

Report for the Quarter ending December 31, 1888.

Sir In compliance with the provisions of section 49 of chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, the Department of Public Parks hereby submits the following statement of its transactions during the three months ending December 31, 1888.

During the period covered by this report no change has taken place in the organization of the Board governing the Department.

In pursuance of the provisions of chapter 721 of the Laws of 1887, an act authorizing the Department of Public Parks to alter the lines, grades and classification of certain streets in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, maps showing the following changes have been adopted and filed after having been duty advertised and hearings given as required by the law:

Map or plan showing changes in that part of Hunt's Point District of the Twenty-third Ward lying between George street, Franklin avenue, the Twenty-third Ward boundary line and Intervale avenue.

Map showing the discontinuance of an unnamed street between Riverview Terrace and Commerce avenue at Morris Dock, in the Twenty-fourth Ward.

Map showing change of street system in that part of the Twenty-fourth Ward bounded on the north by Kingsbridge road, on the east by Aqueduct avenue, on the south by Fordham road, and on the west by Sedgwick avenue.

The sum of \$1,079.20 remaining to the credit of the appropriation made for dredging and cleaning the Mott Haven Canal for the year 1887, to an appropriation required for the care of new parks in the annexed district and the protection of the property of the city lying therein for the same year.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment was also requested to include in the Final Estimate for the year 1889, the following appropriations in addition to those asked for in the Departmental Estimate prepared and forwarded to said Board during the previous quarter:

The sum of fifty thousand dollars to provide for the maintenance and repair of all highways within the limits of the Pelham Bay Park and the care of one-half of City Island Bridge in conformity to the provisions of chapter 421 of the Laws of 1888, and also for the maintenance and repair of all highways within the limits of the new parks in the annexed district.

The sum of twelve thousand dollars for the purpose of raising the iron truss of McComb's Dam Bridge, which obstructs One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street and the Exterior street, to the height required by law.

height required by law.

The sum of two thousand dollars to provide for the laying out of a parade ground and rifle range on Van Cortlandt Park in compliance with the requirements of section 6 chapter 523 of the Laws of 1884.

In accordance with a resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen requesting this Department so to do, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment was also requested to include in the Final Estimate for the year 1889 an appropriation of not less than \$250,000, to provide for the erection, in one of the public places of the city, of a monument in commemoration of the patriotism of citizens who perished while defending the Union during the late Civil War.

The Brush Electric-light Company has been required to remove their electric-light poles and guy posts from Union and Madison Squares.

An offer of Mr. Isaac Bernheimer to present a petrified tree to the Department to be placed on one of the parks, has been accepted.

The privilege of letting skates and chairs at the Central Park Lake during the skating season was granted to August Braun upon his agreeing to pay a sum equal to ten per cent of his gross

receipts for the privilege.

The sum of \$4,431.66 expended by the licensee occupying the Casino Building in Central Park, in repairing and improving that building, was allowed him and applied on account of his license fee due the Department.

A plan for constructing surface railways in Transverse Road No. 3, through Central Park, together with a report thereon, was approved and transmitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for their concurrence, as provided by chapter 407 of the Laws of 1888.

In order to facilitate the opening of the Metropolitan Museum of Art to the public on two evenings of each week, the Board of Aldermen was requested to pass a resolution authorizing the Department to contract, without public letting, for an erectric-light plant for the Museum Building at an expense not to exceed sixteen thousand dollars.

The Counsel to the Corporation has been requested to draft a bill for presentation to the Legislature, conferring upon this Department the power to lease buildings, etc., within the boundaries of the new parks in the annexed district.

The subject of depressing the tracks and changing the grades of that portion of the Port Morris branch of the New York and Harlem Railroad, from East One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street to the junction with the main lines of said railroad at East One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street has been considered and is still under consideration.

CENTRAL AND CITY PARKS.

Gardening Work.

During the past quarter part of the gardening force has been employed in planting trees, shrubs and herbaceous plants on the west side of Central Park, between Eighty-fifth and Ninety-seventh streets, where spaces have been made by the cutting out of dead, diseased or overcrowded specimens. In accomplishing this work there were planted—

Considerable work has been done about the new greenhouses, in grading and putting in drains, in the care and propagation of bedding plants, spreading of manure on flower beds in the Central and City Parks.

General Maintenance Work.

