they are opposed to the system, and especially as they believe that under the reorganization of the Law Department it was expected to do away with the necessity for special counsel. The Corporation Counsel, however, states that while he had expected to be able to do this he finds that for the present year on account of several proceedings such as the Jamaica Bay titles, the water claims against the Havemeyer Sugar Refineries and several matters of patent litigation, that it would pay the City much better to hire outside counsel to devote part of their time to these special matters, than to take up the time of several high priced assistants. He has submitted two long statements in support of this, and while your committee still holds to its general opposition against the plan of employing special counsel, it believes that consideration should be given to Mr. Ellison's repeated urging, and at this time should allow some relief with the expectation that he will try to make this amount do. The committee therefore recommends the adoption of the substitute resolution for the amount of \$12,500, which, together with the amount allowed in the Budget will total \$17,500 for this purpose.

## (SUBSTITUTE.)

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby requested to authorize the Corporation Counsel to incur expenses not to exceed \$12,500 in amount for the services and expenses of special counsel to assist him in the legal matters in which the City is or may be interested in the year 1907; and the said Board is also requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds not to exceed \$12,500, in order to provide means for the payment of said expenses.

The Committee feels that this is another matter which should have been provided for in the budget, but as the pupils are there and it is only fair that provision should be made, your Committee recommends the adoption of the annexed resolution providing for \$15,000 for this purpose.

Resolved, That in pursuance of the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000), for the purpose of providing additional funds for the payment of salaries and the purchase of necessary supplies for the Normal College.

## REPORTS:

Secretary Hyde, of the City College, appeared before the Committee and stated that it was proposed to purchase this house as a home for President Finley, of the college. It is nicely situated, just opposite the college buildings. The alternative is the construction of a building on the college campus, which, it is estimated, would cost \$60,000. Your Committee has inspected this property and investigated its value, and finds that the house is situated on a very fine corner, and was purchased by the present owner, Mr. Schwartz, about three years ago for \$36,000, and that he has expended about \$6,000 or \$7,000 in permanent improvements, and that the price asked for same has been \$42,000. The Committee favors this proposition and therefore recommends the adoption of the ordinance.

AN ORDINANCE providing for an issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of thirty-nine thousand five hundred dollars (\$39,500), to provide means for the acquisition, examination of title, etc., of property located on the north-westerly corner of West One Hundred and Forty-first street and Convent avenue, Borough of Manhattan, for the use of the Board of Trustees of the College of The City of New York for departmental purposes.

The Committee on Finance, to whom was referred on April 30, 1907 (Minutes, page 615), the annexed ordinance in favor of an issue of Corporate Stock, \$1,100,000, for the purchase of the plant of the Staten Island Water Supply Company, respectfully

## REPORTS:

The committee has held hearings on this matter and has made an effort to visit and inspect the various plants in the system, but have not as yet been able to complete same. It has made a careful study of the various reports of the Engineers relative to the estimates upon which this proposed price is based, and it feels that before finally passing upon this proposition that not only should it see the premises, but

should also have more detailed information as to the valuation of the property. A comprehensive report by several of the City's expert water engineers to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, dated February 16, 1906, gives the total value of the distribution system at \$413,273, of the source of supply, including plant and real estate of the four stations at West New Brighton, Bulls Head, New Springville and Brighton Heights, at \$346,689, making a total of \$759,962 for all of the tangible property belonging to the company, leaving a difference of \$340,038, for which amount the committee would like to know what it is proposed to give to the City. If it is franchise or good will, how, in detail, is it made up, also these estimates having been made of the property over two years ago, whether some further allowance should not be made for depreciation since that time. As the six weeks time limit is about to expire, the committee recommends that this matter be rejected at this time, and referred back to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment with the request that further investigation be made in relation to this matter.

