technical or expert service of an occasional and exceptional character to any City

officer, and the amount of whose compensation in any one year shall not exceed

\$750; * * *

—and requested a ruling as to whether the words "any one year" referred to the

current calendar year or to the year beginning on the date of appointment. The

matter was laid over.

The Secretary called the attention of the Commission to the fact that the

opinions requested of the Corporation Counsel on September 12, 1906, and December

4, 1907, as to the legality of the continued employment of certain persons in positions

which they had obtained through transfer, contrary to the decision in the case of Hale

vs. Worstell, and as to the proper classification of the employees of the Board of

Elections, respectively, had not been received. The Secretary was directed to com-

municate further with the Corporation Counsel and request that the opinions be

furnished at the earliest possible moment.

On motion, it was Resolved, That admission to examinations for promotion from minor non-competitive positions to positions in the Competitive Class held pursuant to the provisions of clause 10 of Rule XV., be restricted to those who have served for at least one year in such minor positions.

On motion, it was Resolved, That William H. The proposed weights were approved. On motion, it was Resolved, That the matter of appointing an expert to conduct the coming examination for Veterinarian be and the same hereby is referred to the President, with power.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated March 5, forwarding the resignation of Mr. William N. Berg, Monitor. The resignation was accepted.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated March 4, with reference to the request of Alphonse Putallaz, a candidate for Patrolman, that he be granted a personal interview with him and the Monitor who detected the candidate in consulting a paper not his own. The Secretary was directed to communicate with the candidate and state that the Commission could not see that any advantage would be gained by granting him the desired interview, in view of the fact that on the day of the examination he admitted to the Monitor in question that he had picked the paper from the floor and that the Monitor had stated positively that he saw him consulting it.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated February 7, forwarding a report of Mr. Fuld, Examiner, on the case of Joseph L. Bien, candidate for Court Stenographer. The matter was referred to the President for consideration and a recommendation.

A communication was presented from Mr. Rafferty, Examiner, dated February 22, in relation to the case of Frederick Eldred, candidate for Patrolman, whose name was removed from the list on April 3, 1907, under the provisions of clause 14 of Civil Service Rule VII. The matter was referred to the President for consideration and a recommendation.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the State Civil Service Commission, dated February 26, stating that on that date the following resolutions of the Municipal Commission of New York had been approved in accordance with the understanding arrived at at the recent meeting of the State Board:

1. Amending the classification of exempt positions, under the heading "Board of Water Supply of The City of New York," by including therein the following positions:
Chief of Patrolmen on Aqueduct.
Two Deputy Chiefs of Patrolmen on Aqueduct.
2. Excepting from examination, pursuant to the provisions of Rule XII., paragraph 6, Mr. William N. Thompson, Electrical Engineer, of No. 316 West Ninety-fifth street, to be employed in the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity to supervise the operation and maintenance of the various electrical pumping stations of the high-pressure fire system; the compensation to be at the rate of \$5,000 per annum, and the term of employment not to exceed four months.

The communication was ordered filed. A communication was presented from the Secretary to the Mayor, dated February 7, transmitting for consideration a letter from Louis Wice, of No. 1882 Second avenue, alleging that over one hundred and fifty Laborers employed in the Department of Docks and Ferries were detailed to perform the duties of Watchman. The Secretary was directed to reply to the communication from the Mayor's office and state the result of a previous investigation of the same complaint.

A communication was presented from the Secretary to the Fire Commissioner, dated February 29, forwarding amended records of Firemen James E. McManus, Hook and Ladder Company 55, and John Sullivan, No. 2, Hook and Ladder Company 67, candidates for promotion to Assistant Foreman, with the request that the ratings received by those candidates on "record" be corrected. The amended records were accepted.

A communication was presented from the Secretary to the Fire Commissioner, dated February 29, transmitting an amended record in the case of Fireman John P. Christie, candidate for promotion to Assistant Foreman. It appeared that the origi-

nal record furnished by the Fire Department showed a fine of ten days' pay under date of August 30, 1900, which should have been five days only, and a fine of one day's pay under date of January 25, 1905, which never had been imposed upon the candidate; also that charges of October 2 and 28, 1903, marked "no record," should have been credited to a dismissed member of the Department. The amended record was accepted.

A communication was presented from the Police Commissioner, dated February 14, stating that the books containing the efficiency records of Patrolmen had been forwarded to Police Headquarters by the several commands on December 31, 1907, in anticipation of a call from the Commission for the information contained therein in connection with the examination for promotion to Sergeant, and requesting to be informed, in view of the delay which had occurred in the holding of such examination, whether the said books should not be returned to their several commands for current entries, and left there until such time as the Commission might require transcripts of them. It was also requested by the Police Commissioner that the Commission confirm his understanding of an agreement arrived at whereby it would not be necessary to furnish annual transcripts of the efficiency records of the members of the uniformed force. The Secretary was directed to reply to the communication and state that it would be necessary to return the books to the several precincts for current entries, as, under the rules, the records of the candidates up to the final date for the receiving of applications for the examination for Sergeant would be taken into consideration; and also to state that, in view of the vast number of employees in the uniformed force of the Police Department, transcripts of efficiency records would not be required until a time just prior to the holding of promotion examinations.