This consists of the daily cleaning of 20 miles of drives and bridle roads, and the daily sweeping and cleaning of 28 miles of walks, and the cleaning from leaves of about 400 acres of lawns on the Central Park, together with the walks and lawns of the various City Parks.

The ladies and gentlemen's cottages of the Department have been kept clean and open, in charge of attendants, on an average of ten hours per day.

The road and walk basins on the Central and City Parks have been cleaned on an average of

When necessary, and the condition of the weather permitted, the drives, as well as Fifth

avenue, West Seventy-second and One Hundred and Tenth streets, have been regularly watered.

During the months of October and November the lawns of the Department were open for the use of croquet and tennis players. The playing of foot-ball was also permitted during the same

The snowfall in November required attention in the way of cleaning the walks of the Central The small parks on Fourth and Park avenues and Manhattan Square have been properly

Many of the walks in the upper part of Central Park have been repaired by the application of silt carted on them from the drives.

The following are a few of the items of special work outside the ordinary maintenance: 7,152 yards of manure and 1,393 yards of garden mould were spread on the lawns of Central Park

Manure has been received on the Park as follows:

From Menagerie and Park Stables, 395 yards.

11,202 square feet of tar walks have been repaired in the Central and City Parks.

Considerable work has been done at East River Park in making walk from Eighty-fourth to Eighty-sixth street, in the Park, excavating for stone steps and grading and spreading mould on the

The sidewalk on One Hundred and Tenth street, between Fifth and Eighth avenues, has been repaired and regraded; repairs have also been made to the roadway.

The work at Mt. Morris Park, during the past quarter, consisted chiefly of the ordinary routine

work of cleaning the lawns, basins, walks, etc.

The work at Riverside Drive has consisted of cleaning the Drive, bridle roads and walks, together with the basins along the same. When necessary the drive has been watered; also West Seventy-second street. The roadway crossing the Drive has been paved.

The work at Morningside Park has been chiefly of a constructive nature, such as putting in drainage, grading slopes and lawns, building steps and laying foundations for walks.

Mechanical Work.

The carpenters have been employed as follows:
Putting up skate buildings at Large Lake and Harlem Mere; also erected a temporary building for the accommodation of gentlemen near the Skate Building on Large Lake; also necessary plat-

Removed and replaced, with new material, nearly all of the wooden ceiling on first floor of Arsenal Building, as well as other repairs to doors, windows, etc.; fitted new closets and lockers for use of Police in basement; inclosed animal cages, made storm-doors and such other repairs and alterations as were necessary at the animal buildings.

Made repairs to 2 summer houses and 6 of the sheds and buildings on Central Park.

Made necessary repairs to 7 cottages on Central Park and 6 cottages on the City Parks.

Made 14 new settees for Central Park and 45 for the City Parks; also 112 old settees for Central Park and 328 for the City Parks.

Made 14 new series for Central Fark and 45 for the City Parks.

Made 22 new signs and repaired 18 old signs for Central Park; also made 8 new signs and repaired 12 old signs for the City Parks.

Made necessary repairs to the doors, windows and floors of the Casino, Dairy and Mount St.

Vincent Hotel buildings.

Laid 4 120 square feet of new board walk and necessary repairs to existing board walks at

Laid 4,120 square feet of new board walk and necessary repairs to existing board walks at Museum of Art.

Repaired wooden fences and gates, where necessary, on the Central and City Parks.

Made necessary repairs to dirt, coal and tool boxes; also made 95 new walk scrapers and repaired 34 old ones on the Central and City Parks.

Inclosed stone work around Terrace bridge and Bethesda fountain.

Made new wooden gates for the southern approach at Third avenue bridge; also repairs to the

At Madison avenue bridge, repaired the foot walks, pipe boxes, etc.

Made 1,531 stakes for use on the Central and City Parks, Riverside Park and Morningside Park.

Made 44 new pieces of rolling stock, such as gutter and snow-plows; also 2 new dirt carts and 1 new grass cart for Central Park; repaired 41 pieces of rolling stock, such as gutter, road and snow-plows, light wagons, hand, dirt and grass carts, watering-trucks and express wagons.

Painters' Work.

Painted, grained and varnished 5 cottages; also the inside and outside of skate building, as well as the repairs of several other buildings, including the Dairy, Casino and Mount St. Vincent hotel

Painted 141 settees for Central Park and 115 for the City Parks.
Painted entire 22 pieces of rolling stock, also the repairs on 10 other pieces.
Attended to the necessary glazing of cettages, buildings and gate-boxes.