AN ORDINANCE providing for an issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of one million one hundred thousand dollars (\$1,100,000) to provide means for the purchase of the property and franchises of the Staten Island Water Supply Company.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

The Committee has held hearings on this matter and District Attorney Jerome appeared and spoke on same. He stated that the Criminal Courts Building, owing to the class of people who daily frequented it, had become very dirty, and that at his request Borough President Ahern had sent around the traveling vacuum cleaner and had thoroughly cleaned the building, as Mr. Jerome says, "for the first time in its existence," and from this result he believed that this vacuum system was the only way in which to clean the corners and crevices in public buildings. His idea of having the permanent vacuum plant in that building was that it could be used daily, and thereby do away with the large force of male and female Cleaners now employed there. The Committee is opposed, at this time, to the installation of expensive permanent vacuum cleaning plants in the various municipal buildings, as it does not believe that there would be any material saving, because from past experience it believes the labor force would not be reduced. If this vacuum cleaning, which is still in the experimental stage, works so well, it may be good policy for the City to purchase one or two traveling plants and use them periodically on all of the City office buildings. The Committee therefore recommends that this resolution be rejected.

Dr. S. T. Armstrong, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

From May 5 to May 11, inclusive, 32 operations were performed at Bellevue Hospital, 9 at Gouverneur Hospital, 14 at Harlem Hospital, and 3 at Fordham Hospital, at all of which the Attending Surgeons or their Assistants were present.

The firm which installed the electric time system in Gouverneur Hospital has submitted an estimate for a similar system for the new Harlem Hospital. It is recommended that this system be installed at the new Harlem Hospital at a cost of \$720.

Certain gas pipe connections are required in the eye room of the out patient department, in the hot air bath room, and in the chemical laboratory of the new Harlem Hospital. It is requested that authority be granted to have this work done, at a cost of \$59.50.

The urinals in the north and south toilet rooms of Harlem Hospital are not properly inclosed. The work of erecting an additional marble partition, with an ash panel door, partition to be set in the terrazo floor, with nickel-plated brass strips, with bolts, to connect it with the present marble partition, can be done for the sum of \$128, and it is recommended that it be allowed.

The Operating Surgeons have asked to have a shower bath installed in the Surgeons' dressing room, adjoining the operating room, of Harlem Hospital. An estimate has been given to remove the present sink and supply a nickel-plated needle shower, with an enamel iron receptor, with proper hot and cold water supply and waste connections, for \$218, and it is recommended that this be allowed.

It has been reported that at Bellevue Hospital articles have been passed into the bath room of the prison ward. The windows are protected by bars, but should be protected in addition by guards made of diagonal mesh. Removable guards for the seven windows can be obtained for the sum of \$63, and it is recommended that they be allowed.

Mr. J. H. Freedlander has submitted a bill of \$191.72 for services rendered for the design and construction of a vacuum cleaning and sweeping system in the new Harlem Hospital and for preparing work and drawings. He claims this as 2½ per cent. on the lowest bid of \$7,670.

Mr. L. G. Kirk, contractor for the steam heating in the main power plant, asks authority to test the rising lines in Pavilions A and B of the new Bellevue Hospital by steam from the main power plant. While this is not in the contract, it would not require a large amount of steam, and would be a better test than the water test called for. It is therefore recommended that this request be granted.

Attention is invited to the low ground north of Fordham Hospital, which is marshy and collects a certain amount of water. It is the site of an old pond, and should be filled in to prevent the nuisance from mosquitoes during the summer.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That action upon installing an electric time system in the new Harlem Hospital be deferred, the General Medical Superintendent being directed to obtain additional estimates and to report upon the balance of the appropriation for supplies for the Department.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That an expenditure of \$59.50 be authorized for certain gas pipe connections required in the eye room of the Out Patient Department, in the hot air bath room and in the chemical laboratory of the new Harlem Hospital.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the General Medical Superintendent be directed to obtain estimates on the work of properly inclosing the urinals in the north and south toilet rooms of the new Harlem Hospital, and also on the work of installing a shower bath in the Surgeons' dressing room, adjoining the operating room of the new Harlem Hospital.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the General Medical Superintendent be directed to obtain additional estimates and accept the lowest on the work of supplying guards for the windows of the prison ward at Bellevue Hospital.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the bill of Mr. J. H. Freedlander for \$191.72 be held awaiting information as to what action was taken on similar bills from other architects.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That permission be given to Mr. L. G. Kirk, contractor for the steam heating in the main power plant of Pavilions A and B of the new Bellevue Hospital, to test the main power plant by steam instead of water, as called for in the contract.

