AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 209 Stewart Building, on Wednesday, November 23, 1887, at 3 o'clock P. M.

Present—Commissioners Spencer, Dowd, the Commissioner of Public Works, and Commissioners Baldwin, Barnes, Ridgway and Fish.

Also, Chief Engineer Church, and Consulting Engineer Fieley, and Chief Engineer Birdsall of the Department of Public Works.

The minutes of the stated meeting of November 16 were read and approved.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported their examination and audit of bills contained in voucher No. 3120; and also in vouchers Nos. 3123 to 3136, inclusive; and, on motion, of Commissioner Dowd, the same were approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

Also reported that they had examined the bids received for building the gate-house superstructures, etc., at Pocantico, on Section 4, and at South Yonkers, on Section 9 of the New Croton Aqueduct, and found that the checks received as security, amounting to \$900, were correct; and

that the amount so received had been transmitted to the Comptroller, and the receipt therefor was on file with the Commissioners; that the bids of Thomas Dobbin show the following irregularities, viz.: For gate-house superstructure, etc., at Pocantico, on Section 4, names of sureties not given and affidavit not signed by notary public. For gate-house superstructure, etc., at South Yonkers, on Section 9, names of sureties not given and affidavits not properly made out, the state and county being left blank; and they were therefore of the opinion that said bids were informal. That the bids of Brown, Howard & Co. and John Pierce for the gate-house superstructure, etc., at Pocantico, on Section 4, and of O'Brien & Clark and John Pierce for the gate-house superstructure, etc., at South Yonkers, on Section 9, were found correct as to their formality and the sufficiency of the sureties proposed by them.

Whereupon Commissioner Dowd moved that the bids of Thomas Dobbin, for building both of said gate-houses be rejected, on account of their informality, which was unanimously carried.

Commissioner Newton then moved that the bid or proposal of John Pierce, for building the gate-house superstructure, etc., at Pocantico, on Section 4 of the New Croton Aqueduct be accepted, and the contract awarded to him, which motion was unanimously carried.

Commissioner Barnes then moved that the bids or proposals of O'Brien & Clark and John Pierce, for building the gate-house superstructure, etc., at South Yonkers, on Section 9 of the said New Croton Aqueduct be rejected, which motion was unanimously carried.

Commissioner Fish then moved that the President and Secretary be directed to readvertise for bids or proposals for building the gate-house superstructure, etc., at South Yonkers, on Section 9 of said New Croton Aqueduct, in the CITY RECORD, "New York Star" and "New York Tribune;" said bids to be opened on Wednesday, December 14, 1887, which motion was unanimously carried.

Commissioner Baldwin then moved that the Secretary be directed to obtain from the Comptroller the checks of, or the deposits made by, the unsuccessful bidders, and return the same to such bidders.

Which motion was unanimously carried.

The Committee on Construction recommended the adoption of the following resolution: Resolved, That upon the recommendation of the Chief Engineer, Frederick W. Frost, Assistant Engineer, is hereby granted six months leave of absence from December 1, 1887, without pay.

Adopted.

Also, recommended the adoption of the following resolution: Resolved, That upon the recommendation of the Chief Engineer, P. Bartow and G. W. Hunt be and they are hereby temporarily appointed Assistant Draughtsmen at a salary of \$125 per month, they having been certified by the Civil Service Commission as being eligible for such appointment.

Adopted.

Also, recommended the adoption of the following resolution: Resolved, That an appropriation of \$125 is hereby made to cover cost of enlarging the Assistant Engineer's office, at Croton Dam.

Adopted.

Also recommended the adoption of the following resolutions: Resolved, That on consideration of the communication of the Honorable Commissioner of Public Works to the Aqueduct Commissioners, dated October 24, 1887, accompanying the return of a proposed form of contract and specifications for the construction of a pipe-line from One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street and Convent avenue to the reservoir in Central Park, including a gate-house and chambers and superstructure for the connection of said pipe-line with the Central Park reservoir, the Committee on Construction recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the said proposed form of contract and specifications be returned to the said Commissioner of Public Works, and he be requested to report at as early a day as practicable three separate forms of contract and specifications for the said work and materials, as follows:

First—A form of contract and specifications for furnishing and delivering to the Aqueduct Commissioners, within the City of New York, all 48-inch cast-iron pipes and their appurtenances, and all other iron pipes and iron castings and ironwork required for the said pipe-line, from One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street and Convent avenue, to its connection with the reservoir in Central Park, including the ironwork required for the gate-house on the northerly side of said reservoir, and its chambers and its gates and its substructure, and all its connections with the said reservoir, and for the construction of said pipe-line, and for laying and connecting the same from One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street and Convent avenue to the said gate-house, and for doing all excavation for the same, including the construction of all sewers and other masonry work necessary to finish and fully complete said pipe-line and its connections as the work of construction of Section 16; and this form of contract and specifications shall provide that the work of removal or alteration of structures and appliances now in service as culverts, sewers and water-mains and service-pipes, and the taking up and relaying of the same when necessary, shall be done under the direction and supervision and subject to the inspection and acceptance of the Chief Engineer and his Assistant Engineers of the Department of Public Works.

