MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Present-President John C. McGuire and Commissioners Richard Welling and Alexander Keogh.

The President, Mr. John C. McGuire, presided.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil

Service rules and classification, as follows:

1. By changing the table of minimum relative measurements for the positions of Patrolman and Fireman, appearing in clause 2 of Rule XVII., to read as follows:

Hon, Rhinelander Waldo, Commissioner of the Fire Department, and Edward F. Croker, Chief of the Fire Department, appeared. Commissioner Waldo requested that no change be made in the minimum relative measurements for the position of Fireman as fixed by clause 2 of Rule XVII., but suggested that it would be well to fix the probationary period at three months instead of one month. There being no other appearances, the Chair declared the hearing closed.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the classification by including in the exempt class, under the heading "Department of Public Charities," the following: Third Deputy Commissioner. There being no appearances, the Chair declared the hearing closed.

The Commission then went into regular session, and the minutes of the meeting held May 27 were approved.

On motion, it was Resolved, That the classification of positions in the exempt class, under the heading "Department of Public Charities," be and the same hereby is

amended by including therein the following: Third Deputy Commissioner. Mr. Edmund D. Fisher, Deputy Comptroller, appeared before the Commission and requested that Mr. Richmond Smith, of No. 351 W. 56th st., Borough of Manhattan, be excepted from examination, under the provisions of paragraph 6 of Rule XII., to serve as a Statistical Expert at a total compensation not to exceed \$3,600. Mr. Fisher stated that the particular reason for the employment of Mr. Smith for this specialization work was that he was familiar with the details of municipal work and the functions of the Department of Finance through his connection with financial matters on the staff of the "New York Tribune"; that he, furthermore, was familiar with statistical analysis, and as the work involved was largely a new class of work for The City of New York, and as Mr. Smith had already done some work in connection with standardization, it would seem that his employment by the Comptroller was

desirable. Mr. Fisher then retired, and, on motion, it was Resolved, That with the approval of the Mayor and the State Civil Service Commission, the limitation of compensation fixed by clause 6 of Rule XII. be and the same hereby is waived in the case of Mr. Richmond Smith, of No. 351 W. 56th st., New York City, and the Comptroller is hereby authorized to employ Mr. Smith as a statistical expert, to advise the Committee on Standardization of Specifications and the Purchase of Supplies, organized by the Comptroller on May 13, 1910; provided, however, that the total compensation for the services rendered shall not

exceed \$3,600.

Veterans of the Civil War, honorably discharged from the military or the naval service of the United States, shall not be subject to such probation."



For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifica-tions, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department. No bid shall be accepted from or contract

awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.