## Geological Investigations.

No. 780, May 11, 1907, transmitted copy of report by Dr. Charles P. Berkey regarding the Kensico dam site, and was filed.

## Real Estate—Possession, Ashokan Reservoir.

No. 781, May 13, 1907, called attention to the pending controversy in regard to possession of an unfinished hotel at Brown's Station, and, on motion, it was referred to Commissioner Chadwick, with power to take such action in behalf of the Board as he might deem advisable.

## Accounts.

No. 782, May 15, 1907, requested that the Chief Engineer and the Department Engineer of Headquarters be relieved of certain detail work in signing certain documents, and, on motion, the following resolution was adopted:

## BOARD OF WATER SUPPLY.

New York May 20, 1907.

A special meeting of the Board was held this day.  
Present—Commissioners J. Edward Simmons (President), Charles N. Chadwick and Charles A. Shaw.  
The reading of the minutes of the previous meetings was dispensed with by consent.

Commissioner Chadwick presented the following report:

"New York, May 20, 1907.

"Board of Water Supply, No. 299 Broadway, City:

"Gentlemen—Pursuant to a resolution of the Board of Water Supply, adopted at a meeting held on the 13th of March, instructing the Secretary to refer to me all communications pertaining to the purchase and sale of property, there was submitted to me the matter of the proposed purchase of a farm located at Valhalla, owned by Mrs. Margaret S. See, which Mrs. See offered to sell to the City for the sum of \$21,000 cash.

"The farm is situated on the westerly side of Broadway, extending westward to the New York Central Railroad tracks and northward to the Bronx river, containing about 19.76 acres; also a piece on the westerly side of the railroad tracks, bounded on the north and the west by the Bronx river, containing 3.179 acres; also a piece on the easterly side of Broadway, directly opposite the above described land, containing .832 acre; making in all a total of 23.771 acres. On the property is located a dwelling house, a barn and two other outbuildings in fairly good condition—old but well kept up.

"The 19.76 acre piece is shown on section 3 of the Southern Aqueduct by Parcel No. 191. The .832 acre piece is shown on section 4 of the Southern Aqueduct by Parcel No. 202. The 3.179 acre piece on the westerly side of the railroad tracks, is not shown on our maps, but Mrs. See will not sell any of her land without including this piece.

"I reported the offer of Mrs. See to sell the property to the City, to the Corporation Counsel, who referred the matter to Mr. H. T. Dykman. On May 16, I received from the Corporation Counsel a copy of a letter sent him by Mr. Dykman, dated May 14, 1907, in which Mr. Dykman refers to the See matter as follows:

"I have been personally acquainted with the properties he (Commissioner Chadwick) refers to for many years. I have made a personal examination of the See property and have talked the question over with people in whose judgment I have the utmost confidence. I have no doubt if The City of New York can acquire a good title to the See property, 24 acres, for \$21,000, it would be wise to do so. These 24 acres include three acres west of the railroad not shown on the map."

"On May 18, 1907, I personally visited the property, and I am of the opinion that it will be of advantage to the City to purchase this property at private sale at the price offered.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That, pursuant to the recommendation of Commissioner Chadwick contained in his report dated May 20, 1907, the Board of Water Supply, in accordance with chapter 724 of the Laws of 1905, and subject to the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, approves of the purchase from Margaret S. See, for twenty-one thousand dollars (\$21,000) cash, of Parcel No. 191, Section 3 of the Southern Aqueduct, containing about 19.76 acres, and Parcel No. 202, Section 4 of the Southern Aqueduct, containing .832 acre, and in addition, 3.179 acres on the westerly side of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad at Valhalla, N. Y., bounded on the north and west by the Bronx river; and that, when and if said purchase shall be approved by said Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the Corporation Counsel be and he hereby is requested to prepare all necessary agreements and other instruments for the signature of this Board and to take such other steps and proceedings as may be necessary and proper.