Machinists' Work.

The force consists of steam engineers and men employed in operating the bridges over the Harlem river of skilled laborers, blacksmiths, tool dressers, etc.

The three draw-bridges over the Harlem river have been operated satisfactorily.

Repairs have been made to the urinals and iron railings on the Central and City Parks, also to the tool and selling stool.

Masons' Work.

Built 4,023 cubic feet of stone foundation wall, set 420 running feet of fine blue-stone steps, built 5 new walk basins, laid 148 feet of 8-inch drain-pipe and 82 feet of 6-inch drain-pipe at East

In the construction of a walk and new entrance at Sixty-third street and Eighth avenue, Central In the construction of a walk and new entrance at Sixty-third street and Eighth avenue, Central Park, removed 400 cubic feet of surface rock, cut 200 superficial feet of rock-work, built 250 cubic feet of stone foundation, cut and set 120 running feet of rock steps, built 1,250 cubic feet of dry stone work, cut out 16½ feet of existing park wall, set 2 new blue-stone gate-posts, with blue-stone sills, reset coping and drilled 18 holes for gate anchors.

Also on Central Park rebuilt 7 old road basins, 5 walk basins and cleaned 140 feet of drain-pipe on east side, between Seventy-seventh and Seventy-ninth streets.

At the Eighty-fifth street transverse road cleaned 40 feet of 12-inch culvert-pipe, built brick and stone basin and repaired 120 feet of street pavement.

Also cut new stone sills and pointed joints on south and east walls of Arsenal.

At Mount Morris Park excavated and removed 560 cubic feet of earth, laid 576 cubic feet of broken stone, laid 344 square feet of concrete, and cut and set 16 feet of blue-stone steps and coping, also reset stone, curb and sills at ladies' cottage.

At Morningside Park built 1,470 cubic feet of dry stone foundation wall, built 480 cubic feet of stone foundation, cut and set 252 running feet of rough rock, also top cut 9 receiving-basins and

stone foundation, cut and set 252 running feet of rough rock, also top cut 9 receiving-basins and fitted heads to same.

At Bryant Park laid 468 feet of Philadelphia brick, also 628 feet of rough brick-work, laid 590 square feet of blue-stone flagging, cut and set 57 feet of blue-stone curbing in making necessary alterations at ladies' cottage.

Cut and set granite coping and base block stones at Duane and Christopher Street Parks. In addition to the foregoing, made necessary repairs to flues and brick-work of cottages as

Plumbers' Work.

This force has been employed in attending to the plumbing, gas and water connections of the several cottages and buildings on the Central and City Parks, and also the water-closets and urinals

The force at the stables has been employed in cleaning and caring for 65 horses at the Eighty-fifth Street Stables and 21 at the Police Stables; also in cleaning and repairing the harness for same, and cleaning all light wagons, express wagons and supply wagon.

IMPROVEMENT AND CONSTRUCTION OF CENTRAL PARK, UNDER AUTHORITY OF CHAPTER 575, LAWS OF 1887.

Upper Portion of Park Vertical Wall on the Southerly Side of One Hundred and Tenth Street.

This work was commenced by the contractor on August 6, and was completed on November 23.

The work done during the quarter is: 1,396.60 lineal feet coping set and wall pointed.

Erection of Retaining-walls in Transverse Road No. 2.

This work, which is being done under contract and was commenced August 30, is still in progress.

The work done since October 31 is: 295.00 cubic yards of masonry.

Approaches to ant the Reconstruction of the Grounds around the Metropolitan Museum of Art.

The contract for this work was executed October 2, 1888, and work was commenced on October 10, and is still in progress.

The work done since its commencement is: 418 cubic yards of rock excavation.

10,000 cubic yards of earth excavation.

Riverside Drive Completion, between Eighty-fifth and Eighty-eighth Streets.

The work of completing the unfinished portion of the avenue, between Eighty-fifth and Eighty eighth streets was placed under contract September, 1887, and is now completed.

MORNINGSIDE PARK.

The work being done by men in the employment of the Department is under the supervision of the Superintendent of Parks, and has been upon the excavation of rock along One Hundred and Twenty-third street and Tenth avenue; excavation and superstructure of walks, shaping of the grounds and rock-work masonry for foundation of steps on 6-foot walk, from One Hundred and Sixteenth to One Hundred and Eighteenth street, and the laying of drain tiles and pipes.