A letter was presented from the Commissioner of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, dated February 27, stating that Mr. James J. Bacon, of No. 242 Mulberry street, Manhattan, had been appointed an Architectural Draughtsman in that Department on December 1, 1907, at a salary of \$1,200 per annum, and that his payroll for the month of December had been passed by the Finance Department; that it had refused to audit his January payroll, however, on the ground that the \$1,200 grade of the position of Architectural Draughtsman had not been established for the Department by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen, in accordance with section 56 of the Charter; and requesting, in view of the fact that a \$1,500 grade existed, that Mr. Bacon's payroll for January and February be passed by the Commission at that rate, and that he be granted a leave of absence, without pay, pending the establishment of the \$1,200 grade. The Secretary stated that Mr. Bacon was not eligible for appointment at a salary of \$1,500 per annum, for the reason that a number of persons ahead of him on the eligible list had declined appointment at \$1,200. After careful consideration of the matter the Secretary was directed to certify the payroll for January and February at the rate of \$1,500 per annum, in order that the said employee might be compensated for the services rendered by him, and to authorize a leave of absence, without pay, in his case pending the establishment of the grade of Architectural Draughtsman, \$1,200 per annum, in the Park Department.

A letter was presented from the General Medical Superintendent of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, dated February 27, stating, with reference to recent certifications for the appointment of a Stationary Engineer, that none of the candidates whose names were certified was familiar enough with the machinery of the plant to warrant his employment, and that while they were undoubtedly willing to accept appointment, it would jeopardize the interests of the City to put any one of them in charge of such machinery. The Secretary was directed to reply to the communication and state that if the Department were unable to obtain from the first three candidates on the eligible list of Stationary Engineer one who was able to satisfactorily perform the duties of the position, it would be necessary for the Commission to hold a special examination, open to all competitors, for the reason that the additional requirements were not contemplated at the time of holding the last examination.

A letter was presented from the Secretary of the Health Department, dated March 2, transmitting a copy of a resolution adopted by that Board at its meeting of February 26, substituting Samuel S. Westmoreland, M. D., Hospital Physician, assigned to duty at the Riverside Hospital, The Bronx, as a member of the Board of Examiners for positions in the non-competitive class in the place and stead of Samuel P. Watson, M. D. The appointment was approved.

A letter was presented from the Secretary to the Aqueduct Commissioners, dated February 27, stating that Joseph Dugan, Axeman, had been dismissed from that Department in compliance with the request of the Civil Service Commission. The communication was ordered filed.

The Secretary reported to the Commission that a comparison of the handwriting in the examination papers of John J. Dougan, employed as a Leveler in the office of the President of the Borough of Manhattan, with that in the papers purporting to be those of Joseph Dugan, Axeman in the Aqueduct Commission, made by Mr. William J. Kinsley, Handwriting Expert, of No. 245 Broadway, Manhattan, had left no doubt in the latter's mind that both sets of papers were written by John J. Dougan. On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Secretary be and he hereby is directed to communicate with the President of the Borough of Manhattan and lay before him all the facts in the foregoing case, and request that he take steps immediately to dismiss John J. Dougan from the position of Leveler in his Department.

A letter was presented from the Secretary of the Board of Education, dated February 27, requesting approval of the additional leave of absence, without pay, for one month from February 11, 1908, granted Miss Grace Dahl, Clerk to the Local School Boards of Districts Nos. 37 and 38, on account of continued illness. The leave of absence was approved.

The Secretary presented for consideration a payroll in the amount of \$1,408.06, covering claim No. 53164 for salary of John A. Allen, Topographical Draughtsman in the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, from March 1, 1906, to December 12, 1906, remitted on advice of the Corporation Counsel. It appeared that Mr. Allen had been transferred from the office of the President of the Borough of Queens to the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity on December 20, 1905, at the request of the then Commissioner; that when he reported for duty a new Commissioner had been appointed to the latter Department, and the employee was informed that, owing to lack of funds, no provision could be made for him; whereupon he began action for recovery of salary. The Secretary was directed to attach the certificate of the Commission to the payroll.

A communication was presented from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, dated February 25, with reference to the payroll in the amount of \$192 for salary due Edward Rock for services as Inspector of Masonry Construction in the Bureau of Sewers, Brooklyn, from February 9, 1906, to April 7, 1906. It appeared that the said Inspector, together with a number of others, had been suspended between the dates mentioned pending a hearing of charges; that they were later reinstated, whereupon one of them, Eusebio Ghelardi, had brought suit and recovered his salary for the period of suspension; that the case of Rock being similar, Acting Corporation Counsel Sterling, under date of September 4, 1907, had advised that his salary be paid. The Secretary was directed to attach the certificate of the Commission to the payroll.

A communication was presented from the President of the Borough of Queens, dated February 18, reporting with reference to the complaint of the International Union of Steam Engineers (Local Union No. 319), that Stokers had been performing the duties of Engineers, that Messrs. Charles Lindeman and Hugh Larkins, the employees complained of, were performing the duties of Stokers; that the Jamaica disposal plant was running only eight hours a day, during which time Mr. Mathew Goldner was employed as Engineer. The Secretary stated that a representative of the union had called upon him subsequent to the receipt of the communication from the President of the Borough of Queens and advised him that the said report was not correct. After consideration of the matter the Commission directed that an Examiner be sent to the Jamaica plant to make a personal investigation and ascertain whether the charges were well founded.

A report was presented from the General Medical Superintendent of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, dated February 13, with reference to the complaint of the International Union of Steam Engineers (Local Union No. 319), that Robert Taylor and George Altfelise, Hospital Helpers in the Harlem Hospital, were assigned to perform the duties of Engineer and Oiler, respectively, in the absence of the regular Engineer, who was sent through the buildings to make repairs which should be done by other mechanics, etc. The report stated that it was the custom in all hospitals to have the

Engineers do the minor repair work, such as tightening joints, small steamfitting, etc., and while they were away from the boilers to place Stokers in charge. The communication was ordered filed.

On motion, it was

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