Resolved, That the following form of the resolution for the grant of the franchise or right applied for by the Nassau Electric Railroad Company, containing the form of proposed contract for the grant of such franchise or right, be hereby introduced and entered in the minutes of this Board, as follows, to wit:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to the Nassau Electric Railroad Company, the franchise or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying all of the terms and conditions, including the provisions as to rates, fares and charges upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows, to wit:

This contract, made this day of 1907, by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the Nassau Electric Railroad Company, incorporated for the purpose of building, maintaining and operating a railroad (hereinafter called the Nassau Company), party of the second part, witnesseth:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Nassau Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate a double-track street surface railroad, with the necessary wires and equipment, crossovers, switches and turnouts, for the purpose of conveying persons and property in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, upon the following route:

Commencing at the intersection of Livingston street and Court street; thence through and along Livingston street to Flatbush avenue; thence through and along Flatbush avenue to Lafayette avenue; thence through and along Lafayette avenue to Fulton street, together with the right to connect the aforesaid tracks with the existing tracks of the Brooklyn City Railroad Company upon Court street, Flatbush avenue and Fulton street; with the existing tracks of the Nassau Electric Railroad Company upon Boerum place, and with the existing tracks of the Brooklyn City and Newtown Railroad Company upon Smith street.

The said route, with crossovers, switches and turnouts, is illustratively shown upon the plan and profile herewith attached, entitled "Map showing plan of tracks of Nassau Electric Railroad Company on application for franchise from City of New York," dated May 29, 1905, and signed E. W. Winter, President; approved, Eugene Keapp, Chief Engineer; which plan and profile are to be deemed and hereby are made a part of this franchise. Provided that deviations therefrom and additional crossovers, switches and turnouts which are consistent with the foregoing description and other provisions of this franchise, may be permitted by resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Sec. 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Nassau Company:

First—The consent in writing of the owners of half in value of the property bounded on said streets and avenues to the construction and operation of said railroad shall be obtained by the Nassau Company within six months of the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and a copy of such consents shall be filed with the Board within such time, or in the event that such consents cannot be obtained, the Nassau Company shall, within two months thereafter, make application to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners in the manner provided by the Railroad Law to determine if said railroad ought to be constructed; otherwise this grant shall cease and determine.

Second—The said right to construct, maintain and operate a double track street surface railroad and the connections as herein described shall be held and enjoyed by the Nassau Company, its successors or assigns, for the term of ten (10) years from the date when this contract is signed by the Mayor, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for a further period of ten (10) years upon a fair revaluation of such right and privilege. Such revaluation shall be of the right and privilege to maintain and operate the said railroad by itself, and not to include any valuation derived from the ownership, operation or control of any other railroad by the Nassau Company, its successors or assigns.

If the Nassau Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two years and not later than one year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Nassau Company and the Board.

If the Nassau Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one year before the expiration of the original

term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding ten years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board) or the Nassau Company shall be bound upon request of the other to enter into a written agreement with each other fixing the rate of compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate and at such amount as shall be determined by three freeholders selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Nassau Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgments upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Nassau Company and its officers under oath. The valuation so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall, in any event, be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of this original contract. If, in any case, the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Nassau Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and expense of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Nassau Company, each paying one-half thereof.