20 cubic yards rubble masonry in foundation walls has been laid.
2,133 lineal feet of drain-pipe, from 4" to 10" in diameter laid.
50 lineal feet 2" and 3" drain tile has been laid.
7 sewer manholes, with iron covers, built.

EAST RIVER PARK.

Furnishing and Setting Granite Coping and Piers and the Erection of an Iron Railing on the Sea-wall, etc.

The contract for the above named work was executed September 25, 1888, and the contractor notified to begin work on the 29th of October, but the commencement was delayed until December 5, 1888, and the work is still in progress.

The work done is-

Repaying Walk in Connection with the Battery Sea-wall.

The work was commenced by the contractor August 20, 1888, and was fully completed on October 9, 1888.

The work done during the quarter is—

Setting Curb-stones, Repairing and Resurfacing Roadway and Improving Seventy-second Street, between Eighth and Tenth Avenues.

The contractor commenced work on September 27, 1888, and the work is now virtually

HARLEM RIVER BRIDGES.

Third Avenue Bridge. The work of the renewal of the flooring upon the bridge was commenced by the contractor on October 8, 1888, and was prosecuted to completion within the time specified, viz.: One calendar

The work consisted of two courses of floor plank upon 488 lineal feet of roadway and upon 975 lineal feet of foot-walks. The expense of which was \$8,000.

No special repairs to the Madison avenue and Central bridges have been made during the

The very favorable weather during the past quarter has given us an opportunity to carry on the work most successfully, especially in the smaller City Parks, where the work had to be subservient to the necessities of the Central Park; and, therefore, a great number of trees have been cleaned of cocoons and egg-masses, from some of which over 10 quarts of eggs of the orgyia have been taken

The use of the spraying machine was continued until the last of November for destroying scale insects so abundant on many of our park and street trees.

Over 1,300 species of noxious insects are now found to be working on the trees, shrubs and plants of our Parks, which require constant watchfulness and treatment to insure the healthy and fine appearance so essential to the plantations of our Parks. The white pines, which are all so badly affected with the cotton-plant louse, "Chemees," are one of the most troublesome to deal with. The insects have to be removed with corn brooms and the branches afterwards sprayed with the polysolve preparation. Nearly one month of the past quarter has been given to cleaning the trees in Washington Square and the remainder to the different City Parks. The force employed is two men with myself. The following Parks have been cleaned, and the number of trees in each that have been either cleaned of cocoons or sprayed for scale insects given:

Central Park—The work has been to remove the cocoons of the orgyia, the spraying of trees for scale insects and the sap fly, the collecting of the cocoons of cecropia and cynthia from the shrubbery and of bag-worms from a great variety of trees and shrubs; the collecting of retuna, so destructive to the pine trees; the cleaning of the white pine, of which 2,000 have been cleaned and poisoned; the removal of scale insects from trees and shrubs, the collecting of cocoons of polyphemus, the removal of webs and nests from trees and shrubs, the cleaning of the trees on

phemus, the removal of webs and nests from the trees all over the Park, the cleaning the Mall three times; also the removal of egg-masses from the Park wall, Terrace Bridge benches and railings, besides cleaning the cottages of cocoons, and all trees, as far as it was possible, with the help employed.

The two men employed by me are both efficient and industrious, and merit any praise I may give them. The work is extremely hard, as it necessitates a great deal of hard climbing of the largest trees and a very great wear on garments, caused by the rough work and the poisons necessary for the proper carrying on of this work

The number of trees treated in the Central Park during the past quarter is 3,040, and the fine foliage and abundant fruit attest to the care given this Park during the past summer.

In Washington Square 320 trees have been cleaned of noxious insects, and if a tree is covered with cocoons and scale insects, this necessitates two thorough cleanings, and is so counted. Nearly a month has been given to this Park, and only the smaller trees have been cleaned, but they have been thoroughly treated, and the larger ones will be given an ample spraying in the spring with London purple so as to arrest the larger ones will be given an ample spraying in the spring will London purple so as to arrest the larvæ as soon as they emerge from the egg mass which represents nearly 300 individuals, and before they are able to defoliate the tree. This Park has never been thoroughly cleaned, hence the condition of the trees during the past summer. The great size of the trees and the want of sufficient help is the reason for this state of affairs.