Second—A form of contract and specifications for the construction of said pipe-line, and for laying and connecting the same from One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street and Convent avenue to the said gate-house, and for doing all excavation for the same, including the construction of all sewers and other masonry work necessary to finish and fully complete said pipe-line and its connections, as the work of construction of Section 16; and this form of contract and specifications shall provide that the work of removal or alteration of structures and appliances now in service as culverts, sewers and water-mains and service-pipes, and the taking up and relaying of the same when necessary shall be done under the direction and supervision and subject to the inspection and acceptance of the Chief Engineer and his Assistant Engineers of the Department of Public Works.

Third—A form of contract and specifications for furnishing and delivering to the Aqueduct Commissioners, within the City of New York, all forty-eight-inch cast-iron pipes and their appurtenances, and all other iron pipes and iron castings and ironwork required for the said pipe-line, from One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street and Convent avenue to its connection with the reservoir in Central Park, including the ironwork required for the gate-house on the northerly side of said reservoir, and its chambers and its gates and its substructure, and all its connections with the said reservoir; and for the construction of said pipe-line, and for laying and connecting the same from One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street and Convent avenue to the said gate-house, and for doing all excavation for the same, including the construction of all sewers and other masonry work necessary to finish and fully complete said pipe-line and its connections, as the work of construction of Section 16; and this form of contract and specifications shall provide that the work of removal or alteration of structures and appliances now in service as culverts, sewers and water-mains and service-pipes, and the taking up and relaying of the same when necessary shall be done under the direction and supervision and subject to the inspection and acceptance of the Chief Engineer and his Assistant Engineers of the Department of Public Works.

Fourth—A form of contract and specifications for the construction of the gate-house, its foundations, connections, superstructure, substructure, chambers, gates and appurtenances, including the structures required for the connection of said gate-house, and the said pipe-line with the said reservoir in Central Park, constituting Section 17 of the Aqueduct work.

The contract shall provide that all of the work of construction and the materials furnished for that portion of Section 17, as shall constitute and comprise the necessary substructures and superstructures required for the connection of said gate-house with the reservoir in the Central Park, shall be done and furnished under the direction and supervision, and subject to the inspection of and acceptance by the Chief Engineer of the Department of Public Works, and his subordinates.

Adopted.

By Commissioner Barnes—Resolved, That the bid-box be closed and the keys given to the President, and that John C. Sheehan, Secretary, be authorized by this Commission to receive the bids or proposals for building a masonry dam and work connected therewith on the east branch of the Croton river, in the town of South East, Putnam County, New York, and place the same in the bid-box, and also to receive the checks of the bidders, and to make the necessary preparations for opening the bids at 3 o'clock P. M., on Wednesday, December 7, 1887.

Adopted.

The Committee on Real Estate submitted a report relative to lands belonging to James N. Tompkins, which are now being used for dumping the material taken from Shaft No. 13½, in the town of Greenburg, Westchester County; and in connection therewith, recommended the adoption of the following preamble and resolution:

Whereas, In the judgment of the Aqueduct Commissioners it has become important and necessary in the prosecution of the work on the New Aqueduct that about one acre of land in the immediate vicinity of Shaft No. 13½, in the town of Greenburg, Westchester County, shall be obtained for dumping ground to said shaft, and suitable land for the purpose in that vicinity is owned by James N. Tompkins; therefore

Resolved, That the Real Estate Committee is hereby directed to have the necessary land surveyed and mapped and the map delivered to the Corporation Counsel, who is requested to take the necessary proceedings to have the said land laid down upon the property maps of that section of the Aqueduct, to the end that the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonality may become seized in fee of the same, and its value be determined by Commissioners of Appraisal, under the law; and the Committee on Real Estate is further directed to aid the said Counsel in the premises in every way practicable.

The report of the Committee was adopted.

The Comptroller, under date of November 19, 1887, gave notice of the issue of warrants for the payment of vouchers not certified to by the Aqueduct Commissioners, for Westchester County Section..... \$31,846 62

—which was ordered entered upon the books of the Commission and filed.

The Commissioners then adjourned.

Whereas, The said Mayor and Register have determined that said act cannot go into operation

at the time therein designated thereof, by reason of the non-completion of said map and indices, and for other reasons;

Now, therefore, I, Abram S. Hewitt, Mayor of the City of New York, do hereby give notice that I have extended and do hereby extend the time for said act to go into operation, and for said books, maps and indices to be completed, to the thirtieth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, which is hereby designated by me as the date upon which said act shall go into operation in said Register's office.