Third—Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any other cause, the tracks and appurtenances, including sub and superstructure, poles, wires and subways for electrical conduits, constructed pursuant to this contract, within the streets and highways hereinbefore described, may be acquired by the City in the manner hereinafter described, and, if so acquired, the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any lawful purpose whatsoever, or may be leased to any company or individual. In case the City should decide, by resolution of the Board, to acquire said tangible property constructed in connection with and pertinent to the franchise herein conferred, a certified copy of the resolution of the Board declaring such intention shall be served upon the Nassau Company at least six months prior to the termination of this contract; or, if the same be renewed, then at least six months prior to the termination of the said renewal term; or, in case of the termination of this contract for any other cause than by expiration, within thirty days after such termination. If the City (by the Board) and the Nassau Company, after the declaration of such intention by the Board and the receipt of said resolution by the Nassau Company, can agree as to the then value of such tangible property, the amount thus agreed upon shall thereupon be paid by the City to the Nassau Company, and the property thus acquired shall become the property of the City from and after the date of termination of this contract or any renewal thereof. Nothing shall be included in such amount for any value derived from the franchise. In case, however, the City (by the Board) and the Nassau Company shall not agree as to the then value of said property within a reasonable time, such value shall be determined by appraisal in the manner hereinbefore described in connection with the revaluation of the terms of this franchise in case of a renewal thereof. If, however, within the time or times hereinabove mentioned, the City shall not declare its intention of acquiring said tangible property, the Nassau Company shall, at the termination of this contract or of any renewal thereof, remove any and all of its tracks and appurtenances constructed pursuant to this contract in said streets and avenues, and said streets and avenues shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Nassau Company. In case the Nassau Company shall neglect, after due notice from the City (by the Board) to remove said tracks and appurtenances after the expiration of this contract or any renewal thereof, then the City shall have the right to make such removal and to collect the expense thereof from the Nassau Company.

Fourth—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual or other corporation a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions, over the same streets, avenues or highways and the right to make the requisite and necessary connections with the tracks of the Nassau Company, its successors or assigns, which shall be constructed under this contract.

The use of the railroad which shall be constructed and maintained in the streets, avenues and highways under this contract including the tracks, wires and other equipment used in connection therewith, shall be permitted by the Nassau Company, its successors or assigns, to any individual or corporation to which the City may have granted, or may hereafter grant, the right or privilege to use such streets, avenues or highways for street railroad purposes, upon payment of an annual sum by such individual or corporation to the Nassau Company, which shall not exceed the legal interest on such proportion of the whole cost of the construction of such railroad, and such proportion of the cost of keeping the tracks and track equipment in repair, as the number of cars operated by such company or individual shall bear to the number of cars operated by the companies then using the same, together with the actual cost of the power necessary for the operation of the cars thereon of such individual or corporation, and such proportion of the cost of laying and repairing of pavement and removal of snow and ice, and of all the other obligations imposed upon the Nassau Company by the terms of this contract, in connection with the maintenance or the operation of the said railroad so used, as the number of cars operated by such company or individual shall bear to the number of cars operated by the companies using the same. And, in addition to the said annual sum, computed as aforesaid, the Nassau Company shall have the right to charge such corporation or individual a portion of the original cost of said railroad—the amount so charged to be in proportion to the respective use of said railroad, and to be also based upon that proportion of such part of the original cost as the unexpired portion of the franchise shall bear to the entire period thereof.

If at any time during the terms of this contract the City shall operate a street surface railroad over the whole or any portion of the railroad which shall be constructed under this contract, the Nassau Company shall allow the City to use the whole or any part of the track and track equipment upon payment by the City of

an annual sum, which shall be no greater in proportion to the use than is provided above in the case of the use of said tracks and track equipment by other street railroad companies.

Each individual and corporation shall be charged by the Nassau Company a rental for the use of the aforesaid railroad tracks and appurtenances thereof that shall be uniform in proportion to use with that which the Nassau Company charges any other individual or corporation.

Fifth—The Nassau Company, its successors or assigns, shall pay for the right to construct, maintain and operate the tracks hereby authorized and described for and during the first five years after the commencement of the operation of this extension, into the treasury of the City, to the credit of the Sinking Fund thereof, three per cent. (3%) of its gross receipts for and during the year ending September 30 next preceding; and after the expiration of such five years make a like annual payment into the treasury of the City, to the credit of the Sinking Fund, of five per cent. (5%) of its gross receipts, such percentages to be paid only upon such portion of the Nassau Company's gross receipts as shall bear the same proportion to its whole gross receipts as the length of its extension shall bear to the entire length of its railroad.

The president and the treasurer of the Nassau Company shall, on or before November 1 in each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller or chief fiscal officer of the City of the gross amount of its receipts for the year ending September 30 next preceding, and the books of such corporation shall be open to inspection and examination by such Comptroller or officer, or his duly appointed agent, for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its reports as to its gross receipts, and shall state in such report the total mileage of its extension herein authorized and the total mileage of the Company.