Union Square—In this Square the trees have been given the treatment required in the removal of cocoons and scale insects and the webs caused by the tent caterpillar and Ichtyura; 58 trees have

At the beginning of the quarter 9 contracts for street improvements and sewers were in force, and work in actual progress upon all of them.

5 contracts were completed and accepted during the quarter, and 6 new contracts entered into,

upon one of which work has been begun.

At the end of the quarter and year 9 contracts for street improvements and sewers remained unfinished, including property-owners' contracts

Of the contracts completed in the quarter the most important are regulating, grading, curbing and flagging Sedgwick avenue, from Montgomery to Van Courtland avenue; sewer in One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street, from Websier to Third avenue, and in Third avenue, between One Hundred and Sixty-eighth and One Hundred and Seventieth streets, etc.; paving the Southern Boulevard, from Third avenue to Willis avenue. All large contracts.

In addition to the public contracts are several private contracts made by the property-owners under permits, the work being supervised, directed and inspected, as are public contracts, by the officers of this Department. With these and the work being done by the New York and Harlem and other railroad companies, under general supervision and inspection of the Park Department, the quarter has been one of considerable activity in work, there being sixteen works of construction in active operation. active operation.

The large main sewer in Webster avenue has now reached the fourth and last section, the third section being substantially completed, although not yet quite ready for acceptance.

Some work has been done on the last section, but no great advance can be made until next season, when there is a probability of the completion of the entire contract.

Much preparatory work has been done on the Railroad avenue outlet sewer, and although not showing any actually completed sewer, the contract is being put in a condition that will enable its rapid prosecution at the arrival of the next favorable season.

But little has been done during the quarter on the large and important contract for regulating and grading Brook avenue, from the New York and Harlem Railroad to the Bronx Kills, pending the settlement of questions relating to the depression of the Port Morris Branch Railroad and the establishment of new grades, which questions are now likely to be immediately determined, but excellent progress has been made in the quarter on the regulating and grading of Tinton avenue, between Kelly street and Westchester avenue, and on the sewers in Vanderbilt avenue, East, from One Hundred and Sixty-fifth, One Hundred and Sixty-sixth, One Hundred and Sixty-seventh and One Hundred and Sixty-eighth streets, between Vanderbilt avenue, East, and Washington avenue.

The work of depressing the tracks of the New York and Harlem Railroad etc. has rapidly

The work of depressing the tracks of the New York and Harlem Railroad, etc., has rapidly progressed, 2 of the new street bridges having been placed across the railroad, r not permanently in position, but both are in use.

The work has now advanced to a stage at which the general character of the improvement may

Surveys and the preparation of plans for new work have been continued with all possible vigor, and forms of contract and specifications prepared for several important works which are about to be advertised for bids and for others soon to be advertised.

The improvement of the streets is still very much hampered by the slow progress of street opening proceedings, not nearly as many having been confirmed as it was hoped and expected would be in the past year. It is nevertheless gratifying to know that title to Bungay street has at last been obtained, so that the much needed outlet sewer for the Bungay district may be built.

The final surveys are now being made, and the plans and specifications for the sewer will be completed without delay.

Some of the works of improvement now authorized on various streets have been delayed in consequence of proposed changes in connecting streets, now under consideration, by which the plans for the work are affected.

These plans are prevented from being completed while these questions are unsettled:

Looking over the year 1888, it is found that during the period there have been in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards 16 new contracts for sewers and new improvements entered into, divided as follows:

2 for regulating and grading.
2 for regulating, grading, curbing and flagging.
2 for regulating, grading, curbing, flagging and crosswalks.
2 for fencing vacant lots.
4 for sewers with appurtenances.
4 for paying; and also

1 for cleaning and dredging the Mott Haven Canal.
All but 2 of which have been in operation, and 10 of which have been finished.

10 contracts of former years, which remained unfinished at the beginning of the year, were also in progress, making 27 public and private contracts carried on during the year, exclusive of the railroad companies' work and a number of minor works of drainage, curbing, flagging surveys, etc., under the Department's direction, for which there were no contracts.

Of these there were 18 completed and accepted during the year.

The assessment lists made up in duplicate with their accompanying property maps and transmitted in the year represents a total lot frontage of 75,834 linear feet.