All payments provided for under this paragraph shall be made on or before November 1 in each year.

The annual charges of payments shall continue throughout the whole term of the contract hereby granted, notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other railroad company providing for payments for railroad rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted, or of any part thereof, or of any of the routes mentioned herein, or of any parts thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract; and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, especially said conditions as to payments, anything in the statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding; and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim, by reason thereof or otherwise, exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

The rights and privileges granted hereby shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by act of the Nassau Company, its successors or assigns, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of The City of New York, acting by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment or its successors in authority, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in any wise notwithstanding. And the granting, giving or waiving of any two or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Nothing in this contract shall interfere with or prevent the Nassau Company making traffic arrangements for cars of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit system, and shall not be construed to prevent other companies or the City operating over the tracks of this extension hereby granted.

All compensation received by the Nassau Company from other railroad companies or from the City for the use of the tracks covered by this agreement shall be included in the amount of gross receipts upon which the Nassau Company is required to pay to the City annually the percentage provided above.

Sixth—The Nassau Company shall commence construction of the railroad herein authorized within three months from the day upon which the consents of the property owners are obtained, or from the decision of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, that such railroad ought to be constructed, and shall complete the construction of the same within six months from the same date, otherwise this grant shall cease and determine, and all sums paid, or which may be deposited with the Comptroller of the City, as hereinafter provided, shall thereupon be forfeited to the City; provided that such periods may be extended by the Board for a period or periods not exceeding in the aggregate six months each; and provided, further, that if the commencement or completion of said construction shall be prevented by legal proceedings in any Court, or by works of public improvement or from any other different cause not within the control of the Nassau Company, the time for the commencement or completion of such construction shall be extended for a period covered by such prevention.

Seventh—The said railroad shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City, who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided in the Charter of the City.

Eighth—The said railroad shall be constructed and operated in the latest improved manner of street railway construction and operation for overhead trolley railroads, and the railroad and property of the Nassau Company shall be maintained in good condition throughout the term of this contract.

Ninth—The rate of fare charged for any passenger upon such railroad by any corporation operating thereon not to exceed the rate lawfully chargeable by such corporation for any passenger for one continuous ride from any point on its railroad, or of any road, line or branch operated by it or under its control, to any other point thereof, or of any connecting line or branch thereof within the limits of the City.

Tenth—The cars of each of the lines of the Nassau Company shall be run both day and night, as often as the reasonable convenience of the public may require, or as directed by the Board.

Eleventh—The Nassau Company shall attach to each car run over the said railroad proper fenders or safeguards, in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now enforced, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities.

Twelfth—All cars which are operated on said railroad shall be heated during the cold weather, in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now enforced, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities.

Thirteenth—The Nassau Company, so long as it shall continue to use any of the tracks upon



the streets and avenues in which the railroad shall be constructed under this contract, shall cause to be watered the entire roadway of such streets and avenues, at least three times in every twenty-four hours, when the temperature is above 35 degrees Fahrenheit, and shall provide for such purpose at least one tank car, to be propelled by electric power, the capacity of which shall be sufficient to water such streets and avenues in a satisfactory manner.

Fourteenth—All cars operated on said railroad shall be well lighted by electricity or by some lighting system equally efficient, or as may be required by the Board.

Fifteenth—The Nassau Company shall at all times keep the streets, avenues or highways upon which the said railroad is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks, and for a distance of two feet beyond the rails, on either side thereof, free and clear from ice and snow; provided, however, that the Nassau Company shall, at the option of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, enter into an agreement for each winter season or part thereof to clean an equivalent amount of street surface from curb line to curb line.

Sixteenth—The Nassau Company shall pave and keep in permanent repair that portion of the surface of the street, avenue or highway in which said railroad is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and for a distance of two feet beyond the rails on either side thereof, under the supervision of the local authorities and whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe.

In case of the neglect of the corporation to make pavements or repairs after the expiration of thirty days' notice to do so, the local authorities may make the same at the expense of such corporation. The Company agrees that notice printed in the City Record shall constitute sufficient notice within the meaning of this contract. And the City shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of any such street, avenue or highway, and in that event the Nassau Company, its successors or assigns, shall be bound to replace the pavement on the portion of the street it is responsible for in the manner directed by the proper City officer at its own expense, and the provisions as to repairs herein contained shall apply to such renewed or altered pavement.

Seventeenth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, where not otherwise provided by self-executing penalties, this contract may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel on notice of ten days to the Nassau Company, or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board.

Eighteenth—If the Nassau Company, its successors or assigns, shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed or to maintain its structures in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Nassau Company, specifying any default on the part of the Nassau Company, and requiring the Nassau Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Nassau Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time the Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall, after the hearing hereinafter provided for, fix such an amount that said Nassau Company shall pay as a penalty as shall seem just and fair to said Board, or the Board, in case such structures which may affect the surface of the streets shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board, as aforesaid, shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Nassau Company, in which case the Nassau Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided.

Nineteenth—The Nassau Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the railroad authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Nassau Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or default of the Company.

Twentieth—This grant is based upon the expressed condition that the Nassau Company, within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City of New York the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), either in money or securities, to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Nassau Company of all of the terms and conditions of this contract, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privilege hereby granted, the efficiency of the public service rendered, the repairs of the street pavement, the removal of snow and ice and the quality of the construction of the railroad; and in case of default in the performance by the Nassau Company of such terms and conditions, the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and material to be furnished for the performance thereof, after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceeding; or after default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund, after ten days' notice in writing to the Nassau Company. Or in case of failure to keep the said terms and conditions of this contract relating to the headway, heating and lighting of cars, fenders, wheelguards and watering of street pavements, the Company shall pay a penalty to be fixed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment after the hearing hereinafter provided for.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties in this contract shall be as follows:

The Comptroller of the City, on complaint made, shall, in writing, notify the Nassau Company, through its president, to appear before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on a certain day, not less than ten days after the date of such notice, to show cause why it should not be penalized in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Nassau Company fails to make an appearance, or, after a hearing, appears in the judgment of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to be in fault, said Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall forthwith impose such an amount as a penalty as appears to it to be just and fair, and without legal procedure instruct the Comptroller to withdraw the said amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with the Comptroller. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund the Nassau Company shall, upon ten days' notice in writing, pay to the Comptroller of the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of ten thousand dollars, and in default thereof this contract shall be canceled and null, at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or right under the provisions of this contract shall affect any of the legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City.

The Company agrees to make application to the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity for permission to string and maintain

its electrical conductors in the streets covered by this grant.

Resolved, That the results of the inquiry made by this Board as to the money value of the franchise or right proposed to be granted and the adequacy of the compensation proposed to be paid therefor, and of the terms and conditions, including the provision as to rates, fares and charges, are as hereinbefore specified and fully set forth in and by the foregoing form of proposed contract for the grant of such franchise or right;

Resolved, That these preambles and resolutions, including the said resolution for the grant of a franchise or right applied for by the Nassau Electric Railroad Company and the said form of proposed contract for the grant of such franchise or right containing said results of such inquiry, after the same shall be entered in the minutes of this Board, shall be published for at least twenty (20) days immediately prior to June 28, 1907, in the City Record and at least twice during the ten days immediately prior to June 28, 1907, in the Brooklyn Daily "Eagle" and the Brooklyn "Citizen," two daily newspapers designated by the Mayor therefor and published in The City of New York, at the expense of the Nassau Electric Railroad Company, together with the following notice, to wit:

Notice is hereby given that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, before authorizing any contract for the grant of the franchise or right applied for by the Nassau Electric Railroad Company, and fully set forth and described in the foregoing form of proposed contract for the grant of such franchise or right, and before adopting any resolution authorizing any such contract, will, at a meeting of said Board, to be held in the Old Council Chamber, City Hall, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, on June 28, 1907, at 10.30 o'clock a. m., hold a public hearing thereon at which citizens shall be entitled to appear and be heard.