The most important sewer contract given out in several years was let during the year, namely: that for the outlet sewer in Railroad avenue, East, from the Harlem river to One Hundred and Fifty, eighth street, which is now being prosecuted.

This sewer has been needed for a very long time, and in order to build it, proceedings for acquiring title to Railroad avenue, East, were begun as long ago as August 14, 1880, but the proceedings met with so many delays that they were not finally completed until March 29, 1888, directly after which latter date, as soon as indispensable preliminaries could be performed, the

contract for the sewer was advertised for bids.

The construction of this outlet sewer will afford the opportunity for properly sewering a district the bad sanitary condition of which attracted attention from the very date of annexation, and will relieve the city from a number of difficulties growing out of complications existing before

annexation of the district.

Branches in the intersecting streets should be built as fast as the progress of the main sewer will permit; but as scarcely any of these cross streets are opened according to law, although they are built upon and rather thickly populated, the want of title to the streets will prevent the construction of the sewers and other improvements as rapidly as required.

Many of the cross streets in this district were roughly regulated and graded before annexation; but, while dedicated to public use, and are therefore under the city's care, title to them not having been obtained by legal proceedings, further and complete assessable improvements upon them are therefore departed.

therefore debarred

For opening the greater number of these streets, however, proceedings are under way.

An extension of the Railroad avenue outlet sewer across and beyond the New York and Harlem Railroad is about to be contracted for, a right of way for its construction that will save the delay of the usual condemnation proceedings having been obtained from the owners of the property.

Besides the public contracts there have been, as previously stated, a number of street improve-

ments carried on under contracts made by the property-owners in accordance with permits issued to them by this Department under authority of the Common Council, the work being inspected and directed in a similar manner to public contracts; and, in addition to the works of street improvements and sewerage, supervision has been given to the work being done by various railroad companies in building, extending and improving their roads.

The Suburban Elevated Railroad has been extended to the line of Twenty-third and Twenty-

fourth Wards, there being now in operation about 2½ miles of this road.

A new horse railroad has been partly completed in the Southern Boulevard, but no part of it

has yet been put in use. Much activity has been displayed in the great work of depressing the tracks of the New York and Harlem Railroad through the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, from the beginning the

work, about the close of last winter, up to the present moment.

In carrying on this work the Railroad Company has evinced a disposition to co-operate with the city's officers in giving due regard to public convenience, which unavoidably is interfered with to a certain extent in works of this kind.

As heretofore reported, the cleaning out of the Mott Haven Canal was carried to a successful completion in the early part of the year under exceptionally difficult conditions and risk, the bad condition of the canal banks and bulkheads requiring the utmost care in prosecuting the work. Owing to extreme circumspection no accident occurred and the completion of the work gave general satisfaction. Its performance necessitated, by slow and painstaking work, the removal of some 20,000 cubic yards of deposit, which had to be dredged, loaded, rehandled, transhipped and dumped at sea.

The progress made on the various contracts in operation during each quarter of the year, and for the whole year, is shown by the annexed schedule, which show also the amount of other work

The total length of new sewer built during the year is 12,895 53-100 linear feet or 2 442-1000 miles, from which, deducting old sewer taken up and replaced by new, gives 27 706-1000 miles as the extent of improved sewerage in the annexed district at the close of the year.

In making up the table of sewerage, no account is taken of a considerable amount of drains for surface drainage or temporary sewerage in various parts of the district, as these will be altered or abandoned whenever the improved sewerage reached the neighborhoods in which they are located.

Hopper, for the construction of an armory building on Fourth avenue, between Ninety-fourth and Ninety-fifth streets, and that one of the provisions of said contract was as follows:

"The contractor will also, except as herein otherwise provided, obtain and pay for all necessary permits, and comply with all corporation laws relating to the subject-matter of these specifications, but is not to pay for any expenses connected with the sewer permits, except the paving."

You inform me that the Department of Public Works has declined to issue permits for the sewer connections without the payment of the regular fees, and has addressed to your Board the following letter:

You state that the contractor has from time to time taken out such permits as were necessary, so as not to delay the work, and has paid for them under protest, and that he now asks to be relieved of such payment, and to be reimbursed in accordance with the terms of his contract, and you ask whether, in view of the Commissioner of Public Works having construed an opinion of this department as conflicting with the form of contract approved by this department, any redress can be made to the contractor, and the course to pursue in making it.

In reply to your inquiry, I beg to inform you that the opinion, doubtless, referred to by the Commissioner of Public Works, was one rendered to the Comptroller by one of my predecessors, Judge Lacombe, under date of February 2, 1887, and which can be found published in the CITY RECORD of March 11, 1887. This opinion has, as you will see, an entirely different application from that apparently placed upon it by the Commissioner of Public Works, and in no way relates to work done for the various city departments, and for the benefit and in the interest of the city itself. The clause in the contract referred to by you is a perfectly proper one, and is binding upon you. It is frequently the case that departments letting contracts, will provide certain materials required for their completion, as in the case of contracts for furnishing and laying water-mains where branch pipes and special castings, etc., are frequently provided by the city, other portions of the material required being provided by the contractor, or, as in the case of the construction of buildings for the use of the Department of Charities and Correction, where frequently a large portion of the labor required for the completion of the work is provided by the city.

It appears to have been the intention of your department that the expense of obtaining the necessary permits for making proper sewer connections should be borne by the city, and the contract would doubtless be so construed by the courts. I therefore advise you that the contractor be reimbursed for the amounts already paid by him for such permits out of the appropriation under which the Armory Building is constructed, and that in future permits which it may be necessary for him to obtain be paid for from such appropriation.

has any duty or office in respect to patients in the course
of treatment, or persons who apply for treatment or care
at a dispensary or hospital, to see that a report is immediately made to the Health Department of the City of
New York of every person infected with a contagious
disease who comes to their knowledge, and that such
person or persons so infected are properly isolated and
kept separate from other persons and other patients.

such premises to be kept. Nor shall any such person
rent, let, hireout, or allow, having power to prevent the
same to be used as or for a place of sleeping or residence,
any portion or apartment of any building, which apartment or portion has not at least one foot of its height
and space above the level of every part of the sidewalk
and curbstone of any adjacent street, nor of which the
floor is damp by reason of water from the ground, or
which is impregnated or penetrated by any offensive
gas, smell, or exhalation prejudicial to health. But this
section shall not prevent the leasing, renting, or occupancy of cellars or rooms less elevated than aforesaid
and as a part of any building rented or let, when they
are not let or intended to be occupied or used by any
person as a sleeping apartment, or as a principal or sole
dwelling apartment.

OF WATER RENTS AND RULES GOVERNING THE USE OF WATER, FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK, ORDER OF JOHN NEWTON, COMISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS.

The rent of all tenements which shall exceed in width fifty feet shall be the subject of special contract with the Commissioner of Public Works.

The apportionment of the regular rents upon dwellinghouses are on the basis that but one family is to occupy the same, and for each additional family, one dollar per year shall be charged.

Meters will be placed on all houses where waste of water is found, and theywill be charged at rates fixed by the Department for all the water passing through them. The extra and miscellaneous rates sha be as follows, to wit:

BUILDING PURPOSES.—For each one thousand bricks laid, or for stone-work—to be measured as brick—ten cents per thousand. For plastering, forty cents per hundred yards.
COWS.—For each and every cow, one dollar per annum. DINING SALOONS shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.
FISH STANDS (retail) shall be charged five dollars per annum each.
For all stables not metered, the rates shall be as follows: HORSES, FISHATE.—For two horses there shall be charged six dollars per annum; and for each additional horse, two dollars.
HORSES, LIVERY.—For each horse up to and not exceeding thirty in number, one dollar and fifty cents each per annum; and for each additional horse, one dollar.
HORSES, COMNIBUS AND CART.—For each horse, one dollar.
HORSES TROUGHS.—For each trough, and for each half

Horses, Omnibus and Cart.—For each horse, one dollar per annum.

Horse Troughs.—For each trough, and for each half barrel or tub on sidewalk or street, twenty dollars per annum; each trough is to be fitted with a proper ball-cock to prevent waste.

Hotels and Boarding Houses shall, in addition to the regular rate for private families, be charged for each lodging room, at the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Laundres shall be charged from eight to twenty dollars per annum, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Liquor and Lager Beer Saloons shall be charged an annual rate of ten dollars each. An additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for each tap or wash-box.

PHOTOGRAPH GALLERIES shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

SODA, MINERAL WATER and ROOT BEER FOUNTAINS shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

STEAM ENGINES, where not metered, shall be charged by the horse-power, as follows; For each horse-power up to and not exceeding ten, the sum of ten dollars per annum; for each exceeding ten, and not over fifteen, the sum of seven dollars and fifty cents each and for each horse-power over fifteen, the sum of five dollars.

WATER-CLOSETS AND URINALS.—To each building on a lot one water-closet having sewer connection is allowed without charge; each additional water-closet or urinal will be charged as hereinafter stated. All closets connected in any manner with sewer shall be charged two dollars for each seat per annum, whether in a building or on any other portion of the premises. METERS.

Under the provisions of section 252, Consolidated Act 1882, water-meiers, of approved pattern, shall be hereafter placed on the pipes supplying all stores, workshops, hotels, manufactories, public edifices, at wharves, ferry-houses, stables, and in all places where water is furnished for business consumption, except private dwellings.

It is provided by section 352, Laws of 1882, that "all expenses of meters, their connections and setting, water rates, and other lawful charges for the supply of Croton water, shall be a lien upon the premises where such water is supplied, as now provided by law." *

All manufacturing and other business requiring a large supply of water will be fitted with a meter.

The rate charged for steam-vessels taking water daily or belonging to daily lines, is one-half cent. per ton (Custom House measurement) for each time they take water. Steamers taking water other than daily, one cent per ton (Custom House measurement).

All matters not hereinbefore embraced are reserved for special contract by and with the Commissioner of Public Works.

HYDRANTS, HOSE, TROUGHS, FOUNTAINS, ETC., ETC.

No owner or tenant will be allowed to supply water to another person or persons.

All persons taking water from the City must keep their own service-pipes, street tap, and all fixtures connected therewith, in good repair, protected from frost, at their own risk and expense, and shall prevent all waste of mater.

The use of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons, railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot be per-

railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot be permitted.

No horse-troughs or norse-watering fixtures will be permitted in the street or on the sidewalk, except upon a license or permit taken out for that purpose. All licenses or permits must be annually renewed on the first of May. Such fixtures must be kept in good order and the water not allowed to drip or waste by overrunning the sidewalk or street, or to become dangerous in winter by freezing in and about such troughs or fixtures.

No hydrant will be permitted on the sidewalk or in the front area, and any hydrant standing in a yard or alley, attached to any dwelling or building, must not be left running when not in actual use, and if the drip or waste from such hydrant freezes and becomes dangerous in winter, the supply will be shut off in addition to the penalty of five dollars imposed.

Taps at wash-basins, water-closets, baths and urinals must not be left running, under the penalty of five dollars for each offense, which will be strictly enforced.

Fountains or jets in hotels, porter-houses, eating-saloons, confectioreries or other buildings are strictly prohibited.

The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, house-fronts, vards, court-vards, gardens, and about

prohibited.

The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, house-fronts, yards, court-yards, gardens, and about stables, is prohibited. Where premises are provided with wells, special permits will be issued for the use of hose, in order that the police or inspectors of this department may understand that the permission is not for the use of Croton water.

Opening free hydrants to fill hand sprinkless or other

Opening fire-hydrants to fill hand sprinklers or other vessels will not be allowed.

The penalty for a violation of any of the preceding rules and regulations will be five dollars for each offense, and if not paid when imposed will become a lien on the premises in like manner as all other charges for unpaid water rates.

PUBLIC NOTICE AS TO WATER RATES.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559, Laws of 1887, amending sections 550 and 521 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed June 9, 1887, the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rents :

ing water rents:

1st. All extracharges for water incurred from and after
June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in
arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretotore been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meters
are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water
by meter measurement shall be the only charge against
such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through
meter.

such building, or such part thereot as is supplied through meter.

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

5th. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1881, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.

NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full torce in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

on the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore even to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will he allowed for any portion of one year.

GRANTS OF LANDS UNDER WATER.

The OWNERS OF LANDS IN THE CITY OF New York, which were formerly under water, and which were granted by the City of New York, are notified that nearly all of the grants of such lands contain covenants, on the part of the grantees, and their successors and assigns, to maintain and keep in repair the adjacent streets. The condition of many of these streets is such as to make it necessary that they should be repaired and repaved, and that the obligation resting upon the present owners of adjacent lots to do this work should now be enforced. Many of such owners have requested that such covenants be commuted, and wholly released, upon the payment by them of a certain sum per lot.

The natter will shortly be presented to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for their consideration, and the adjustment of the basis of commutation, and application for releases should therefore be made at once.
